WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING.

To Susan T. Baker, Constable of the Town of Fryeburg, in the County of Oxford, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Fryeburg, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said Town on Monday, the third day of March, A. D. 1924, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year and vote the salary.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to accept the Town Reports for the year ending February 7, A. D. 1924.

Article 4. To elect three selectmen, assessors and overseers of the poor and vote their salary.

Article 5. To elect a treasurer for the year ensuing and vote the salary.

Article 6. To elect one member of the school board for three years. Enoch W. Pike's term expires.

Article 7. To elect one or more road commissioners for the ensuing year and vote the compensation.

Article 8. To elect a tax collector for the year ensuing and vote the compensation.

Article 9. To elect one or more fire wards and vote the compensation.

Article 10. To elect an auditor for the year ensuing and vote the compensation.

Article 11. To elect all other necessary town officers.

Article 12. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for bridges for the year ensuing.

Article 13. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for general road work for the year ensuing.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of raising money necessary to entitle it to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes of 1916.

Article 15. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$600.00 for the improvement of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commissioners in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the repairs of roads and bridges.

Article 16. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$250.00 for patrol work on the State Aid Unimproved Roads.

Article 17. To see if the Town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$525.00, it being the amount required by law for the repairs of the State Highway leading through East Fryeburg and also the sum of \$310.00 for the State Aid Improved Roads.

Article 18. To see if the Town will grant and raise the sum of \$250.00 together with \$581.58, the amount now in the treasury appropriated for this purpose and unexpended for the repairing and tarring of the road in Fryeburg Village, commencing at the Maine Central Railroad Station and running to Main Street of said Village by way of Smith Street.

Article 19. To see If the Town will grant and raise the sum of \$2,000.00 to be laid out for the construction of road from near the farm of W. J. Pitman toward Birch Hill. so-called, and for any needed repairs on road already built.

Article 20. To see if the Town will grant and raise the sum of \$100.00 to construct a drain from the point

opposite the home of L. H. Andrews to Horse-shoe Pond following the highway.

Article 21. To see if the Town will grant and raise the sum of \$600.00 to repair and tar Elm Street in Fryeburg Village.

Article 22. To see if the Town will grant and raise the sum of \$1500.00 for construction work on the road leading across the intervale from Weston's Bridge to East Conway, said construction to commence at the State line and extend towards Weston's Bridge.

Article 23. To see if the Town will grant and raise the sum of \$2,000.00 for construction work on the road from Fryeburg Village to Lovell Village, said construction to commence at the point near Emerson's Swamp where the 1922 work ended and extending towards Lovell.

Article 24. To see if the Town will grant and raise the sum of \$700.00 for repairing and constructing the road leading from Fish Street to the Iron Bridge in the Harbor District in extension of the work done in 1922.

Article 25. To see if the Town will grant and raise the sum of \$50.00 for Grover Post G. A. R.

Article 26. To see what sum, if any, the Town will grant and appropriate for the committee in charge of the Pine Hill Lands donated the Town by Minnie A. Bradley Mattson.

Article 27. To see what sum, if any, the Town will grant and raise for the eradication of Blister Rust.

Article 28. To see if the Town will accept the legacy of \$500.00 left the Town of Fryeburg in trust by Mary Hastings Bunton, the interest to be used for the Town School at North Fryeburg.

Article 29. To see if the Town will accept the legacy of \$500.00 left the Town of Fryeburg in trust by Mary Hastings Bunton, the interest to be used for the care

and maintenance of the two cemeteries in North Fryeburg to be expended under the direction of the Ladies' Social Circle of North Fryeburg.

Article 30. To see what action the Town will take in preparing to celebrate the 200th anniversaray of the Battle of Lovewells Pond, May 18, 1725, between the Massachusetts Rangers, under Captain John Lovewell, and the Pequawket Indians under Chief Paugus, and to see what sum they will appropriate to meet the expenses.

Article 31. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and appropriate for the support of common schools for the ensuing year.

Article 32. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and appropriate for the payment of secondary school tuition for the ensuing year.

Article 33. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and appropriate for the purchase of text-books and supplies for the ensuing year.

Article 34. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and appropriate for the repairs of school property for the ensuing year.

Article 35. To see if the Town will grant and appropriate a special fund of \$10.00 for each school in Town, the sum to be expended for school improvement, in every school that raises and expends a like amount for school improvements.

Article 36. To see if the Town will vote to continue the Toll Bridge School for the ensuing year, said school not having maintained an average attendance of eight pupils as required by law.

Article 37. To see if the Town will vote to pay the School Board for their services, and if so, how much.

Article 38. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for the support of poor for the year ensuing.

Article 39. To see what sum of money the Town will grant and raise for current expenses for the year ensuing.

Article 40. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to borrow \$5,000.00, if necessary, to meet bills.

Article 41. To see if the Town will vote to discount all taxes, except poll taxes, paid before June 15th, and if so, what per cent.

Article 42. To see if the Town will vote to accept the sum of \$102.00 donated to the Town of Fryeburg by Mary G. Perley, to be held in trust and the income of which to be expended for the care and maintenance of the Dr. Oliver Griswold burial lot located in the Town cemetery in Fryeburg Village.

Article 43. To act on any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the lists of voters in said Fryeburg and hearing and deciding upon the applications of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said lists, at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon of the day of said meeting.

I respectfully call attenton of citizens to the Health Laws, as follows:

Report of Infectious Disease by Householder.

Sec. 48. Whenever any householder knows, or has reason to believe, that any person with his family or household has smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, cholera, typhus, or typhoid fever, cerebro-spinal meningitis, measles, membranous croup, so called, whooping-cough or any other disease which is made notifiable by the rules and regulations of the state board of health, he shall within twenty-four hours, give notice thereof to the health officer of the town in which he resides, and such notice shall be given either at the office of the health officer, or by letter or telephone, the communication to be mailed or delivered to him within the time above specified, and in case there is no health officer, to the secretary of the local board of health, either at his office or by communication as aforesaid.

Infected Person Not to be Removed Without Permission.

Sec. 49. No householder in whose dwelling there occurs any of the notifiable diseases, shall permit any person suffering from any such disease, or any clothing or other property to be removed from his house, without the consent of the board, or of the health officer, and the said board or health officer shall prescribe the conditions of removal.

Infectious Children Shall Not Attend School.

Sec. 50. No parent, guardian or other person, shall carelessly carry about children or others affected with infectious diseases, or knowingly or willfully introduce infectious persons into other person's houses, or permit such children under his care, to attend any school, theatre, church or any public place.

Reports from Physicians.

Sec. 51. Whenever any physician knows or has reason to believe that any person whom he is called upon to visit, has or is infected with any of the notifiable diseases, such physicians shall forthwith give notice thereof to the secretary of the local board of health, or the health officer of the town in which such person lives.

Duties of Individuals.

Sec. 53. No person affected with smallpox, scarlet fever, diphtheria, or other quarantinable disease, and no person having access to any person affected with any of the said diseases, shall mingle with the general public until such sanitary precautions as may be prescribed by the local board of health shall have been complied with.

Penalty for Violation.

Sec. 65. Whoever wilfully violates any provision of the twenty-six preceding sections, or of said regulations

and by-laws, or neglects or refuses to obey any order or direction of any local board of health or health officer authorized by said provisions, the penalty for which is not herein specifically provided, or willfully interferes with any person or thing to prevent the execution of the provisions of said sections or of said regulations and by-laws, shall be punished by a fine of not more than fifty dollars; judges of municipal and police courts and trial justices shall have jurisdiction original and concurrent with the supreme judicial and superior courts, of all offenses under said sections.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the School Committee and Citizens of the Town of Fryeburg:

Herewith my first annual report of the progress, condition and needs of the schools of the Town of Fryeburg. In this report I shall attempt to cover the subject only in so far as it deals with the schools since I came to this position, July 1, 1923.

Teachers:

Schools opened September 14, 1923, with the following teachers in charge:

Primary, Miss Christine Hunter, West Benton.

Intermediate, Miss Edna Ellis, Skowhegan.

Grammar, Mrs. Emily Steadman, Fryeburg.

West, Miss Hattie Kelley, Everett, Mass.

North, Mr. Roy C. Berry, Woodfords.

Harbor, Mrs. Annie Eastman, Fryeburg.

Toll Bridge, Miss Sylvia Wyman, West Benton.

Center, Miss Esther Lambert, East Corinth.

East, Mr. Horace Morse, Hanover.

Among these teachers, four are Normal School Graduates, three are teachers who have had considerable experience, and two are beginning teachers.

Attendance:

Although attendance has been fair yet there is always room for improvement. Many children are allowed to stay from school for light and transient reasons. Thus far we have escaped any serious epidemic, the weather has not interfered to any great extent and conditions have generally favored good attendance. Parents should always bear in mind the fact that the lower the attendance the less are the State Funds received, since a part of the apportionment is based on aggregate attendance.

Student Activities:

During the year thus far the several schools have carried on extra-curriculum activities of various kinds. American Education Week in November was duly observed in all schools. The School Improvement League is flourishing and eight schools have qualified for and received the \$10.00 provided by the town in case they could show \$10.00 earned during the year. I strongly advise that this encouragement be continued.

Parties and entertainments have been held from time

to time. I believe that extra-curriculum activities should be encouraged, but always with much consideration to their consistency and relative importance.

A town-wide spelling contest is now going on in all the schools.

Visitation:

While visits by parents and friends have been of the usual frequency, it would appear that here as elsewhere parents may well take more time to visit their schools and to know more of the school home of their children. We have no regular visiting day, but let it be known that every day is visiting day in our schools.

Text-books:

The question of suitable and sufficient text-books is rather a large one. We have a large number of books which are not in suitable condition to use, and a stilllarger number which are out-of-date. Neither have we enough text-books of the same kind and edition to equip all pupils in the same grade in different schools. There should be enough text-books to "go around," that is, we should have enough books of the same kind and of the same edition so that all the pupils in town in each grade may study the same text at the same time. In this way a pupil in any grade in any school will cover the same ground as a pupil in that grade in any other school in town. Transference from one school to another, when necessary, may then be made without loss or confusion. Our aim in this direction should be a uniform course of study, and uniform sources of information in all schools. In order to bring this condition about large expenditures will be necessary.

Repairs:

The following repairs have been effected.

The interior of the village building was redecorated in light green and new curtains were hung. The interior of the building is now very neat and attractive.

At Toll Bridge the old shed and toilets were removed and a new connected shed with toilets in accordance with the law were built. At Harbor the same arrangements as at Toll Bridge were effected. The lighting was changed in both buildings.

At North a partition was built in the corridor, thus insuring warmth in the toilets. By this arrangement we hope to escape the danger of freezing of the chemical toilets.

At East a portion of the cellar wall was planked.

New stoves have been purchased for Harbor and Center. Other minor, upkeep repairs have been made where necessary. The floors in all buildings have been oiled.

The following repairs should be made this year:

Rearrangement of the toilets at East. Interior painting at Harbor and North. New curtains at North. The shed at Toll Bridge should be painted. Other minor repairs will appear necessary from time to time.

Training of Teachers:

It is becoming more and more obvious that to obtain the best results teachers must be well trained. Equipment of the latest pattern in modern buildings goes a long way, but in the last analysis the teacher makes the school. There is a State-wide movement towards the securing of better trained teachers. Opportunities for securing this training are ample. Our Normal Schools, both during the regular year and during the summer sessions offer attractive and appropriate courses. I wish that among many of our teachers, and I have found most of them very faithful, there might grow up more of a professional attitude and more of an ambition to secure further training. Any town which pays a higher salary for a trained and consistent teacher is making a paying investment when results are considered.

I wish to express my appreciation for the courtesy which I have experienced at the hands of the School Committee, teachers and citizens of the town of Fryeburg. The relations between the School Department and other departments and officials have been uniformly pleasant.
