Report of Superintendent of Schools.

CITIZENS OF JONESPORT:-

GENTLEMEN:—It again becomes my duty and privilege to present to you the condition of the school affairs of this town.

In this year's report I have many things to record of growth and substantial gain.

At the beginning of the school year I felt that I was badly handicapped by being obliged to hire many new teachers of whose abilities I knew only by recommendation. Many of our own teachers had gone to the Normal Schools. The work of the teachers almost universally has been very commendable and much excellent work has been accomplished under very unfavorable circumstances caused by over crowded schoolrooms.

The year for the common schools has been 30 weeks, an increase of 3 more than last year and for the high school 36 weeks which is six weeks more than has ever been taught in one year, yet with the exception of the amount raised by the special town meeting to pay the assistant of the high school the appropriations have not been overdrawn with this one exception: that of fuel for the high school, and this has not been overdrawn as much as last year.

In the common schools we have had more skillful services, have increased our school year, and will have a balance in the treasury undrawn after all the winter terms close. It may interest you to know that the aggregate number of all the extra weeks in the different schools is thirty-six weeks, yet the extra cost in fuel is only \$15.

If you can recall the report of last year you will remember that the work of the high school was conspicuous by its absence. I had little to record in its favor. There was much justifiable complaint. Students, whose parents realized its condition, had been sent to other schools.

Graduates, who wished to attend college, had to go away to some preparatory school and study two years to get what they should have got here, thereby saving both time and money. No student was obliged to do any work at home. Under these circumstances, is it to be wondered at that some of our citizens opposed appropriations for the high school?

Realizing the great need of a good high school in the town, and the justifiableness of the complaints made, I set to work to find out the requirements of a first class high school that would fit students for college if they wished to attend and give them the practical knowledge and intellectual power that will help them to appreciate and grasp the opportunities that life may offer them.

Mr. Murphy was secured by great persistence as the trustees of the Academy were determined to keep him An assistant, a graduate of Smith College, was secured and the course arranged to meet the college requirement.

To the high school course of study has been added Chemistry, French, Psycology and English History and made stronger in Mathematics, Latin and English. This necessitated a larger expense in text books than was foreseen and has been met in part by several of the students purchasing a book.

The pupils have shown that they are worthy of this extra effort and expense by the attendance and work accomplished, although at first it came pretty hard for them.

Apparatus for a chemical laboratory has been secured, the funds for which were raised by a lecture given by Mr. Murphy and a supper and entertainment given by the students.

I wish here to express my gratitude for and appreciation of the thorough and practical character of the work accomplished by Mr. Murphy and his assistant in this school and I regret very much that pupils from the island schools who had passed the entrance examination did not avail themselves of the opportunity of attending the school for the past year. It is hoped they will not let this opportunity pass another year.

The warmth and air of this school room have been much improved by the cold air pipe added and extra registers. A course of study for the school was printed during the fall term.

COMMON SCHOOLS.

The work of grading in the common schools is nearly completed, the grades being nearly as uniform in the district schools as the village schools and the same work required in all.

The course of study for the common schools is nearly ready for printing. It has been made more thorough in mental arithmetic and reading. New Second and Third Readers have been purchased also new Spellers for the entire schools and Arithmetics for the VII and VIII Grades.

Marked improvement can be observed in penmanship, oral and written expression and arithmetic. These improvements are by no means confined to the village schools but are fully as noticeable in the district schools.

Drawing has been introduced in the West Jonesport Schools in all grades, and in the first five grades in the schools in Dist. No. 3. I trust to see this put in all the schools during the coming year, as it trains the hand, the eye, the judgement and artistic sense and helps the child to appreciate the beautiful in art and nature.

These schools need new Fourth and Fifth Readers, Arithmetics and Grammars for the IX Grades. An additional number of large Histories are required and have been much needed the past term but there were not sufficient funds to purchase them.

After visiting the state college this spring I visited the schools in Bangor and through the kindness of Supt. Tilton obtained a collection of the children's written work in Arithmetic and Language. It was beautiful work and teachers and Superintendent were justly proud of it. I was filled with despair, for comparing it with the work of our children it seemed a long way in the future before they would be able to reach such excellence, but today I can show you work done by our children that will compare favorably with those of the Bangor schools.

THE SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT LEAGUES.

The School Improvement Leagues are still active. The Lincoln School League in West Jonesport has purchased a fine adjustable book case and has a considerable fund toward the beginning of a Supplementary School Library. These are now found in every well provided school in New England (and our children have no idea of being behind them.)

The Washington League in Dist. No. 3 has tinted the school room walls which were very dingy. This has wonderfully improved the appearance of the room.

The Franklin League at Kelley's Point has also been active. They have purchased an encyclopedia and I think have a little fund besides. They have the honor of keeping their out-houses in such excellent condition that the attention of the S. S. C. was drawn to the fact and they gave the League in token of their appreciation of the excellent care rendered a beautiful picture by Landseer.

The children of the Wm. McKiuley League, Beal's Island, have not been idle this winter. They have added two new pictures to their room and have quite a fund beside.

Spelling schools have been held at the Lower Bay and

Head Harbor schools which have proved of profit and enjoyment to parents as well as scholars.

The Longfellow League at Monsapec purchased a picture of Longfellow and did a great deal toward improving their grounds.

It is hoped during the coming spring that citizens of the place in their respective districts will lend a hand to these little workers and see if something cannot be done of permanent value in the way of grading and planting trees in the school yard. The high school grounds need grading very much and trees planted. Were it not for the fact that there are so many things that we must have this coming year I would ask for a small appropriation for this purpose.

The improvements in the school work in this town are yet in their infancy and if we would have them reach noble proportions of permanent value every man, woman, and child must work together, give their attention and thoughtful criticism, sympathy and encouragement and last but not least, generosity, for in no way can we make so profitable an investment for ourselves, our children and our posterity.

An education is an investment on which there are no taxes, no interest to be paid, and no insurance against fires, robbers or any other calamity. It wears nothing but lives on the wisdom of the past and present generations and gathers for its holder wisdom and pleasure and life more abundantly. It helps a man or woman to grasp opportunities that he would otherwise have to see passed to someone else.

Conspicuously placed on the front of that noble structure, the Boston Public Library is this famous inscription:—"The Commonwealth requires the *Education of the People* as a *Safeguard* of *Order* and *Libertg*." This is full of great significance to every loyal American citizen. This glorious order, Liberty and Unity of a great nation of nations, of which every American can honorably boast has been, and can only be maintained by the education of the people, not the rich and those in large cities only, but each one and every one, here and everywhere. The children of the islands and rural districts must have equal advantages with those of the village as far as is possible. This *sateguard will not exist* of itself. It has required sacrifice in the past and will require greater in the future. We must willingly and generously give of the gain of our factories, our stores, of our fishing and our fields even though we deprive ourselves of many things we would like to have. Nor must our effort and interest cease with our giving. We must see to it that we get full value for what we give. Funds must be wisely and economically used. Close inspection makes good officers.

This year we shall need a much larger appropriation for the high school than ever before, if we are to have one of the present high standard. The teaching services rendered in our school for the past two terms are of a professional quality, second to none in the state. The man who is at the head of it can secure a salary of a thousand easily. Machias who has nearly 200 less children than we have raises for her high school \$1225. Lubec, who has only 35 scholars in her high school, raises \$1150. In each case these amounts are independent of the state aid.

I firmly believe it is wiser to have no high school than to have a poor one and that we need a good one needs no discussion. I trust that each citizen will see to it that sufficient funds are raised to carry on a first-class high school such as the town is worthy of.

In the primary school on Beal's Island the little ones are obliged to sit in seats made for children 10 years older and so placed as to fit the mothers and fathers. When writing the children have either to stand up or sit on the very edge of their seat leaning forward to their utmost with the desk nearly under their chins. Try the position yourselves and imagine how you would feel at the expiration of six hours. Any physician will tell you that this is very injurious to the growing child. These seats should be replaced by new ones suitable for primary children.

At Alley's Bay the schoolhouse is in very good condition with the exception of the paint on the outside. The old seats have been replaced by new ones, but the room is entirely too small to accommodate safely so many children. The dimensions of this room are 25x19x9 and the number of pupils registered this winter 42. This gives about 30 cubic feet to each pupil and the smallest limit that is considered safe is 240 cubic feet and our children at Alley's Bay are getting just one-eighth of this. And this condition of things in a locality where consumption, a contagious disease, claims a victim nearly every year.

The schoolroom at Head Harbor is in good repair but is entirely too small. There is not sufficient breathing capacity as the room is small and very low posted. The ventilation is poor in all our schoolrooms.

Mr. Noyes, the man whom you last elected on your school board has had entire charge of the repairs and I wish here to compliment you on your good judgment in your selection, as he has wisely and economically discharged this duty as far as the funds provided would permit. One member of the school board should be a carpenter. Mr. Noyes will give you a detailed account of what has been done and what is needed in the line of repairs.
