Superintendent of Schools and High School Principal

Report of Superintentendent of Schools

To the S S Committee-

Gentlemen—In accordance with the regulations of the school department, the following report is presented; the fourth submitted by

e as superingendent of Lubec.

You have kept thoroughly in touch with the expenditures of the department. Each bill has been approved by a majority of the committee before being ordered paid. This method has systematized the matter of accounts and has not only made the work lighter for ourselves, but has been of much assistance to the municipal officers in arranging for the payment of bills

Teachers

In the Elementary schools of the village, three changes are noted in the teaching force. Miss Agnes Adams resigned at the close of the school year in June, to accept a position in Mass. Miss Annie Adams resigned at the same time to accept a position in the Machias Normal School, and Miss Etta Trecartin returned to the 9th grade after being out two years. Miss Crockett, who had taught in the 9th grade was made principal of North Lubec Grammar. Several unavoidable changes have been made in the outlying schools. The new teachers have shown their ability to do as good work as can reasonably be expected. It takes some time for a teacher to get acquainted with conditions before the best work can be done; yet it seems that the teachers have readily understood conditions and gotten the schools in running order with little difficulty.

All teachers in the town have had previous experience in teaching with three exceptions. Miss Grace Webber plans to enter a Normal school next year and Miss Sadie Avery remained out of Normal school for the purpose of teaching a year. The third teacher, who had no previous experience is Miss Mary Varney, who, however, has taken nearly the full course in Plymouth Normal School, and consequently

has had a course in methods of teaching,

The policy of the school board has been to assist graduates of the high school who show promise of making good teachers, by allowing them to teach for a limited time, usually a year, after which they are expected to attend some state normal school. This plan ought to be very acceptable to those who intend to become teachers. Young and inexperienced teachers should not expect to teach longer than this before starting a course in a normal school. This is a duty they owe to the town and to themselves.

In a recent communication from the State Educational Department, the matter of better preparation of teachers was presented.

School officials are urged to use their influence to send students to Normal schools. The communication incidently suggested that the Town of Lubec should have as its quota of students, in Normal schools six at the present time. Upon looking up the number from Lubec who are in such schools we find eight distributed as follows: two in Machias, one in Presque Isle, three in Farmington, and two in Gorham. If all towns of the State were manifesting the same degree of interest in this important matter as has been shown in Lubec, I feel that each year we would not have to enroll in the teaching force of the State one thousand new, inexperienced and untrained teachers. This is about the number of such teachers employed under the present conditions. These conditions arise from facts which are indisputable and the somer the towns take concerted action to overcome these difficulties the sooner will results show gratifying improvement.

High School

The High School has shown a gratifying increase in numbers since the last report, the number registered being ninety five. We have carried out the plans which were made a year ago by introducing a Commercial Course. Fully as many pupils have elected the course as should, in fact a communication was sent to each pupil who entered in the Freshman class stating the purposes of such a course and the necessity of not taking it with an idea that it supplants an academic course. This course is hardly in operation, as only pupils of three classes have elected it. Four typewriters were provided last year but with the increase of students who will take the subject next year, there should be at least three more typewriters provided.

The teachers of the High School are all showing by their efforts and interests that the standard of the school shall be bigh; the results of their work show that the school reaches a high degree of efficiency.

In connection with the High School, I wish to call your attention to the need of another teacher. With the present number and an increased attendance next year, it will be too much for four teachers to carry on the work especially when the attention of one teachers is devoted to a course entirely outside the academic work. It places too much strain upon the teachers to do what they conscientiously feel should be done. It has been our desire to have two modern languages in the school but with our limited teaching force it is impossible to take more than one. The additional teacher should be employed then the courses can be arranged so that more needed time can be given the subjects. This recommendation is feasible from the financial point of view. According to statistics it seems that the average cost per pupil in high schools of the State per year is a little above thirty dollars. Many of the larger schools will show a cost much higher.

We find the cost per pupil on the same basis in the town of Lubec to be less than \$23.00. This is much less than the average for the State and is even less than it was four years ago as the cost per

pupil then was nearly twenty nine dollars.

Repairs.

During the year in addition to the minor repairs, cleaning etc. the School Board arranged to have five school houses painted. These schoolhouses were given two coats of extra quality paint. Other buildings should receive attention next year. Early in the fall it was found that owing to serious defect in the chimney at number 2 West, so called, a new chimney should be built. This was done and since that time the heating of the building has been satisfactory.

One side of the roof of the schoolhouse at South Lubec was reshingled and very soon the other side will need to be reshingled.

The lower room of that building needs a new floor as we had to patch the floor owing to being worn through in places. This floor should be laid of hard wood. Several of the buildings need interior repairs, some more extensive than others, and an appropriation should be made with this purpose in view. We wish to express our appreciation of the work done on the interior of the old part of the building in the Village. The changes made in partitions etc. have improved conditions considerably. The building is improved in consequence both inside and outside.

Textbooks.

Owing to the demands made by the High Schools for additional books, we have supplied only necessary books to meet the needs without considering new subjects or new titles in the elementary schools:

Not a new title has been taken to displace a similiar book of some other. There have been evidently need of making some changes but we have tried to keep within the appropriation in this matter which I am pleased to report has been done.

General Remarks

During the year it has been our purpose to encourage the teachers to present their subjects in their varied relations so that the pupils will thoroughly understand them. The pupils have been urged to get the thought of the lessons rather than the words of the text.

They have been encouraged to go outside the language of the book and to use their own language as far as possible. The teachers have tried to introduce the work so that the reasoning powers may be developed. Much should be done in each subject to increase the reasoning powers. Much attention has been given to the subject of mental analysis as applied to arithmetic.

It has been our purpose to have a minimum amount of work outlined for the classes and whenever time can be taken in connection with the abilities of the members of the classes, the teachers have tried to take extra work with the idea of reaching a maximum amount.

This minimum work above mentioned should cover such of the subjects as is absolutely necessary, and should be done very thoroughly,

This idea of thoroughness carries with it the principle that children should not be superficial in the essentials.

Knowledge obtained by doing work superficially is not making the pupil self dependent; is not furnishing a good basis for habit formation

Of en we have heard expressions of criticism trom parents who feel that their children should cover more ground in particular books used as basal texts. They are satisfied if the child has the exact words of the book at his command and do not realize that much time and effort should be given to work which is outside, that is, work taken from other texts etc. We must admit that the mixed schools, owing to lack of time, do more of this rote work than the grades do but the principle holds good in all schools.

The report of the principal of the High School is appended as a part of this school report and your attention is called to it for a more detailed report.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation of the hearty cooperation of the teachers and p arents. Without such cooperation the work in the schools would fail in large measure of satisfactory results. I take this opportunity to thank the members of the Committee for the cordial relations toward the teachers and myself; for your readiness to give time and attention to the important work of managing the schools.

Report of High School Principal

To the Superintendent and Members of the S S Committee

Gentlemen:—As principal of the Lubec High school I here-

with present my fourth annual report.

Enrolment—The Lubec High School this year has had an enrollment of 96 pupils, 51 boys and 45 girls. Within a period of three years the school has more than doubled its members. You will notice that the number of boys exceed that of the girls, which fact is worthy of comment. It is a condition not usually found, as statistics will prove and one which should be regarded as a credit to the town. It shows that parents appreciate what a high school course means to their boys, and that they are willing to make, often a strenuous effort to give the boys what at the present time, is absolute essential for a fair start in life

Although the number leaving this school is exceptionally small it should, nevertheless, be smaller. In considering this question of dropping out of school to many people regard it wholly from a pecuniary standpoint. They think a high school course valuable only so far as it may be turned into dollars and cents. These people lose sight of the fact that such a course comprises not only a curriculum which, to a certain extent, may be said to have a money equivalent, but also some things which from their very nature, can have no market value, but which are invaluable to human welfare. One of these things is what the student gains by daily obedience to school regulations; by submitting his inclinations to what is intended for the good of the whole. In other words it is practising daily the conquest of self, a school in which child or adult can not have too much training. Another is the isciqline acquired from performing in a satisfactory and methodical way, the daily routine of the school work. The carrying out day by day of the prescribed programme must develop the powers of application and concentration.

A third is the benefit derived from associating with active and earnest boys and girls of the same age, who have a definite aim in view and who are working, many under taxing circumstances, to rea ize that aim. These are the things that cannot be bought and sold. Alexander, although his coffers overflowed with the treasures of Susa and Persepolis, could never possess the conquest of self. Edison, regarded by many as the greatest American, did not buy the powers of concentration which have enabled him to occupy his exalted position and influence—who would presume to weigh it out in terms of dollars ond cents! These agencies, active at the most impressionable period of life are in themselves enough to make worth while the struggle to

keep in school until graduation, the girl or boy.

Attendance—The daily attendance has been, on the whole, satisfactory. There have however been some instances where children have been allowed to stay out of school for flimsy excuses. This is an injustice to the pupil, for it allows him to look upon his school work as relatively unimportant, which must result in decreasing his interest. It interferes with his advancement. The majority of students have all they can manage in doing one days work at a time. Attempting to do more than this, as has to be done in case of absence, is a great disadvantage. There are few "extras" which cannot be taken care of after school or on Saturday.

The pupils coming in from out of town deserve the greatest commendation. They are always present and on time, no matter the condition of the weather, and in spite of the fact that they walk anywhere from two to eight miles or ten miles.

Home Study—It is useless to expect a pupil to get very much out of high school work unless he is required to spend from one to three hours in home study. It is the duty of the school to develop and make clear the subject matter; it is the duty of the home to see that the pupil spends enough time in individual work to make the teachers explanation intelligible. There should be a definite time set aside for home work and this time should be spent in diligent application and not in merely sitting and looking at the book. The time spent in study should not be at eight thirty in the evening after mind and body havebecome exhausted by the day's activities. It should be before supper, shortly after supper, or in the morning before school.

The Commercial Course—This year the course has been extended into the Junior year. There are at present 44 pupils in this department. The work is in charge of efficient and experienced teachers whose time is practically all devoted to the interests of the commercial students. There is no reason why the results should not be good. The equipment has been improved by changing the book keeping texts for a more up to date edition. Four new type writers have been purchased and placed in the recitation room situated between the rooms occupied by the third and fourth grades.

Athletic Association -- By a vote of the school the athletic association has been carried out just as it was last year. The organization has been represented by a baseball and basketball team. In baseball the team did not do very much, owing to various circumstances. Because of a lack of material it was necessary to play outside men, which is objectionable. What is needed is to find out the material which there is in the school and to develope it. This can be done only through the services of a person who knows baseball, who knows how to handle boys and

who has plenty of time. If the school is to have any standing in the recently formed "Washington County League" which includes the preparatory schools of the county, the boys must have instruction. The custom of high schools is to hire a coach and it is the intention of the Association to follow the lead of other schools in that particular and to supply a coach for three or four weeks in the spring. This will cost about \$80. A good part of the money is already in the treasury.

The basketball season has been unusually successful. The team is the best that the school, and perhaps the town has ever had. Of the six games played, only one resulted in a defeat and this was with the Waterville team which was acknowledged to be out of the high school class. The attendance at the games has been large and has put the Association in excellent standing financially. This money will be used to procure the necessary material for the baseball season, and to help pay the expenses of the coach.

Mr. Walter G. Brown has very kindly presented the boys with a horizontal bar which may be made a valuable source of amusement and development.
