WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To EDWARD M. SAWYER, a constable of the Town of Jonesport in the County of Washington, and State of Maine.

GREETING:—

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Jonesport qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Jonesport Opera House in said town on Monday, the 10th day of March, 1919, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
2. To choose a Town Clerk.
3. To choose Three Selectmen.
4. To choose Three Assessors.
5. To choose Three Overseers of the Pocr.
6. To choose a Town Treasurer.
7. To receive bids for collecting the txaes for the ensuing year. The lowest bidder who can give a good and sufficient bond to be accepted and voted for in article 8.
8. To choose a Collector of Taxes.
9. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate under the provisions of Chap. 130 of the Public Laws of 1913 the sum of \$500 for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for care of Ways, Highways and Bridges.

11. To see whether the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Highways during the ensuing year within the limits of the town under the provisions of Section of Chap. 130 of the Public Laws of 1913.
12. To see if the town will vote to raise money for the Library for the ensuing year.
13. To elect a Fire Inspector.
14. To see if the town will vote to raise money for a Fourth of July Celebration.
15. To see if the town will vote to raise money to defray the expenses of the Fire Department.
16. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to make a temporary loan to defray expenses until taxes are collected.
17. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Assessors to assess money to pay E. M. Sawyer and others for taxes paid on Pittseld Trust Co.'s stock after failure of said company, amount \$216.95. Assessors failed to include this in their assessment of 1918.
18. To see if the town will vote to elect a man to have charge of Fire Engine and raise money for same.
19. To see if the town will vote to pay the balance due on the Flag Pole at the Library, amounting to \$83.58 and raise money for the same.
20. To raise money to pay snow bills.
21. To raise money for Board of Health.
22. To raise money for Common Schools.
23. To raise money for High School, Janitor and Supplies.
24. To raise money for School Repairs and Painting.
25. To raise money for Supplies, Insurance and Apparatus.
26. To raise money for Highways and Bridges.
27. To raise money for Text Books.

28. To raise money for Superintendent's Salary.
29. To raise money for Service of School Committee.
30. To raise money for Cleaning and Sanitation of School Houses.
31. To elect a member of the School Committee.
32. To raise money for the Support of Poor.
33. To raise money for Town Debt and Interest.
34. To raise money for Town Expense.
35. To raise money for Abatements.
36. To raise money for Repairs of old sidewalks.
37. To see if the town will vote to pay Joel Wilson any extra money for collecting taxes for 1918. If so the amount and raise money for the same.
38. To see if the town will vote to build State Aid road under contract and authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to make contract if one can be made satisfactory.
39. To raise money for Sealer of Weights and Measures.
40. To see what sum the town will raise for its Board of Health to contribute to the general fund of the Anti-Tuberculosis Society of Washington County; and raise money for same.
41. To choose Surveyors of wood, lumber and bark and all other necessary Town Officers.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session at the Town Office on Thursday, Friday and Saturday preceding the meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters. Dated at Jonesport, Me., Feb. 15th, 1919.

**REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS
To the School Board and Citizens of Jonesport:—**

GREETING: In giving to you my seventh annual report, I hope I have proved the supposition that experience counts, that my ability as an educational director of your school system has improved, that I have marked out paths of progress which all have noted, and that during the war period in the midst of a world upheaval that your schools have withstood the shock as well as the average system. It is true that much of my time during the past year has been diverted from actual work in the school rooms to war activities much of which came unsought from the State and Nation since I was an official and a school man who are supposed to be so patriotic as to work without pay, as I believe all school men in the United States have done. Besides this, I have **tried to encourage more gardening, pig and poultry raising and other means of keeping down the high cost of living and I have set the example by doing all the above things as side issues.** No doubt the schools have suffered, but a great deal has been done in war saving and in greater production, which has added a practical side to school life that is valuable.

There are many ideas, notions, and plans of reconstruction which I would like to thrust forcibly into the forms of every person's mind so that even the most lethargic one in town would at least open his eyes to the fact that deep muddy ruts are poor tracks to remain in, if Democracy is to be world wide, Education and Christianity to become universal in an upset world, flickering with prospects of a saner, deeper, and a nobler chance to live out an earthly existence. Sanity teaches us that better conditions can come only by more education and the removal of illiteracy from our midst, by more cooperation with less of the "skin your neighbor alive"

spirit illustrated by profiteering and the trust autocracies, and we can not expect these conditions to change rapidly because it will take a long time to convince people that the present and past way of doing things is passe, to mold them into cooperative beings spiritually minded in the things above carnage and its allied interests of grab.

It is a common saying not to look for improvement in the present generation, but it seems that after passing through the past two years, one must be in a comatose state, if he is not ready to support, promote,, and even change his mode of living for the introduction of any sane way of seeming improvement in rearing the coming generation. At this point I am radically departing from the usual custom, in order to show how the present generation is handicapping the next. You know the condition of lobster fishing, how the small lobsters have been and are being sold by the fishermen at a small recompense and to a near extermination of a once prosperous industry. But that is not all, you are denying your children the privilege of receiving the great growth that those small lobsters would deny them beside an industry which you unthinking men are wiping out. The same thing is true of our clam flats. You have dug up the little growing clams in order to fill more cans until clams are scarce. Leave the small ones which will increase ten fold to help your children to care for you in old age. The growth will avail much more than the extra bank account will yield gained from undeveloped seed. The same thing is also true of catching "britt" or very small herring. But here is another hindrance to the producing of better future generation. There are many parents who do not try to have their children attend school, allowing them to be late or causing them to be late, taking them out of school to work for

a mere pittance, while the parent himself wastes more in the unnecessary of life, than the children earn. Then there are many parents of this generation who do not allow their children to attend school after the fifteenth birthday. Have we not made it plain that improvements in our schools are in jeopardy as long as such conditions exist?

How can a better generation with better schools be expected when parents devastate the industries of the future by exterminating the means of propagation, cripple the minds of the school children by not giving to them the opportunities of the public schools without limit, and by not putting in new ways of gaining a livelihood to replace those destroyed?

The American people are considered the most progressive of any, yet the present and past generations have been slow to act. Three years ago war was inevitable to all pioneer thinkers, yet President Wilson deferred until the majority of our people should awake and be willing to assume the responsibility. People must be educated to new conditions, so all the great men set out on tours of the country and the great organization of Four Minute Men began explaining the war situation. Now that war is over the same thing has got to come about in education, cooperation, and in practical living. It seems that the present generation is in the best condition to receive an impetus, to act, and to formulate new conceptions, and from the standpoint, which this report intends to reveal, the outlook for great improvements in all phases of education.

School improvements will not come about by introducing new or old fads, but our schools can become much more practical. In the lower grades the fundamentals of the past will be the main themes of the future, but differently taught. The teacher of the past too often times taught abstractly, unprepar-

edly, and sometimes unintentionally. Teachers of the future must teach concretely, preparedly and perspectively. In the upper grades and advanced schools we must initiate new practical subjects. We must diversify our courses to meet the needs of the many temperaments and inclinations that our children are heir to in this world of aspiration. No doubt but that we should learn more about productivity, how to handle and propagate Nature's resources. Real citizenship divested of politics should be taught in the upper grades. Perhaps women when they become full fledged voters can make a striking improvement along the line of teaching citizenship. The time is not far distant when in Jonesport some of the following subjects may be and can be taught. some phases of manual training and domestic science, drawing and music for esthetic work, poultry raising, fisheries, gardening, and some of the fundamentals of navigation in addition to the courses we already have.

There is no need to dwell on what our schools have accomplished during the past year. It is good to know that a system exists after two years of war, with a great shortage of teachers, and the fact that our schools as a whole have been closed for periods of from two to five weeks for four years in succession for contagious diseases, and some or all of the schools have been closed for various periods for thirteen successive terms. As a result the grades are not as well balanced as in former years. Work is already contemplated and in force to relieve the situation so that next June ought to find conditions nearer the usual. Most of our teachers have cooperated and made the most of existing conditions and at the present time our schools are running smoothly. Especial mention should be made that at every

cr.s.s when vacancies occurred some one has come forward and relieved the situation, thus especial credit is due Mrs. D. D. Kelley, Mrs. D. S. Andrews, and Mrs. Ira Norton for their devotion to the schools and to their ability to teach.

Our High school during the past year and a half has passed through a variation of crises. There have been seven different principals who remained four weeks or longer. The assistants have remained for the year and in all cases have accomplished results. The war has reduced the attendance from a probable 85 to an actual 62 this year. The new building is proving all claims ever made for it. It is light, roomy, warm, and well ventilated and an influence for high grade development. There is plenty of room for more courses. Some of the new courses previously mentioned can be introduced at very little expense as the federal government will pay one-third, the State one-third, leaving only a third for the town to pay.

These vocational courses can be made very effective and interesting. There have been 62 pupils registered of which 14 are seniors, 9 juniors, 11 sophomores, 27 freshmen, and one special. In the college preparatory course are 7 boys and 19 girls. In the English course are 13 boys and 6 girls. In the commercial course are 6 boys and 17 girls. Mr. Everett B. Coffin has been secured as principal. He is interested in the work and seems to be meeting the demands that a school of this grade requires.

The schools have been well furnished with books. Next year our greatest need will be for geographies and histories. A few new histories were bought this year but no geographies. We had a plenty of old texts on hand in geography which we have used, as it was inexpedient to buy new ones, when we consider that the map of Europe will be

entirely changed, and other changes.

Supplies as usual have been furnished, care being used to see that all material was used properly and not wasted. Insurance will become due on two buildings this year, the Cove Primary and the West Jonesport Primary buildings.

No extensive repairs have been undertaken this year, but quite a lot in way of general repairs has been accomplished. A new furnace has been installed in place of the old one at the high school building. The underpinning has been reset at Kelleys Point building. Next year, I recommend considerable painting and inside work. The Cove Grammar and Beals buildings need to be painted on the outside. Both bay school buildings, the Cove and West Jonesport primary buildings and the Cove lower Grammar rooms should be painted and whitened.

There is one thing that needs to be changed, which is the opening of our schools in the fall. We have been very late in order to give the young people a chance to work in the factories. But for four or five years work has been very scarce during September. Therefore the month of September has been lost to many of our pupils, beside costing the town much more for fuel. No school system should be secondary or sacrificed for other interests.

Your special attention is called to the statistics at the end of this report. I have received much help during the year in carrying on the schools and I feel that as a whole I have been strongly supported in all attempts I have engaged in either for the schools or in war activities. I certainly appreciate the help, the counsel, and the confidence which the interested people, teachers, and School Board have given me.

Thus it appears that there will be about \$115 balance in favor of our school system after a full year is completed in all departments, which is rather a close margin, but if there had not been an epidemic there would have been a safe margin of about \$600, since the epidemic cost the Common and High schools approximately \$500. I recommend the budget system as it presents a common sense basis to work upon and meets the demands of any system without the greatly overdrawn accounts of the usual guessed at appropriations without fore thought.
