As an attempt was made at the late annual meeting to impugn the honesty of the selectmen and treasurer by M. A. Beal, charging these officers with giving a "garbled report" during their term of office; and also alleging that instead of the town having a surplus it was actually in debt.

To refute the charges and remove whatever comment they may cause as regards the honesty and integrity of those in charge of the affairs of the town an investigation was demanded and acceded to at the meeting and the following report submitted by the Committee:

"We the undersigned having been appointed a committee to examine the books and acc'ts. of the selectmen and treasurer do state that we have examined every order drawn since Mar. 1900. We have found them posted to their proper places. We have added carefully each acc't. and find them correct; that the balances have been credited to their several acc'ts.

And it has been figured that the town owes the several departments the balances above stated and that the town has a balance above all liabilities as stated at the annual meeting.

We have also examined the treasurer's books and compared them with the orders returned and canceled.

The selectmen have drawn orders on the treasurer amounting to 10218.51 and we cannot find an error of one cent in the whole acc't.

We hereby state that the acc'ts stand as given by the selectmen at the annual meeting.

By request of the selectmen we have examined the annual reports of 1897-8 and 99 and we find that the balances due different acc't. have been carried forward from year to year and it has been figured that the town owed the several departments the balances above stated in these years."

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE

SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

YEAR ENDING MARCH 11, 1901.

To the Citizens of Jonesport:-

Gentlemen:—In presenting this report of the work in our schools for the past year, I have much that I wish to call your attention to, things favorable and unfavorable. They must be looked squarely in the face and overcome as our ambition and finances will permit.

There seems to be a general interest awakening in behalf of the schools, noticeable in every district, among both parents and children. If this continues it will do much to raise the educational standing of the whole town. One of the most encouraging signs is the demand on the part of the citizens for the best teachers and the effort our young teachers are making to meet this demand. This is right, the best is none too good for Jonesport. We are the second largest town in the county and let us see to it, that in the near future our schools are second to none. I wish here to commend the work of our teachers, and our young teachers in particular. They have been conscientious and energetic in their efforts to secure good attendance and teach thoroughly those in their care. That which speaks best for them and augurs well for the schools in the future, is the fact that they are not satisfied with their present fitness as teachers, and all who have decided to make teaching their profession, plan to attend a training school the present year. I here express my hearty appreciation of their cordial co-operation and untiring zeal in carrying out any and all suggestions made by me for the welfare of the schools.

School leagues have been organized in four schools and where working have an excellent showing in cleanliness, decoration of rooms and apparatus. The children of the Washington League, under Mr. E. A. Worcester in Dist-No. 3 have cleaned their school room, bought a dictionary holder, a fine large globe and several large historical pictures. They have raised sufficient funds to buy a book case in which they propose placing an encyclopedia in the near future.

The children of the Franklin School League at Kelley's Point under Mr. Turner have kept their school room and out buildings in the neatest possible condition, have purchased a large picture of Benj. Franklin and have about \$7. in their treasury.

The children of the league at Beal's Island, under Mr. Chas. Perkins, cleaned their schoolroom and out buildings, framed a beautiful picture given them by Mr. Perkins and quite extensively improved their school grounds by removing rocks and rubbish and planting flower beds.

The Lincoln School League, at West Jonesport, under Mrs. D. D. Kelley, decorated its schoolroom very tastily and has some money in the treasury.

What these leagues have done all can do under the guidance of an efficient teacher, if he or she be retained more than one term in the same school. It is hoped that the citizens

will take a warm interest in assisting the children to improve their school grounds this coming spring and especially Arbor day for there is nothing so true an index of the social and moral life of the town as the condition of the public buildings. and their grounds.

A course of study has been prepared for all the schools and they have been graded as far as is possible in one year.

At the County Supt. Meeting called and held at Machias, by W. W. Stetson this last spring grading and drawing up a course of study for the schools was strongly urged on all the superintendents by Mr. Stetson. This will prove, if carefully carried out, of untold benefit to all the children.

Book-keeping and Botany have been replaced in the High school course. No new branches have been added to the common school course, but more thorough and comprehensive work has been demanded in the studies already pursued.

The school year has been one week shorter than last year. This is a great mistake and one I cannot account for, and entirely unnecessary, there being enough money of the school appropriations to run the schools two weeks longer making the school year one week longer than last year. Our school year should be thirty-four weeks. This is what Lubec and many other towns in our county have. I do not expect you can lengthen the schools to that extent this year but I think it should be lengthened to at least thirty weeks this year.

The average attendance has made quite a gain this year and would have been much better but for the grip. This gain is 11 per cent over last year. Seven terms of school have fell but one below the number registered and some of them a little less: Alley's Bay, 2; Indian River, 1; Lower Bay, 1; Upper Bay, 1; Beal's Island Grammar, 1; Kelley's Point, 1. The poorest average occurs in the High school and in the winter terms of the village primary schools. The average attendance might be greatly improved in these schools if the sidewalks were kept free from snow. It is not prudent to send little ones out when the snow is half way to When visiting the school at Head Harbor, their waists. walking from the shore to the schoolhouse I have always wondered if one half of the men in Jonesport realized what a path the little ones at Head Harbor have to travel twice a day. I travel the same path the children do, but it is always fair weather when I go. To get over the rocks I have to use my hands as well as my feet, to pass the wire fences I have to crawl or roll. The road is but a cow path in which the little brooks follow lovingly along the larger part of the year. Most of the children have a mile and many more than a mile over this kind of a path. Nothing but rubber boots will permit one to pass over it dry shod, and few of the children have these and several not even rubbers. They must sit all day with wet feet and on going home at night wet them again. Gentlemen: I feel sure there is not one among you, knowing these facts, who will not raise both hands to help these little ones by improving the roads.

TEXT BOOKS.

There have been old books exchanged for new ones to the amount of \$53.77. 576 new books have been purchased: Two Webster Unabridged Dictionaries, 7 Academic Dictionaries, 35 dozen writing books and one wall map. Stetson's History of Maine and Civil Government has been placed in the High school in place of the old Civil Government. This book meets a demand that has long been felt, as it gives a full history of our own state and places before the pupil in a practical interesting way the principal laws governing the town, city, county, state and the United States, the officers, their duties and how elected. Thwing's Physics, Overton's Physiology and Fiske's history have replaced the worn out.

volumes of Steele's Physics, Hutchinson's Physiology and Swinton's history. The coming year this school needs quite a number new text books as follows: Cicero, Botany, English history, General history and Rhetoric.

In the common schools Metcalf & Bright's Lessons have been placed in the fifth, sixth and seventh grades. The Werner arithmetic in grades fifth and sixth. Dictionaries have been placed in all the schools without them, but the primary schools. New spellers, readers and arithmetics are needed in the common schools.

REPAIRS.

The schoolhouse in Dist. No. 1 has been painted inside and out, the wall freshened with calcimo, new blackboards made and repairs made on the wood shed. With the addition of a new door step this building will be in excellent condition.

The schoolhouse in Dist. No. 3 is in excellent condition, with the exception of a bad leak in the belfry and lack of ink wells in the lower room. The out buildings are in bad condition and need immediate attention.

At the High school there is serious trouble with the heating. Both children and teacher have suffered with the cold this winter. The furnace heats the basement to perfection but not the school room. I think a cold air pipe would drive the heat into the room but I would advise getting professional advice before acting on this suggestion.

The schoolhouse in Dist. No. 3 needs painting badly and the walls freshening.

The schoolhouses in Dists. 4 and 5 need painting on the outside, and belfries thoroughly repaired as they leak badly. Blackboards need repairing also the walls and ceilings need patching and I would advise papering with a cheap, stout

paper. This would strengthen them enough to last several years longer. This is frequently done in both city and town schoolhouses.

The schoolhouse in Dist. No. 6 needs painting on the outside, the belfry repaired and the walls freshened.

The schoolhouse in Dist. No. 7 is in excellent condition. The paint is looking quite thin but will do a while longer.

The schoolhouse in Dist. No. 8 has been reshingled, replastered, a wood shed, closets, and an entry built. The seating is very poor and insufficient and must be improved.

The schoolhouse in Dist. No. 9 needs painting.

The schoolhouse in Dist. No. 10 is in excellent condition, but an entry and an out-house are very much needed.

The sanitary condition of all our schoolhouses, particularly the ventilation, is exceedingly poor. I have asked Dr. Illis to investigate the town rooms carefully and report to you at this meeting.

I strongly recommend that a grammar schoolroom be built as near as possible in the center of the town, that the children of the 8th and 9th grades from the present village grammar schools be placed in this room and the 9th grade from Dist. No. 6, if they wish to attend. Four schools in town have been full this winter and will be overcrowded this coming spring and fall.

Many bad effects come from overcrowded schoolrooms. One of the most serious is the bad effect upon the health of the children from lack of pure air, another is the impossibility to give the child the fit needed for the high school, thereby making our high school of a lower grade than it should be. No amount of money, or services of the best teachers, or the wisest supervision will make our primary, grammar and high schools what they should be until this extra room is secured. This will make fewer classes to each teacher and secure more efficient services.

I recommend the following appropriation for school purposes for the coming year:
