WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To Herbert J. Rogers, a Constable of the Town of Jonesport, in the County of Washington, and State of Maine:

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Jonesport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Jonesport Opera House, in said town, on Monday, the 9th day of March, 1925, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- 2. To choose a Town Clerk.
- 3. To act on the report of the Selectmen, Superintendent of Schools, Peabody Memorial Library, Overseers of the Poor, and any other reports.
- 4. To choose three Selectmen.
- 5. To choose three Assessors.
- 6. To choose three Overseers of the Poor.
- 7. To choose a Town Treasurer.
- 8. To receive bids for collecting the taxes for the ensuing year. The lowest bidder who can give a good and sufficient bond to be accepted and voted for in Article 9.
- 9. To choose a Collector of Taxes.
- 10. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Sec. 19, of Chapter 25 of the revised Statutes.
- 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$533 for the improvement of the section

- of state aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the sum regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; this amount being necessary as per provision of Sec. 18, Chap. 25 of the Revised Statutes.
- 12. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions, under the provision of the Revised Statutes of Maine, the same to be expended by the Maine Development Association.
- 13. To raise money for the Library for the ensuing year.
- 14. To elect a Fire Inspector; and raise money for same.
- 14A. To elect the necessary member of the School Committee.
- 14B. To see what action the town will take on electing an Auditor.
- 14C. To see if the town will vote to have a Patrolman for the main roads.
- 14D. To elect a Road Commissioner, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint.
- 14E. To see if the town will vote to raise money for a Fourth of July Celebration.
- 14F. To see what action the town will take with regard to care of fire engine, and to appropriate money for same.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire, in anticipation of taxes, such sums of money as may be needed for the ensuing year.
- 16. To raise money for snow bills.
- 17. To raise money for High School, Janitor and Supplies.

- 18. To raise money for School Repairs and Painting.
- 19. To raise money for Suppplies ,Insurance and Apparatus.
- 20. To raise money for Highways and Bridges.
- 21. To raise money for Board of Health.
- 22. To raise money for Common Schools.
- 23. To raise money for Text Books.
- 24. To raise money for Superintendent's Salary.
- 25. To raise money for service of School Committee and Office Expense.
- 26. To raise money for Support of Poor.
- 27. To see what action the town will take in regard to danger signs for Schools on the Highways and appropriate money for same.
- 28. To raise money for Town Debt and Interest.
- 29. To raise money for Town Expense.
- 30. To raise money for Abatements.
- 31. To raise money for Repairs of Sidewalks.
- 32. To see if the town will vote to build the State Aid Road under contract, and authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to make a contract if one can be made satisfactorily.
- 33. To raise money for Sealer of Weights and Measures.
- 34. To elect a Sealer of Weights and Measures.
- 35. To see whether the town will vote to raise a sum of money, and if so, how much, towards defraying the expense of combatting tuberculosis in Washington County, said sum to be expended by the Washington County Anti-Tuberculosis Association.
- 36. To raise money for advertising Jonesport as a summer resort, appoint a committee to handle same and raise money for same, this appropriation to apply to Camp Ground Road, if necessary.

- 37. To see what action the town will take in regard to continuing the sidewalk from Richard Davis home to store of David Sawyer and raise money, for same.
- 38. To see what action the town will take with regard to licensing peddlers.
- 39. To see what action the town will take with regard to hiring a man when necessary to look after traffic, at the discretion of the Selectmen, and to raise money for same.
- 40. To see what action the town will take in regard to purchase of a snow plow and raise money for same.
- 41. To see what action the town will take with regard to instructing the Selectmen to sell the Delia Alley house, or any other like property.
- 42. To see if the town desires to vote to accept the terms of the so-called Workmen's Compensation Act, being Chap. 50 of the Revised Statutes, and raise money for same.
- 43. To raise money for cleaning and sanitation of school houses.
- 44. To see what action the town will take about raising money to pay bills on Torrey House.
- 45. To choose Surveyors of wood, lumber, bark and all other necessary town officers.

The Selectmen will be in session at the office of E. A. & G. F. Mansfield, on Thursday, Friday and Saturday preceding the meeting, for the purpose of correcting the lists of voters.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Committee and Citizens of Jonesort: Ladies and Gentlemen:

As Superintendent of Schools, it is my duty to submit the annual report of our schools, the same being my fifth report as Superintendent of Schools. In this report I shall try in a brief way to summarize upon the condition and needs of our schools.

FINANCES

A glance at the statistical part of this report shows that our schools have been conducted on sound financial basis. From the table found in this report under the SUMMARY it is shown that our total resources for all school purposes exceed the total expenditures for all school purposes by \$116.71, in other words we have been able to operate schools for twelve months by a saving of \$116.71 as compared with the budget figures of last year. licit your very careful attention of the SUMMARY in the statistical part of this report. This gives a comparison of our resources with our expenditures in each department of our schools. Some striking comparisons may be made with the report for last year. It will be seen that the number of pupils for the year is 582 as compared with 560 for last year. This increase is due to the increased enrollment in the high school. I believe this increase in our high school is due to the present of the junior high school in our system. The per capita cost of education, both elementary and secondary for this year was while for the preceeding year it was \$42.26, or a reduction in the per capita cost of \$3.89. This past year it cost us \$0.219 to educate one pupil per day while last year it cost us \$0.24.

It is true that we have some small overdrafts in some departments, the most conspicuous of which is that of Repairs, this amounting to \$220.20. Two factors at least explain the major part of this overdraft, one being the expense of concreting the basement at beals, the other being the seating equipment for the high school, eight or nine new seats and desks being purchased for the mainroom and ten new tablet arm chairs for the recitation rooms. A sufficient allowance was not made for concreting the basement at Beals, and no provision was made for the seats and desks for the high school.

ATTENDANCE

The following table has been compiled for the Fall Term of school showing the number of pupils enrolled in each school, the average attendance, and the number not absent one half-day.

Of the 582 pupils registered in our schools there were on the average day 544.79 pupils present, or over 93½ per cent attendance. Although this is somewhat better than last year, there is yet a chance to improve. 41½ per cent of the total number of pupils registered were not absent ½ day for the term which is 9½ per cent better showing than last year. The attention of the reader is particularly called to the attendance records of the following schools: Flying Place, Cove Grammar, High School, Kelley's Point and Cove Intermediate, also the West Jonesport Grammar, all of which maintained a percentage of attendance of over 95 per cent for the term.

REPAIRS

Some very much needed repairs have been made during the past year. Our second set of chemical toilets for our schools were installed at the Cove Grammar School Building, the other set being at the High School Building. Other school buildings needing this improvement are: Cove Primary, West Jonesport Grammar and the Beals Grammar School. Provision is made in the school budget for the installation of another set. By adding to our equipment each year in this manner, we shall soon have removed one of the most disagreeable features of our schools.

The basement floor of the Beals Grammar School Building has been covered with concrete with proper drainage provided. This make a very neat basement doing away with muddy floor. I hope the time is not far distant when this may be accomplished in the basements of the Cove Grammar, West Jonesport Grammar and High School buildings.

The interior of the West Jonesport Primary and Intermediate school building has been painted, the ceiling and walls being tinted with light shades, and the woodwork painted with a light color to match.

The school building at Sealand has been newly painted on the inside with same tints used at the West Jonesport Primary and Intermediate. Some work was done on the roof and on the interior finish where the water had run down into the room. Another year this building should be painted on the exterior.

Our painting for the new year should be confined to outside work. The high school building should be painted in a good light shade with appropriate trimmings. This is one of the most conspicutions buildings in town and would I believe add considerable to the appearance of the town if painted in appropriate colors. Provision has been made to paint

this building in conjunction with the Masonic Fraternity.

Your School Committee and Superintendent are recommending that something be done in the way of furnishing a satisfactory heating system I would recommend that High School Building. storm windows be purchased in sufficient number to cover all windows on the north and west sides of the building, and that the furnace under the main part of the building be replaced by a pipeless furnace of sufficient size to heat the main room. The furnace in the annex or new part of the building will provide sufficient heat for the rooms of this part of the build-Our greatest problem in heating the main room is to keep the cold air outside. At present with a strong zero wind cold air comes in around the windows faster than the hot air comes from the furnace. I feel confident that storm windows with a pipeless furnace will take care of our heating problem at the high school.

The school building at the Upper Bay should be shingled on one side of the roof. The roof on this side has been renailed and patched but now leaks badly at times. The front yard should have five or six loads of gravel hauled in to fill up the space where the soil has washed away.

New steps will have to be made at the Beals Grammar School Building. This last year some attempt was made to repair them but it was found impossible to make more than temporary repairs.

Another year it will be necessary to further add to the seating capacity of the high school. We are at present obliged to use the commercial room for a home room, the seating capacity of the main room being inadequate. With a large entering class next year it will be necessary to use the Language Room for a home room. This change will call for some new seating equipment. This increase in our enroll-

ment calls for more books and class room equipment, particularly text books. We should add considerably to our library from year to year. This past year a set of 15 volumes of historical reference material have been added to the High School Library. A set of 48 maps on history and geography and mounted on a tripod have been added to the High School equipment.

Our science equipment should be enlarged from year to year. This enlargement should mean additional equipment, and not just replacing materials such as have been used, such as chemicals.

CONCLUSION

In concluding this report I wish to take the opportunity to express my appreciation of the fine cooperative spirit manifested by the citizens of Jonesport with respect to the educational welfare of our children. I also wish to thank the members of the Superintending School Committee for their loyalty and support shown me in my work.
