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
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

The University of Maine is the state's center of learning, discovery, and service to the public. As the flagship university of the University of Maine System and the state's land grant and sea grant institution, the University of Maine has the unique responsibility for providing high-quality undergraduate and graduate education programs, public service, and basic and applied research.

Located in Orono, within close proximity to the ocean, lakes, and mountains, the University of Maine offers an inspiring learning environment. There is plenty of open space on its 1,200 acres, where students are offered the diversity and the challenge of a large university in an invigorating atmosphere of a small college. The campus is located 10 miles north of Bangor, Maine's third largest city.

The University's undergraduate and graduate educational offerings are built upon a liberal arts and sciences foundation complemented by profession-oriented education in a wide range of disciplines, many of which are found nowhere else in the state. Because of their responsibility to teach, conduct research, and serve the public, faculty members are able to incorporate the new knowledge they uncover with classroom activities, often giving students hands-on experience in the research process.

The University offers its students, faculty, and staff, as well as the people of the community and the state, an outstanding athletic tradition. Several Black Bear teams have excelled to regional and national prominence, including the Black Bear ice hockey team, the 1993 NCAA Division I national champions. UMaine's 19 Division I sports entertain more than 100 intercollegiate events on campus each year attracting 200,000 spectators.

Included on UMaine's athletic staff is an academic coordinator responsible for closely monitoring the progress of each of the 600 varsity student-athletes. Coaches also monitor and advise their student-athletes, frequently holding meetings specifically to discuss academic situations. Study halls and special tutorial sessions are scheduled daily as a way to enhance the learning process. This support and close scrutiny has been a significant reason the overall grade point average of student-athletes has been higher than that of the general student body. The primary goal of the University and the athletic department is to see each individual reach his or her academic potential.



DR. PETER HOFF President r. Peter S. Hoff became president of the University of Maine (UMaine) on

August 1, 1997, following his appointment by the University of Maine System Board of Trustees upon the recommendation of System Chancellor Terrence J. MacTaggart.

During his first year in office, President Hoff focused on several major issues facing the university and the people of Maine.

Around the state, in visits to schools, service organizations, and businesses, President Hoff has talked about the University's role in improving Maine's quality of life and the state's economy. He has also spoken of the University's role in helping Maine's young people find educational and economic opportunities in Maine, and promoting high aspirations among those younger citizens. His first year as President was recognized by many for its action and leadership.

One of President Hoff's most ambitious undertakings was the development of a University action plan called BearWorks. That 80-item document, recently modified, provides a list of priorities, goals and objectives designed to enable the University of Maine to fulfill its mission and potential as the flagship of the state university system. The plan calls for UMaine to achieve the following fundamental goals:


• a land-grant University with a Maine focus and a human scale

- a strong and dynamic University
- a collegial community of learners, and
- Maine's college of choice.

During President Hoff's brief tenure, firstyear student enrollment has risen and, recognizing the University's importance and value to Maine, state appropriations for research and development at UMaine have increased.

President Hoff says he is a strong believer in the special role the University of Maine plays in the lives of Maine people.

"As the state's flagship university and its land-grant and sea-grant institution, the



As UMaine's athletic director, Tyler is responsible for programs and facilities involving 19 intercollegiate athletic teams, as well as intramural and recreational programs involving approximately 6,500 students, employees, and members of the community. She oversees a \$7.8 million budget, much of which is generated through ticket and merchandise sales, private donations, and fees.

Tyler earned a Ph.D. in Physical Education, Sports Psychology from the University of Maryland in 1986. Since 1973 she had been employed by that university, starting as an instructor and coach and progressing through several administrative positions. She holds the distinction of being the only Division I coach to win NCAA national championships in two different sports, lacrosse and field hockey.

She coached lacrosse at Maryland in 1974 and from 1976–90, directing her team to the NCAA title in 1986. She was the national Coach of the Year in 1984 and 1986. University of Maine serves the entire state," he explains. "UMaine is actively working in every county with local businesses, industries, farmers, governments, and citizens to address their most pressing social and economic needs.

"The University is an essential, relevant, and valued resource for the state," President Hoff stresses. "It is a thriving and vital institution with major responsibilities and public expectations."

Prior to his appointment as UMaine's president, Hoff served as Senior Advisor to the Chancellor of The California State University. He joined the California system in 1993 as Senior Vice Chancellor, Academic Affairs, a position he held until 1996. President Hoff also served as Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University System of Georgia (1990–1993) and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at Indiana University Southeast (1987–1990).

He received a B.A. degree in 1966, from the University of Wisconsin in Madison. He began his career teaching English in 1970 at the University of Wisconsin System after completing his M.A. and his Ph.D. in English and Humanities at Stanford University in 1968 and 1970, respectively.

Hoff, his wife Dianne, and 15-year-old son Jay reside in the President's House, a stately Victorian home located on campus.

She served as head field hockey coach at Maryland from 1974–87, leading the Terrapins to the NCAA title in her final season.

From 1987–89 she served as an assistant athletic director before being elevated to associate athletic director in 1989. She held that title until 1991 when she was named the senior associate athletic director and senior woman administrator.

Tyler also served as the acting athletic director at Maryland from July-October, 1990.

In 1995, Tyler became the second woman ever elected to the University of Maryland Hall of Fame. She has served on numerous national committees and currently is a member of the NCAA Women's Basketball committee.

Tyler received her B.S. in Physical Education from Northeastern University in 1969. She earned her M.S. in Physical Education, Sports Psychology from The Pennsylvania State University in 1972.

Tyler and her husband, Dennis Casey, have two children — Andrew, 6, and Alexis, 5. They live in Glenburn.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT PROGRAMS

The University of Maine is committed to offering a comprehensive academic support program for student-athletes. The University of Maine Academic Support Program for Student Athletes has expanded its services to include a variety of progressive and pro-active support programs to assist the student-athlete in developing academically and personally.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

All student athletes will receive academic support which will begin before they arrive on campus. Beginning after the signing of the letter of intent, student-athletes will be given information regarding admission and registration procedures.

Orientation. Once on campus, the first-year student-athlete will be provided an orientation program which will provide information regarding athletics and eligibility issues, in addition to resources available on campus. This orientation will draw together many campus constituencies and will provide the first-year student-athletes with the opportunity to discover all that the University of Maine has to offer—both academically and culturally.

Academic Monitoring. Throughout their college career, student-athletes will be monitored by the academic counseling staff to ensure academic progress toward their degree program. In order to enhance knowledge of the academic progress of studentathletes during the semester, grade reports will be sent to faculty twice per semester. In addition, the student-athletes will receive information frequently regarding the requirements of their degree program as well as the academic requirements of the NCAA.

Academic Mentoring. In some cases it is necessary to provide additional support to student-athletes. When this is deemed necessary, academic mentors are made available to student-athletes. These mentors will provide time management and study skill instructions as well as tutorial assistance when necessary. Tutorial Program. All students at the University of Maine have access to tutors free of charge for 100 and 200 level courses through the Onward program. Tutorial support will also be provided on a limited basis to student-athletes through the Academic Support Programs. Current tutorial offerings include: Biology, Anatomy and Physiology, Math, English, and Accounting.

Computer Facilities. In addition to the computer facilities available to all University of Maine students, the Sam Sezak Academic Lounge houses a computer facility for the exclusive use of student-athletes. This facility is open at accommodating hours to fill the needs of student-athletes' hectic schedules.

LIFE SKILLS

Student-athletes are offered a wide variety of Life Skills programs throughout their college careers.

Life Skills Seminars. This program involves many different campus organizations and services. In order to tailor this service to the needs of the individual student-athletes, a menu of programs is offered to studentathletes at the beginning of the fall semester. Each team and coaching staff is given the opportunity to select a number of Life Skills workshops which are of particular interest to them. Examples include: career development, drug education, study skills, nutrition, multicultural education, or NCAA updates. Multicultural Programs. The University of Maine and its Athletic Department have a commitment to supporting diversity within the campus community. A liaison relationship involving full-time staff members has developed between the Office of Multicultural Affairs and the Department of Athletics to promote an appreciation of diversity and to serve the student-athletes of different cultures.

Student-Athlete Advisory Board. The board is comprised of members of all intercollegiate sports teams at UMaine. The board meets with the Athletic Director and other pertinent athletic and academic administrators regularly to discuss issues of relevance to the student-athlete population, and to lobby for changes which the student-athletes feel are necessary to promote their growth as athletes and members of the community.

Outreach. One activity in which the Student-Athlete Advisory Board is involved is community outreach. Opportunities exist through the Community Outreach Program for student-athletes to get valuable public speaking experience while they give back to the community. Student-athletes speak at numerous schools and community group meetings throughout the year.

Scholar-Athlete Recognition. In addition to providing academic support to the student-athletes at UMaine, the staffalso recognizes their academic accomplishments. Each spring a recognition reception and ceremony is held at which those athletes who have earned a 3.0 minimum grade point average are acknowledged and presented with medallions. Because the ceremony is held during halftime of a basketball game, members of the community are made aware of the academic achievements of the student-athletes at the University of Maine.

PRIDE TRADITION EXCELLENCE

While the UMaine women's basketball program has earned national attention for its success on the court, the Black Bears have also made a name for themselves as one of the top academic teams in the country. In 1997, the Women's Basketball Coaches Association (WBCA) named UMaine to the WBCA Academic Top-25 Honor Roll as the Black Bears recorded the seventh highest grade point average as a team among Division I women's basketball programs in 1996–97. In 1997–98, the Black Bears continued to rank among the leaders as the 13th-best academic women's basketball team in the country.

This achievement builds upon the academic tradition of excellence and success that has characterized the program. This tradition is built on years of hard work and dedication by the talented student-athletes who have been a part of the UMaine women's basketball program.

The women's basketball team has always been one of the highest academic performing teams on the UMaine campus while being one of the most successful athletically as well.

In addition to the WBCA honor, six members of last year's team were named to the AMERICA EAST Academic Honor Roll for earning a grade point average of 3.0 or higher over the academic year. In the spring of 1995 the program was recognized for having the highest GPA of all the women's athletic teams on campus.

Five members of the 1997–98 team (Cindy Blodgett, Sandi Carver, Klara Danes, Kelly Bowman and Amy Vachon) were honored as University of Maine Scholar-Athletes. Those student-athletes earned a 3.0 grade point average or better for both the previous spring and fall semesters and/or maintained a 3.0 accumulative grade point average.

In addition, Cindy Blodgett shared the Dean Smith Award with track athlete Johanna Riley as the University's top female student athlete. She was also named a GTE-CoSIDA Academic All-American.

Turner was first team All-Region while Botett and DeLilli earned second team honors.

Football

• Mickey Fein led the Black Bear aerial attack setting records for touchdown passes (26), and completions (236) while wide receivers Rameek Wright and John Tennett entered the record books for receptions (88) and touchdown catches (8). Derek Carter set the career interception mark with 21 while earning his third All-Conference honor.

Golf

• Coach Ted Woodward's team placed fifth in the AMERICA EAST Championship with Seth Woodcock finishing 13th and Steve Shuman 17th. David DeBree's seventh-place at the Toski Invitational was the team's top individual effort.

Hockey (Men)

• Shawn Walsh's team returned to the HOCKEY EAST Championship for a league record ninth time. Black Bear goalie Alfie Michaud and forward Steve Kariya were HEA All-Tournament choices. Kariya received the Len Ceglarski Sportsmanship Award for a second straight year.

Hockey (Women)

• Coach Rick Filighera lead UMaine to a mark of 12-6-2 in its first year of varsity status. Sophomore Alison Lorenz led the nation in scoring with 38 goals and 22 assists in 20 games to earn ECAC Women's Alliance Player of the Year honors.

Soccer (Men)

• Senior captain Ted Sherry earned second team GTE Academic All-American honors. Ricky Brown, the team's second leading scorer with six goals and two assists was named second team All-AMERICA EAST.


Swimming and Diving


Track and Field

Andrew Oliver earned All-American honors in the javelin at the 1998 NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.







— Joe Ciampi, Head Coach Auburn University Joanne Palombo-McCallie, 32, was named the fourth head coach in the 22-year history of the University of Maine women's basketball program on June 18, 1992. The appointment was an opportunity to return home for the native of Brunswick, Maine and was a chance for the Black Bears to be led by a coach who has achieved the highest levels of performance at every point of her career.


Now in her seventh year at the helm of the program, she has led the Black Bears to four Conference Championships, four regular season titles, and five straight 20-win seasons. She was named the 1995 and 1996 conference Coach of the Year and led the Black Bears to their fourth NCAA Tournament appearance last season with a 21-9 record.

Palombo is accustomed to success. She was the state of Maine's first *Parade Magazine* girl's basketball All-American as a senior at Brunswick High School in 1983. She took her playing talents to Northwestern University where she was a fouryear letter winner for the Wildcats, helping them to the second round of the NCAA Tournament in 1987. As a senior, she was an All-Big Ten Honorable Mention selection and a first-team All-Academic choice. She graduated in 1987 with a bachelor's degree in political science and worked in the sales and marketing division of a major telecommunications company, quickly becoming one of the company's top producers.

After assisting the Northwestern team on a part-time basis while working in the private sector, she moved on to Auburn University where she earned her master's degree in business administration in 1990 and served as an assistant coach for the Lady Tigers from 1988–1992. Auburn played in two national championship games and made an appearance in the Elite Eight during her tenure. The team also posted the longest home winning streak in NCAA history, winning 69 games. As the team's primary recruiter, Palombo signed the fourth-ranked recruiting class in 1990–91 and the 16th-ranked recruiting class in 1991–92.

Palombo came to Maine prepared to use her experience and knowledge to continue and build on the achievements that have been a part of her life.

In her first season as a head coach, Palombo overcame the loss of four seniors, the challenge of a new coaching staff and a difficult schedule, to lead UMaine to its fourth straight North Atlantic Conference title game.

• Was the assistant coach at Auburn University from 1988 to 1992, helping to guide the Lady Tigers to two NCAA Final Four appearances

In 1994, UMaine won 14 of its last 16 games to finish 20-7 overall. The 12-game improvement of the team's 1992–93, 9-20 mark was the fourthbest turn around in the nation. A smothering defense which ranked second in the nation in points allowed (54.7 ppg) and sixth in field goal percentage defense (.361) helped lead the Black Bears.

In August of 1995, Palombo coached a U.S. college all-star team that traveled to Belgium to play against Europe's all-stars in the People-to-People tournament. Her squad, which included two members of her Black Bear team (Stephanie Guidi and Sandi Carver), recorded a 4-3 mark.

In 1996, she led the team on a 19-game winning streak, the longest in school history, in addition to a defense that ranked third nationally in field goal percentage defense (35.4) and eighth in scoring margin (16.8).

Under her guidance, the 1997 squad won 18 of its final 20 games and was second in the nation in field goal percentage (49.5), eighth in scoring margin (18.6), eighth in field goal percentage defense (35.6) and 12th in scoring offense (80.5).

Palombo recorded her 100th career coaching victory in 1997 with a 99-57 victory over Towson State in the AMERICA EAST tournament quarterfinals. During the 1997–98 season, she became the winningest coach in the history of UMaine women's basketball and her career record now stands at 123-55.

In that season, the Black Bears once again broke the 20-win mark, posting a 21-9 record. Maine was ranked 24th in scoring offense (77.9), ninth in field goal percentage (48.2) and 16th in free throw percentage (74.0).



Palombo was named the 1995 and 1996 North Atlantic Conference Coach of the Year.

As a part of her role as head coach, Palombo has worked diligently in several areas surrounding the sport. She has sought to increase the visibility of not only her own program but women's athletics in general. Attendance for home basketball games soared to an average 4,846, a school and conference record in 1997–98. UMaine ranked as high as 10th in the nation last season, and second in New England in average attendance.

Additionally, Palombo has played an integral role in putting together a fundraising event for the UMaine women's basketball program and women's athletics. She secured two high-profile advocates of women's athletics, Dr. Donna Lopiano and Sheryl Swoopes, to be the featured speakers for "Realizing the Dream; Celebrating Women in Athletics." Palombo is also a member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association as well as having served as a YES (Youth Education in Sports) clinician. She is currently a member of the Kodak All-American Selection Committee and the USA Today's Top 25 Poll Committee. Palombo also serves on a variety of state of Maine committees which include: Board of Directors for the Shaw House, Governor's Council for Physical Fitness, and honorary member for Take Our Daughters to Work Day.

Another role which is important to Palombo is being a mother. She and husband Dr. John McCallie are the proud parents of four-year-old Madeline.

Kim Lazor Assistant Coach Benner, 27, enters his sixth year as an assistant Coach on the University of Maine staff.

The 1995-96 season was his first as a full-time coach after spending two seasons as a restrictedearnings coach prior to 1995. He has previously coached recreational league basketball in Wiscasset, Maine.

In August of 1998, he served as one of the coaches of a U.S. all-star team which travelled to France. The team included current UMaine players Amy Vachon and Kristen McCormick.

Benner has also assisted with various forms of game management for the men's and women's teams at Lyndon State College in Vermont, a school he attended before coming to UMaine as an undergraduate. He graduated from UMaine in December of 1992 with a bachelor's degree in psychology and is currently nearing completion of his master's in education.

At Wiscasset High School, he was a three-sport athlete, competing in soccer, basketball, and baseball. As a senior he captained both the basketball and baseball teams.

Benner coordinates recruiting, scheduling, and Black Bear Basketball summer camps, while assisting with scouting of opponents, game preparation and film exchange.

L azor enters her third season as a member of the Black Bear coaching staff. Lazor, a 27 year old native of Warren, Ohio, is a 1994 graduate of Penn State University in State College, Pa., where she earned a bachelor's degree in communications.

As a member of the Penn State nationally-ranked women's basketball team, Lazor played an integral part in the Lady Lion's ascent to the top of the Atlantic 10 and Big 10 conference standings and the team's season-long streak in the top two positions in the national polls. In 1990, she was named an Atlantic 10 Conference Player of Influence, despite suffering a dislocated knee in her first collegiate home game and in 1993 was honored with the PSU Adversity Award for continuing her career after four knee surgeries. She came to UMaine after spending two years at Bucknell University in Lewisburg, Pa. where she was responsible for coaching post players. She helped lead Bucknell to its first-ever Patriot League regular season title while tving a school record 18 wins in 1996.

Prior to Bucknell, she was an assistant coach of the girls' varsity and junior varsity teams at State College Area High School.

Lazor's responsibilities for the Black Bears are the coaching and recruitment of post players, scouting opponents, planning team travel and marketing-promotions, fundraising and summer camps. Benner resides in Bangor with his wife Christine.

1998-99 SEASON OUTLOOK

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: 88-89, 89-90, 90-91, 93-94, 94-95, 95-96, 96-97

The 1998–99 version of the University I of Maine women's basketball team will be both similar and different from those teams that have represented UMaine so well in the past. Like any team that loses three of its top four scorers from the year before, the Black Bears will face the challenge of replacing much of last year's offensive power. Unlike most teams in that predicament, the Black Bears return several experienced players and a number of talented weapons who, because of injury or lack of court time, have not showcased their complete game yet. Those players are poised to use their abilities and experience to continue UMaine's tradition of success in AMERICA EAST and on a national level.

The Black Bears will depend heavily on a pair of juniors to set them on the path to a fifth straight NCAA Tournament. Jamie Cassidy and Amy Vachon are the only two starters to return from last year's team. Cassidy, a 6-4 center from Methuen, Mass. led the team in rebounding with 7.9 rebounds per game and was second in scoring to All-American Cindy Blodgett, averaging 17.6 points. Those statistics placed her among the top players in the league in those categories. She was the AMERICA EAST Rookie of the Year as a freshman and earned a spot on the 1997–98 All-Conference team.

The backcourt will once again be in the capable hands of Vachon. The leadership and court sense of this 5-9 point guard from Augusta, Maine was a key factor in last year's success. She led the conference with 6.5 assists per game and broke the UMaine and AMERICA EAST records for assists in a season with 194. Using her ability to drive as well as her accuracy from long range, she contributed 6.5 points per game.

Kristen McCormick will likely be a key source of fire power in the backcourt. The 5-10 junior from Medford, Mass. started 10 games last season and averaged 5.6 ppg. She was one of Maine's three-point threats, hitting a team-high .379 (22/54) from behind the arc. One of the biggest assets Maine could have is a healthy Katie Clark. The 6-0 junior from Bangor, Maine missed most of her first two seasons because of injury. She was limited to 11 games last season before a foot injury and subsequent surgery forced her out for the remainder of the season. Kelly Bowman is also a player who has been hampered by injuries. She redshirted as a sophomore because of a knee injury and sat out the first 12 games last season with a stress fracture. The 5-11 native of Newport, Maine is a savvy and tenacious defender and should see more action this season.

Sophomores Kizzy Lopez and Chantal Macream are also candidates for increased playing time. Lopez, a 5-10 guard from Hemmingford, Quebec, played in 26 games and has a very effective, aggressive style. Macream will look to expand her role on the team. The 5-6 guard from Pierrefords, Quebec saw limited action in 17 games and has leadership qualities and a strong defensive game.

In the front court, Andrea Clark is a leading candidate for a starting position. One of the team's two seniors, Clark played in all 30 games and started three. The 6-3 native of Starks, Maine is one of the strongest players on the team and gives the Black Bears a considerable presence in the paint on both offense and defense. With one year of American basketball behind her, sophomore Martina Tinklova will likely be a force for the Black Bears in 1998–99. The 6-4 native of the Czech Republic played in 29 games in her rookie season, missing one due to injury. She averaged 3.1 ppg and made some of the year's most dynamic plays.

Five newcomers will also join the mix and each could play a big part in the future successes of the Black Bears. Guards Ellen Geraghty (Winsted, Conn.), Lacey Stone (Whitefish Bay, Wisc.) and Tracy Guerrette (St. Agatha, Maine) should be strong additions to the backcourt while Eva Moldre (Estonia) and Andrea Pardilla (Old Town, Maine) will strengthen the UMaine inside game.


The Black Bears will start the season in the southern part of the state, taking on Northeastern in the Dead River Company Shootout on November 20 in Portland, Maine.

They will open at Alfond Arena on November 27 against St. Bonaventure in the Dead River Company Classic. UMaine will also host UNC-Charlotte and the University of Mississippi in the four-team tournament which will culminate on November 28. UMaine hits the road for a December 2 match up with the University of Massachusetts before heading to Chicago to take part in the Northwestern Roger L. White Invitational on December 4 and 5. The trip to Northwestern will be a homecoming of sorts for Head Coach Joanne Palombo-McCallie, who played for the Wildcats. UMaine will take on Western Kentucky, a team the Black Bears defeated at home last season, in the opening game and then await the result of the Northwestern and Ohio University game.

A home game with Rhode Island is the final game before a break for exams and the holidays. On December 28 and 29, UMaine will be in New Orleans for a game with Middle Tennessee State in the Tulane Doubletree Tournament.

The AMERICA EAST season then gets into full swing with 17 straight conference games. UMaine will host Boston University on January 5 and end the regular season on February 25 at home against Hartford.

The AMERICA EAST Tournament will take place at the University of Vermont on March 3–6 as the Black Bears try to win their fifth straight conference tournament title and the automatic NCAA bid that accompanies the championship.

1997-98 SEASON REVIEW

CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: 88-89, 89-90, 90-91, 93-94, 94-95, 95-96, 96-97

The Black Bears encountered some new challenges in the 1997–98 season but the end results were the same. The season saw UMaine defeat a nationally ranked opponent, win more than 20 games for the 12th time in program history, lose the regular season conference title for the first time in four years, win the program's sixth conference tournament championship and advance to the fourth consecutive NCAA Tournament. The Black Bears were ranked 14th in the nation in attendance, attracting an average of 4,846 to their home games.

Individual honors were plentiful. Cindy Blodgett won the AMERICA EAST Tournament Most Outstanding Player and became the first player in conference history to be named to the All-Conference first team four times. She was named a third team All-American and became the fourth woman to score more than 3,000 points in NCAA history. She was also named a GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-American and was awarded the UMaine Dean Smith Award as the top female Student-Athlete. Her name appears in the UMaine record book 20 times.

Amy Vachon etched her name into the record book with 194 assists, a new single season record at UMaine and in AMERICA EAST. She needs just 171 assists to break Blodgett's record for assists in a career (487).

Jamie Cassidy also flourished last season. She was named to the All-Conference team and averaged 22.3 points per game and 8.7 rebounds per game against ranked opponents.

UMaine started the season with a win over AMERICA EAST rival Northeastern in front of a crowd of 6,517 in the Dead River Company Shootout at the Portland Civic Center.

The Black Bears opened at Alfond Arena in the Dead River Company Classic on November 28 and 29. In the first round, UMaine defeated James Madison 85-62. In the finals of the tournament, 23rd ranked Wisconsin pulled out a 97-80 win over UMaine. Blodgett and Cassidy were both named to the All-Tournament team and Blodgett set a new record for points scored in the tournament with 55.

The game against UMass on December 4 saw another record fall. Blodgett scored 19 points in the first seven minutes of the game to break Rachel Bouchard's UMaine and conference record for points scored in a career. When the record was set, the score of the game was 27-5 and UMaine went on to a 82-68 victory.

UMaine travelled to Vermont for an early season battle with the Catamounts. UMaine took a 12point lead into halftime, but the Catamounts came back in the second half. Vermont pulled to within four with less than a minute to go, but Blodgett hit four free throws in the final 26 seconds to give UMaine a 86-78 win.

Before UMaine took a break for exams and the holiday, the Black Bears scored an easy 91-55 win over Rhode Island. They returned to the court in the University of Miami Holiday Tournament. The Black Bears beat East Carolina 92-70 in the opening round then faced Miami in the finals.

UMaine overcame an early deficit with a 16-3 run and led 41-35 at the half. In the second half, Miami gained the lead back, but just a few points separated the teams for most of the second half. In the final five minutes, Miami pulled away for a 91-78 win. Cassidy and Blodgett were named to the All-Tournament team.

UMaine returned home to start the heart of the conference season. An 80-58 win over Boston University came at a price as Blodgett went down with an injury. The Black Bears responded with wins over Towson (72-52), Delaware (78-66), Hartford (63-57) and New Hampshire (75-61) during her absence.

Blodgett returned for the Drexel game in Philadelphia but UMaine dropped its first conference

game of the season, 69-64. The Black Bears rebounded two days later with a 72-42 win over Hofstra, holding the Flying Dutchwomen to just 18 points in the second half.

UMaine then lost two straight conference games for the first time since the 1992-93 season as New Hampshire won 75-65 and Vermont won 73-68.

The Black Bears responded with two strong outings, an 84-58 win over Towson and a 98-73 win over Delaware. BU defeated UMaine 94-77 on February 12 and the Black Bears beat Northeastern 70-56 two days later.

In the final non-conference game of the year, UMaine faced nationally ranked UConn at the Hartford Civic Center. The Black Bears led or were tied with the Huskies for most of the first half before a Nykesha Sales flurry gave UConn a 13 point halftime lead. UConn went on to a 98-70 lead despite Cassidy's game-high 24 points.

Back in conference play, UMaine took an 86-66 decision from Drexel and beat Hofstra 91-83. The Black Bears finished the regular season on the road and lost to Hartford 74-67.

UMaine hosted the first ever one-site conference tournament and was seeded second behind Vermont. The Black Bears dispatched with Drexel 84-59 in the first round and battled Northeastern to a 77-70 win. In the final against Vermont, neither team led by more than five points as the lead changed 20 times. UMaine went up by three with 1:36 remaining in the game but Vermont answered with two straight baskets to take a one point lead. Cassidy scored a layup with six seconds left to give UMaine an 81-80 lead. The Black Bears stopped Vermont's final attempt and won the AMERICA EAST Tournament for the fourth straight year.

UMaine travelled to North Carolina for a match up with North Carolina State in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. NC State, an eventual Final Four team, took an early lead and went on to an 89-64 win.







Now in its 11th year of championship competition, AMERICA EAST continues its rise toward national prominence with a reputation as one of the most competitive and comprehensive conferences in the nation.

Over the last decade, AMERICA EAST teams have established a record of unparalleled success, enabling the conference to earn automaticqualifier status in six NCAA Championships: Baseball, Men's Basketball, Women's Basketball, Field Hockey, Women's Soccer and Women's Volleyball.

In addition, AMERICA EAST is on the verge of receiving automatic qualifier status in softball, men's tennis, women's tennis and men's soccer. Only a handful of the nation's Division I conferences provides as much access for its champions into NCAA postseason play.

This on-field success has come without sacrificing the academic integrity of the 10 member institutions: Boston University, University of Delaware, Drexel University, University of Hartford, Hofstra University, University of Maine, University of New Hampshire, Northeastern University, Towson University, and University of Vermont.

"The conference has made significant strides toward national prominence in all sports," says Chris Monasch, Commissioner of AMERICA EAST. "The potential for continued development is considerable due to the academic and athletic quality of the 10 member institutions. AMERICA EAST is poised to attain an even greater presence in the near future."

Again last season, AMERICA EAST continued its ascent into the national picture in several sports.

Men's basketball saw its championship played before a packed house and national audience on ESPN, as Delaware earned the conference's automatic berth to the NCAA Tournament.

AMERICA EAST also earned the national spotlight in women's basketball as the conference rated No. 13 of 30 Division I conferences according to the NCAA's Rating Percentage Index (RPI). With a high level of play, it should come as no surprise AMERICA EAST continued to be ranked in the top 10 nationally in attendance, as evidenced by the 13,624 fans who passed through the turnstiles at Maine's Alfond Arena during the AMERICA EAST Championship.

AMERICA EAST career scoring leader Cindy Blodgett, who twice led the nation in scoring during her four years at Maine, has taken her talent to the next level as the sixth overall pick (by the Cleveland Rockers) in the 1998 WNBA Draft.

The fall of 1997 was another banner season for AMERICA EAST as the Hartford women's soccer team advanced to the NCAA second round. Northeastern was one of only six automatic qualifiers to the NCAA Field Hockey Championship after winning the AMERICA EAST title.

Boston University's men's soccer team advanced to the NCAA Championship, continuing AMERICA EAST's streak of placing at least one team in the NCAA Championship since the league began competition in that sport in 1988.

Hofstra advanced to the NCAA Championship by virtue of its AMERICA EAST title in volleyball.

The spring proved to be one of the most successful in recent history as Delaware's baseball team received a No. 3 seed in the NCAA Baseball Championship, the highest AMERICA EAST seed since Maine's third seed in 1991.

The Blue Hens' Kevin Mench, the first sophomore to win AMERICA EAST Player of the Year honors, became the first sophomore to earn Collegiate Baseball Magazine's National Player of the Year. Mench led the nation in both batting and home runs.

Northeastern's Carlos Pena became the first of six AMERICA EAST players selected in the 1998 Major League Baseball Draft, when he was chosen with the 10th overall pick in the first round by the Texas Rangers.

With that talent, AMERICA EAST baseball was ranked ninth nationally in the most recent RPI as the top-rated conference in the East.

Hofstra ranked near the top 25 in the nation en route to its AMERICA EAST softball title.

In addition to the team-sport success, Boston University's Karl Rasmussen, the first four-time cross-country champion in AMERICA EAST history, was named All-American after finishing fifth in the 10,000-meters at the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

In keeping the proper balance between academics and athletics, AMERICA EAST continued to award the Academic Cup, honoring the institution whose student-athletes compile the highest composite team grade-point average of the 10 member institutions over the course of the academic year. In addition, more than 1,300 student-athletes with grade-point averages of 3.0 or higher during their playing season were named to the Academic Honor Roll.

Several AMERICA EAST student-athletes were also recognized both regionally and nationally as GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-Americans.

To see just how far AMERICA EAST has come, consider the following. The league was established in 1979 as the ECAC North. The conference at that time consisted of 10 institutions and sponsored league competition only in men's basketball, with the champion having an automatic bid to the NCAA Division I Championship.

Men's basketball remained the lone league sport until the 1987-88 academic year. At that time, the Board of Directors made a new commitment to the Conference, establishing a conference office, hiring a full-time commissioner, and embarking on a building program which, within a few short years, sponsored championship competition in 21 different sports for men and women.

Stuart P. Haskell, Jr. was employed as the conference's first commissioner in 1987, and served in that capacity until his retirement in July, 1997. During his tenure, AMERICA EAST expanded to conduct men's championships in baseball, basketball, cross country, golf, indoor track, lacrosse, outdoor track, soccer, swimming and tennis.

The conference's Board of Directors voted to include women's athletics in the conference at the beginning of the 1988-89 academic year. These sports — basketball, cross country, field hockey, indoor track, lacrosse, outdoor track, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball — have thrived under AMERICA EAST leadership. The conference is proud to provide a postseason championship in every leaguesponsored women's sport.

In addition to supporting and recognizing success on the playing field, AMERICA EAST also sponsors one of the most expansive programs in the country citing academic successes among its student-athletes. Among the conference awards is the Academic Cup, honoring the institution whose student-athletes compile the highest composite team grade-point average of the 10 member-institutions over the course of the academic year. All varsity team members who earn Dean's List honors or a grade-point average of 3.0 or higher during their playing season receive AMERICA EAST recognition and awards. The conference annually determines the top Scholar-Athlete in each of its 21 championship sports and from those 21 winners, the top male and female Scholar-Athlete are further honored by the league.

With a recently-expanded staff and resources, and the conference's relocation to downtown Boston, AMERICA EAST is poised to continue its rise with an eye on the 21st century.

AMERICA EAST and ESPN Regional will once again provide a Game of the Week television package for men's and women's basketball. In addition, the conference championship will be televised live on ESPN for the 12th consecutive year.

This venture, and several others, including the advent of the conference website www.americaeast.org — are aimed at servicing the needs and interests of AMERICA EAST fans everywhere.

FACILITIES CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIPS: 88-89, 89-90, 90-91, 93-94, 94-95, 95-96, 96-97

The Harold Alfond Sports Arena, one of the finest all-purpose facilities in the northeast, was completed in February of 1977. Thanks to the generosity of Mr. Harold Alfond, the Arena allows basketball to return to campus in a modern, up-graded facility. The UMaine women played their first game in Alfond on January 30, 1992 when they defeated Boston University, 74-57. The largest women's crowd at the Arena was 5,862 when they faced New Hampshire on February 1, 1998.

Attendance at the University of Maine reached an all-time high last year with 4,846 fans on average at Alfond Arena. UMaine finished 14th in the nation in the national rankings of attendance, and was as high as tenth in the country during the season.

Mr. Alfond, who has contributed over \$6 million dollars to the University since 1968, donated \$2 million dollars for the expansion. Mr. Alfond's gift represented the largest one-time (non-posthumous) cash contribution ever bestowed upon the University at that time. Over 2,000 people, headed by Mr. Alfond, donated funds for the original construction of the complex.

The expansion created 70-foot by 140foot additions to the east and west sides of the Arena allowing for the installation of 1,200 seats. The construction raises the capacity to 5,587 for hockey and 5,712 for basketball. Included in the Arena expansion are additional concession areas and rest rooms, locker rooms, ticket offices, souvenir stands and improved media facilities. A storage area has also been built for the new basketball court to be used in the building.

Aside from being UMaine's home court, the Arena is used by high school and youth hockey leagues, and for concerts and graduation ceremonies.

The complex is a modern facility with virtually no obstructed-view seats in the build-ing and an excellent view of the court.

The following services are offered at Alfond Arena:




The Alfond Sports Arena was the sight of UMaine's big upset victory 75-73 over #10 Alabama during the 1994-95 campaign and another upset in 1998 when the Black Bears defeated 18th ranked Western Kentucky.

Public Telephones: Pay phones are located in the lobby of the arena. **Concession stands:** Located at both the east and west sides of the arena.

Rest Rooms: Located underneath the east and west side bleachers.

First Aid: Medical attendants are present at each game and can be found at the south end of the arena.




Alfond Sports Arena: Home of the Black Bears since 1992.

The Michael B. and Georgia D. Latti Fitness Center.

Completion of the \$1.2 million Memorial Gymnasium Renovation and Addition Project has given the University of Maine some of the finest athletic facilities in the Northeast.

The Michael B. and Georgia D. Latti Fitness Center was dedicated at a ceremony on October 6, 1989. The 6,000-foot facility next to Wallace Pool contains a weight room and training facility which serves an estimated 500 students, faculty and members of the surrounding community each day. Over the last few years, the center has been refurbished and restocked with the latest fitness equipment to make the Latti Fitness Center one of the top athletic facilities in New England.

A modern training facility to service the University community was completed in June of 1990. The new facility is more than double the size of the old facility. The 1,800foot room also features top equipment to serve the 200 recreational and varsity athletes who use the facility each day. The wet area of the room includes a freezer with ice making capabilities and three whirlpools. The facility also houses seven plinths and a taping area for 30 athletes.

The University employs three full-time trainers to assist with athletic coverage. Approximately 15 student-trainers also help in the coverage of practices and home events.

The women's basketball team also received new locker room facilities as part of the expansion project.

The Edith Ness Women's Basketball Suite was made possible by the generous donation of Mrs. Edith Talbot Ness, class of 1932, a loyal fan and dedicated alumna who is devoted to excellence at the University of Maine.

The locker room contains 20 oak boxstyle lockers with upper compartments in which valuables and equipment may be stored. There is also a shower room and bathroom area.

The plush carpeting and attractive architecture make this a premier locker room facility.






PRESS PARKING: A section of VIP parking has been reserved for members of the media. Please contact the UMaine Sports Information Office in advance for passes.
