# THE ORONO CAMPUS

The University of Maine at Orono, with its six colleges and four schools, is the largest campus in the statewide university system. There is plenty of elbow room on its 1,100 acres, where the student is offered the diversity and challenge of a large university in the invigorating atmosphere of a small college. Close personal contact among students, and among students and faculty, is a tradition at Orono, where one knows his neighbors and his teachers.

Orono is a cosmopolitan campus in a classic New England setting. Last year students from 25 foreign countries and 45 states studied here, and fully 20 percent of the total enrollment of some 11,000 students regularly is admitted from other states and nations around the world.

There is ample opportunity for the student to enrich his university days academically and socially outside the classroom. There are seven scholastic honor societies, four nonscholastic honor societies, 22 departmental and professional honor societies, 56 associations, clubs and organizations, and six religious groups. Nineteen fraternities and 10 sororities have chapters at Orono.

The campus is located one mile from the center of Orono, an attractive town of about 10,000 population, and eight miles from Bangor, the state's third largest city. It is in the center of the state's year-round outdoor recreation area, with ski slopes, scores of ponds, lakes, streams, and the beautiful Maine coast within easy driving distance.

Interstate Route 95, a scenic four-lane highway that bisects the state north to south to the New Hampshire state line, passes within a mile of the campus. Air travelers land at Bangor International Airport, where the University of Maine has established a campus in former Dow Air Force Base facilities, Bangor Community College. BCC, in the 1974-75 academic year, became the new sixth college of the University of Maine at Orono. Although the 162 acre campus, with its 58 buildings, is located in Bangor, its relationship with Orono is the same as the other five colleges.

In its role as a community college, the primary objectives of BCC are to offer twoyear associate degree programs, one-year certificate, and short-term programs to meet special educational needs.

The University of Maine at Orono offers programs in physical education, intercollegiate athletics, intramural sports, recreation and related club activities. These programs are recognized as an integral part of the educational process which the university controls and supports within the limitations of budget, staff, equipment, and facilities. These programs are to promote educational leadership, physical fitness, opportunity for recreational pursuits, and athletic excellence through instruction and competition.

In 1968 the State Legislature created a system of public higher education for Maine. This action unified the University of Maine and the five state colleges into one "cohesive structure of public education in the State of Maine." The university now has campuses in Orono, Bangor, Portland-Gorham, Augusta, Presque Isle, Farmington, Fort Kent, and Machias.

The information in this publication pertains only to the activities and programs at Orono.





**MAINE 8, DARTMOUTH 4**

I didn't want to go. It was too cold. I was tired from spending my Saturday refereeing a two-year-old and a seven-year-old confined to the house by runny noses. I had never seen a hockey game and it wouldn't put a dent in my life if I never saw one. I voiced every excuse, feeble complaint, weak protestation in vain.

The tickets had been bought. The babysitter had been hired. Reason weighed against me. We went.

We passed the short time along the Interstate to Orono scraping the interior breath frost from the windshield. By the time we reached the university the glass had cleared enough for us to clearly see great waves and rows of vehicles, carriers of hockey aficionados faster than we, stretching far into the dark allies and canyons of the fieldhouse parking lot. We drove around and around, we ranted, we persevered, we parked.

Then we ran. It was too cold to walk. Running past all those cars in my clumpy boots gave me that old nutball sensation I used to get trying to walk in skis. If God had wanted mankind to stumble around that way He would have designed us with great long feet.

We puffed into the Alfond Arena on a blast of Arctic desperation and came body to body with great waves and rows of the hockey aficionados themselves. They were dressed all in down from their heads to their feet, and they were lined up three deep along every passage designed to get us to our appointed seats. The tribal drums of the UMO band thundered at us from somewhere just beyond the three layers of humanity, bloodchurning rhythms that squeezed us through the down- and nylon-lined artery along the back wall until we could break through to the stairs leading to our seats.

Now I could sink down out of my mittens and earmuffs and coat and reconnoiter. I was astonished at the relatively small size of the arena, quite pleasantly astonished. I could see every corner of the rink. I could see every face in the crowd across the way. I could watch the faces looking down from the gallery.

But now the tribal drums began to pound in earnest, the band exploded into the Maine Stein Song, the crowd exploded into general exultation, and two sets of brightlycolored, cloth-covered stuffed dolls swirled out of somewhere and swept down the ice past us.

I couldn't see them. I knew they were young, half as old as I. I knew they must be strong and fast. I wondered if they were kind. I wondered if they were smart. I wondered if they were shy or if they were romantic opportunists.

Sometimes when they were drawn close into the boards in front of us I could see their eyes behind the bars of their armor. The eyes didn't look into my eyes, so I couldn't see into them, couldn't tell if they were shy or kind.

The game started. The players were wild electrified kachina dolls, gods of fire and wind, gods of ice. They skated backwards, they skated sideways, they hopped and jumped and threw themselves down with abandon. One danced on the ice, skated like liquid silver, dazzled and dulled his opposition. The game raged so fiercely that even the young and strong could not sustain the battle for more than a few minutes.

Their replacements came up over the boards with the intensity of doughboys rising out of trenches in the Ardenne. They slammed their sticks at the puck, they slammed their bodies at each other, they bashed into the boards with the force of elephants and skated away without noticing that all their bones should have been shattered in the crunch.

The goalkeeper stood in ultimate defense of his territory with a stick wrapped in shining tape and a first-baseman's glove. I never saw the puck. He almost always saw it, knocked it away, impounded it. I couldn't see, but I could feel the invisible village within the net the goalie guarded. Some atavistic fury drove him, drove the defensemen, to the savagery with which they protected their village from the Dartmouth huns.

It was over. Maine's blue knights had won their hockey game. Our village was safe. The prowess of our defenders would be noticed and rewarded with a step up in the NCAA rankings. I loved it. I was amazed. It was fast, it was exciting, it was fun. For a short time I could project my spirit out onto the ice field, pretend I was out there meeting the challenge to my village's life and honor. Those curly-haired athletes made me feel fast when I had never been fast, strong when I had never been strong, powerful when I never had power. I don't suppose they knew that.

We applauded in unison with the rest of the village when it ended, collected our gear, pushed out through the down and nylon, ran back over the frozen snow, drove home. I wonder if we can get tickets to the Yale game.

"We're not conceding this season as a 'rebuilding' year. This could be our biggest challenge since we fielded our first team in 1977".

Those are the emphatic words of head hockey coach Jack Semler, who is set for his fifth year (78 wins, 47 losses, two ties) at Maine. The 1980-81 New England Division One Coach-ofthe-Year sees 1981-82 as another stepping stone in the Black Bears' quest to maintain their young hockey program as one of the East's best.

"The stakes are much higher now than 1977 because we are a Division One team," points out Semler, who will again be assisted by Gary Wright. "On the one hand, we've got a group of upperclassmen eager to prove themselves without being in the shadow of last year's graduated seniors. This is their chance to prove what an integral part of Maine hockey they have been. On the other hand, we've got a group of freshmen who I feel can prove themselves the strongest class ever recruited at Maine if they pull together and play with enthusiasm and emotion. With teams like Providence, BC, UNH, and Colgate having no key graduation losses, people won't be picking us to do much, but this factor alone is great incentive. If we make the playoffs, this team will have accomplished more than any Maine hockey team we've had."

The Bears, 23-11 last year and Division One playoff quarterfinalists for the first time, return several outstanding players. One of them is hard-hitting defenseman David Ellis, the team's senior captain. This superb body checker is a former All-Downeast Classic and All-Holy Cross Tournament pick.

Ellis anchors a solid defense corps, perhaps the team's strongest area. All-American Andre Aubut returns for his final year with junior Ken Fargnoli and sophomores David Hunt and Mike Symonds. Four fine freshmen blueliners will be pressing for playing time, including Rene Comeault, Mark Crowley, Jeff Kloewer and Joel Steensen.

The Bears must restructure their forward lines with the loss of such high scorers as All-American Gary Conn, Joe Crespi and Brian Hughes, the team's three all-time top scorers, last year's captain Bill Demianiuk and John Tortorella via graduation. Senior Rob Zamejc, the team's top returning scorer with 21 goals and 29 assists, leads a capable group of veterans that includes seniors Robert Lafleur, UMO's shorthand goal recordholder, Gaetan Bernier and Richard Cote and sophomores Todd Bjorkstrand and Paul Giacalone. Talented forward prospects include Mike Beaudry, Jim Bolger, Scott Boretti, Laurie Bourgeois, Bruce Hegland, Ron Hellen, Ray Jacques, Joe Jirele and Pete Maher.

Senior Dwight Montgomery will make the move to a forward position this winter after starring for three years on defense for the Blue and White.

In goal, where Maine must replace the talented goaltending tandem of Jeff Nord and Jim Tortorella, sophomore Duffy Loney joins freshmen Pete Smith and Andy Lehmann in the nets for the Bears.

In the third Division One season in Maine's short, but winning hockey history, Semler will take his freshman-filled squad along a difficult schedule highlighted in mid-season by the Auld Lang Syne Classic in a four-team field with host Dartmouth, Vermont and New Hampshire.

The challenge is there. The playoffs await the best.

Elsewhere in this Black Bear Hockey Guide is an article by Leigh McCarthy, first-time fan, that beautifully strikes all the notes that have come to be heard from and about the Maine Hockey Program. She has captured in words the essence of excitement Maine hockey fans have come to long for, the excitement that begins in earnest when the ice goes down at the Alfond and has fans chomping at the bit for the opener in the middle of November. The program has done this for the fans, but let it also be known what the Maine fan has done for the program.

When Maine players arrived hours before game time for the Division One home opener last year against Clarkson, they came upon a scene that stayed with them the entire year. Stretching out the door, down the entrance ramp, into the parking lot and off down the road towards the fieldhouse, were hundreds of fans, waiting in the cold night to get their tickets. Now graduated Jamie Logan never got over that sight. For the entire season, whenever anyone mentioned Maine fans, Jamie would vividly recall that night with great pride. If you asked him how he got himself up for a game, he invariably repeated the story.

Gaetan Bernier is now a senior. When he recalls his moments in a Maine uniform, he will take you back to the first night he stepped from the walkway to the ice his freshman year to the incessant roar of the home crowd. When he tells the story, he drifts away, the mind's eye taking over and the wonder of it all repeating itself in his words and in his smile.

For Andre Aubut (pronounced 'boo' by Maine fans), the All-American defenseman, there is a unique and warm sense of home every time he's introduced. He hears his own cheer that gives a whole new meaning to the term "boo birds." Long before the All-American honors came, Andre had found a college home on the ice, the fans made that clear.

This year there are 15 freshmen on the Maine squad. Coach Jack Semler brought as many of them as possible to the Alfond to hear and see his greatest recruiting tool — the Maine Fan. Let there be no mistake about it, the success of this recruiting season and those in the past was helped in no small part by the sheer delight Maine fans bring not only to themselves and Maine players, but to all who see them in action, especially the recruit.

Then there is the opposition. Whenever one mentions the Alfond and its crowds to Maine's opposition, the eyes widen and more than one "wow" is exuded. Maine, in four short years, has developed a reputation as a tough place to play, not only because of the quality of play, but also the quality of crowd. That is a great tribute to the "new crowd" on the block.

For the Maine student fan there has to be a special love for the game and their team. There are fewer seats than folks, and the Maine students do not have reserved seats. They are in the lines, rushing for the rush seats. That fact does not go unnoticed by the players. The support of fellow students is a source of inspiration. They rarely talk about that, but that does not mean those feelings are not there. When the dorm or frat or campus friends yell out, they are heard.

Finally, a very special relationship has developed between the community fans and the Maine hockey player, as evidenced by an inspired community turnout to salute the first graduating class of hockey players at a special hockey night last spring, conceived and sponsored by area fans. This bond has resulted in players coaching in youth leagues and speaking at all types of community affairs.

The relationship of fan to fan has led to the Alfond family of fans. They come early and knit, eat, read the paper, play cards and just socialize with friends they never knew four years ago. They occupy the "reserved zoo" in sections G and H; the goalie's gang in the balcony; the SROs who have seats but never sit down; the "assistant coaches" behind the Maine bench; and the players' section where moms, dads and girlfriends sometimes meet for the first time. They travel on buses to the away games and make more noise than the home crowd, or at least try. And do they love to talk about "their" hockey team.

All of this does not pass unnoticed by the players. If it had, Maine never would have a hockey program in the enviable position it now occupies. For the last four years Maine fans and players have nurtured one another when they both needed it most. They were made for each other.

Maine fans, you have been heard, and this year 15 freshmen will come to appreciate what playing at the Alfond is all about.



Hockey at the University of Maine became a reality with a \$400,000 contribution from businessman Harold Alfond, for whom the arena is named. After dropping the ceremonial first puck, Alfond and 3,300 fans sat back and watched the Black Bears take back-to-back 7-5 triumphs from Acadia. (see photo B).

The Bears' late season rush at a playoff berth fell just short after Maine defeated the Colby Mules, 4-1, in Waterville. The Mules bumped Maine from the number eight spot when they defeated number one Bowdoin in the regular season finale.

Sophomore Gary Conn, who led Maine in scoring the first season, opens the second campaign with record-setting performance at Mt. Allison. His five goals, including four in the final period, led Maine to a 5-4, come-from-behind win over the Mounties. The next afternoon, Conn tallied the game-tying goal with only six seconds left. (see photo A).

Goaltender Jeff Nord cops Goalie of the Week honors twice in three weeks for his performances against defending NCAA Division Two champion Merrimack and arch-rival Bowdoin. His 37-save, 6-0, victory over the Polar Bears is Maine's only shutout, and snap Bowdoin's 243 consecutive game team scoring streak, a Division Two record.

Jim Tortorella wins the Most Valuable Player award in leading the Black Bears to their first tournament victory as they take the Holy Cross Crusader Classic with a 4-3 triumph over the host Crusaders. Four weeks later, he turned in a 56-save performance leading Maine to its first ever win over a Division One opponent, 5-4, against R.P.I.

Center Joe Crespi sets a new consecutive game scoring streak of 19 games, and wins Forward of the Week honors leading Maine to wins over Division Two arch-rival Salem State and Vermont.

Freshman defenseman Andre Aubut is named ECAC Division Two Rookie of the Year and to the All-ECAC first team, while Gary Conn and Jeff Nord are named to the second team. Maine, seeded first for the ECAC East Tournament, had its drive towards the title stopped, 7-4, by Salem State.

The Black Bears move into the ranks of Division One after only two seasons of varsity hockey. With a renovated Alfond Arena, which now has a balcony at the north end, the Bears took on their most ambitious schedule. (see photo C).

The Bears prove they belong when they knock off, at the time nationally-ranked, Boston College, 6-3, on the road, and New Hampshire, 5-3, at home, in the same week. Defenseman Dwight Montgomery is named ECAC Defenseman of the Week for his outstanding play in these two triumphs.

The Bears clinch their first Downeast Classic title with solid, team performances over Bowdoin and Colby. Aubut, Montgomery, and captain Bill Demianiuk are named to the all-tournament team, while Aubut is also named the tournament's Most Valuable Player.


Maine begins its stretch run at the playoffs with a solid 5-3 victory over Harvard, then collects the firstever overtime win in Black Bear history when Dwight Montgomery tallies the game winner at 1:44 against New Hampshire at Durham.


Gary Conn's six point performance leads the Bears to an amazing 8-7 come-from-behind victory over Boston University. Maine, down 6-1 in the second period, scored four times in the final period to nip the Terriers. Six days later, Conn scored with only 2:39 left to propel Maine to a 6-5 win over Providence in Providence to keep the Bears' slim playoff hopes alive.


After splitting their first northern trip, the Bears are sitting in the eighth spot, but must wait for the regular season to finish to see if they have made the playoffs in their first season in Division One. Cornell went on to defeat Providence and Boston University in overtime on the final day of the regular season, knocking the Bears out of the playoffs, and the Big Red clinched the number eight spot.

Andre Aubut becomes one of only a handful of sophomores ever to win All-American honors. He is named to the Titan Hockey All-American squad, as well as to the All-ECAC first team. (see photo E).

Maine earns its first Division One playoff berth, finishing fourth overall and second in the East. Cornell ends Black Bear hopes with a 7-4 quarterfinal win. Gary Conn, Maine's all-time career scorer, earns All-American honors. Jeff Nord sets Maine record with 59 saves at BU and goes on to sign with the St. Louis Blues, becoming the first Bear to go pro. (see photo D). Thirteen seniors close out incredible four-year careers.
