## MEDIA INFORMATION

The University of Maine extends a cordial welcome to all working media covering our home games. We appreciate the coverage you give us and we will do everything possible to assist you in your game duties.

The Maine Sports Communications Office asks all media to make arrangements for credentials well before game day. The hockey press box is extremely limited in seating space and auxiliary seats are difficult to obtain. All credentials requests should be directed to Ian McCaw at (207) 581-1055. All credentials requests should be picked up at the Will Call Window before the game.

At all home games, media will be provided with game notes, statistical information, period-

by-period short charts and a game summary sheet. Power outlets and telephone lines are available for media members who wish to file directly from the press box.

Any media members wishing post-game interviews must allow for a 10-minute "cooling-off period" following the game before entering the locker rooms.

As a result of the HOCKEY EAST/WCHA reciprocal radio agreement, one designated visiting radio station will be afforded access to an outside phone line. Any other visiting radio station intent on broadcasting should contact Ian McCaw, and a decision will be made as to the feasibility of broadcasting the particular game given the capacity constraints of the press box.

# THE UNIVERSITY OF MAINE



The University of Maine is the largest of the seven campuses that comprise the University of Maine System. It is the Land Grant University and Sea Grant College of the state. The Orono campus, located on 1,200 acres in the center of the state, is made up of seven colleges and four schools. The philosophy of teaching and research at UM provides its students with the diversity and challenge of a large university and the atmosphere and attention of a small college. Faculty and staff are encouraged to work closely with the student body, a UM tradition that goes back to the earliest years of the Orono campus.

The University of Maine encourages students to enroll from throughout New England and beyond. As a result, the University has a diverse student body. Last year, over 45 states and 25 countries were represented on campus. More than 20 percent of the total enrollment of over 11,000 students is admitted from outside the state.

The philosophy of the University encourages the complete development of each student, both in and out of the classroom. In addition to the many challenging academic programs that lead to bachelor's degrees, UM also has a large variety of social, recreational and professional activities. To develop the body as well as the mind, UM offers a large variety of intramural and recreational sports in addition to its NCAA Division One varsity athletic program. Maine is a member of the Yankee Conference in football, the ECAC North Atlantic Confer-

ence in men's basketball, the Seaboard Conference in women's basketball, the HOCKEY EAST in hockey and the ECAC North Baseball Conference.

UM has seven scholastic honor societies, four non-scholastic honor societies, 22 departmental and professional honor societies, 56 associations, clubs, and organizations, and six religious groups. There are a total of 29 fraternities and sororities that maintain chapters at Maine. Many of the fraternities offer an alternative to dorm living at their chapter houses.

The University is located about one mile from the center of Orono, a town in a classic New England setting. With a population of about 10,000 and its location of 10 miles north of Bangor, the state's third largest city, Orono is in the center of Maine's year-round outdoor recreation area, with ski slopes, numerous ponds, lakes, streams and the beautiful and scenic Maine coast within easy driving distance.

Despite being away from a large urban area, the University has access to a number of transportation modes. Interstate Route 95, the major highway that stretches from Florida to Maine, passes within a mile of the campus. Air travelers are served by Bangor International Airport, which is located about 15 minutes from the campus. Two major and one regional airlines schedule numerous flights in and out of the state at BIA.

The University of Maine maintains a strong commitment to its students. Throughout the 121-year history, the University has continually added and changed its offerings to meet the needs of its student body. Back in 1871, the University consisted of a College of Arts and Sciences and a College of Agriculture (now Life Sciences and Agriculture). In 1923, a Graduate School was added. The College of Education and School of Nursing were established in 1958 followed by the College of Business Administration in 1965. In 1974, the University of Maine at Bangor was merged with the main campus to form Bangor Community College. BCC provided continuing education and other community support services until 1985 when it was reorganized. The College of Engineering and Science and School of Performing Arts became part of the Orono family in 1975, while the College of Forest Resources was created in 1982. UM's newest college is University College, created this past summer. Formed to replace Bangor Community College, University College will offer all of the old BCC services and many new ones. University College will be located at both Orono and Bangor, thus fully integrating the Bangor campus with Orono.

After over a century of service to the state, the University of Maine has established and maintained a tradition of excellence and high values as it pursues the goal of developing its students' minds, bodies and spirits. As a dynamic institution, ready to respond to the needs of its students and faculty, the University will continue to strive for excellence long into the 21st century.



## DR. DALE W. LICK

Dr. Dale W. Lick, 48, has been named the 16th president of the University of Maine, effective Sept. 1, 1986. Dr. Lick comes to the University of Maine after serving for eight years as president of Georgia Southern College in Statesboro, Ga., where he was also a professor of mathematics and computer science. During his tenure at Georgia Southern, he was a guiding force in moving the school's athletic programs into Division One and this past year the Georgia Southern football team won the Division I-AA national championship.

A graduate of Michigan State University where he obtained his baccalaureate and master's degrees in mathematics, Dr. Lick earned his doctorate at the University of California in Riverside.

Prior to taking the presidency of Georgia Southern, he was dean of the School of Sciences and Health Professions at Old Dominion University, vice president for academic affairs at Russell Sage College and chairman of the math department at Drexel University.

He is married and he and his wife, Marilyn, have three children.



## STU HASKELL, JR.

UM's Director of Physical Education and Athletics is Stuart Haskell, Jr. Stu, who is the first UM graduate and Maine native (Lincoln) to hold the Director's position, succeeded Harold Westerman on June 1, 1982. Stu has been a member of the university's staff for nearly 29 years, serving as Assistant Director of Publicity between 1957 and 1965 and as Business Manager of Athletics between 1966 and 1983. He served as Director of Informational Services for the public schools of Evanston, Ill. in 1965 and early 1966. Stu is a journalism graduate of Maine and was employed for three years as a sportswriter for the *Bangor Daily News* and one year as Editor of *The Republican Journal* in Belfast in the mid-1950's. He and his wife, Gloria, are the parents of four children.

# ALFOND ARENA HOME OF THE BLACK BEARS

One of the finest college hockey facilities in the country, the Harold Alfond Sports Arena has served the University community since 1977. Completed in February of that year, the building was dedicated by Mr. Alfond and officials of the University on November 18 at the Maine-Acadia hockey game. More than just the home ice for the Black Bears, the building is used by the UM figure skating program as well as by youth, high school and senior hockey leagues. With the ice removed, Alfond Arena has served as an auditorium for rock concerts and graduation ceremonies.

The complex is a modern facility that has a capacity of more than 4,100. There are virtually no obstructed seats in the building and everyone is afforded an excellent view of the ice. There are two spacious locker rooms and a well-equipped training room on the arena's lower level. The Alfond Sports Arena was built with the generous contributions of more than 2,000 people, headed by Harold Alfond, who contributed to the UM Second Century Fund. Through their efforts, a useful facility has been built and maintained that continues to serve both the university and greater Bangor communities.

# HOCKEY AT MAINE

The history of varsity hockey at the University of Maine can be divided into two eras. The first began shortly after the end of World War I when American college campuses were flooded with returning GIs. Varsity athletics in general were just beginning to return to their pre-war levels at most campuses when hockey as a college sport began a major resurgence across the country.

In the fall of 1922, several UM students formed a group to petition the Athletic Board to add varsity hockey for the 1922-23 winter season. A generation earlier, in 1906-07, a club team had been active on campus playing such teams as Bowdoin. That group had unsuccessfully sought varsity status for the sport. The 1922 group fared better as the board granted full varsity status for the new team which began play in February, 1923.

Five contests were played the first year as the Bears ended up with a 2-3 record. The wins were against Colby and Bates. Joseph Murphy served as the coach of the 1923 squad while

Drew Stearns, who also starred on the UM baseball squad, was the team captain.

A year later, the team played 12 games, winning four and losing eight. The highlights of the season were a 4-2 win over Boston University and a 6-1 romp over Bowdoin. Stan Wallace coached the team and Wilmer Elliott, who also played on the football team, was the captain.

Following the season's end, the hockey program was re-evaluated and it was decided to discontinue the sport, primarily because of the problem of maintaining a suitable ice surface. The Athletic Board recommended that as soon as an indoor facility could be built, hockey should be restored as a varsity sport.

Time passed, 52 years to be exact, before hockey could be revived at Maine. This second era of college hockey began with a proposal and gift from Harold Alfond, a long-time friend of the University. Alfond's generous gift of \$400,000 enabled the University to begin construction of an indoor facility.

Shortly afterward, Jack Semler, then head coach at Princeton, was hired as Maine's first full-time hockey coach. Construction of Alfond Arena proceeded and a team was selected in the fall of 1977 to compete in the ECAC Division II East league.

Hockey returned to the Orono campus on the night of November 18, 1977 when the Black Bears defeated Acadia University, 7-5.

The 1977-78 Black Bears were competitive in the league all year and with a 15-12 overall mark narrowly missed the playoffs.

A year later, Maine won the ECAC-East regular season crown and, in the process, defeated three Division I teams: RPI, Northeastern and Vermont. Maine was seeded first in the playoffs and easily handled American International, 4-1, in the quarter-finals before a highly partisan home crowd. Four days later, however, the Bears fell to Salem State, 7-4, in the semi-final game also held at Alfond. Although the loss put a small damper on the season it couldn't take away from an otherwise outstanding 25-8-1 season.

Almost from the beginning, the intention of the University was to eventually field a Division I hockey team. That goal was reached in 1979 when Maine was granted Division I status by the NCAA and the ECAC.

The Black Bears leaped into Division I competition with some immediate success. Before the end of December, Maine had defeated Northeastern, Brown, Princeton, Boston College and New Hampshire.

Although no longer fighting for a home ice berth, key wins over Harvard (5-3), New Hampshire (6-5 OT), Boston University (8-7) and Providence (6-5) helped Maine's cause. With a week left in the season, the final playoff spot boiled down to either Maine or Cornell.

However, the Big Red reeled off wins in their final two games to earn the berth.

A year later, however, the Bears pulled everything together and posted a 23-11 overall record and a fourth place finish in the ECAC. During the season, Jim Tortorella achieved the distinction of being the first ECAC goalie to score a goal. It happened at the RPI Invitational Tournament against Vasby, a Swedish amateur team. Maine was leading 11-1 late in the game when UM goalie Jim Tortorella made a routine clearing of the puck. Untouched by anyone, the puck hit the side board and headed straight for the Vasby net. Goalie Robert Nyquist skated forward to play the puck but somehow got confused and mishandled his stick. The puck bounced over the blade and deflected into the net. Both Tortorella's stick and puck are now on display in the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame in Eveleth, Minn.

Under the ECAC's playoff seeding rules, UM was seeded fifth in the league tournament and travelled to Cornell. Maine was in the game through two periods, but Cornell scored three unanswered goals that gave them a 7-4 win.

After the 1980-81 season, 15 players were lost to graduation and Jeff Nord unexpectedly turned pro leaving behind a young and inexperienced team. Maine suffered through an 8-21 season in 1981-82 and then lost several other players to graduation including All-American Andre Aubut. The 1982-83 squad finished in last place in the ECAC with a mark of 5-24.

Things began to improve in 1983-84 as Maine began a climb out of the cellar. But, injuries to key players took their toll and the Bears ended up with a 14-20 record and a 13th place finish in their final year in the ECAC.

Maine then entered a new era and made a commitment to compete with the best hockey programs in the country. It began in August 1983, when Maine became the sixth member of the HOCKEY EAST Association. Membership in HOCKEY EAST gave the team much greater exposure and a tougher schedule.

In January 1984, founding coach Jack Semler stepped down after seven seasons to devote more time to his family. He was replaced by Shawn Walsh, a highly successful assistant coach from Michigan State.

The 1984-85 season saw Maine become competitive against its HOCKEY EAST and WCHA opponents despite a 12-29-1 record. During the season, Maine earned victories over powers such as Michigan Tech, North Dakota, league regular season champion Boston College and three wins over NCAA runner-up Providence.

The 1985-86 season saw Maine ice one of its youngest teams ever, but one that showed great potential. The year was highlighted by a two-game series sweep of Colorado College, and an early-February three-game winning streak. Freshmen Al Loring, Jack Capuano, Bruce Major, Eric Weinrich and Bob Corkum all had very fine rookie campaigns to provide Maine hockey supporters with an optimistic attitude for the future.



# THE COACHING STAFF

## SHAWN WALSH

### Head Coach

Shawn Walsh, the chief architect in the rebuilding of the Maine hockey program, is in his third year as head coach.

At Maine, Walsh has gone 23-57-2, but the improvements which he has made in the program have only begun to show. In the past three recruiting classes, Walsh and his staff have brought in 25 players, nine of which are NHL draft picks. Shawn has also demanded a strong work-ethic and good academics from his players, thereby improving team discipline.

The 31-year-old native of White Plains, New York, is the youngest coach in NCAA Division I hockey, but he certainly is not lacking in experience.

Walsh is a 1978 graduate of Bowling Green. He earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees in health and education from that institution. He was a backup goaltender for the Falcons behind All-CCHA selections Al Sarachman and Mike Liut for two seasons. As a junior, Walsh suffered a severe knee injury that ended his collegiate playing career.

Shawn then began to concentrate on coaching, and worked with current New York Rangers head coach Ted Sator at a high school program in Ohio. In his senior year at BGSU, Walsh coached the junior varsity team, and also worked with head coach Ron Mason at the varsity level. Walsh remained at Bowling Green for two additional seasons under Mason before the two men decided to move on to Michigan State to boost that sagging program.

Prior to Mason and Walsh arriving at MSU in 1979, the Spartans had failed to qualify for the WCHA playoffs in three straight seasons. While at MSU, Walsh helped lead Michigan State to three consecutive CCHA titles and to the NCAA finals in 1983-84, his final year. Walsh deserves much of the credit for building the Michigan State program to 1985 NCAA champions.

In 1981, Walsh was named head coach of the Great Lakes entry in the National Sports Festival. His team went through the tournament undefeated to capture the gold medal.

Shawn serves on the Board of Governors of the American Hockey Coaches Association, and is the Director of both the Maine and Elite Hockey Schools. The Elite Hockey School specializes in teaching professional players. Walsh has also instructed at the Huron Hockey School for nine years.

Shawn is single and lives in Veazie.

## JAY LEACH

### Assistant Coach

Jay has made an enormous impact on the Black Bear hockey program in his three years at Maine. The 33-year-old native of Winchester, Mass., is the team's primary recruiter and has been responsible for bringing in many of the talented Black Bear underclassmen. In addition to his recruiting responsibilities, Leach also assists Walsh with on-ice practices.

Jay came to Maine from Merrimack College, after spending two seasons with the Warriors

as an assistant coach and recruiter.

Leach is a 1978 graduate of New Haven who earned a degree in business administration, and played for the Charger hockey team. During his senior year, he coached the Choate-Rosemary Hall hockey team and managed the campus arena.

Leach went on to play professionally in the Quebec Nordiques organization for teams in Syracuse, N.Y., and Erie, Penn. He later played for the Minnesota North Stars affiliate in Nashville, before retiring as a player in 1980. Jay spent two years in business before accepting his appointment at Merrimack in 1982.

Jay is one of four hockey-playing Leach brothers. Brother Jon played for Maine from 1977 until 1981, Mark was a member of the St. Lawrence University's team in the late 1970's, and Steve is a member of the NHL's Washington Capitals.

Jay and his wife, Jean, live in Orono.

## BRUCE CROWDER

### Assistant Coach

Bruce brings a great deal of hockey experience with him to Maine as he begins his first year of collegiate coaching. The 29-year-old is a native of Essex, Ontario, who is best known for a four-year NHL career in which he played for the Boston Bruins and Pittsburgh Penguins.

At Maine, Bruce's responsibilities will include on-ice assistance at practice, some recruiting work, and closely monitoring the academic progress of the student-athletes. Bruce is a 1979 graduate of the University of New Hampshire who majored in physical education. He feels that the most positive attributes he brings to the position are his teaching ability and profes-

sional experience.

Bruce's NHL hockey experience will bring him instant respect from players. As a player, Bruce was an aggressive, grinding-type winger with a tremendous work-ethic and was very effective in Boston. His brother Keith played with him in Boston for three seasons, and last year Keith led the Bruins in scoring.

Bruce and his wife, Lucie, have two sons, Kevin and Scott, and they live in the Orono area.

## DAVE WESTBY

### Assistant Coach

Dave is a new member of the Black Bear coaching staff for the 1986-87 season. The 25-year-old will be responsible for pre-game scouting, videotape post-game analysis, liaison with the Friends of Maine Hockey group and on-ice assistance at practice.

Dave is a native of Woodbury, Minn., and played with former Maine assistant coach Mike Piette at Wisconsin-River Falls. Westby was a defenseman on the 1983 NAIA champion Wisconsin-R.F. club, and he earned his degree in business administration from River Falls in 1985.

Coming out of high school, Dave had an opportunity to obtain a football scholarship to North Dakota, but chose a collegiate hockey career instead.

Dave's hockey background is diverse. He has experience in coaching, officiating and scouting. He has coached youth hockey players aged six to 16 in Wisconsin, and also worked at the Maine Hockey School this past summer.

At Maine Dave will enroll in the MBA program to continue his studies. He is single and will reside in Orono during the academic year.

## JOE CLARK

### Assistant Coach

Joe is in his first season as an assistant coach at Maine. His main responsibility will be to work with the Black Bears' three young goaltenders. He will also coordinate the team's statistics.

The 25-year-old native of Augusta is no stranger to the nets himself, as he excelled for Cony High School before graduating in 1979.

After completing high school, Clark began working as a sportswriter at the Kennebec Journal. He also served as an assistant coach at Gardiner High School, helping them to a pair of state hockey championships in five seasons. At Gardiner, Joe worked primarily with the defense and goaltenders, and he will bring this experience to Maine.

While at Maine, Clark plans on finishing his degree in journalism, a field which he is considering returning to if he decides to leave coaching.

Joe has served as head coach of the Maine Midget team which competed in the Yankee Conference All-Star Festival. He has also coached at the Phillips-Exeter Academy in New Hampshire, and the University of Maine Hockey School.

Joe is single and will reside in Orono during the year.

## THE SUPPORT STAFF

### PHIL MATEJA — Hockey Trainer

One of the most important persons connected with the UM hockey team is trainer Phil Mateja. An assistant trainer in the UM athletic department, he became the hockey trainer at the start of the 1983-84 season. As the team's first line of medical care, he is responsible for looking after the physical well-being of the players and to call in professional help when required. A native of Illinois, Phil has been a part of the UM athletic scene for 12 years. He was a student trainer at the University of Missouri and, after graduating, took his certification exam in June, 1974. Shortly after, he was hired at Maine as an assistant to long-time head trainer Wes Jordan. At first, he worked with the Black Bears junior varsity teams and then with the varsity basketball team until his recent shift to hockey. Besides his duties with the hockey team, he also works with the football team during pre-season. Phil, his wife, Judy, and son, Jeff, live in Orono.

### STEVE JONES — Equipment Manager

Steve is in his sixth year at the University of Maine. However, this will be his first season working full-time with the hockey program. His responsibilities will include maintenance of the equipment, overseeing the student assistant managers and skate-sharpening.

Jones was a student manager at Brewer High School for four years before accepting his current position at Maine. He also works closely with the football, basketball and baseball programs at Maine.

The 25-year-old is a native of Milford, Maine, and now lives in the Orono area.

# 1986-87 OUTLOOK



One look at the credentials of the 1986-87 Maine hockey team gives you the impression that this is a program on the rise. Only a handful of NCAA teams can boast having 10 NHL draft picks on their roster, seven of which have been selected in the last two drafts.

The nucleus of the 1986-87 Black Bears is made up of underclassmen, as 19 players on the 28-man roster have yet to reach their junior year. "We are in the situation now where our predominant classes will be the freshmen and sophomores," says head coach Shawn Walsh.

Walsh, now in his third year with Maine, has put together this Black Bear team with three successive strong recruiting years. Many experts rate his last two recruiting classes among the best in the country.

By virtue of this, Maine also has one of the youngest teams in the country, as more than one-half of the roster is less than 20 years old. Over the next two years, Maine can expect to lose only nine players to graduation.

The 1985-86 Black Bears went 11-28-1 through one of the nation's most difficult schedules, finishing fifth in the tough HOCKEY EAST with an 8-25-1 conference mark. The Bears finished only six points out of fourth place, and home-ice advantage for the playoffs. Fourteen of Maine's 28 losses were by two goals or less, indicating how competitive they were last season.

This year's HOCKEY EAST/WCHA composite schedule will find Maine facing Hockey East opponents in a double home-and-home series, and WCHA teams only once each.

Walsh's team goal for the season is to improve in the point standings, since he feels that all of the clubs in the HOCKEY EAST will be improved. "It would be a great accomplishment if we could give our tremendously loyal fans an opportunity to see a home playoff game," says Walsh.

"Offensively," says Walsh, "we will be looking to improve our special situations unit, and we will use training camp to evaluate personnel who can help out on the powerplay." The presence of right winger Mike Golden (13-16-29 in 24 games) for a full season, along with the development of many of last year's young players could help out in this area.

"In the defensive end, I would like to see us reduce our goals against-average (5.02 in 1985-86) by at least one-half goal per game," says Walsh. "Our main emphasis will be to work with our young defense."

Gone from the '85-'86 Black Bear team are John McDonald (11-24-35), Ron Hellen (12-12-24), Scott Smith (6-15-21), Neil Johnson (1-7-8), Ray Roy (1-1, 6.33), Jean Lacoste (2-6, 4.55), Tom McComb (0-4-4), Dewey Wahlin (0-3-3) and Shawn Anderson (5-8-13).

Here is a look at the 1986-87 Black Bears by position:

## GOALIES:

This position is expected to be Maine's greatest strength this season, with sophomore Al Loring and freshman Scott King expected to share the netminding duties.

Loring (8-21-1, 5.03), who was last year's HOCKEY EAST Co-Rookie of the Year, earned the No. 1 goaltender role last season with his consistent play. His 963 saves last season set a Maine single-season record, while his 830 HOCKEY EAST saves was the second highest total in league history. His 60 saves against North Dakota (11/29/85) established a Maine and HOCKEY EAST record.

King, a 1986 10th-round draft pick of the Detroit Red Wings, played for Vernon of the British Columbia Junior Hockey League last year. Coincidentally, Loring and King were foes

in the BCJHL two years ago, earning first and second team All-Star recognition respectively in that league.

The third goaltender in camp is Tim Adams, a recruited walk-on from Northport, N.Y. He is expected to add depth to the position.

"The biggest thing that we are looking for from the goalies is consistency," says Walsh. "I think that Scott's presence will ease the pressure on Al."

## DEFENSE:

It may sound contradictory, but the best way to describe the Maine defense is young and experienced.

Leading the defense will be junior tri-captain Dave Nonis (3-10-13), and sophomore tri-captain Jack Capuano (9-18-27), who tied a HOCKEY EAST record for goals by a defenseman in a season with nine.


Gardiner native Eric Weinrich (0-15-15) is also expected to be a major force, as he led Maine in plus/minus statistics last season as a freshman.

The two other returning defensemen are Bangor's Vince Guidotti, a forward who was moved back to defense for the final one-third of last season, and John Baker (1-0-1) a senior who won the Coaches Award last year.

A key addition will be Bob Beers (6-2, 199), a sophomore eligible immediately after transferring from the folded Northern Arizona program. Beers was a 10th-round 1985 Boston Bruins draft pick.

Incoming freshmen Claudio Scremin (6-1, 183) and Jim Burke (6-2, 201) will add size and depth to the defense.

"It will be very interesting to watch how our defense develops this season," says Walsh. "It could be the position that dictates our fortunes."

#### LEFT WING:

This position is one that Walsh expects to be much stronger this season.

Sophomore Bruce Major (14-14-28) led Maine in goals last season, and was third among HOCKEY EAST's rookie scorers.

Junior tri-captain Mike McHugh (9-10-19) of Bowdoin and sophomore Chris Cambio (10-7-17) will be counted on to have good seasons. Senior Jay Mazur (5-7-12) will also be tried on the left side, after playing predominately at right wing during his career.

Freshmen Christian Lalond (6-0, 176) and John Massara (6-0, 178) are expected to push the veterans for playing time.

#### CENTER:

The center position is one that coach Walsh needs to get more offensive production from if Maine is to be successful this season.

Junior Dave Wensley (13-18-31) is the top returning scorer for the Black Bears. Sophomore Todd Jenkins (7-7-14) hopes to rebound from an injury-filled campaign and contribute more to the scoring.

Freshman Dave Capuano, a second-round 1986 draft pick of the Pittsburgh Penguins, has enormous potential and could be a big plus on the power play.

Junior Todd Studnicka (6-5-11) and recruit Chuck Santoro (5-8, 153) will add depth at center.

#### RIGHT WING:

On the right side, for the first time during Walsh's tenure, there should be a battle for playing time.

Leading the way for Maine should be Mike Golden (13-16-29) who will be entering his first full season. Golden was a second-round 1984 pick of the Edmonton Oilers, and was impressive at the 1986 National Sports Festival.

Bob Corkum (7-16-23), a third-round '86 Buffalo draft pick, is coming off a very productive first year, and also played well at the 1986 Sports Festival.

Defensive-specialist Steve Santini (8-10-18) and junior Rob Braccia (2-3-5) should play important roles for Maine. Redshirt freshman Jim Blouin of Lewiston and incoming freshman Guy Perron (5-9, 156) will add depth to this position.







The formation of HOCKEY EAST is a major event not only for college hockey but for intercollegiate athletics as a whole. Not since the formation of The BIG EAST Conference has a league had as much impact on a sport as has HOCKEY EAST. The birth of HOCKEY EAST has brought together seven of the strongest hockey programs in the east, each with a major commitment to both academic excellence and athletic competition. Right from the start, the league members determined that the association would be run in a first class manner. That commitment to excellence has paid off with the success of a joint scheduling agreement with the Western Collegiate Hockey Association (WCHA), the first such agreement in the history of intercollegiate athletics. The agreement provides regular season games between the two associations with the games counting in both league standings.

Almost immediately after it was announced that the five charter members had formed a new hockey conference the comparisons to The BIG EAST Conference began. Two of HOCKEY EAST's charter members, Boston College and Providence, are also members of the well-known basketball conference. But while The BIG EAST is a multi-sport association, HOCKEY EAST was formed solely as a hockey league. Hopeful of the same national interest that basketball creates, the founding AD's faced the task of trying to adapt the example of The BIG EAST to the sport of hockey. Three years of hard work have proven that the course of action was the right one.

One of the major attractions of HOCKEY EAST is the strength of its teams. Two of 1985's NCAA Final Four teams were from HOCKEY EAST, Boston College and Providence. It marked the first time a new league has placed two of its teams in the national finals other than by default. One of the teams, Providence, finished in second place after a tight loss to eventual champion R.P.I., 2-1. HOCKEY EAST teams won 11 ECAC titles between 1962 and 1984 and, since 1971, have won three NCAA championships and finished second twice.

Another major attraction is the fact that HOCKEY EAST is centered around the greater Boston metro area, the most important center of population east of New York. With a population of 4.5 million to draw on, the association is showcasing its talents in one of the prime areas of the country.

The impetus behind the formation of HOCKEY EAST came as a result of a move by the presidents of the six Ivy League schools to form their own hockey league outside the ECAC structure. At first only a rumor, the intentions of

the Ivy group were confirmed at an ECAC meeting in early June 1983. As a result of the confirmation, the athletic directors of Boston College, Boston University, New Hampshire, Northeastern and Providence met at BU's Case Center to decide upon a course of action. As the meeting progressed, the AD's realized that they had two choices: take a positive step and initiate their own league or take a negative step by sitting back and waiting to see what might happen. The five officials decided the positive step was the right action to take. A month later, the AD's reconvened and officially formed HOCKEY EAST. They also sent out letters of invitation to other interested schools and approved a number of policies regarding league play. The University of Maine became the first expansion member of the group followed by the University of Lowell.

HOCKEY EAST is an organization whose time has come. With the advent of such a league, items such as coordinated schedules, league marketing and a full-time league staff have been introduced to eastern college hockey for the first time. But above all else, the most important thing about HOCKEY EAST is that each of its seven member institutions is committed to developing and maintaining a balance of academic excellence and athletic competition second to none. That is, and always will be, the first priority of the HOCKEY EAST Association.
