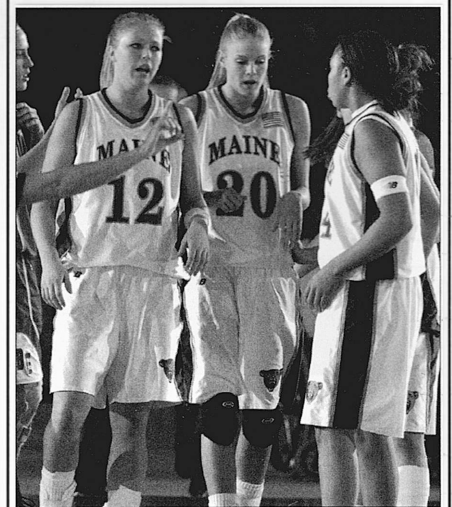

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The University of Maine is the state's center of learning, discovery, and service to the public. As the flagship university of the University of Maine System and the state's land-grant and sea-grant institution, the University of Maine has the unique responsibility for providing high-quality undergraduate and graduate education programs, public service, and basic and applied research.

Located in Orono, within close proximity to the ocean, lakes, and mountains, the University of Maine offers an inspiring learning environment. There is plenty of open space on its 1,200 acres, where students are offered the diversity and the challenge of a large university in an invigorating atmosphere of a small college. The campus is located 10 miles north of Bangor, Maine's third largest city.

The University's undergraduate and graduate educational offerings are built upon a liberal arts and sciences foundation complemented by profession-oriented education in a wide range of disciplines, many of which are found nowhere else in the state. Because of their responsibility to teach, conduct research, and serve the public, faculty members are able to incorporate the new knowledge they uncover with classroom activities, often giving students hands-on experience in the research process.

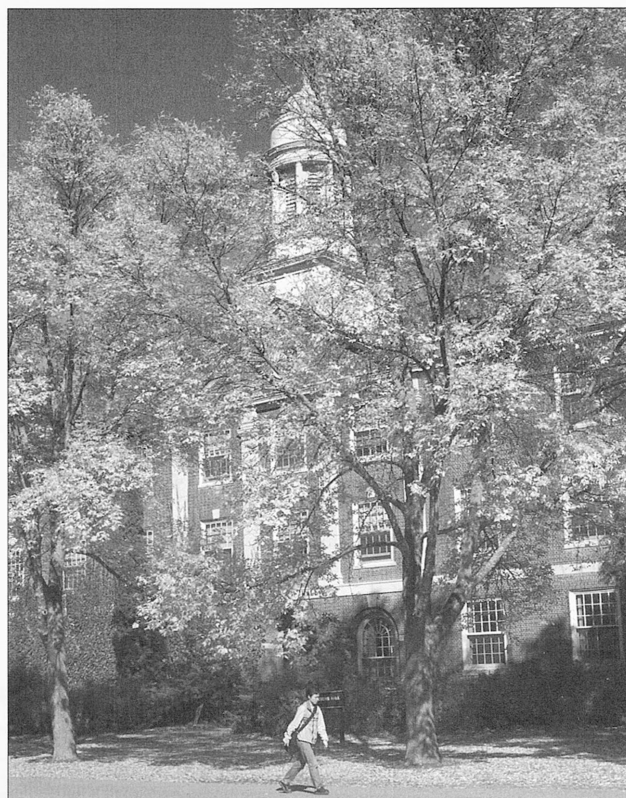
The University offers its students, faculty, and staff, as well as the people of the community and the state, an outstanding athletic tradition. Maine's 19 Division I sports entertain more than 150 intercollegiate events

on campus each year attracting 200,000 spectators.

The University of Maine was established as the Maine College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts under the provisions of the Morrill Act, approved by President Abraham Lincoln in 1862. In 1897, the original name changed to the University of Maine. The institution opened September 21, 1868 with twelve students and two faculty members.

By 1871, curricula had been organized in Agriculture, Civil Engineering, Mechanical Engineering, and electives. From these courses of study there gradually developed the Colleges of Life Sciences and Agriculture (later to include the School of Forest Resources and the School of Human Development), Engineering and Science, and Arts and Sciences. The School of Education was established in 1930 and received college status in 1958. The School of Business Administration was formed in 1958 and was granted college status in 1965. Women have been admitted into all curricula since 1872.

The Maine Agricultural and Forest Experiment Station was founded as a division of the University in 1887. In 1912, the Maine Cooperative Extension, which



offers field educational programs for both adults and youths, was initiated. The first master's degree was conferred in 1881; the first doctor's degree in 1960. Since 1923 there has been a separate graduate school. The Summer Session as a separate entity dates from 1902. A Continuing Education Division offers evening and Saturday courses from the several curricula.

In 1980, the University of Maine was given Sea Grant College status by the Federal Government under provisions of the National Sea Grant College Program Act.

The Maine Facts

- Fall 2005 enrollment totaled approximately 11,400 students, nearly 2,200 of whom are graduate students. The student body includes residents of 47 states and 61 countries. Seventy-seven percent of Maine's students are full-time.
- *The Princeton Review* rates Maine among the top 20 "best bargains" among public colleges and universities in the U.S. Other universities in the same category include the University of California-Berkeley, the University of Texas-Austin and North Carolina State University.
- Maine is one of just 151 institutions (4 percent) nationwide to be classified by the Carnegie Founda-

tion for the Advancement of Teaching as a "Doctoral Research — Extensive" university, the highest classification possible.

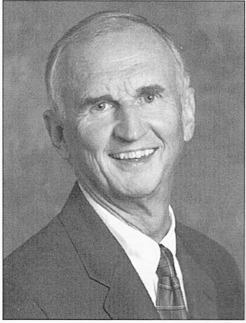
- More of Maine's high school valedictorians and salutatorians enroll at the University of Maine than all other Maine colleges and universities combined.
- Maine is the largest residential college community in Maine. Maine student housing is at capacity, with 3,763 students choosing to live on campus.
- The average SAT score of the 2004 entering class was 1,081, 55 points above the national average, and 75 above the state average.

Dr. Robert Kennedy

PRESIDENT



Robert A. Kennedy, Ph. D., became the president of the University of Maine on April 15, 2005. A plant biochemist with a long and distinguished scholarly career, Kennedy has held

academic leadership positions at some of the nation's most prestigious universities. He has been at Maine since July 2000, serving first as Vice President for Academic Affairs. One year after his arrival, he was promoted to the position of Executive Vice President and Provost.

At Maine, Kennedy has played a central role in developing and executing the university's teaching, research and statewide public outreach missions. He has led the university's well-received strategic planning process, which has helped to

provide direction for four years of growth and advancement in targeted critical areas.

"I am grateful for the opportunity to lead the University of Maine at this exciting time in the university's history," Kennedy says. "As all Black Bear fans know, Maine enjoys national and regional prominence in intercollegiate athletics. In competition and in the classroom, Maine student athletes have enjoyed tremendous success in the past several seasons. I look forward to the continuation of that success this year.

"With its wide-ranging mission of teaching, cutting-edge research and public engagement, the University of Maine is a true statewide resource, which will play a central role in developing and shaping the state's future."

Kennedy began his academic career on the faculty of the University of Iowa, followed by faculty appointments at Washington State University, The Ohio State University, the University of Maryland and Texas A&M University. He served as Associate Dean and Director of the Colleges of Agriculture and Life Sciences and the University of Maryland

Agricultural Experiment Station for one year, before being promoted to the vice presidency for research at that university's Maryland Institute for Agriculture and Natural Resources. Immediately before coming to UMaine, Kennedy served for eight years as Vice President for Research and Associate Provost for Graduate Studies at Texas A&M.

In the late 1980s, Kennedy worked for three years in the Division of Molecular Biosciences and the Division of Cellular Biosciences at the National Science Foundation in Washington, D.C.

A Minnesota native, Kennedy earned his undergraduate degree in plant science for the University of Minnesota in 1968 and a Ph.D. in botany from the University of California, Berkeley in 1974. Kennedy and his wife, Mary, a professor of biochemistry at Maine, have four sons.

Athletic Administration

Blake James

INTERIM ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



Blake James was named Interim Athletic Director by President Robert Kennedy and began his duties on July 23, 2005. He has served the past two years at Maine as the Senior Associate Athletic Director, overseeing marketing, ticketing, retail operations, athletic development along with men's and women's track and field and cross country, men's soccer, men's basketball and baseball.

Prior to coming to Maine, he worked in athletic development at Providence College, where he established the "Friars Forever" campaign and the Friar Athletic Fund. He began his career at the University of Miami where he worked in corporate sales and athletic development with former Maine Athletic Director Patrick Nero. James also worked at the University of Nebraska.

He received a bachelors degree in marketing in 1992 from Minnesota State University – Mankato and earned a masters degree from St. Thomas University (Miami, FL) in 1994. James and his wife, Kelly, reside in Veazie with their daughter, Haley, and son, Ryan.

Terry Kix

SENIOR WOMEN'S ADMINISTRATOR



Terry Kix is entering her third year as Maine's Senior Women's Administrator, overseeing several areas, including summer camps and student-athlete services.

She is also in her 15th year as head coach of the Maine field hockey team. In 2002 and 2003 she led her team to a spot in the America East Championship game, while the team reached the conference tournament each of the last four seasons. She has earned America East Coach of the Year honors three times (1995, 1997, 2002). Overall she has compiled a record of 161-102-5, including 1996 and 1994 ECAC Championships.

A 1985 graduate of the University of Connecticut with a degree in sports marketing, Kix was a celebrated athlete while playing for the Huskies. She was a member of the 1981 National Championship team, and participated in the final four each of her four seasons at UConn. She earned All-America honors during her junior and senior years.

Sports Medicine

College athletics places extreme physical demands on the players. To meet this reality, Maine has a highly respected sports medicine staff to help its student-athletes with any health related situation.

The Maine sports medicine team includes five certified athletic trainers, a team physician, an orthopaedic physician, a wide variety of medical specialists and student-athletic trainers. The Maine team physician, Dr. Craig W. Curtis, holds a doctor's clinic on campus four days per week, and the orthopaedic physician holds clinic once per week. In addition, a physical therapist is in the athletic training room three days per week, and a team podiatrist visits bi-monthly. Other specialists on the Maine athletic health care team include an optometrist, a chiropractor and a dentist.

The staff is headquartered in the Mike Kessock Sports Medicine Center, located in the Memorial Gymnasium, and houses some of the newest technology in the field of sports medicine. This facility, located inside Memorial Gym, serves all injury prevention, treatment and rehabilitation needs of the student-athlete.

The Cutler Student Health Center, located adjacent

to Memorial Gym, also serves as an on-campus resource capable of handling x-rays and laboratory work for student-athletes.

Prevention of injury is a primary focus of the athletic training staff. Black Bear student-athletes are screened for conditions which could predispose them to injury and placed on programs to prevent these injuries.

If an injury does occur, the athlete is placed on a daily injury treatment and rehabilitation program designed to return the athlete to the playing field as quickly and safely as possible. Certified athletic trainers utilize the latest in treatment and rehabilitation

techniques to aggressively return the athlete to competition. All Black Bear student-athletes are supervised by a member of the sports medicine staff from the first day of rehabilitation until total recovery has occurred.

Strength and Conditioning

The Maine strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology, nutrition, and one-on-one attention to each athlete. Maine student-athletes make a year-round commitment to physically preparing to play their sport at the highest level.

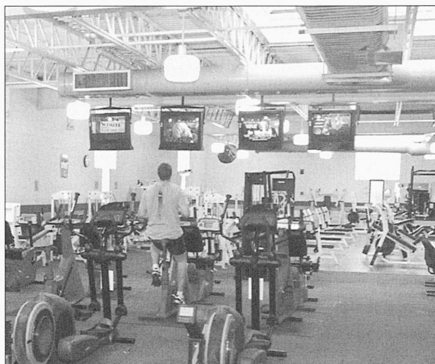
That physical preparation addresses numerous components that are critical to athletic success, including strength, speed, power, agility, flexibility, metabolic conditioning, and motivation. The Maine strength and conditioning staff tailors a strength and conditioning program that matches the student-athlete's individual needs with the sport-specific physical demands.

At the heart of the Maine strength and conditioning

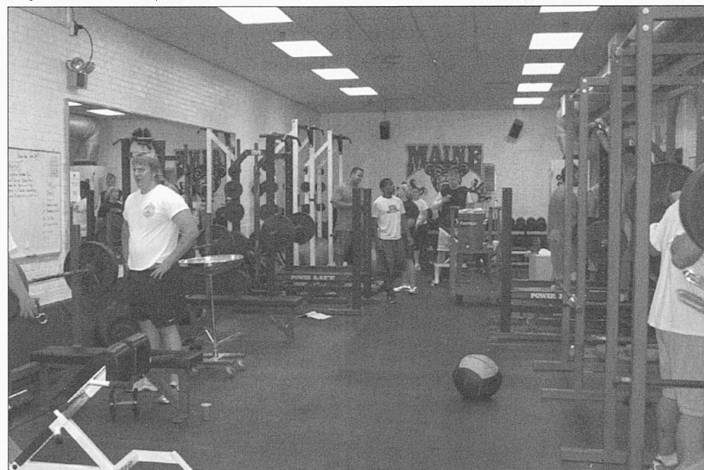
program is the Intercollegiate Athletic Strength Center, located in the Memorial Gymnasium. The physical elements of the Strength Center reflect the strength training and conditioning philosophy. The 1,600-square foot facility contains more than 8,000 pounds of weight, four multi-purpose power racks, four bench press stations, dumbbells ranging from five to 130 pounds, and numerous selectorized machines. A fully equipped plyometric training area is located just off the Strength Center.

In addition to this great facility, the Latti

Fitness Center is also used by the Black Bears. The 5,000-square foot facility, located in Memorial Gym next to Wallace Pool, was first dedicated on October 6, 1989, and has recently been completely renovated. A total of 28 state-of-the-art cardiovascular machines and numerous selectorized machines are available to supplement the conditioning and rehabilitation of Maine student-athletes.

Academic Support

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

The University of Maine is committed to offering a comprehensive academic support program in conjunction with other University of Maine resources which can assist student-athletes in succeeding in their studies. Students must work just as intensely in the classroom as they do on the court, field, or ice in order to excel. Services include a variety of progressive and proactive support programs which can assist the student-athlete in developing academically, professionally and personally throughout their college years.

Once on campus, first year student-athletes participate in orientation programs covering athletics, eligibility, and resources available on campus. These programs draw together many campus elements and provide opportunities to discover all that Maine has to offer both academically and culturally.

Academic Support Counselors provide:

- Discussion of goals and academic plans
- Ongoing academic eligibility, degree progress and NCAA certification
- Consultation for class registration
- First-year orientation programs
- Tutoring services
- Academic progress checks
- Individual meetings
- Monitored study hours

Academic Progress Monitored. The Athletic Academic Counseling staff monitors student-athletes' academic progress throughout their college careers to ensure academic success in their chosen degree programs. To enhance knowledge of progress throughout the semester, academic progress reports are sent to course instructors twice each semester. In addition, student athletes report grades regularly to their assigned counselor and receive information regarding their status in meeting University of Maine and NCAA academic requirements.

Tutoring Services. The Tutor Program provides free tutors for all University of Maine students who

need academic assistance in 100 & 200 level courses. The Tutor Program's role is to help students "learn how-to-learn" course material and how to utilize the resources available on campus. Athletic Tutoring is also available through Academic Support Services as a supplement to class lecture and readings. Peer tutors meet student-athletes once or twice weekly to review course material, answer questions and prepare for upcoming exams.

Services for Students with Disabilities. The University of Maine Disability Support Services facilitates the education of any University of Maine student with diagnosed physical or learning disabilities by providing a point of accommodation and services to enhance success. In collaboration with these services, student-athletes receive additional support from a learning disability specialist on the Academic Support staff. Student-athlete referrals are made on an individualized basis.

Sezak Academic Center. In addition to several computer clusters available to all University of Maine students, student-athletes have exclusive use of computers (IBM and Macintosh) in the Sam and Ethel Sezak Academic Center. Computers in this facility are networked to the Fogler Library, campus intranet, and the Internet. This monitored study center is open at accommodating hours to fill the needs of student-athletes' hectic schedules. Student-athletes take advantage by utilizing the Academic Center for obtaining required study table hours. In addition, ten IBM-compatible laptop computers are available to student-athletes to use when traveling to athletic competitions.

Academic Achievement. In addition to the many conference and national honors, each spring the athletic department honors Maine's Scholar Athletes, those student-athletes earning a 3.0 minimum GPA for the year. In 2005, a total of 171 student-athletes earned this distinction. In addition, 56 first-year students were honored as "Rising Stars" for earning a 3.0 or better in their first semester at Maine. The total of 227 honorees is the largest group in the history of the program, representing over 50% of the students who participate in Intercollegiate Athletics at Maine. In 2004, Maine was awarded the America East Academic Cup, representing the highest GPA among member schools with a 3.12 overall average. In 2005, Maine again posted a 3.12 overall GPA, finishing second in the conference.

LIFE SKILLS

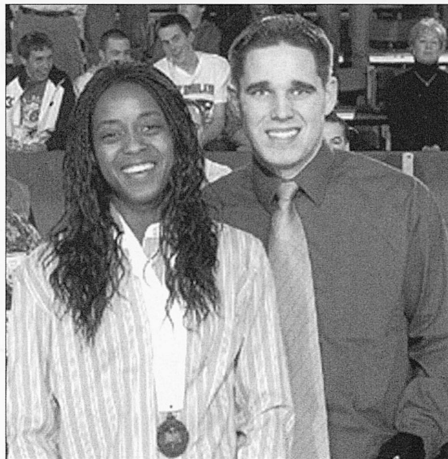
The goal of the life skills program is to assist student-athletes as students, citizens and aspiring professionals.

Life Skills Seminars. Student-athletes work with the Life Skills Coordinator and campus members to design and participate in life skills workshops covering a variety of areas: career development, team building, alcohol and drug education, and nutrition.

Multicultural Programs. The University of Maine and its Athletic Department have a commitment to supporting diversity within the campus community. A liaison relationship involving full-time staff members has developed between the Office of Multicultural Affairs and the Department of Athletics to promote an appreciation of diversity and to serve the student-athletes of different cultures.

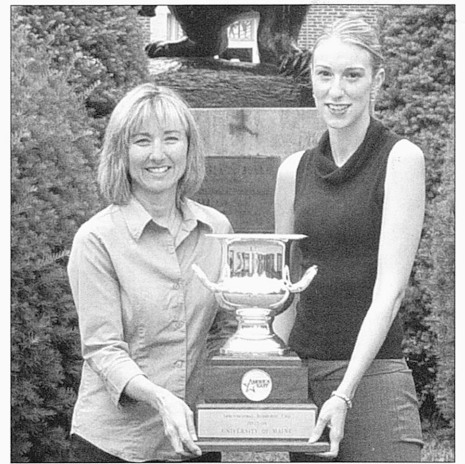
Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. This organization is composed of members from each of the intercollegiate sports teams and meets with athletic and academic administrators regularly to help streamline and promote efficient communication between the athletic department administration and the student-athlete population. SAAC acknowledges the unique contribution student-athletes provide to the collegiate and community climate, and remains committed to positive involvement and excellence in each.

Outreach. Opportunities exist through the Community Outreach Program for student-athletes to gain public speaking experience while they give back to the community. Student-athletes speak at numerous schools and community groups during the year, including the "Winter Kids Program" which encourages 5th, 6th and 7th graders to commit to fun and healthy winter lifestyles.

Right: Academic Support staff Ann Maxim and Cristina Kerluke accept the 2004 America East Academic Cup.



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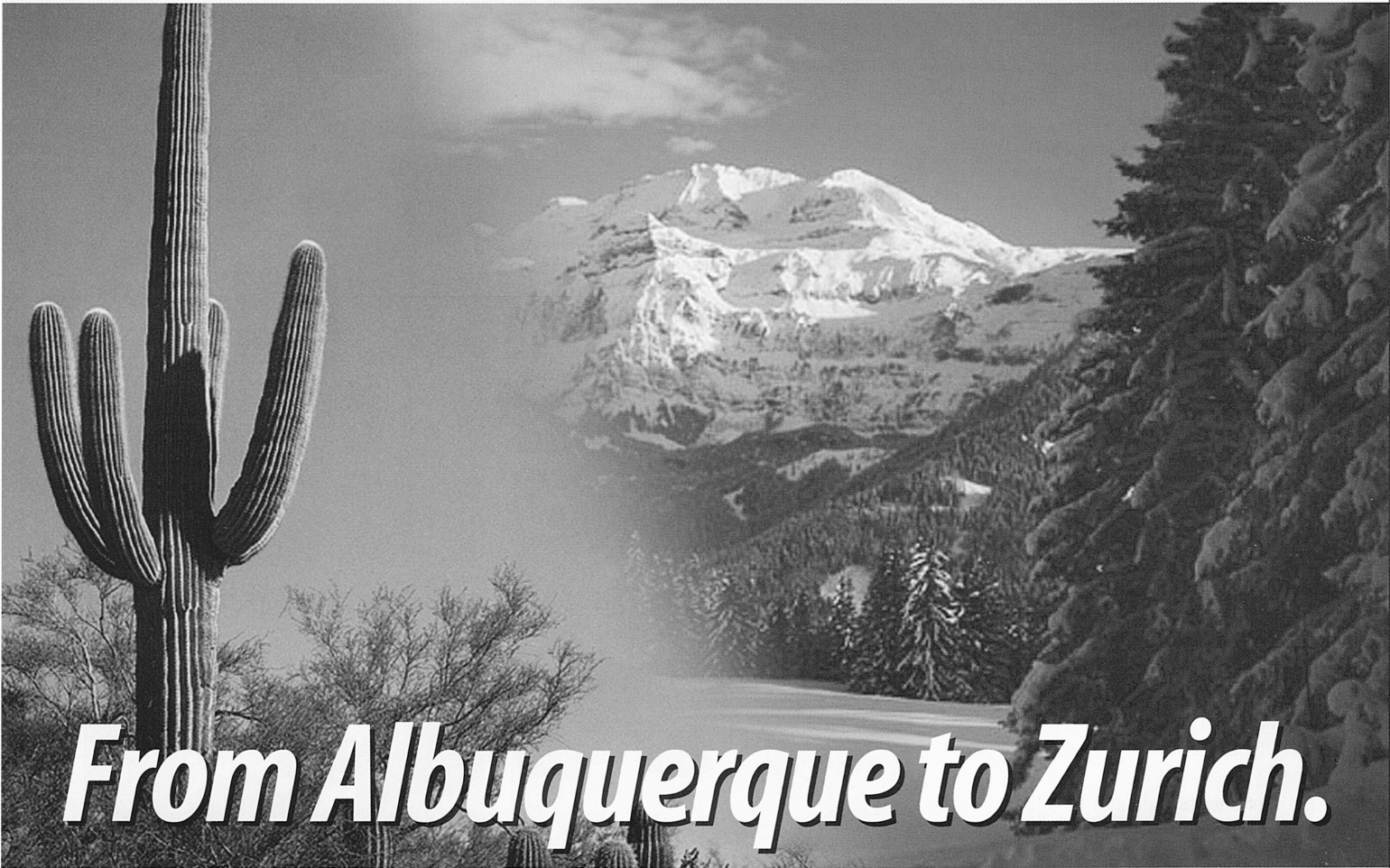
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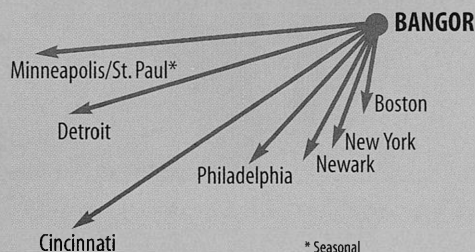

The University of Maine Athletic Department continued a tradition of success during the 2004-05 academic year. Overall, eight teams reached postseason play and two teams won America East titles. Men's ice hockey and baseball participated in the NCAA Tournament. While the Black Bears were excelling in competition, they also excelled in the classroom.

ACADEMIC SUCCESS: Maine finished second with a 3.12 grade point average for the America East Academic Cup after winning the Academic Cup in 2004. Men's cross country, men's outdoor track and field, volleyball and field hockey led the conference in team grade point averages. Softball and women's swimming led America East in honor roll selections. Maine's women's ice hockey team led Hockey East in conference academic honor roll selections. Individually, more than half of all student-athletes were named Maine Scholar-Athletes with a grade point average of 3.0 or better.

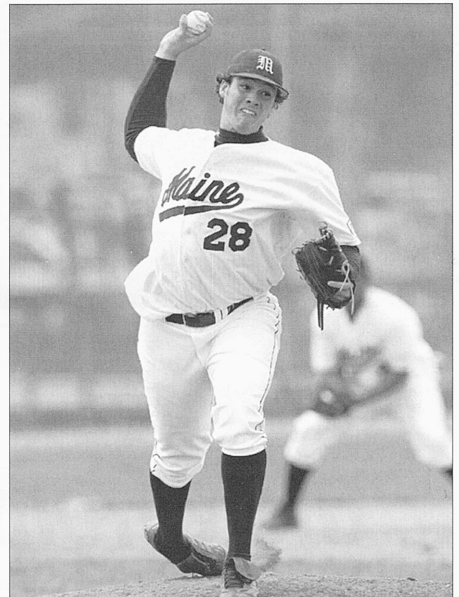
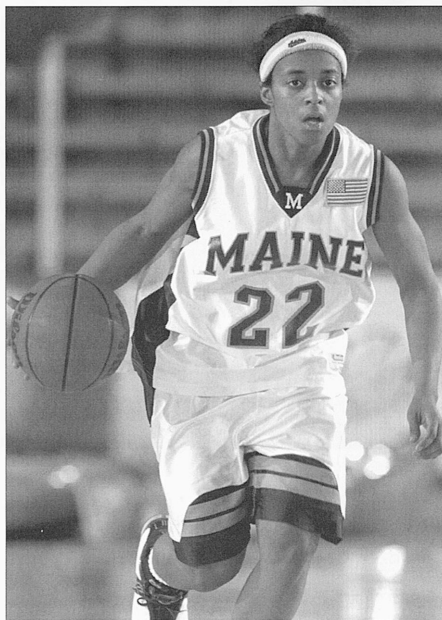
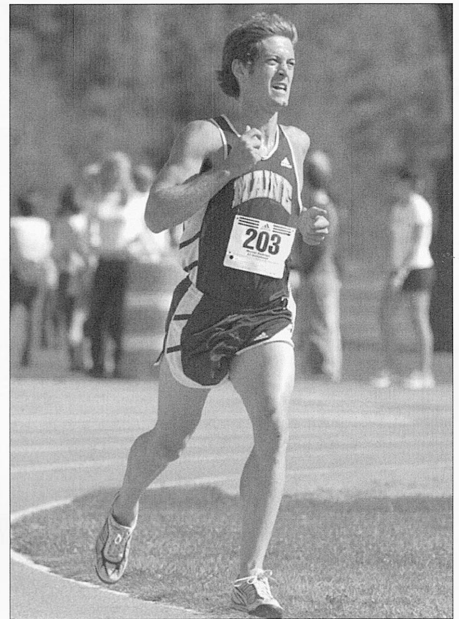
ATHLETIC SUCCESS: In the fall of 2004, the Black Bears began the season strong as the women's soccer team and the volleyball team advanced to the America East Conference Championship game. Men's cross country won their first America East title. The football team posted a 9-7 win over Mississippi State for the team's first ever win over a Division I-A opponent.

The winter teams continued to build upon the success of the fall sports. The women's basketball team won the regular-season America East title and played in the WNIT for the second time in three years. Men's ice hockey reached the NCAA Tournament for the seventh straight season.

In the spring, the baseball team won the America East title and defeated Southern Mississippi in the NCAA Regionals held at Ole Miss.

Overall, the combination of athletic and academic success has enabled the University of Maine to build one of the strongest athletic programs in New England.

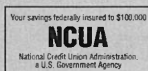
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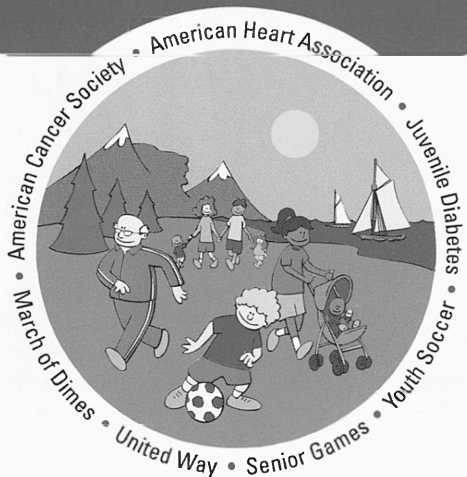
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University of Maine Traditions

Bananas – The Black Bear

The black bear has been the mascot of the University of Maine since 1914.

Jeff, a black bear cub who was found on the slopes of Mt. Katahdin in that year, was loaned to the university by Old Town police chief O.B. Fernandez, who hoped that the beast might bring good luck to the ailing football team.

Jeff made his debut at a rally in preparation for the Colby game, and as he entered the auditorium, the surprised crowd applauded enthusiastically. Thinking it only proper thing to do, Jeff gratefully stood on his head; the crowd went "bananas!"

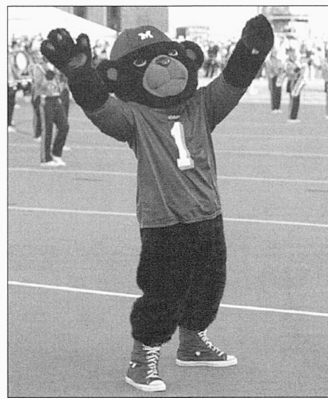
Maine went on to whip Colby 31-6, and Maine has

been going "bananas" for Black Bears ever since.

Former track and cross country captain Lloyd E. Houghton '12 presented the university with its own black bear cub the following year, and, remembering Jeff's enthusiastic welcome he suggested that the cub be named, Bananas.

At least 15 different black bears have carried on the name "Bananas" until the practice of having live mascots was banned after the death of "Cindy Bananas" in 1966.

In 1969, the Alpha Phi Omega fraternity began



providing a "human Bananas" as a service to the university, and they continue to do so today. Additional support is provided by the Graduate M Club and the Maine General Alumni Association.

Bananas entertains at Maine athletic contest and other university special events, and also takes part in a variety of

community activities and events.

In the fall of 2004, a newly designed "Bananas" mascot was unveiled at the first home football game. The "new" Bananas (pictured) will serve as the mascot for years to come.

School Colors and Logo

The University of Maine unveiled a new bear logo and school colors during the 1999 Homecoming festivities. Official University of Maine school colors are "Maine blue" (a deep sky blue), navy blue and white.



University Crest

The University Crest embodies the history of the University of Maine and its position as the flagship university of the University of Maine System. The three flags inside the crest represent the institution's flagship status and symbolize its mission of teaching, research and public service. Maine's natural resources, and the university's position as a land-grant university and sea-grant College, are depicted in the colors of pale blue and navy blue that stand for the sea and sky.



Maine Day

In 1935 President Arthur Hauck inaugurated "Maine Day," a day set aside for "spring clean-up" of the campus. Classes are suspended for the day and all of the campus community – students, faculty, staff, and alumni – pitch in to spruce up the campus. The day kicks off with a wake-up parade, followed by work projects throughout the morning. A gigantic barbecue is held in the steam plant parking lot at lunchtime for all volunteers. In the afternoon student teams compete for the "oozeball championship" – volleyball played in the mud.

Athletic Success

Several Black Bear teams have excelled to regional and national prominence, including the Black Bear men's ice hockey team, the 1993 and 1999 NCAA Division I national champions. In the last 19 years and 22 of the last 23, at least one Black Bear sports team has competed in an NCAA Championship. The Black Bears captured their first national title in 1993 when they defeated Lake Superior State University, 5-4, then captured the 1999 NCAA crown with a 3-2 win over New Hampshire. The baseball team has made seven appearances in the College World Series.

Ann McInerney was officially introduced as the University of Maine's women's basketball coach on May 6, 2005, after a highly successful stint in the same position at Merrimack College. She is the ninth head coach in Maine women's basketball history.

McInerney spent the past six seasons as head coach at Merrimack, posting the highest winning percentage in school history and back-to-back trips to the NCAA Division II Final Four.

"Ann has proven to be a successful teacher and leader," said former Maine Athletics Director Patrick Nero. "She has taken the Merrimack College women's basketball program to a level that they have never achieved before and I have great confidence that she will direct our women's basketball program in a similar manner. We were fortunate to have had an excellent candidate pool to choose from. Ann was one that we identified from the start and as the process went on it became apparent to us that she would be a great coach for the University of Maine."

McInerney accepted her new position with excitement as she looks to build upon the rich tradition that is Maine women's basketball.

"There is a lot of excitement and passion that surrounds the University of Maine women's basketball program and I'm looking forward to being a part of it," she said. "This program has a proud history and that will provide tremendous motivation for us as a team to continue building upon that tradition."

MERRIMACK YEARS

In six seasons at Merrimack, McInerney had an overall record of 119-65, including a 60-10 mark in the past two seasons. In the 2002-03 season, she guided the Warriors to a 21-9 record, the first 20-plus win season in school history. The team reached the NCAA Division II tournament for the first time in school history and reached the regional semifinals. The program continued to excel in the 2003-04 season, posting a 31-4 record, the best in school history. The Warriors finished the season ranked fourth in the nation. The team won the Northeast-10 regular season and tournament titles to advance to the NCAA Division II tournament. After winning the Northeast Regional, the Warriors won in the Elite Eight

After winning the Northeast Regional and reaching the Elite Eight, the Warriors reached the Final Four for the second-consecutive season.

TRAINING GROUND

Prior to Merrimack, McInerney was the top assistant coach at Bentley College from 1994 to 1999. While at Bentley, she helped direct the team to a 139-23 record, four regular season Northeast-10 conference championships, three conference tournament championships, four NCAA Division II Elite Eight appearances and one appearance in the Final Four.

McInerney got her start in coaching as the head coach of Nichols College in Dudley, Mass., in 1990. In two seasons she posted a 32-17 record. She spent 1992-94 as an assistant basketball and assistant softball coach at Merrimack. With the softball team, she helped guide the Warriors to the 1994 national championship.

PLAYING CAREER

A 1989 graduate of Assumption College with a degree in education and psychology, McInerney was Assumption’s all-time leading scorer when she left with 1,406-career points in her career. She earned Northeast-10 Conference Player-of-the-Year honors in 1989 and was inducted into the Assumption College Athletic Hall of Fame in October of 1997.

TAKING OVER A PROUD PROGRAM

McInerney takes over a program that has a strong history of success as the dominate program in America East. In the past eleven years, the Black Bears have made seven appearances in the NCAA Tournament, won eight conference regular season championships, won five conference tournament titles, had two appearances in the WNIT and had six players named conference Player of the Year. Maine has had 20-plus wins in twelve of the last fifteen seasons while leading the conference in attendance each season.

“We will play the game the right way because that is the ultimate sign of respect for this proud program,” McInerney added. “I look forward to players from the past coming back to Maine and cheering on the current players as they continue to build this program.”

After winning the Northeast Regional and reaching the Elite Eight, the Warriors reached the Final Four for the second-consecutive season.

Karlsson went to Merrimack after serving as an assistant women's basketball coach at Boston University. While with the Terriers, she assisted with skill enhancement of individual players and taught fundamental and team strategies. Prior to arriving at Boston University, Karlsson served as an assistant women's basketball coach at Brandeis University.

A 1991 graduate of the University of Maine, she played three seasons for the Black Bears (1987-1990). Former Maine standout and 2005 America East Player of the Year, Kim Corbitt, was named assistant coach of the Maine basketball program on Aug. 9, 2005.

Corbitt begins her coaching career at her alma mater after a decorated playing career for the Black Bears. As a senior during the 2004-05 season, Corbitt was also named the America East Defensive Player of the Year in addition to the top conference honor, becoming the first player in league history to earn both awards in the same year. It marked the second time in her career Corbitt won the league's defensive player-of-the-year award, as she also earned the honor in 2003. She started 28 games last season while helping to lead Maine (20-10 overall) to the 2005 America East regular season championship and a berth in the WNIT. Corbitt led the team with 120 assists last season and ranks third in school history with 436. She ranked fourth on the team in points per game (9.1), while shooting a solid 49 percent (86-of-177) from the field. Corbitt earned the 2004 and 2005 America East Women's Basketball Scholar-Athlete Award, and was also named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll during that time.

"Kim Corbitt is an icon up here," head coach Ann McInerney said. "She was an outstanding point guard and was a coach on the court for her teammates. She knows a lot about this program and her knowledge of it will help us continue to build upon the success Maine has achieved in women's basketball."

A native of Albany, N.Y., Corbitt played at Colonie High School. She graduated from Maine in August '05 with a B.S. in biological engineering and mathematics. Corbitt's primary duties will be exchanging film with opponents and helping to coordinate practice schedules.

Alfond Arena

With its white, multi-peaked roof, the Harold Alfond Sports Arena is distinctive on the outside. But what goes on inside during Black Bears women's basketball games is what truly makes "The Alfond" a special venue.

Each year thousands of spectators pack Alfond Arena, making Maine one of the region's leaders in total attendance. The Black Bears loyal, knowledgeable fans help give Maine a unique home court advantage.

The Harold Alfond Sports Arena was completed in February of 1977. It is named after Harold Alfond, one of the University of Maine's largest benefactors and the founder of the Dexter Shoe Company. Mr. Alfond was one of 2,000 people who contributed funds for the original construction of the complex, and donated \$2 million for the Arena's expansion in 1992.

At that time, Mr. Alfond's gift to fund the expansion represented the largest one-time (non-posthumous) cash contribution ever bestowed upon the University of Maine. Altogether, Mr. Alfond has donated over \$6 million to the University since 1968.

The 1992 expansion project created 70-foot by 140-foot additions to both the east and west sides of the Arena, allowing the installation of an additional 1,200 seats. The construction raised the building's capacity to 5,200 for hockey and over 5,700 for basketball, allowing men's and women's basketball games to once again be played on campus. During the previous four seasons, both Black Bear basketball teams had played at the Bangor Auditorium, 15 minutes south of campus.

The Maine women's basketball team played its first game in Alfond Arena against Boston University on Jan. 30, 1992, and posted a 74-57 win. Since then, the Black Bears have recorded a 134-37 mark in their 13 seasons at the Alfond. The largest crowd to see a women's basketball game at the arena was on Feb. 1, 1998, when 5,862 fans packed the building to see the Black Bears face rival New Hampshire.

Since women's basketball began playing at Alfond Arena, attendance has increased dramatically to place Maine among the nation's leaders in women's basketball attendance.

During the 2004-05 season, an average of 2,372 fans came to 12 home games, placing the Black Bears first in the America East Conference in home attendance. Attendance



reached an all-time high in 1997-98, when Maine finished 14th in the nation with an average of 4,846 fans.

In addition to being Maine's home court and ice hockey venue, the facility is used by high school and youth hockey leagues, and for concerts and graduation ceremonies.

Amenities at Alfond Arena include: 13 skyboxes at the south end of the building, with one reserved for University officials; the Dexter Lounge, a meeting room used for team functions, hospitality by the various Friends groups, and other special events; the Maine athletic ticket office; game-night locker rooms for both men's and women's basketball; and "Bear Necessities," the athletic department's official retail store for Black Bear apparel and other merchandise.

Alfond Arena's Shawn Walsh Center includes a large training room for treatment of in-game injuries, as well as the offices and locker room's for the Maine men's and women's ice hockey programs.

Fan services in the arena include rest rooms under both the east and west side grandstands, and concession stands located at several locations on the main concourse around the building.

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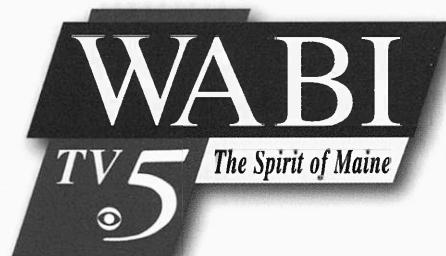


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The Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps (NROTC) program is designed to provide college students with a Navy training experience that will complement their education as well as provide them with an opportunity for a commission in the Navy or Marine Corps upon graduation.

The Naval ROTC program is available to graduating high school seniors and current undergraduate students. High school seniors are eligible to apply for a **four-year scholarship**; applications are due during their senior year. **Three-year and two-year scholarships** are available to current undergraduate students and are awarded based on grade point average, naval aptitude, and physical readiness. Academic performance in math and science courses is considered as well. The Navy currently supports Naval ROTC Units at two institutions in Maine: Maine Maritime Academy and the University of Maine at Orono. Additionally, nursing students enrolled at both the University of Maine and Husson College are eligible to enroll in Naval ROTC, and may apply for **nurse option scholarships**.

The Navy ROTC is designed to provide students with the leadership and management skills necessary for success in the naval service. The program focuses on academics, physical fitness, and leadership development. The program offers courses in the following areas: Introduction to Naval Science, Navigation, Naval Weapons Systems, Engineering, Seapower, Leadership and Management, Ethical Decision Making, Amphibious Warfare, and Evolution of Warfare. The Department of Naval Science offers a minor in Naval Science. The minor requires the completion of 23 credit hours in Naval Science courses.

The Program provides students with a challenging, but tremendously rewarding college experience. Scholarship benefits include full college tuition and fees, \$250.00 a semester for books, and stipend of \$250.00 per month. Additional activities include summer training cruises, formal military functions, Color Guard, field trips, and drill competitions.

Upon graduation, Naval ROTC students are awarded a commission as an officer in the Navy or Marine Corps, and can

choose one of the following challenging career paths: Naval Aviation, Submarine Warfare (Nuclear), Surface Warfare (Conventional or Nuclear), Navy SEAL, Navy Nurse Corps, or the United States Marine Corps.

To enter the Naval ROTC Program, a student must be a United States citizen, at least 17 years old at time of enrollment, physically qualified, and of sound character. For two or three-year scholarships, students may apply for enrollment during their first or

second year of a four-year degree program. Four-year scholarship applicants must apply during their senior year of high school. Students may gain more information about the Naval ROTC Program by contacting:

Academic Achievements & Honors

The Maine women's basketball program not only strives for success on the court, but also excellence in the classroom. In addition to basketball achievements, the Black Bears have also made a name for themselves as one of the top academic teams in the nation.

The 2004-05 season was no exception. Five Black Bears were honored by America East, including Kim Corbitt, who was named a Scholar-Athlete by the league. In addition to Corbitt, Missy Traversi and Margaret Elderton were named to the Commissioner's Honor Roll for gaining grade point averages of 3.50 or higher. Lindsey Hugstad-Vaa and Nicole Jay were named to the America East Academic Honor Roll for accumulating GPAs between 3.00-3.49. Ashley Underwood joined those five by being named Maine Scholar-Athletes. Corbitt and Traversi were named Gold Medalists as they were named Maine Scholar-Athletes for a third-consecutive year.

Maine has earned a spot in the WBCA rankings four times in the last eight years. The team finished seventh in both 1999-00 and 1996-97, and 13th in both 1997-98 and 2003-04.

Nine Black Bears were named to the 2003-04 America East Winter/Spring Academic Honor Roll for earning GPAs of 3.0 or higher. Corbitt was named the top women's basketball scholar-athlete in the conference. Corbitt, Heather Ernest, Jay, Traversi and Julie Veilleux all earned a spot on the Commissioner's Honor Roll.

Seven women's basketball student-athletes were tabbed as 2003 University of Maine Scholar-Athletes after maintaining a 3.0 or better GPA. Ernest and Veilleux were honored as gold medalists for receiving the award for the fourth time. Additionally, three rookies - Bracey Barker, Hugstad-Vaa and Underwood - were named Maine Rising Stars, an accolade given to freshmen with a 3.0 or better in the Fall Semester.

The women's basketball team has traditionally been one of the highest performing groups on the Maine campus, at the same time being one of the most successful athletically.

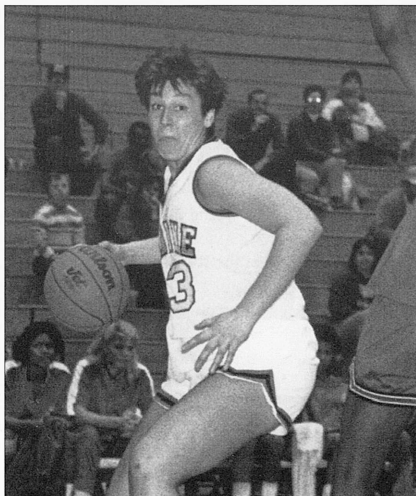
In the spring of 2000, the program was recognized for having the highest GPA of all of the women's athletic teams on campus.

Rachel Bouchard became the first University of Maine women's basketball player to earn GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America honors in 1990 and concluded her career by winning a prestigious NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship, one of only two Maine female student-athletes to do so.

Cindy Blodgett was the second Black Bear to earn Academic All-America accolades, when she was named to the first team in 1998.

A pair of women's basketball players have been recipients of the Dean Smith Award, named for the only Black Bear to win the Walter Byers Scholarship as the nation's top student-athlete, and presented annually to the university's top student-athlete.

Chrissy Strong won the Dean Smith Award in 1994, while Blodgett shared the award with track athlete Johanna Riley in 1998.

Since its modest beginning as a men's basketball-only conference in 1979, America East has evolved into one of the most comprehensive NCAA Division I conferences with a commitment to broad-based, competitive athletics programs, complementing the academic integrity and missions of the member institutions.

Each of the nine institutions - University at Albany, Binghamton University, Boston University, University of Hartford, University of Maine, University of Maryland, Baltimore County (UMBC), University of New Hampshire, Stony Brook University, and University of Vermont - offers a unique blend of academic and athletic tradition.

Progressive in its approach to its more than 3,500 student-athletes, America East recognizes champions in each of its 22 sports: men's and women's basketball, baseball, men's and women's cross country, field hockey, men's and women's golf, men's and women's indoor track and field, men's and women's lacrosse, men's and women's outdoor track and field, men's and women's soccer, softball, men's and women's swimming and diving, men's and women's tennis, and volleyball.

America East also conducts the nation's most comprehensive academic recognition program for student-athletes. Nearly 1,700 student-athletes with grade-point averages of 3.0 or better were honored in 2004-05 alone.

With a geographic footprint covering the Mid-Atlantic to Northeast regions of the United States, America East has a population base of more than 50 million people and nearly 30 million television homes. America East member institutions include more than 106,000 students on the nine campuses and boast nearly one million living alumni.

America East enters its 18th year of all-sports championship competition on the heels of one of the most successful seasons in history as five of its 10 team sport champions won at least one game in the NCAA Championship. Vermont advanced in the NCAA Men's Basketball Championship with a 60-57 overtime win over Syracuse in the first round. In addition, America East sent two teams to the National Invitation Tournament. Of the nation's 20 Division I-AA and I-AAA conferences, only five placed as many as three men's basketball teams in the postseason. For only the second time in conference history, America East advanced five men's and women's basketball teams combined to the postseason.

Boston University earned the highest national seeding for an America East team when it entered the NCAA Women's

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Lacrosse Championship as the No. 3 seed. The Terriers also enjoyed a successful men's soccer season, advancing to the second round. It marked the fourth-straight year the America East men's soccer champion had won at least one game in the NCAA Championship. America East baseball champion Maine advanced to the NCAA Regional for the 14th time in school history, defeating Southern Mississippi while falling a game short of the championship round. The America East field hockey champion advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championship for the second time in three years.

In addition, America East sent 42 student-athletes to the NCAA East Outdoor Track and Field Regional and saw two student-athletes compete at the both the NCAA Indoor Track and Field and Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

America East institutions boasted six Academic All-Americans in 2004-05 while another 37 were named All-District.

The conference also honored a top-scholar athlete in each of its 22 championship sports. Repeat winners from 2003-04 included Andy Allstadt of the Albany men's cross country and track and field teams, Kim Corbitt of the Maine women's basketball team, Jill Friedman of the Albany women's golf team, Adam Grossman of the UMBC men's track and field teams, David Hehn of the Vermont men's basketball team, and Aaron Izaryk of the Maine baseball team.

Nearly 1,700 of America East's 3,500 student-athletes were named to the Academic Honor Roll after receiving grade-point averages of 3.0 or better. Included in that total were 753 student-athletes who earned a 3.5 or better.
