This board has held its annual meeting and quarterly meetings as specified by the laws of the State of Maine. During the past year one case of measles and one case of pulmonary tuberculosis were reported to this board. Three nuisances were reported to the board during the year. No deaths from tuberculosis have been reported to the board and no diseases except one of measles have been reported for quarantine. The board has made a special effort to instruct the public of the dangers of infections and contagious diseases. It has caused to be distributed among them 300 copies of "The Prevention of Consumption," circulars issued by the State Board of Health. Also, 500 copies of "The Danger from Flies," circulars issued by the State Board of Health.

Too little notice is given to sink drains and the disinfecting of houses occupied by tubercular patients.

In accordance with the law enacted by the last legisla-

TO THE VOTERS OF MACHIAS:

The undersigned, members of the School Committee, in submitting the report of the Superintendent of Schools take the opportunity to summarize, briefly, the condition of the School department and their doing during the past year.

The present School Board has been together five years and during that time many changes, both in the teaching force and in the schools themselves have been made.

The School Committee, believing that a longer school year was desirable, added two weeks, making now thirtysix weeks which is about the maximum in this state.

Through the concerted efforts of the people of Wash-

ington county and the generosity of the citizens of Machias.

it has been possible to give to one half of our common school pupils absolutely trained teaching, coupled with upto-date and sanitary conditions in every way. This cannot fail to have a great influence for good in the remainder of our schools and teachers, for "example is better than precept" and competition is a great stimulant.

For years the towns-people and School Boards have believed that local teachers, with no training whatever, some with not even a high school education, were competent enough to bring up our pupils. We believe that this idea is being dissolved, and that parents will insist that principles of school training should obtain, as much as they require specialized education in their clergymen, -

physicians and lawyers.

We are of the opinion that, within reasonable limits, the cost of these up-to-date methods should not be weighed in the consideration; that it is and must be a pecuniary loss to any town to hire or retain teachers for purely sentimental reasons.

The School Committee has lately become party to what it considers a nearly perfect arrangement by which, at scarcely any increase in expense we obtain a trained Superintendent of Schools who is devoting his whole time to the work. It is too well known to need remark that small towns cannot have adequate supervision, as few persons are competent for the position, fewer have the time, and none can be paid what his services would be worth. The plan of union superintendance overcomes all these difficulties, and we congratulate the citizens that this system is in working order here.

A study of the report of the Superintendent should be

made. It may be objected that the cost of our common

and high schools has increased. It must be remembered however, that professional people have a right to demand, and do demand, adequate compensation, not only for their present worth, but for the investment of their training; that it costs more to live, not only for the teacher but for the janitor, and all classes insist upon an increase in wages. In addition, each town must furnish free text books; and an increase of 100 per cent in the attendance of our High School in twenty years, justifies an increase in its faculty.

The registration at the high school is, indeed, worthy of note, particularly when it is understood that the course of study there does not offer the practical education which ought to be given. The committee is aware of this and has deplored it for some time. This condition was brought

about a number of years ago when the institution was made a fitting school for New England colleges. More recently a Maine law was passed allowing extra state aid provided high schools were raised to a certain standard. These two requirements are, to a certain extent, inconsistent, and the School Department believes that more attention should be paid to giving the pupils a thorough, practical fit for their life work rather than to provide for those scholars who, in theory, are going to attend college. "It is a condition and not a theory, which confronts us," and we contemplate making a change in the curriculum of the high school which shall benefit the ten who, finish their education in our scools rather than the one who, perhaps, intends to go to college.

In conclusion, the establishment of a Normal School in this town and the excellent standing of our schools have advertised us as an educational centre and towns within a

wide circle are now sending here pupils, who formerly went

to academies, and fitting schools. The fact that they are sent to Machias is the best proof of the excellence of the local school system.



Each teacher is expected to be present in the school-



No teacher shall deviate from the hours of opening or closing the sessions except by special permission obtained beforehand from the Superintendent or school committee. If by reason of sickness or for any other cause a teacher shall be unable to be present at either morning or afternoon session she shall notify the Superintendent before the time of opening that session.

If a teacher shall suspect that a pupil under her charge is suffering from any contagious disease, she shall immediately notify the School Physician who shall examine the child in the school building and if found suffering from such a disease he shall be excluded from school and bis parents notified of the fact.

As my work has covered only about one half of the school year this report can only briefly touch upon some more important phases of school work.


In entering upon any new field of school work it takes time to get acquimed, with the, problems, and to make the proper re-adjustments in order to give the school system greater efficiency.

Reports of the scholarship and deportment of each pupil will be made every half term. Parents are requested to carefully examine these reports and to sign and return them to the teachers."



School Houses.

The school houses are for the most part in good condition although repairs, more or less extensive, are needed each year. During the summer all the school bouses were inspected, cleaned, plaster repaired, floors painted or oiled and other necessary minor repairs made.

Extra windows were placed in the rear of the Grammar school so that the room now is very well lighted.

Steel ladders were also placed on the outside of the

Rawson, Hemenway and Kennebee schools, so that those

school houses conform to the state law in regard to means

of egress in case of fire.

New seats are needed in the Hemenway upper school and in the Bell school as the seats and desks now there are old, out-of-date and unhygience.

Text-books.

The schools are fairly well provided with text-books and those purchased during the year have been mainly to replace worn out books.

I believe we ought to make an investigation of the writing systems in use in other places and make some attempt to improve that in use here if no better is found.

The results that have been attained are not satisfactory and our pupils in common with those of many other towns leave school very poor writers. Whether this is the

fault of the system, or of the teacher, or both, something should be done to remedy it.

Unless a separate appropriation is made for supplies we ought to have a larger appropriation.

Teachers.

The teaching corps of Machias is one of which the town may well be proud. They have given freely of their time and strength to make the schosls successful and profitable and their efforts have been rewarded with improved schools. Machias has a school system that compares very favorably with any town of its size in the state.

We need more money for teachers salaries. Wages in all kinds of labor have increased enormously in the last two years and the cost of living has also increased. If we are to get trained teachers for our schools, we must pay them a salary that will make it worth their while to get that training, and that will enable them to live comfortably

while teaching. Our salaries are entitely too small to at-

tract teachers from out of town with proper training.

High School

The High School has had a successful year under the efficient management of Mr. Chaffee and Mr. Harriman. At the beginning of the fall term we were confronted with a large and surprising increase in our high school attendance.

If the attendance continues to increase at the present rate next year will find our quarters entirely too small to accommodate the pupils and our teaching force to small to successfully handle the classes.

I believe that something should be done to make our High School curriculum more attractive and useful to this large majority of boys and girls who must go to work when

they finish school.

Attendance.

Our attendance is very gratifying but not by any means as good as it ought to be. Every child of school age ought to attend school regularly and if he does not do so he is losing something that can never be regained and destroying his chances for future happiness and prosperity.

The matter of regular attendance lies largely with the parents and we cannot too strongly urge the parents of Machias to see that their children attend school every day of every term.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the citizens of Machias for their kindness and courtesy and the members of the school committee for their sympathy with and hearty cooperation in everything that makes for the improvement of cur schools.




