REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Litchfield:

I hereby submit my annual report of the progress, condition and needs of your schools including the School Statistics, and Financial Report for the fiscal year ending February 20, 1924.✓

Eight schools have been maintained this year and five of the teachers retained. Good work was done in all the schools during the summer term with one exception. In the Waterman very little hard work was done because of the teacher's lack of discipline and tact. It was necessary to employ new teachers in the Earle, Waterman and North schools for the fall term. Two of these had had experience and one was a one year girl at Normal School. During the fall term good progress was evident from the good attendance and the enthusiasm of both teachers and pupils. All were striving to do their best. The attendance for the winter term has been unusually good although two schools suffered because of contagious diseases. Good work has been done.

THE PARENT TEACHERS' ASSOCIATION

Although an Association has existed in this town for a number of years no meetings have been held until recently interest has been aroused. Several meetings were held in the different schools, where the respective teachers furnished the entertainment. At the meeting held at the Ferrin school this fall we were fortunate to secure Mr. R. J. Libby, State Agent for Rural Education, who spoke on Education and its value in the Rural Districts. We hope to hear him later at a similar meeting to be held at the Grange Hall at the North.

HOT LUNCHES

Most of our teachers are serving some warm dish during the cold weather and their efforts are rewarded by the good effects on the pupils. These lunches are especially beneficial where more than half of the pupils carry their dinners.

TRANSPORTATION

At present we find it necessary to employ five separate transportation teams. Three of these are carrying from one to three pupils for a distance of not over two miles. About thirty dollars per week is being paid to accommodate ten pupils.

REPAIRS

The Waterman school-house was shingled on both sides, the ceiling patched and painted. Two new doors were hung inside and a new stove and jacket with new funnel were placed in the schoolroom. All this school-house needs now is a new floor to make it one of the most attractive schoolrooms in town. The Lincoln, Earle and Oak Hill schools were placed in good shape, the ceiling and walls were painted. The ceiling of the Pine Tree was also painted. Two approved toilets were built at the Earle and Pine Tree. This leaves but one school now which does not have an approved toilet. Shingles are purchased to shingle the North schoolhouse. The North, Washington, and Ferrin schoolhouses need to be painted inside and the Lincoln painted on the outside this coming year. A jacket is needed for the Pine Tree school.

LITCHFIELD ACADEMY

We were fortunate this fall to secure two excellent teachers for Litchfield Academy. Both of considerable experience who have at all times endeavored to uphold the standard of the school. The following report of the principal merits careful attention.

LITCHFIELD ACADEMY

To the Friends of Litchfield Academy:

There are several encouraging matters to report this year in connection with Litchfield Academy.

In the first place the officials of the school have shown a very helpful and substantial interest in endeavoring to supply us with books and equipment. We have added therefore a much needed supply of physical apparatus to our laboratory as well as books.

We have conformed to the State Agent's Course of study for a two teacher high school and are following his outline exactly.

Another important and satisfactory feature of the work this year is the co-operation of the students with the teachers. They have responded nobly to every call for the betterment and uplift of the school, whether it was trimming the trees and improving the appearance of our grounds or writing essays. Good progress has been the result.

We have been making a strong effort to keep our attendance this year, over 30, for by doing so we shall be entitled to more state aid. Up to last month we have maintained an average of 34. This month owing to sickness and winter conditions it will be somewhat less. We heartily appreciate the help of the parents on this line thus far and hope with your assistance to finish the year well above the necessary thirty.

We have introduced daily physical exercise and have bought a victrola to help in this department, the students selling candy to pay for the instrument.

We hope with your assistance to purchase suits and other equipment for our baseball team this spring and that a creditable nine will represent the Academy.

We have been handicapped by lack of room for physical exercises and for games at socials, etc., and humbly recommend an additional room to be built for this purpose which will not only serve for a gymnasium and indoor games but for manual training and agricultural room.

Our blackboards, seats and flag-pole are in a needy condition while our toilets and sanitary arrangements are very poor.

We would also recommend an entirely different heating plant that would give an even temperature.

Why not have a coat or two of paint on the building to add to the general tone of refinement?

Our policy and aim is to assist in developing the young people mentally, physically and morally to become all around citizens. We have excellent material and we are enthusiastic.

WARRANT

To H. F. Woodard, Constable of the Town of Litchfield,

GREETINGS:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Litchfield qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to assemble at the Town House in said town on Monday the third day of March A.D., 1924 at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To attend to the report of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseer of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Town Agent, Auditor of Accounts, Superintendent of Schools, and School Committee.

Art. 4. To choose three or more Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Town Agent, Auditor of Accounts, A Collector of Taxes, one or more members of the School Committee, one or more Constables, Surveyors of Wood and Lumber, Fence Viewers, Sealers of Weights and Measures and all other necessary officers, agents and committees and one or more Fire Wardens.

Art. 5. To see if the Town will vote to have one or more Road Commissioners.

Art. 6. To choose a Road Commissioner.

- Art. 7. To vote a sum of money for support of Schools.
- Art. 8. To vote a sum of money for the purchase of School Books.
- Art. 9. To vote a sum of money for School Supplies.
- Art. 10. To vote a sum of money for the Repairs of Schoolhouses.
- Art. 11. To vote a sum of money for Incidental Town Expenses.
- Art. 12. To vote a sum of money for Support of Poor.
- Art. 13. To vote a sum of money for the Repairs of Roads and Bridges.
- Art. 14. To vote a sum of money for paying Snow Bills for the present winter.
- Art. 15. To see if the Town will establish a price for labor for the present winter or act anything in relation thereto.
- Art. 16. To see if the Town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
- Art. 17. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the money raised in 1923, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 154 of the Public Laws of 1917, for the construction of a State Highway or act anything in relation thereto.
- Art. 18. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways

and bridges; the above amounts being the maximum which the Town is allowed to raise under provisions of Section 19, Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 19. To see whether the Town will vote to raise money, and what sum for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the Town, under the provisions of Section 18 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.

Art. 20. To vote a sum of money for the observance of Memorial Day and act anything in relation thereto.

Art. 21. To see if the Town will authorize the Superintending School Committee to contract with the Trustees of Litchfield Academy for the tuition of the High School scholars for the ensuing year, in that institution.

Art. 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for graveling the road from Litchfield Corner to the Bowdoin line and act anything in relation thereto.

Art. 23. To see if the Town will grant David Bowie permission to build a cattle pass under the highway.

Art. 24. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to hire money, if it should become necessary, to pay the Town's indebtedness.

Art. 25. To see what action the Town will take for caring for and running the hearse.

Art. 26. To see what action the Town will take as to pay for the Superintending School Committee for the year 1924 and act anything in relation thereto.

Art. 27. To see what action the Town will take in reference to caring for the Town's Poor and act anything in relation thereto.

Art. 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise a sum of money for graveling the Pond Road and act anything in relation thereto.

Art. 29. To see if the Town will approve and receive from John Day Smith, a native of Litchfield, the sum of one thousand dollars to be safely invested and kept intact forever and the income thereof to be used in maintaining a fence around the old Grant Cemetery, in what was formerly called School District No. 5, and caring for the ground therein.

Art. 30. To see if the Town will vote to accept the list of jurors as revised by the Selectmen, Town Treasurer and Town Clerk.

Art. 31. To see if the Town will raise a sum of money to repair the road leading from the Brick School House Corner to the Hall School House so called and act anything in relation thereto.

Art. 32. To see if the Town will vote to open any school which may be closed by law and act anything in relation thereto.

Art. 33. To direct how future Town meetings shall be called and at what time in March 1925 the annual Town meeting shall be held.

The Selectmen hereby give notice that they will be in session on the day named above from nine o'clock in the forenoon to receive evidence of qualification of voters.
