To the Citizens of the Town of Litchfield:

Your committee will not present an extended report as the most important subjects are taken up in the Superintendent's report. Superintendent C. M. Kendrick, who was deeply interested in the schools of his district, was called into service in June. The committee of the district met and elected Mrs. Ha rriet N. Fenderson of Farmington, Maine, Superintendent of Schools of the Litchfield Union to begin her work in July, 1918. Mrs. H. N. Fenderson is a graduate of Gorham Normal School and came to us well recommended and we believe her service will prove that we made no mistake in our She entered upon her duties with energy and zeal and your committee feels that much hard work has been done to improve the methods of instruction, and we appreciate the high personal work of the superintendent and teachers. Your committee heartily endorse the recommendation made by the superintendent in her report.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Litchfield:

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit to you, this, my first Annual School Report, as Superintendent of Schools for the fiscal year ending February 1919.

Owing to the epidemic of influenza during the past fall and winter, the schools in Litchfield have been forced to close twice; once in the middle of the fall term for four weeks, and at the beginning of the winter term, three more weeks.

The scarcity of teachers, and these enforced vacations, have been two very hard problems for superintendents this year. All the schools in Litchfield, however, have been maintained, and time lost will be made up during the spring vacation, providing there are no more interruptions.

In several schools the teachers have been much troubled by tardiness of the pupils. Written excuses will be demanded hereafter in all instances, and no written excuse will be accepted unless it is at least formally consistent with the provisions of the law. The cooperation of the parents is earnestly desired.

TEACHERS -

As most of your elementary schools are rural and quite small in number, with small pay, the large part of the teachers, with only a few exceptions, employed the past year have been inexperienced and untrained Academy and High School graduates. Although the teachers have been faithful and conscientious workers, the results have not been entirely satisfactory.

As the tendency of the most competent teachers is toward the well paid positions in the graded town and city schools, it has been suggested by our Governor that the State Superintendent of public schools be authorized to offer to a certain number of selected teachers each year, a special summer course of training, designed to fit them for teaching in rural communities, and that the ordinary salary which they would receive during their subsequent service in rural schools be supplemented by a substantial sum to be paid by the State. As a part of this arrange-

ment, the teachers should agree to serve as model rural teachers under the direction of their local superintendent. A bill has already been introduced in this legislature calling for an appropriation of \$5,000 to carry out this work in 1919.

If the Smith Bill, now before Congress, providing Federal aid for school, becomes a law, about one million dollars will be added to the school funds of our State. It is hoped that some of this money will be used to insure efficient teachers in the rural schools and the sparsely settled localities in our State.

A well attended and interesting teacher's meeting was held at the Lincoln school, Litchfield Corner, in the early fall and other meetings were planned, but were postponed on account of sickness.

EQUALIZATION FUND

In accordance with the provisions of section 166-168 chapter 16 R. S.

The town of Litchfield received this year \$245.00 from the State Equalization Fund to be expended under the direction of the superintending school committee as follows:

\$175.00 for increasing teacher's wages,

\$70.00 towards improvement of out buildings.

Miss Della Tuttle, a graduate of Gorham Normal School, has been employed as a Helping Teacher the past term, and will continue through the year in the same capacity to help out some of the young and inexperienced teachers in their school work.

The excellent work done at Litchfield Academy this past fall and winter terms by Prin. E. A. Kimball and Ass't Miss Godfrey is thoroughly appreciated by both the superintendent and committee, her report is as follows:

REPORT OF LITCHFIELD ACADEMY

To the Superintendent of Schools:

The work of the school year, 1918 and 1919 opened of the Academy on September 17th, and has been continued industriously since that time. The students seem reasonably interested in their work, and fully half of them very much so.

The entering class is gratifying, both in number and in quality, and it is to be hoped that all members of this class will retain their interest, and present themselves, with ample deserts, for their diplomas in June 1922.

A special effort is being made to help students to realize and appreciate their privileges at the Academy, and to make them love their work; also to keep their minds fixed upon the importance of an education, whatever the life-work shall be; also they are called to consider and to begin to realize the great responsibility before them as progressive, effective and helpful citizens. While they study mathematics, history, etc., these must be related to life.

The trustees have been quick to respond to calls for needed repairs. Doubtless, more can and will be made.

Our constant endeavor is to make the work of such a nature that it will command general respect and win hearty co-operation and willing assistance from a live and appreciative public, and the patronage of all those needing the benefits such a school can give.

The Academy can still be made a notable and noteworthy educational institution; and it should also become the center of the civic thought and life and work of this community.

FREPAIRS

The Lincoln school at Litchfield corner was greatly improved the past summer by graining the interior wood work, tinting the walls and ceiling, and erecting a new out-building, connecting it with the back of the school room by a latticed walk. Other necessary repairs were made on several of the other school buildings. This year, some of the other out-buildings and shed should be repaired, and a new chimney built at the North school.

BOOKS

No new books have been bought this fall, as a large number of supplementary readers, geographies, and histories were purchased in the spring by Superintendent Kendrick. Many of the basal text books in use however will have to be replaced before long, as quite a number are in very bad condition.

SUPPLIES

The Palmer Method writing manuals were purchased for the use of the teachers in all the schools, the past fall, and next year it will be necessary to get manuals for each pupil. Owing to the high price of paper, only a small supply was bought this year.

Maps are greatly needed in some of the schools, as well as new blackboards.

The flags should receive attention, as a number are badly worn.

I am sure, that every boy and girl in Litchfield will want to help by joining one of the Victory Garden

Clubs this coming spring.

WARRANT

To O. A. True, Constable of the Town of Litchfield:

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Litchfield qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday the third day of March A. D. 1919 at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art. 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year Art. 3 To attend to the report of the Selectmen Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer Town Agent, Auditor of Accounts, Superintendent of Schools and School Committee.
- Art. 4 To choose three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor, Town Treasurer, Town Agent, Auditor of Accounts, a collector of Taxes, one or more members of the School Committee, one or more Constables, Surveyors of wood and lumber, Fence Viewers and Field Drivers, a Pound Keeper, Sealer of Weights and Measures and all other necessary Officers, Agents and Committees and one or more Fire Wardens.
- Art. 5 To see if the town will vote to have one or more Road Commissioners.
- Art. 6 To vote a sum of money for the support of schools.
- Art. 7 To vote a sum of money for the purchase of school books.

- Art. 8 To vote a sum of money for school supplies.
- Art. 9 To vote a sum of money for repairs of school houses.
- Art. 10 To vote a sum of money for Incidental town expenses.
 - Art. 11 To vote a sum of money for support of poor.
- Art. 12 To vote a sum of money for repairs of roads and bridges.
- Art. 13 To vote a sum of money to pay snow bills for the present winter.
- Art. 14 To see if the town will vote to buy a new road machine and raise money for same.
- Art. 15 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid, as provided in section 20 of chapter 130 of the Public Law of 1913.
- Art. 16 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533 for the improvements of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 19, of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
 - Art. 17 To see whether the town will vot to raise money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town, under the provisions of section 18 of chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
 - Art. 18 To vote a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day and act anything in relation thereto.
 - Art. 19 To see if the town will authorize the Superintending School Committee to contract with the Trustees of Litchfield Academy for the tuition of the High School scholars for the ensuing year, in that institution and raise a sum of money for that purpose or act anything relating thereto.

Art. 20 To see if the town will vote how many schools shall be maintained the coming year and where they shall be located.

Art. 21 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to hire money, if it should become necessary to pay the town's indebtedness.

Art. 22 To see if the town will establish a price for labor on the highway or act anything in relation thereto.

Art. 23 To see what action the town will take for caring and running a hearse.

Art. 24 To see if the town will gravel a part of the Pond road and raise money for that purpose.

Art. 25 To see what action the town will take as to pay for the Superintending School Committee for the year 1919 and act anything in relation thereto.

Art. 26 To see what action the town will take in reference to caring for the town's poor and act anything necessary thereon

Art. 27 To see if the town will raise a sum of money to help defray expenses at Litchfield farm.

Art. 28 To see if the town will authorize the Superintending School Committee to repair one or more school buildings in compliance with the plans submitted by the State Superintendent of Schools, and raise a sum of money for that purpose.

Art. 29 To see if the town will vote to have the taxes collected within the year by December 15, 1919.

Art. 30 To see if the town will vote to open the school at North Litchfield and have the opening in the hands of the School Committee.

Art. 31 To see if the town will vote to continue the Berry school for the ensuing year, now closed by law.

Art. 32. To see if the town will accept the list of Jurors revised by the Selectmen, Treasurer and Town Clerk.

Art. 33 To direct how future town meetings shall be called and at what time in March 1919 the annual town meeting shall be held.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session on the day named above from nine until ten o'clock in the forenoon to receive evidence of qualification of voters.
