

## Report of Superintendent of Schools.

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Gentlemen of the School Committee:—

I herewith submit my second annual report upon the condition of schools in the town of Lubec. In many ways the year has been a successful one and the general tone of the work has been good. We have been rather unfortunate in having so much sickness, especially in the village schools, during the fall and winter, but with the return of spring there is a prospect of improved conditions. The severity of the winter has also hindered in the work and occasioned an irregular attendance.

An attempt was made in the spring to keep all the children fourteen years of age and under, in school until the end of the term, so they could complete their work and have a definite standing, if they entered the schools during the next year. In the village and in several other districts the children were kept in school, but in a few cases it was impossible to bring about the desired results, either through the unwillingness of the truant officer to act or his neglecting to qualify. I wish to take this opportunity to publicly thank Mr. Moores, Truant Officer in Dist. No. 1, for the efficient manner in which he performed his duty.

I am afraid parents do not realize the importance of keeping their children in schools during the few weeks they are in session after the factories open. Work lost in the spring cannot be made up, as the final ranks for the year are given out at that time and the promotions made. Ground lost in the fall can be made up, if the child has sufficient ability and shows a willingness to work.

There will be but one week's vacation this spring, thus bringing the closing time of the next term earlier. This change has been made so as to favor, as much as possible, those desiring to work in the factories during the summer. It is rather discouraging to the teachers, to have schools which ordinarily have thirty or more pupils drop down to fourteen or fifteen as soon as the first factory whistle blows. It does not make so much difference about the older children, but the children ten or twelve years of age ought to be kept in school every day a session is possible. It is earnestly hoped that parents will cooperate more heartily with the school officials, during the coming year, in the endeavor to raise the standard of attendance.

### REPAIRS.

Many repairs have been made on the school buildings throughout the town. The large buildings at North and South Lubec have been painted and repaired thoroughly, inside and out, and will need nothing further done to them for some time to come. Several of the other buildings have been murescoed and have had other minor repairs during the year.

There are three improvements which will have to be made in the near future. A sewer and suitable sanitary arrangements will have to be put in the large building in the village as the lives and health of over three hundred children are endangered by the present conditions.

The school house at No. 2 East will have to be replaced with a new one, as the present building is entirely unfit for school purposes. This building is one of the oldest in town and is certainly in the poorest repair of any. The building at the Ridge will either have to be enlarged or a new one built, as it is entirely too small to accommodate the number of children attending. I have placed these needs in the order of their importance and would strongly recommend that the sewer be put in this year and other changes made as fast as possible.

## COLUMBIAN HALL.

The lower part of Columbian Hall has been divided and fitted for the first grade as was provided in the last town meeting. Contrary to expectations, it has been possible to secure a very comfortable as well as convenient room from this portion of the building. About fifty pupils have been registered in this school and highly satisfactory work has been done throughout the year. The first three grades are now in such a condition that good work is possible. To a person conversant with the conditions as they were, and as they now are, a marked improvement is discernible, as the average number of pupils has been reduced to about forty per teacher. It will be necessary to open an ungraded school in the other part of the Hall next winter, as there have been thirteen desks with three pupils apiece in the large building during the present term.

## SUPPLIES

With an appropriation of \$125 to purchase supplies, or in other words such maps, globes, writing books, paper and pencils, and various other articles as are needed to assist the teacher in carrying on the work of the school, it can be very easily seen that parents will have to furnish the greater part of the common supplies for their children. There is a growing tendency on the part of some to furnish less and less of the supplies necessary. I mention this as I think there is a misunderstanding concerning the supplies furnished.

Composition paper is furnished for examinations.

Language paper for class compositions.

Arithmetic paper for number and busy work for the smaller children.

## TEXT BOOKS.

It has been impossible to furnish all the books called for during the year with the amount appropriated. It will be necessary to have \$500, in order to furnish all the books which will be needed during the coming year. Many of the books are in a dilapidated condition and will have to be replaced. There are also more children in school than there have ever been before, and every child means an increased expenditure. With about 800 children in the schools at the present time, there is less than 40 cts. per pupil to buy books with. The cost of an average book is more than 40 cts. It can be easily seen that this condition will have to be remedied.

I have been trying to introduce the Ward Readers throughout the town and to make several changes in the supplementary reading. The Grammars and Language Books have nearly all been changed and ought to be in good condition.

## FINANCIAL CONDITION.

The length of the coming school year will depend entirely upon the amount appropriated by the town. It has been necessary to cut down the present school year as the amount received from the Town and the State have not been sufficient to maintain the schools for thirty-four weeks as has been done in the past. A comparison of the amounts available for common school purposes the last two years will show that there has been only \$102.73 more, available this year than last. With this amount we have been expected to provide a teacher, fuel, and janitor for the Columbian Hall school, and to maintain the school in the Anderson District.

In order that there may be no mistake concerning the amount necessary to maintain the schools for thirty-four weeks I will give the actual cost of maintaining the schools for that length of time according to the present basis :

This will merely cover actual expenses which can be reckoned in dollars and cents. As there is no balance worth mentioning, and as there are always expenses which cannot be foreseen, it will be necessary to raise \$3500, if the schools are to be in session thirty-four weeks. Thirty-four weeks is not a long school year as most of the large towns in Maine have thirty-six weeks and many of the cities have thirty-eight.


