WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To Herbert J. Rogers, a Constable of the Town of Jonesport, in the County of Washington, and State of Maine.

Greeting:-

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Jonesport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Jonesport Opera House, in said town, on Monday, the 10th day of March. 1924, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
 - 2. To choose a Town Clerk.
- 3. To act on the report of the Selectmen, Superintendent of Schools, Peabody Memorial Library, Overseers of the Poor, and any other reports.
 - 4. To choose three Selectmen.
 - 5. To choose three Assessors.
 - 6. To choose three Overseers of the Pcor.
 - 7. To choose a Town Treasurer.
- 8. To receive bids for collecting the taxes for the ensuing year. The lowest bidder who can give a good and sufficient bond to be accepted and voted for in Article 9.
 - 9. To choose a Collector of Taxes.
- 10. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Sec. 19, of Chapter 25 of the revised Statutes.
- 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$533 for improvement of the section of state aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the sum regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; this amount being necessary as per provision of Sec. 18, Chap. 25 of the Revised Statutes.

- 12. To see if the town will vote to accept the effer of John V. Sawyer and Edward B. Sawyer, for the free use for the period of twenty years of all the land they own on Kelley Point, so called, for a free camping ground for automobilists, and the citizens of Jonesport, and to raise money for building a suitable road, and properly equipping the camping ground.
- 13. To raise money for the Library for the ensuing year.
 - 14. To elect a Fire Inspector.
- 14A. To see what action the town will take in voting to use one-sixth of all money raised at the annual town meeting for Highways, Bridges and Sidewalks, for the Beals Island Highways and Bridges.
- 14B. To see if the town will vote to raise \$250 for purpose of concreting basement of Beals Grammar School building.
- 14C. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to purshase a cage for purpose of holding one or more criminals for protection of the citizens same to be installed in Engine House, and raise money for same.
- 14D. To elect the necessary member of the School Committee.
- 14E. To raise money for cleaning and sanitation of school houses.
- 14F. To see what action the town will take on electing an Auditor.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to have a Patrolman for the main roads.
- 16. To elect a Road Commissioner, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise money for a Fourth of July Celebration.
- 18. To see what action the town will take with regard to care of fire engine, and to appropriate roney for same.
 - 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize

the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire, in anticipation of taxes, such sums of money as may be needed for the ensuing year.

- 20. '10 raise money for snow bills.
- 21. To raise money for High School, Janitor and Supplies.
- 22. To raise money for School Repairs and Painting.
- 23. To raise money for Supplies, Insurance and Apparatus.
 - 24. To raise money for Highways and Bridges.
 - 25. To raise money for Board of Health.
 - 26. To raise money for Common Schools.
 - 27. To raise money for Text Books.
 - 28. To raise money for Mother's Aid.
- 29. To raise money for Superintendent's salary.
- 30. To raise money for service of School Committee.
 - 31. To raise money for support of Poor.
- 32. To raise money for Town Debt and Interest.
 - 33. To raise money for Town expense.
 - 34. To raise money for Abatements.
 - 35. To raise money for Repairs of Sidewalks.
- 36. To see if the town will vote to build the State Aid Road under contract, and authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to make a contract, if one can be made satisfactorily.
- 37. To raise money for Sealers of Weights & Measures.
 - 38. To elect a Sealer of Weights & Measures.
- 39. To see whether the town will vote to raise a sum of money, and if so, how much, towards defraying the expense of combatting tuberculosis in Washington County, said sum to be expended by the Washington County Anti-Tuberculosis Association.
- 40. To see what action the town with relation to discontinuing the road on Head Harbor Island, or

any part of said road, leading from Zebediah Alley place to Frank Carter place, so called.

- 41. To see if the town will vote to exempt Clara E. Rogers from taxes for the year 1924.
- 42. To see if the town will vote to gravel the road from the head of the cove, so called, to Loon Point, and raise money for same.
- 43. To raise money for advertising Jonesport as summer resort, appoint a Committee to handle same, and raise the necessary money.
- 44. To choose Surveyors of wood, lumber. bark and all other necessary town officers.
- 45. To see if the town desires to vote to accept the terms of the so called workmen's Compensation Act, being Chap. 50, of the revised statutes.

The Selectmen will be in session at the office of E. A. & G. F. Mansfield, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday preceding the meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

If we continue this program, in two or three years, the town will be out of debt. We do not need to tell you that care in the selection of your town officials is absolutely essential to carrying out this program.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of Jonesport; Ladies and Gentlemen:

As Superintendent of Schools it becomes my duty to submit the annual report of the progress, condition and needs of the public schools of Jonesport.

Attendance

Our school attendance during the past year has been exceptionally good, in fact the best during the four years of my supervision. The schools have not been interrupted on account of epidemics a_8 is frequently the case. In order that a better idea of the attendance in the different schools may be ascertained I am herewith submitting a list of the different schools with the attendance records.

Percentage of attendance nearly 92 per cent. 32 per cent of pupils were not absent for ½ day during the 13 weeks. In some schools the attendance has been affected to a greater or less degree by pupils coming in late in the term or leaving the school before the term closed. The schools affected in this manner are: Upper Bay, Lower Bay, Cove Upper Grammar, Cove Primary, West Jonesport Grammar, West Jonesport Primary and West Jonesport Intermediate. The attention of the reader is particularly called to the last column marked number not absent 1/2 day. In the Cove Grammar with 38 pupils registered there were 24 who were not absent for one session during the 13 weeks. West Jonesport Grammar with 45 registered 18 pupils were not absent for ½ day. In the Flying Place School with 16 pupils registered there were 9 not absent for a session. In the Junior High with 21 pupils registered there were 12 not absent for a 1/2 day. In the High School with 75 registered there were 47 who were not absent for a half day. is a remarkable showing and an item of great importance in our school system.

Teachers

Our teaching force has for the most part been composed of an industrious and faithful group of men and women. There are 17 teachers who devote their entire time in the elementary grades, and

of this number seven are normal graduates, or the equivalent, four of which have had teaching experience of from three to over 15 years. Ten of the 17 teachers have had teaching experience ranging from 2 years to over 20 years. A big majority of the teachers have attended the Summer Training Schools.

These teachers receive from \$13.00 to \$20.00 per week, the average wage being \$17.89. They pay on the average about \$7.00 per week for board.

High School

We believe that the High School has enjoyed a prosperous year even though it has been necessary to make some changes in the faculty. We were indeed sorry to have to accept the resignation of Helen L. Bailey, who had been with us as instructor of Commercial Branches for nearly five years. It is unfortunate that we are obliged to release many of our old experienced teachers in order that some larger place may take them over. It has been said, and correctly I believe, that Maine is the teacher training ground for all the states in New England. As soon as a teacher proves she can teach school successfully, school officials from Massachusetts or Connecticut buy her away from us.

We are glad to report that a cordial spirit of cooperation exists between the principal and teachers and pupils. We feel that in the entire school body there is an inclination to pay attention to the primary objects of the the school, and to athletics and socials to assume their rightful place. This place is to render life more attractive, to foster a proper school spirit, and to add to the regular work of the school.

Again if athletics are properly managed the pupils get a training in conduct and point of view that is indeed valuable for them $a_{\rm S}$ citizens of a great democracy. The conduct of our high school

pupils in the school building, on the school grounds, and in the street is very commendable.

Finances

We believe that our schools have been run as economically as it was possible without lowering the efficiency of the system. It is true that our total expenditures exceed our total resources by \$272.88. Our only ovrdraft amounting to \$336.11 being in the account for Support of Schools (Common and High Schools). This overdraft is explained by the fact that our State Funds were cut from \$6552.20 (the amount received last year) to \$6108.09 (the amount we received this year), or a cut of \$444.11. A letter from the State Commissioner of Education explains that this cut is due to action of the Legislature whereby the State School Fund was cut about 100.000 less than that of the preceding year. reduction comes from placing certain educational activities which have usually been subject to separate appropriations under the State School Fund. We have small balances in all accounts except the account just referred to.

A School Committee Ruling

I wish to take this opportunity to explain an act of the School Committee relative to the admittance of children to the first grade of the primary schools. Although this matter has been explained before, I find that there is still some misunderstanding as to its meaning. This act requires that all new first grade pupils shall be admitted to the first grade of our primary schools but once during the school year, and that the time of said entrance shall be at the beginning of the Fall Term. Any pupil may be admitted at this time who is five years of age, or will become five during the Fall Term. For instance, if a pupil is to have his 5th birthday in November, he may begin school in the September pre-

ceding; if the child has his fifth birthday in January he is not permitted to enter until the following September.

This action is taken in order that the work of the primary teachers may be more efficient. This is accomplished by having all pupils begin school at one time. It causes a great deal of confusion to have pupils coming to the school at different times during the year.

Repairs

During the past year a good deal has been done to make the working conditions of the schools as comfortable as possible, without being extravagant in the least. Considerable has been done to improve the toilet facilities in the schools. The chemical toilets have been installed in the High School. We are glad to report that these toilets are proving to be very satisfactory in every way. New outbuildings have been connected to main buildings at Kelley's Point and Alley's Bay. We have one set of chemical toilets and fixtures for use at the Cove. At this time we have six school buildings equipped with toilets such as meet the requirements of the State Law. Two new furnaces were installed in the basement of the school building at Beals. furnaces furnish a sufficient amount of heat. work has been done to improve the buildings on the The Kelley Point, the Lower Bay, the Upper Bay and the Cove Primary and Intermediate schools have been plastered and the walls tinted and woodwork painted. On account of the rapid increase in the size of the student body of the high school it has been necessary to add to our seating capacity. Our seating capacity is 94 at present. It will be necessary to add to the seating capacity for another fall. The woodwork in the Beals School Building, the West Jonesport Grammar and Cove Grammar schools was varnished this last summer.

Many minor repairs have been made in the heating plants of the different schools. Another year more extensive repairs will have to be made on the furnaces, also two new stoves will have to be purchased, and the stoves at Alley's Bay and Lower Bay are practically all worn out.

Equipment

Foremost among the new equipment is the addition of sanitary bubbler drinking fountains, ten of these having been provided for the schools. The introduction of these fountains and the chemical toilets together constitute the most essential equipment of schools that are for the most part rural like ours. The schools are generally well equipped with maps, globes and books (both text and reference). Each school has a school library varying from 10 to 150 volumes, consisting of references and some fiction. Each primary school is supplied with a sand table. New recitation chairs (tablet arm style) replace the old setees in the Junior High room.

Among the text books in use are to be found many of the very latest editions. A large sum has been expended for text books during the past two This increase in the cost of books has been caused by the Junior and Senior High increase in enrollment. Three years ago our high school had an enrollment of 65 pupils. This year the enrollment of the junior and senior high schools is 115. Last year the enrollment in these grades was 108. Our total school enrollment this year is 560 as compared with 549 for last year. I mention these facts merelly to explain the growth of our high school. and in this connection the importance of the junior high school as a factor in the growth of the high school. Obviously, this increase in size calls for greater expenditures, particularly on text books.

Tan adjustable window shades of the latest design have been purchased in sufficient quantity to

take care of the needs of all schools in town at a cost of nearly \$260.00. These shades were very much needed, very little having been expedd for this purpose in recent years. Some of the schools were practically without curtains, and all schools with the exception of the Beals Grammar and West Jonesport Grammar schools were supplied with the old fashioned spring roller shades. A large number of these old shades are practically worthless.

Conclusion

In concluding this, my fourth report, I desire to call your attention to the school budget submitted later in the report. I desire to commend the faithful efforts of the teachers who have cooperated with me to increase the efficiency of our schools, to express my appreciation of the loyalty and the support given me by the School Committee, and to thank the public-spirited citizens of Jonesport who have supported me in my work among the youth of this town.
