REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

Machias, Maine March 1, 1931

To the Board of Education:

In compliance with the requirements of the law, I submit herewith my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

TEACHERS

The teaching staff for the elementary schools was necessarily changed this year by the resignations of Miss Helen Bowker, Miss Margaret Coffin and Miss Ruby Bryant. We were very fortunate to secure excellent teachers to fill the vacancies. The new teachers are Miss Clara Clemons, Hemingway School; Miss Marion Coffin, Rawson School; and Miss Winifred Bryant, Kennebec School.

I am pleased to report that all teachers are doing excellent work and are striving hard to promote the best interests of the pupils.

There were several changes in the teaching corps of the high school. Mr. McEacharn and Miss Lois Chadwick being the only ones on the present staff who had taught in the building before. The new teachers are: Mr. and Mrs. L. R. Additon, Miss Ella Mowry and Miss Olive McKinnon. Conscientious work is being performed by all the high school teachers.

We should have at least one more teacher in the high school, to relieve the teaching load, to give the Principal more time for administration duties, and to allow for a broader course of study.

A further account of the high school and its needs will be found in the Principal's report.

JANITOR

The janitor service has been excellent this year. Everything has been kept neat and clean and there have been no complaints from the teachers.

ATTENDANCE

On the whole, attendance has been very satisfactory.

Nearly all cases of absence have been caused by sickness. Parents should realize that part of our State Apportionment is reckoned on aggregate attendance and should plan, as they have been doing, to keep their children in regular attendance.

HEALTH

The County Nurse has made one visit to each school and plans to make another before the school year is over. This is about all we can expect from her as her duties are so many and her territory so large. However, we should give more attention to health in our schools. New text books are needed and a campaign should be started for 100% seven point health. I might add that we are planning to do something along this line.

MUSIC

This course has been very satisfactory this year and should be continued. A full report by Mrs. Parlin follows.

REPAIRS

Considerable work was done this year, especially on the High School. Fire escapes were built on the Rawson and Hemingway buildings. Minor repairs were made on the Kennebec school especially after the fires. The cost for this was paid by the insurance company. The high school needs painting on the outside and the front entrance needs some repair.

The boilers have been carefully inspected twice this year by an Inspector from the insurance companies. He pronounced them perfectly safe and recommended a few minor repairs. These repairs were made and conditions were pronounced satisfactory.

BOOKS & APPARATUS

Although a good start was made last year in providing new and up-to-date books we found it necessary to purchase quite a few more this year, especially in the high school.

The books in the English Department were very old and in very poor condition. The Sophomore and Junior Classes

this year, are above average in number, and there were not enough books of any kind for them. New histories were furnished in the seventh grade and new arithmetics in the seventh and eighth grades.

A series of new health books is badly needed in the grades.

Supplementary material is needed in all subjects.

Laboratory apparatus has been purchased whenever needed and the regular supplies have been furnished.

FINANCES

This year the School Department has been badly handicapped financially. The State Apportionment was \$500 less this year than last. We have never received any State Aid for the Physical Education Course and this lowered last year's budget by \$600 more. We also found that there was over \$500 in old bills that had to be paid. Taking all these amounts together it will be seen that we had much less to work with than was expected from last year's budget.

BUDGET

The following budget provides for thirty-six weeks of school, music, the usual operating expenses of the schools, an increase in salaries of certain teachers and an amount to equal at least 6% of last year's State Apportionment Fund. The State Department has informed us that it is necessary to raise this last amount as the Apportionment Fund for next year will be at least that much less. I am also giving two amounts to be raised, one allowing for an extra teacher in the high school.

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To the Superintendent, School Committee, and Citizens of Machias:

I herewith submit the annual report of Machias High School:

ATTENDANCE

School opened September 8 with an enrollment of 181 pupils, 45 of which registered from surrounding towns. The distribution by classes was: Seniors-35, Juniors-50, Sophomores-57, and Freshmen-39. During the fall term there were 50 not absent from either session, and the average attendance was 170. Up to the present time only four have been lost.

Too much emphasis cannot be placed upon the importance of regular attendance. The benefit derived from classroom explanations and discussions is the factor which makes regular attendance important. Even if all assignments are made up with the teacher the work can only be done in part. Absences due to sickness, and sometimes other causes are unavoidable, but I feel that a number of absences are avoidable and should be avoided for the benefit of the pupil, school and teachers.

COURSES

At the beginning of this school year we found that it was nothing less than impossible with the number of teachers to offer the variety of subjects listed in the course of study passed on from last year. To meet this situation and also to encourage the study of Latin and Algebra a new course of study was prepared. The College Preparatory Course has been divided into two parts, namely, Classical and Scientific. In the first course four years of Latin are required; in the second, two years of Latin in addition to other requirements. A third course offered is the general Course; it is here that the variety of courses is limited. The great number of high school pupils that do not continue their education should have several subjects dealing as di-

rectly as possible with every day problems. The chief criticism to offering such courses is, usually, that they become over-crowded with pupils who should choose a college course and would profit by it. This is a very important and serious problem and one that should receive due consideration by both parents and teachers before a final choice is allowed.

ATHLETICS

The football team had a very successful season under the leadership of Mr. Cunningham who deserves much credit and many thanks for his willingness to give his time and effort to the needs of the school. Further credit and thanks should be extended to Mr. Pendergast for his work during a period of Mr. Cunningham's absence.

I feel that the high school and every interested citizen of Machias owes a debt of gratitude to Mr. Kimball and the Normal School for making a basketball schedule possible this year. They have not only given us the use of their gymnasium at a very low cost but also have repeatedly changed their own plans for our benefit. With this opportunity a fine team has been developed and a record made which is a credit to the players and to the school.

IMPROVEMENTS AND NEEDED IMPROVEMENTS

Painting and repairing on the interior of the building has made a great change in its appearance. The number of new chairs added to the main room has made it possible to have regular morning assembly. Part of the chairs being the arm-chair type made the supply of this kind large enough to accommodate all study-period groups in the main room. The fire bell has been put in working order and fire drills have been practiced.

Some of the outstanding needed supplies are: (1) black-boards in room 2, (2) laboratory equipment for science courses, (3) library supplies. The school is the next thing to destitute of a library. Time and again this year important reference work has had to be omitted. Several popular books and magazines containing recent ideas and information are very much needed for reference and reading. I believe that

boys and girls are most interested in the educational things that appear in the period of time since their birth. If there is plenty of such material before them, it takes only encouragement for a great number to read it. Outside book reports for English classes have been quite well taken care of through the local and State libraries.

Undoubtedly the greatest need of the school is more teachers. The Directory of Secondary Schools, published each year by the Department of Education, shows that Machias High School has the least number of teachers of any school of its approximate size in the State. This number of teachers makes it necessary to neglect parts of a high school education which I believe are important to the pupils. I should like to mention briefly some of the phases of the work that are affected: (1) variety of subjects is too limited: (2) physical education is being neglected; (3) extra-curricular activities are being neglected; (4) individual help and conferences are being neglected; (5) written work to be properly corrected by the teacher and returned to the pupil has to be limited to a minimum in all classes.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation to the School Committee, Superintendent, and Citizens of Machias for the cooperation and encouragement which I have received in my work this year.

REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools:

Our work in the grades is progressing steadily, as it has during the last two years, with the idea of eventually bringing the Machias Schools up to a working basis, musically, with schools in the towns that have been supplied with music instruction for many years. We all realize that a child in the seventh or eighth grade, for example, with only two years

of instruction in music, cannot be expected to compete with one who has been receiving musical training for a period of seven or eight school years. However, thru concentrated, earnest work, great gains may be made each year toward that desired goal of equality with other schools, the aim and desire of all music supervisors.

At the Primary School, in addition to the regular work of rote singing, rhythm drill, folk dancing, singing games, and the introduction of syllable work, three Rhythm Bands have been organized this year. A Toy Band outfit of twenty-five pieces has been purchased, and in addition to the excellent drill in rhythm which the children are receiving from the use of it, there remains the infinite greater value of the interest awakened in ensemble playing and the hope that thru the pleasure derived from using toy instruments, there may arise later the desire to take up the study of real orchestra and band instruments. There will be at least three opportunities to hear these bands publicly this year-first, at a Primary School entertainment to be given during the last week of the Winter term; again, at a P. T. A. meeting in April; and finally, at our annual music exhibition in May.

It is at the Rawson School, in grades four, five and six, that we strive to make our greatest gains in musical sight reading, ear training and the fundamental drills necessary to a working knowledge of music, for all teachers realize that it is at this period of a child's life, between the ages of eight and eleven years, that he is most adaptable to drill work and some phases of music, like the multiplication tables of arithmetic, must receive a large amount of concentrated memory work. At this school we are fortunate, as we are at the Hemingway, in having a Victrola, and folk dancing is continued. During the Spring term, music appreciation work, with the aid of the Victrola, will be started, to be continued into the higher grades. The children from this school, under the direction of their teachers, Miss Smith and Miss Coffin, furnished a Lincoln and Washington program for the Par-

ent-Teacher Association on February 12th and used a number of their songs and choruses.

In the seventh and eighth grades, in the High School building, in addition to our regular work of sight reading, drills, etc. continued from the lower grades, we have, this year, on Friday mornings, received the radio instruction given by Walter Damrosch in his orchestral broadcasts for school children. The pupils have kept notebooks containing the selections played, with notes concerning each, and have listened to and learned to recognize all the instruments used in Symphony orchestras. Under the supervision of their room teacher, Miss McDonald, the eighth grade pupils prepared picture charts of these instruments and presented one to each of the other school rooms. Thru the kindness of the Parent-Teacher Association, the piano on the first floor of the High School building has been repaired for the use of these two grades, and chorus and Junior Glee club instruction will be the principal work taken up during the Spring term, resulting, we expect, in the production of an operetta.

Our High School Music is embodied in our orchestra and Glee Club work. The Orchestra, this year, is made up of eighteen players and I am exceedingly pleased with the work which they have done. Their faithfulness in attending rehearsals and the efforts which they have put forth have been most gratifying. They furnished music two nights for the Senior Play given in the Colonial theatre, for the annual P. T. A. Washington's Birthday entertainment, and for all school functions, such as prize speaking contests, etc., that have required the services of an orchestra.

The Glee Club has fifty members. They furnished the entertainment for the January P. T. A. meeting, and will present their annual concert in May. This winter, two male quartets have been formed, and one of them contributed to the Washington's Birthday entertainment just mentioned. A three part chorus for girls is now being organized from Glee Club members; so, this year more individual attention can be given the members of the organization.

As a whole, the music work is progressing most satisfactorily to me, as a supervisor. The cooperation of all the teachers in carrying out our lesson plans is exceedingly fine and is being greatly appreciated by me. Were it not for their patient drill work, week by week, our pupils could not have gained a standard in their music work as high as they already have.

WARRANT FOR TOWN MEETING

STATE OF MAINE

To GROVER K. COFFIN, one of the Constables of the Town of Machias:

IN THE NAME OF THE STATE OF MAINE, you are hereby required to warn and notify such of the inhabitants of said Town of Machias as are qualified to vote in town affairs, to assemble at COLONIAL THEATRE in said Machias, on Monday the twenty third instant, at nine o'clock and thirty minutes in the forenoon, to act on the following named articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose a Town Clerk, Selectmen, Assessors, Overseers of the Poor, Town Treasurer, Auditor, Member of the Superintending School Committee for the term of three years, one Fire Commissioner for the term of three years, Collector of Taxes, Road Commissioner, and all other town officers required by laws of the State of Maine.

Article 3. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary or deemed expedient for the support of the Schools, Poor, Fire Department, Water Service, Street Lighting, School Books, Apparatus, Appliances, Repairs of Town Buildings and all other legal purposes and town charges for the ensuing year.

Aritcle 4. To see whether the town will vote "YES" or "NO" on the question of raising and appropriating money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19 of Chapter 25 of the Revised Statutes.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, and if so, how much, for the improvements of the section of State Aid Road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commissioner, in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of Ways, Highways, and Bridges: the amount not to exceed the maximum

which the town is allowed to raise under the provision of Section 18 Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes and of acts additional thereto.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, and what sum, for the maintenance of State Aid Highways during the ensuing year, within the limits of the town.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of not less than One hundred and thirty dollars for the maintenance of the improved section of Third Class roads to be used in connection with the third class road appropriation made by the State for the improvement of third class roads.

Article 8. To see if the town will instruct the Selectmen to appoint a Road Commissioner for the ensuing year.

Article 9. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money, and if so how much, for support of a free reading room, or Public Library.

Article 10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of One hundred dollars for observance of next Memorial Day.

Article 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money, and if so how much, to pay this year's interest on the town debt.

Article 12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money, and if so how much, to be applied toward payment of the principal of town debt.

Article 13. to see if the town will vote to borrow not exceeding Eight thousand dollars, upon the faith and credit of the town during the municiple year 1931-1932 in anticipation of, and to be paid from the taxes to be collected on assessment for the municipal year, and if the town votes so to borrow, to authorize and direct the treasurer to execute and deliver the negotiable interest-bearing note or notes of the town for the sum or sums so borrowed.

Article 14. to see if the town will vote to suspend for the ensuing year, the operation of the provisions of the last paragraph of Section 10 of the town by-laws requiring the ringing of the curfew.

Article 15. to see whether the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, and if so how much, toward defraying the expenses of combating Tuberculosis in Washington County, said sum to be expended by the Washington County Anti-Tuberculosis Association.

Article 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine hundred dollars (\$900.00) for the purpose of tarring the following named streets; Main street from the foot of Steel's Hill to Dr. Smith's Corner; Center street from the Post Office Corner to Court street; Free street; Broadway from Dr. Smith's Corner to Court street; and Dublin street from Main street to the foot of Old Maid's Hill.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to accept the road Signs erected by the State Highway Department.
