

To the Members of the S. S. Committee and Citizens of the Town of Machias:

I hereby present my fourth annual report of the condition, progress and needs of the schools of Machias.

We have had a successful school year of thirtysix weeks.

Under Prin. A. W. Austin the High School has developed a much higher degree of scholarship and deportment than during the past few years. Solid geometry has been added to the course of study and our boys entering engineering courses in our colleges will not be further handicapped by the lack of this subject. The Commercial Course has been revised to agree with commercial courses in modern high schools. The Junior High School has maintained the same courses as last year. At the present time we are preparing a course

of study to place in the hands of the printer outlining the work of each course. Anyone interested can have a copy upon application to the superintendent. We have deferred having this course of study printed to see what action the town will take in establishing a course in Domestic Science in our schools. It is an understood fact that any well-balanced educational system needs a Domestic Science Course. During the past two years the girls of the seventh and eighth grades, under the instruction of Miss O'Donnell and Miss Gaffney have made remarkable progress in sewing. The Parent-Teachers' Association has borne the expense of this work. At the present time the Parent-Teachers' Association has enough funds on hand raised for that particular purpose, to aid substantially in equipping a course of Domestic Science for our High School. If the town wil raise the sum of \$400 for instruction the State will pay \$800 in support of the course. The value of the course has been thoroughly proven in all communities where it has been established. Certainly the girls of the Town of Machias are entitled to the same benefits received by girls of similar communities of the state. Sewing, cooking, value of food products and household administration are things every girl of the present day should be familiar with and the best method whereby this knowledge can be attained is a course in Domestic Science.

School House Repairs

According to the vote taken at the last annual town meeting the two wings were added to the High School building thus giving space for four more class rooms. This work was done by contractor W. H. Wass in a very satisfactory manner, under the supervision of the Board of Selectmen, the S. S. Committee acting in an advisory capacity. This addi- ANNUAL TOWN REPORT - 39

tion will give ample room for an indefinite time, unless the population of the town should be largely increased, and the children of Machias are surely as comfortably equipped for school accommodations as any town or city in eastern Maine.

But when tearing away to erect the two wings a great deal of rotten wood was uncovered which cost heavily to replace. A new chimney was also necessary owing to the new heating plant. These with many minor expenditures caused a heavy overdraft in the Repairs Account. This work was absolutely necessary and could only be done at the least expense at that time. And I feel sure that no citizen can question the advisability of them. It is also interesting to note that while the selectmen were empowered to borrow \$7000 it was only necessary for them to borrow \$5000. During the past cold weather the building has been comfortable at all times, while around us schools were suspending sessions owing to the fact that they could not heat their buildings. I can assure you that the improved school conditions are thoroughly appreciated by both pupils and teachers.

Health

Among the many causes of poor progress on the part of the school children is ill health, and in many cases this is due to remediable causes. Defective sight and hearing are responsible for many backward pupils. The apparent dullness and stupidity in many pupils is caused by the presence of adenoids which interfere with the blood supply to the brain, clog up the nasal passages, cause mouth breathing and the indistinct pronounciation of words. They are easily removed by a physician. During the past year our physicians and county

nurse gave their time unstintedly to make an examination of all the pupils in our schools.

I respectfully recommend that the advice of these competent authorities be followed so far as possible in the interest of your children's school work.

In closing this report I desire to thank all the friends of our school and the members of the Superintending School Committee for their uniform courtesy, good will and co-operation.



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HIGH SCHOOL REPORT

To the Superintendent, School Board and Citizens of the Town of Machias:

The whole number of scholars attending high school i_S 170, of whom 67 are enrolled in the College Preparatory Course, 72 in the Commercial Course, and 31 in the English Course.

I wish to take this occasion to express to the parents in the Town of Machias, my appreciation of the gentlemanly and ladylike standard of conduct that I have observed on the part of their sons and daughters, both in school and out. This I believe must be attributed both to healthful home influences and to the teachers who have preceded me, and those in the lower grades. I would be glad if I could commend the studious habits and industry of your sons and daughters as highly as I can their courtesy and conduct, but this I cannot honestly do, and I am glad to have this opportunity to request the co-operation of the parents with the object that their children may obtain the maximum advantages that your High School has to offer. This can only be done when both parents and students come to realize that a High School diploma is of no value except as it stands for tasks, faithfully performed, and studies conscientiously mastered.

The value of a High School or a College education consists wholly in the amount of mental discipline and efficiency the student has acquired. The student who enters high school or college and throughout his course meets difficulty with determination and accepts it as an incentive to hard and intensive study graduates with a mental development of incalculate value both to himself and to society. On the other hand, the student who through 48 ANNUAL TOWN REPORT ---

his school and college days, looks on difficulty as something to be passed over as easily as possible, graduates with a weaker brain than he or she would have possessed, had their school days ended when they left the grammar school.

There are two mental habits which fix our places in the world. One is the habit of mastery which leads to success, the other is the habit of quitting, whose goal is a failure. Which mental habit do you want for your sons and daughters?

With the hope of raising the standard of schol-

arship in this school, I have, with the co-operation and advice of your superintendent and school board, followed the example of practically all the large high schools in New England, and established an aftersession so that when the student shows by unsatisfactory daily work or deficient marks in examinations that they have not been doing enough home work to make their high school course of value to themselves, we can keep them in the building for an extra hour of study. This is a study period pure and simple. The students are not kept to receive help, but to help themselvs. However, the teacher who has the session in charge is always glad to help as much as possible, and all of us have stayed night after night until fiveo'clock and after, to help those whom we felt had need of it. Also, that the parents might better know what kind of work their children were doing. I have established a definite system of ranking which all teachers in the Senior High School are abliged to follow. All teachers keep daily ranks. Examinations are given three times a year. . The passing mark is 70 per cent. A student present in the class, but failing to have prepared the lesson receives 30 per cent for attendance, as I believe that it is a poor teacher who cannot impart more than 30

per cent of a subject during the recitation period. Work made up, whether because of absence or failure receives only 70 per cent. Daily work counts two-thirds, and examinations one-third.

We are all making an especial effort, not only that every student shall receive all the rank that belongs to them, but also that no student shall receive more rank than belongs to him or her. An error in either direction is detrimental to the pupil, misleadign to the parents, and unfair to the student body as a whole. If students receive poor rank, let the parents first find out if they are doing the amount of home study that they should. If they are not, the remedy is in the hands of the parents. If they are, it would be unwise for the parent toconfer with the Principal. In seclusion I want to express my appreciation of the earnest and intelligent co-operation which I have received from the Superintendent of Schools the School Board and my fellow Teachers. It has been many years since I have had the pleasure of working with men and women who were striving as intelligently and earnestly for the best interests of a school, at no matter what cost to themserves, either in form of hard work or personal popularity.

I want to express my appreciation of the high school building which I considered one of the most convenient and best planned that I ever worked in. It is also amply large for a school of the present size, and could accommodate many morewithout overcrowding. During this cold weather, there has never been a day but what the building has been perfectly warm enough for comfort which speaks well, both for the heating plant and the faithfulness of the Janitor.

MANUAL TRAINING REPORT

To Superintendent of Schools, Members of School Board and Citizens of Machias:

I take pleasure at this time in thanking you for the courteous treatment and co-operation extended to me, and perhaps at this time it would be well to say a few words in regard to Manual Training. This department has added to the standard and stability of all schools where it has been instituted, for it gets nearer to the things that the average boy has to deal when he leaves school. This year there are sixty boys taking this course and they are very much interested in their work, and sometime during the month of May, we will have an exhibition showing the projects the boy_s have made during this school year. I hope you may find time to attend. Several tools have been added to the equipment this year and we have six vices and several hand clamps ordered which are greatly needed, and, I would recommend the purchase of a wood turning lathe. This is a very essential part of wood working and its use is being taught in a great many of the schools. One more thing I would like to mention at the present time. The boys are required to furnish practically all of their stock, consequently some of the boys have stock to work with and some do not, which is very unsatisfactory. Now I would suggest that the Town put in a small supply of stock and let the boys have it at half-price. This is done in nearly all of the schools, and in a school of this size it would not be a very costly proposition.

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF MAINE, you are hereby required to warn and notify such of the inhabitants of said town of Machias as are qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at PHOENIX OPERA HOUSE, in said Machias, on Monday, the twenty-sixth day of March instant, at nine o'clock and thirty minutes in the forenoon, to act on the following named articles, to wit:

ARTICLE 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE

2. To choose a Town Clerk, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of Poor, Town Treasurer, Auditor, Member of Superintending School Committee for the term of three years, one Fire Commissioner for the term of three years, Collector of Taxes, (Road Commissioner), and all other town officers required by the laws of the State of Maine.



ARTICLE 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary or deemed expedient for the support of the schools, poor, fire department. water service, street lighting, school books, apparatus and appliances, repairs of highways, bridges and sidewalks, repair of town buildings, and all other legal purposes and town charges for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 4. To see whether the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid as provided in section 19, of chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of five hundred and thirty-three dollars for the improvement of the section of state road as outlined in the report of the report of the state highway commissioner, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges; the above amount being the maximum which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of section 18, chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, and what sum, for the mainetnance of state and state aid highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to appoint a Road Commissioner for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 8. To determine the compensation of the Road Commissioner.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will raise and ap-

propriate the sum of five hundred dollars for Free Reading Room.

ARTICLE 10.

To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of one hundred dollars for observance of next Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of twelve hndred dollars to pay this year's interest on

the town debt.

To see if the town will vote to bor-ARTICLE 12. row not exceeding eight thousand dollars, upon the faith and credit of the town during the municipal year 1923 and 1924, in anticipation of, and to be paid from, the taxes to be collected on assessments for said municipal year, and if the town votes so to borrow, to authorize and direct treasurer to execute and deliver the negotiable interest-bearing promissory note or notes of the town for the sum or sums so borrowed.

RTICLE 13. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money, and if so, how much, to be applied towards payment of the town debt.

To see if the town will authorize ARTICLE 14. the Superintendending School Committee to provide instruction in manual training and domestic sci-

ence, or either of said branches, in the public schools of the town.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money, and if so, how much, to defray the expense of teaching the branch or branches mentioned in the preceding article.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote to suspend for the ensuing year the operation of the provisions of the last paragraph of section 10 of the town by-law_s requiring the ringing of the curfew.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the town will vote to raise money for open air band concert_s during the coming summer, and if so, how much.

ARTICLE 18. To see whether the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money and if so, how much, towards defraying the expense of combatting Tuberculosis in Washington County Anti-Tuberculosis Association.

ARTICLE 19. To see whether the town will authorize the selectmen to purchase calcium chloride for use on the streets, and raise and appropriate money therefor.

ARTICLE 20. To see whether the town will vote

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to authorize the Selectmen to install a modern street lighting system to replace the present arrangement which has become obsolete, and raise and appropriate money for said purpose.

ARTICLE 21.

To see whether the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the growth on the old cemetery lot near Sylvan Park.

ARTICLE 22. To see whether the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, or a committee to be chosen for the pur pose, to construct a public sewer beginning on northerly side of Water Street near the residence of John P. Farris, and crossing said street and extending through the Leighton field to the canal or river, and raise and appropriate money for said purpose.
