WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To Herbert J. Rogers, a Constable of the Town of Jonesport, in the County of Washington and State of Maine:

Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Jonesport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Jonesport Opera House, in said Town, on Monday the 10th day of March at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
2. To choose a Town Clerk.
3. To act on the report of the Selectmen, Superintendent of schools, Peabody Memorial Library, Overseers of the Poor and any other reports.
4. To choose three Selectmen.
5. To choose three Assessors.
6. To choose a Town Treasurer.
7. To vote the fees of the Collector of Taxes
8. To choose a Collector of Taxes.
9. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Secion 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes.
10. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$533.00 for the improvement of the Section of the State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the sum regularly raised for the care of Highways and Bridges; this amount being necessary as per provision of Section 17, Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes.

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11. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions under the provisions of the Revised Statutes of Maine, the same to be expended by the Maine Development Association.
 12. To raise money for the Library for the ensuing year.
 13. To elect a Fire Inspector and raise money for the same.
 14. To elect the necessary members of the School Committee.
 15. To see if the Town will vote to have a patrolman for the roads and raise money for same.
 16. To elect a Road Commissioner or instruct the Selectmen to appoint.
 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise money on account of Centennial year 1932.
 18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to care of fire engine and to appropriate money for same.
 19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire in anticipation of taxes, such sums of money as may be needed for the ensuing year.
 20. To see what action the Town will take in raising money for Memorial Day.
 21. To raise money for Snow Bills.
 22. To see what action the Town will take in regard to having a warm garage for the tractor and raise money necessary for same.
 23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Support of Schools, including teachers' wages and board, fuel, janitors' service, tuition and board of pupils, text books, reference books and school supplies for desk or laboratory use.

24. To see what action the Town will take in regard to letting the transportation of scholars to the lowest bidder, provided he will have a suitable conveyance, subject to the supervision of the School Board, and raise money for same.

25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for school repairs, painting and equipment.

26. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Superintendent's salary, School Committee and office expense.

27. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Insurance, Light and Power.

28. To see what action the Town will take in regard to putting one light near Oliver Church's; two lights on the West End road; one on Alley's lane; two lights between Owen Lamson's and Warren Norton's corner, and four lights from James Norton's to John Fleet's home.

29. To see what action the Town will take in regard to changing the street light one pole back from the end of J. E. Lakeman's street.

30. To see what action the Town will take in regard to exempting A. V. Rogers boat building plant for the term of five years, if exempt he will build, in addition to shop that he already has, a building 46' wide 80' long with marine railway running into shop.

31. To see what action the Town will take in regard to repairing or building a new bridge, under the Bridge Act, at Cummings creek and raise money for same.

32. To see what action the Town will take in regard to revising Jury Box.

33. To see what action the Town will take in regard to hiring the Opera House for actual time used for Town business instead of under present method.

34. To see what action the Town will take in regard to tarring State Aid Road thru town and raise money for same.

35. To see what action the Town will take in regard to raising money for Compulsory Education.

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36. To raise money for Highways and Bridges.
 37. To raise money for Board of Health.
 38. To see what action the Town will take regarding raising money for the Camp Ground and raise money for same.
 39. To choose three Overseers of the Poor.
 40. To see what action the Town will take in regard to maintaining the Poor Farm or instruct Selectmen to lease if necessary.
 41. To raise money for Support of Poor.
 42. To raise money for Town Debt and Interest.
 43. To raise money for Town Expense.
 44. To raise money for Abatements.
 45. To raise money for Repair of Sidewalks.
 46. To raise money for Sealer of Weights and Measures.
 47. To see whether the Town will vote to raise a sum of money and if so, how much, towards defraying the expense of combating tuberculosis in Washington County, said sum to be expended by the Washington County Anti-Tuberculosis Association.
 48. To see what action the Town will take in regard to appropriating money for dependent children and raise money for same.
 49. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Two Hundred Dollars for the purpose of repairs on third class roads and cutting bushes on state aid and state roads.
 50. To see if the Town desires to vote to accept the terms of the so-called Workmen's Compensation Act, being Chapter 50 of the Revised Statutes, and raise money for same.
 51. To see what action the Town will take in regard to appointing a Committee of twelve men, to act in conjunction with the Selectmen in estimating appropriations and all other Town business.
 52. To choose Surveyors of wood, lumber, bark and all other necessary town officers.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Fire House on Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings, March 6, 7 and 8th, preceding Town Meeting, for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committees and Citizens of Jonesport:

Again the time has arrived when it is necessary to report upon the business of the town for the year just passed. It is my duty and pleasure as Superintendent of Schools to report the business of the schools, the same being my tenth in a series of similar reports.

We have operated the elementary and secondary schools for thirty-eight weeks, or two weeks more than our regular school year, since we closed the books prior to the last March meeting. The account for the Support of Schools shows a balance of \$409.67. We have balances in all accounts except the account for Superintendence, in which case no appropriation was made and hence are required to carry this forward as an overdraft amounting to \$394.47. Our resources for all school purposes exceed our expenditures for all school purposes by 162.59, which we believe is an indication of sound business in the administration of the affairs of the public schools.

The Superintendent of Schools in conjunction with the School Committee has prepared a budget of our needs in the schools for the year ending March 1931. In the preparation of this budget no attempt has been made toward expansion, but rather to confine our expenditures to the necessary expenditures or requirements of the schools. We solicit your careful consideration of the different items appearing in the budget submitted as a part of this report.

Our teaching force as a whole compares favorably with any similar group with whom it has been my pleasure to be associated. We may well consider ourselves fortunate in being able to retain such a large percentage of our capable teachers in recent years. Our high school under the leadership of William O. Bailey with the assistance of Miss Bowman, Mr. Dooey, Miss Damm, Miss Drisko and Miss Brogan has enjoyed a successful and profitable year. I believe there has been a greater degree of conscious endeavor, more work accomplished and with less friction than during any of the preceding years of my term as superintendent. I think I may not be assuming too much when I state there has been a greater degree of satisfaction this past year by the patrons of the school. This cooperative spirit on the part of all is very essential to any great undertaking, and to my way of thinking, is not elsewhere more essential than in school work.

To be sure there have been times when cooperation seemed to be lacking, but cases of this kind have been few and temporary. We must have confidence in our teachers. We must support them even when it appears they have erred in judgment. At any rate we as parents must not disclose any displeasure over matters pertaining to the school in the presence of pupils. The pupil must always feel that the parent has confidence in the teacher. Should an occasion arise when it appears that injustice has been done a pupil, and I am well aware that it does sometimes occur, since teachers are human and as such are subject to mistakes, it should be the duty of the parent to meet the teacher alone and talk the matter over. Good results are sure to follow which will establish confidence in both parent and teacher without disturbing the peace of mind of the child. So much trouble could be avoided if we would only get together and talk our problems over. Misunderstanding, or misinformation and not infrequently suspicion causes us much unnecessary annoyance.

The writer desires to point out a serious situation existing in our schools at present. From the preceding table it will be seen that we had 89 pupils registered in grade one during the year ending June 1929, and of this number 41 were not promoted, or made to repeat the work of the first grade this year. This condition of affairs has been growing from bad to worse in recent years, until at present we have reached a condition where the primary schools have become so congested as to make it impossible for a teacher to conduct such a large class of pupils in an efficient manner. For example at Cove Primary school at present we have 56 pupils registered and of this number 25 are repeating the work of the first grade. At the West Jonesport Primary School 13 pupils are repeating the work of the first grade. It will be observed that this difficulty does not exist to any great extent in the other grades, the percentage of failures is very small in each of the other grades, being slightly more than 20% in any one grade and in most grades with the exception of the first it averages about 12½%. In the first grade the percentage of failures is in excess of 46%.

I believe the cause of this very large percentage of failures in grade one is due primarily to the irregular attendance of the pupils of this grade and age. The pupils of the first grade are in practically all cases under seven years of age. According to the attendance laws of our state pupils are not required to attend school regularly until they become seven. It is my opinion that much of this irregular attendance is unnecessary. It is very discouraging to a child to have to repeat a grade, especially the first. This could be avoided if the child were sent to school regularly. I appeal to all parents having children in grade one to cooperate with us by sending their children to school every day and thus counteract this constantly increasing difficulty.

This past summer we painted the High School Building on the interior in flat colors of light tan and white, also the Cove Primary & Intermediate Building in the same manner.

The Cove Grammar School and the Upper Bay School were painted on the exterior. Three new typewriters were added to our high school equipment. The grammar schools at West Jonesport and Cove were wired for electric lights this fall. The usual amount of repairs to stoves and furnaces were attended to. Some rather extensive repairs were necessary at the Cove and West Jonesport grammar schools both on furnaces and toilets.

During the summer a start was made to equip the schools with play ground apparatus, so much needed and so much in evidence in all up-to-date school systems. Three swings and two seesaws were made at each of the primary school buildings. The money for this work was earned by the pupils at the time of the School Exhibition last February. It is planned to hold the exhibition March 11. We hope to be able to continue the work of improving the play grounds another summer.

The school building at the Upper Bay should be put upon a solid foundation. The frost works upon the underpinning in such a manner as to make it impossible to keep the building in good repair. The floor at the present time is twisted all out of shape. The old underpinning should be replaced by a concrete wall or posts. The walls and ceiling should be repaired and painted. The blackboards are inadequate and the room is poorly lighted. In order to relieve this condition windows should be placed on the south side only. This would afford sufficient space for blackboards on the north and east sides. Provision is made to take care of this work out of the School Repair account.

The walls and ceilings of the West Jonesport Intermediate and Kelleys Point Schools should be painted. The Kelleys Point Building will need to be shingled this summer. The roof of the West Jonesport Grammar School Building leaks badly and will have to be shingled over hips and possibly over all.
