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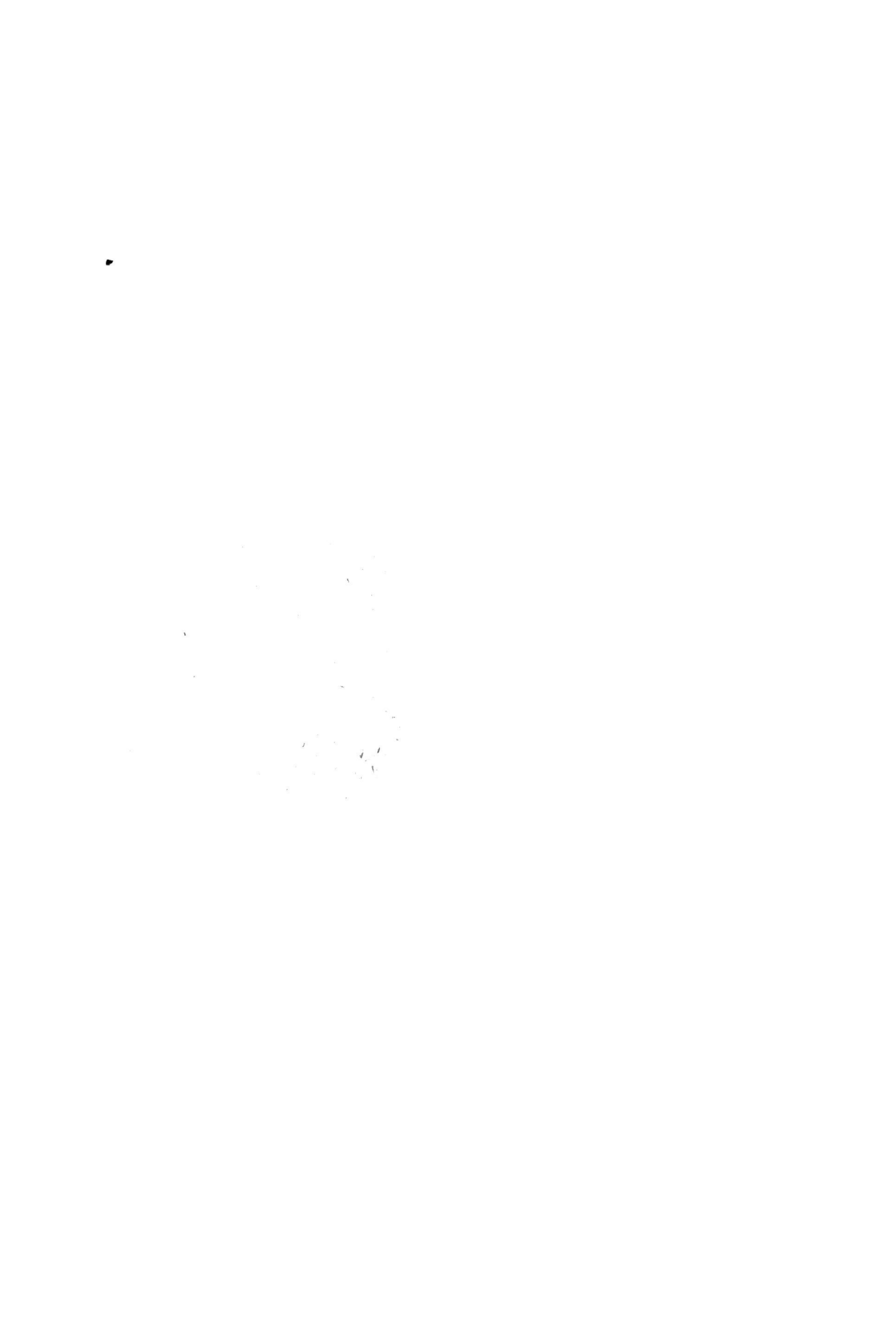

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

To Herbert J. Rogers, a Constable of the Town of Jonesport, in the County of Washington and State of Maine:

Greeting:—

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Jonesport, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Jonesport Opera House, in said town on Monday the 9th day of March at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting
2. To choose a town clerk.
3. To act on the report of the Selectmen, Superintendent of Schools, Peabody Memorial Library, Overseers of the Poor and any other reports.
4. To choose three Selectmen.
5. To choose three Assessors.
6. To choose a Town Treasurer.
7. To vote the fees of the Collector of Taxes.
8. To choose a Collector of Taxes.
9. To see if the Town will vote "Yes" or "No" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the Town to State Aid as provided in Section 26 to 32 Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes.
10. To see what sum, if any, the town will vote to raise in accordance with the provision of Section 26 to 32 inclusive of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes, for the construction of a State Aid Highway extending from the Columbia town line on State Aid Road No. 3, in town of Addison in a southerly and easterly direction through Addison village to State Aid Road No. 2, thence southerly on state aid road No. 2 to state aid road No. 4 thence easterly on state aid road No. 4 to state highway "N" Spur. thence southerly on state highway "N" spur to Jonesport town line approximately 15.05 miles, thence in town of Jonesport from Addison town line in a southerly direction to state aid road No. 1 thence

easterly and northerly to Jonesboro town line approximately 14.74 miles ,thence in town of Jonesboro from Jonesport town line in a northerly direction to State Highway "N", thence easterly on State Highway "N" to State Aid road No. 4, thence southerly and easterly to Roque Bluffs town line approximately 4.85 miles, total mileage in three towns 34.64 miles."

11. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for advertising our natural resources, advantages and attractions under the provisions of the Revised Statutes of Maine, the same to be expended by the Maine Development Association.

12. To raise money for the Library for the ensuing year.

13. To elect a Fire Inspector and raise money for the same.

14. To elect the necessary members of the School Committee.

15. To see if the Town will vote to have a patrolman for the roads and raise money for same.

16. To elect a Road Commissioner or instruct the Selectmen to appoint.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise money on account of Centennial year 1932.

18. To see what action the Town will take in regard to care of fire engine and to appropriate money for same.

19. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire in anticipation of taxes, such sums of money as may be needed for the ensuing year.

20. To see what action the Town will take in raising money for Memorial Day.

21. To raise money for snow bills.

22. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for the Support of schools including teachers' wages and board, fuel, janitors' service, tuition and board of pupils, text books, reference books and school supplies for desk or laboratory use.

23. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for school repairs, painting and equipment.

24. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Superintendent's salary, School Committee and office expense.

25. To see what sum of money the Town will vote to raise for Insurance, Light and Power.

26. To see what action the Town will take in regard to raising money under the Bridge Act to complete Cummings Creek bridge and raise money for same.

27. To see if the Town will vote to maintain at its present height the bridge crossing the creek directly east of the Charles F. Cummings store, and to leave unchanged the grade of the street passing said store.

28. To see if the Town will accept a trust fund for the sum of \$200.00 from Chas. E. Turner, left by Mary E. Conant as a permanent fund in the name of John Calvin and Augusta Hatch, the interest on said sum to be used annually in caring for a lot in Bay View Cemetery in which Mary E. Conant's father and mother are buried.

29. To see what action the Town will take in regard to placing a street light at the end of the road at Cummings & Norton's Wharf.

30. To see what action the Town will take in regard to raising one hundred dollars to improve the town road leading through E. N. Alley Estate. If not favorable to raising \$100 for improvement of this road to see what action the Town will take in regard to discontinuing same.

31. To see what action the Town will take in regard to tarring Main Street from Dickey's Corner to meet the tar now on said street, and raise money for the same.

32. To see what action the Town will take in regard to financing our entire debt by means of issuing municipal bonds.

33. To see what action the Town will take in regard to placing a street light on pole nearest to new school building.

33A. To see what action the Town will take in regard

to placing four lights on Indian River Road, commencing at post 303 to post 291.

34. To see what action the Town will take in regard to tarring State Aid Road thru town and raise money for same.

35. To see what action the Town will take in regard to raising money for Compulsory Education.

36. To raise money for Highways and Bridges.

37. To raise money for Board of Health.

38. To see what action the Town will take regarding raising money for Camp Ground and raise money for same.

39. To choose three Overseers of the Poor.

40. To see what action the Town will take in regard to maintaining the Poor Farm or instruct Selectmen to lease if necessary.

41. To raise money for Support of Poor.

42. To raise money for Town Debt and Interest.

43. To raise money for Town Expense.

44. To raise money for Abatements.

45. To raise money for Repair of Sidewalks.

46. To raise money for Sealer of Weights and Measures.

47. To see whether the Town will vote to raise a sum of money and if so, how much, towards defraying the expense of combating tuberculosis in Washington Co., said sum to be expended by the Wash. Co. Anti-Tuberculosis Ass'n.

48. To see what action the Town will take in regard to appropriating money for dependent children and raise money for same.

49. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of Two Hundred Dollars for the purpose of repairs on third class roads and cutting bushes on state aid and state roads.

50. To see if the Town desires to vote to accept the terms of the so-called Workmen's Compensation Act, being Chapter 50 of the Revised Statutes, and raise money for same.

51. To see what action the Town will take in regard to

appointing a Committee of twelve men, to act in conjunction with the Selectmen in estimating appropriations and all other Town business.

52. To choose Surveyors of wood, lumber, bark and all other necessary town officers.

The Selectmen will be in session at the Fire House on Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings, March 5, 6 and 7, preceding Town Meeting for the purpose of correcting the list of voters.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of Jonesport:

Agreeable with the custom I herewith submit a report of the Public Schools for the fiscal year ending March 1931. the same being my eleventh in a series of similar reports.

The Town employs sixteen teachers, four in the high school and twelve in the common schools. Our maximum salary in the high school \$2000.00, the minimum salary \$1100.00 and the average salary \$1363.00. In the common schools the maximum salary is \$864.00, the minimum salary \$540.00 and the average salary \$711.00. These teachers are required to pay from \$8.00 to \$10.00 per week for living expenses.

A directory of the teachers follows on the next page.

The schools have been operated for 35 weeks since our last annual meeting, or one week short of our regular school year. We have a balance of \$568.23 in the account for the Support of Schools. We have a balance of \$108.65 in the account for School Repairs. There is an overdraft of \$13.12 in the account for School Committee and Office Expense. This is due principally to the office expense incidental to the construction of the New School Building. There is an overdraft of \$524.34 in the account for Insurance. This is due to the insurance placed on the New School Building, and the placing of additional insurance on two school buildings, that were not adequately covered. Our total balances for current operating expenses exceed our total overdrafts for these purposes by \$139.42. Our operating expenses have been increased considerably due to the fire last May. All of the books and supplies held in reserve in the office of the Cove Grammar School Building were destroyed, also the furniture and many of the books in use in the building. The cost

of fitting up the High School Auditorium, so as to provide accommodations for the pupils that were burned out, was considerable. We may consider ourselves fortunate that we had available such a large space, and so adapted to our needs. Only four days of school were lost in making two rooms ready for the two schools. These temporary accommodations served us very well until the opening of the winter term, December 31st., when the New School Building was ready for occupancy.

Needless to say, the boys and girls and teachers were delighted with the new surroundings. All who have inspected the new building agree that it is the most modern school building in the eastern part of the State. That we are able to enjoy such pleasant surroundings is due to the farsightedness of the members of the Advisory Committee and the members of the Building Committee appointed by the Advisory Committee to supervise the construction of the new building. The Committee was indeed fortunate in having as contractor, C. A. Batson formerly a resident of Addison. Mr. Batson was the lowest among some twenty bidders. The reduced cost of building materials and labor just at this particular time made it possible to build much cheaper than ordinarily. No effort was spared to make this building comply with the most exacting requirements for school buildings, and to insure healthy and sanitary surroundings for the youth of this town for years to come. It certainly cannot be said that Jonesport has failed to provide educational advantages for its children, the citizens of tomorrow.

For a number of years we have had between fifty and sixty pupils registered in grades one and two at the Cove. It has been impossible for a teacher to do much with so many pupils. In the new building with five rooms it has been possible to add one extra teacher and thus divide this school with a teacher for the first grade and a teacher for the second grade.

The teachers and pupils of the New School Building

have been very active in securing funds through selling candy, holding socials and through donations. They have purchased a piano and have the same paid for at this time. The pupils of the West Jonesport Grammar School purchased a new electric radio last year and finished paying for the same this year. The pupils of the High School purchased a fifteen volume set of reference books. Two sets of swings and four seesaws have been made and paid for, and are ready to be set up on the play grounds as soon as the frost is out of the ground. The money for this work comes through funds earned by the schools at the Exhibition held last year. We now have a balance in the bank of \$32.87 which is available for the improvement of the play grounds.

This year we remodeled the school building at the Upper Bay. This building was placed upon a solid foundation by means of concrete posts placed below the frost. New windows were placed on the south side of the building which light the room correctly. New blackboards were placed on two sides of the room. New steps were built and banking boards made for the building. The West Jonesport Grammar School Building was shingled with heavy asphalt shingles. One new typewriter was purchased for use in the commercial department of the high school, also one machine exchanged for a new one.

It will be necessary to shingle the Kelley's Point School Building this next year. It will also be necessary to make some rather extensive repairs on the outbuilding at Kelley's Point. We have three typewriters to be exchanged this summer. Our electric current will cost us about \$200.00. For further recommendations your attention is directed to the budget submitted later in this report. This school budget has been prepared after much deliberation on the part of the superintendent and school committee. No attempt has been made toward expansion, but rather to confine our activities to the necessities of the schools.
