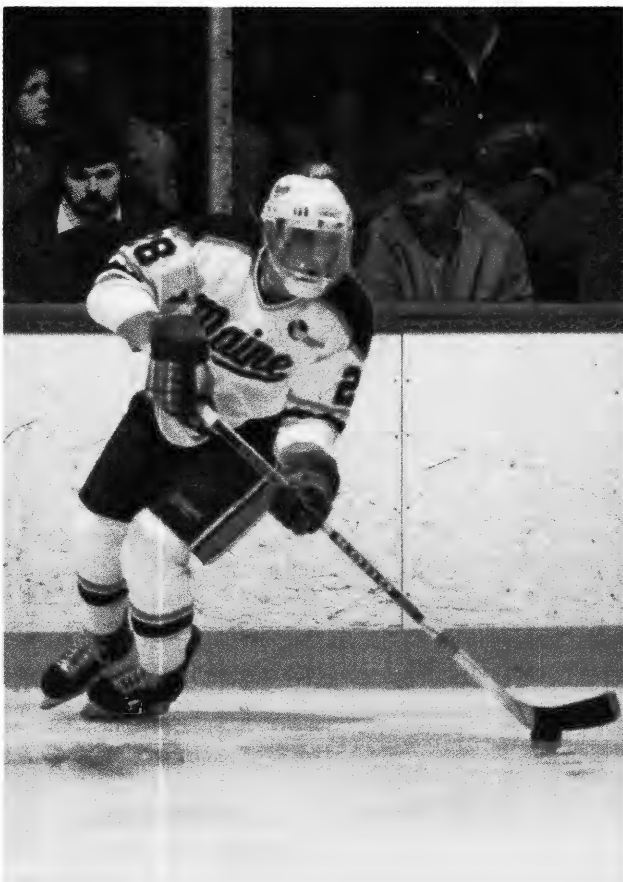

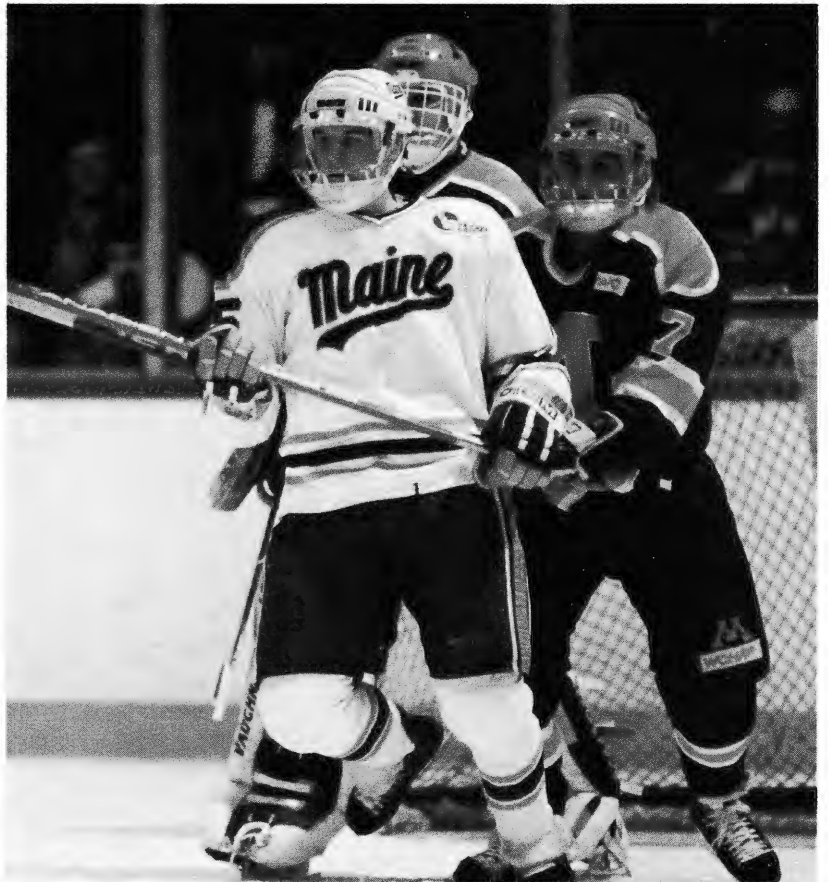

The University of Maine

The University of Maine, located in Orono, is the largest campus in the statewide university system. There is plenty of elbow room on its 1,200 acres, where the student is offered the diversity and challenge of a large university in the invigorating atmosphere of a small college. The campus at Orono is in a classic New England setting, located ten miles north of Bangor, Maine's third largest city. The region is conveniently located close to ski slopes, outdoor recreation areas, and the beautiful Maine coastline.

The University offers an outstanding faculty with a variety of exciting and challenging course opportunities. Baccalaureate degree programs are offered through eight colleges: Applied Sciences and Agriculture, Arts and Humanities, Business Administration, Education, Engineering and Technology, Forest Resources, Sciences, and Social and Behavioral Sciences. The campus houses

the expansive Raymond Fogler Library and a number of respected research facilities to give the student an excellent learning environment.

Students from 37 states and 36 countries studied at the Uni-

versity last year, and more than 20 percent of the total enrollment of 12,800 is admitted from outside the state of Maine.

There are seven scholastic honor societies, four non-scholastic honor societies, 22 departmental



honor societies, 56 associations, clubs, and organizations, and six religious groups. Fifteen fraternities and eight sororities have chapters in Orono. In short, a variety of opportunities exists for students, both academically and socially, outside of the classroom. Also, the Maine Center for the Arts, hosting concerts, comedy, theatre, recitals, and other popular entertainment, is located on campus and features nationally and world renowned entertainers.

Maine offers its students, the community and the state an outstanding athletic tradition. Black Bear teams have excelled in a number of sports reaching regional and national prominence.

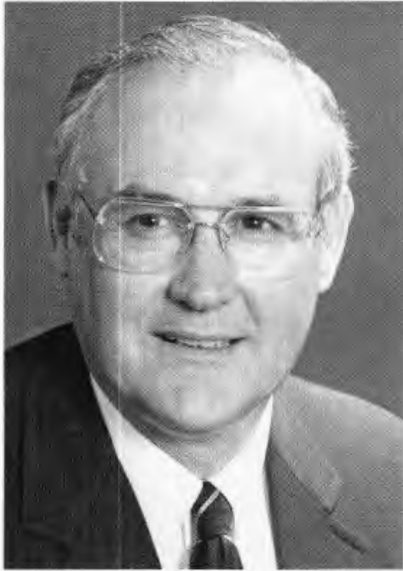
Maine's Athletic Department has hired a full-time academic coordinator responsible for closely

monitoring the progress of each of the 600 varsity student-athletes at the University. The individual sport coaches also monitor and advise their student-athletes, frequently holding meetings to specifically discuss academic situations. Study halls and special tutorial sessions are used daily as a way to enhance the learning process. This support and close scrutiny has been a major reason why the overall grade point average of student-athletes at Maine has been higher than that of the general student body. The goal of the University and the athletic department is to see each individual reach his or her academic potential.

The Recreation and Intramural Department offers organized competition in a number of events

throughout the year, from basketball and softball to team tennis, flag football, and soccer, to name a few. There are also open facilities available to the student for pickup games. Maine's 20 Division I athletic teams host more than 100 intercollegiate events on campus each year. The University offers the student a wide spectrum of possibilities to enhance the overall college experience.





DR. DALE LICK **President**

Dr. Dale W. Lick, 52, was named the 15th president of the University of Maine Sept. 1, 1986. He begins his fifth year of leadership at Orono this fall.

In making the announcement of Lick's appointment in 1986, Francis Brown, Chairperson of the Presidential Search Committee, described Dr. Lick as "an outstanding educator, an experienced academic leader, and an effective administrator and spokesman for higher education.

"He has the academic vision, personal skills and depth of experience to lead Maine into a new era of achievement as the State's leading research university," said Brown. Lick has proven his effectiveness as an administrator creating productive change on the Orono campus.

Dr. Lick came to Maine after serving eight years as President of Georgia Southern University in Statesboro, Ga. During his tenure at Georgia Southern, he was a guiding force in moving the school's athletic programs into Division I and for the Georgia Southern football team's back-to-back Division I-AA national championships.

A graduate of Michigan State University, where he obtained his baccalaureate and master's degrees

in mathematics, Dr. Lick earned his doctorate at the University of California at Riverside.

Prior to taking the presidency of Georgia Southern, he was Dean of the School of Sciences and Health Professions at Old Dominion University, Vice President for Academic Affairs at Russell Sage College and Chairman of the math department at Drexel University.

At Maine, Lick has seen applica-

tions for admission rise 15 per cent in 1988 alone. During that same time, the standards for admissions have risen as well. Dr. Lick was responsible for the hiring of athletic director Dr. Kevin White, and athletic programs have grown toward national prominence during their tenure.

Dr. Lick is married and he and his wife, Marilyn, have three children.





DR. THOMAS ACETO
Vice President for
Administration

Dr. Thomas Aceto, 53, has served as a vice president at the University of Maine since 1978. Initially appointed as Vice President for Student Affairs, Dr. Aceto served dual vice presidencies for Student Affairs and Finance, and Administration from 1984-87. He was appointed Vice President for Administration in 1987.

Regarded as an administrator who has accomplished lofty goals, Dr. Aceto assumed responsibility for UM Athletics in 1985 and has had an important behind the scenes impact on the program ever since.

His responsibilities at the University, beyond athletics, include the Business Office, University Bookstore, Purchasing, Facilities Management, Public Safety, Environmental Safety, Human Resources, Children's Center, University of Maine Press, and the Maine Center for the Arts.

Prior to his appointment at Maine, Aceto served as Vice President for Student Affairs at The State University of New York at Plattsburgh where he supervised athletics and was responsible for initiating an NCAA Division III ice hockey program which has developed into

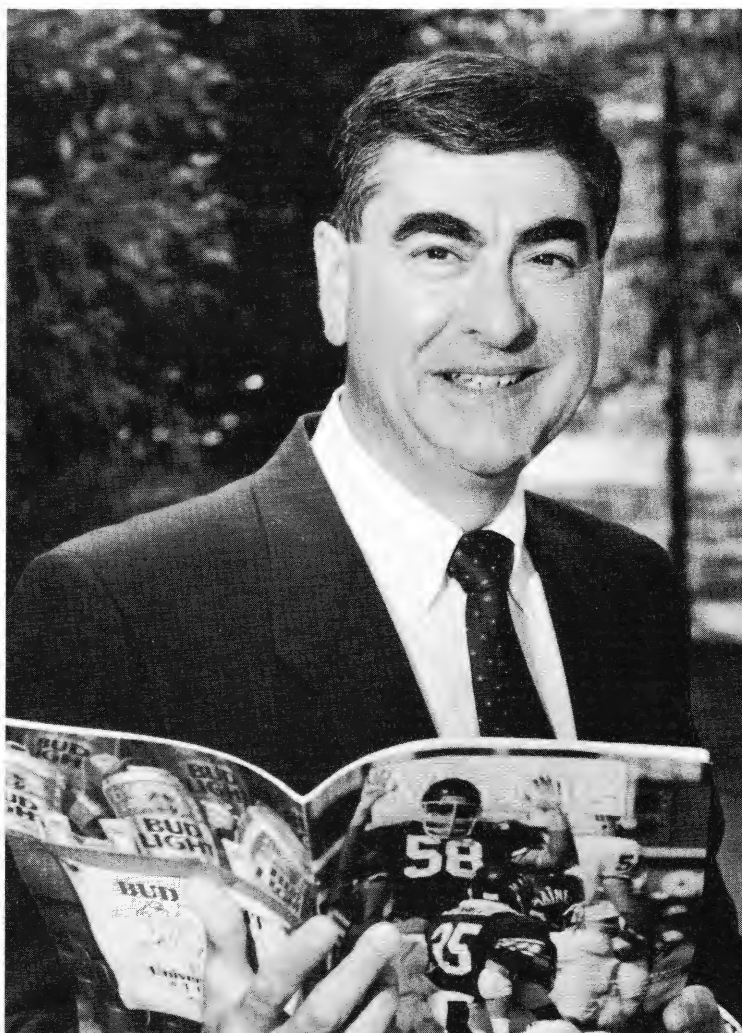
one of the top programs in the nation. During his tenure at Plattsburgh, he played a key role in the founding of the Empire State Games, a state-wide summer sports festival patterned after the Olympic games.

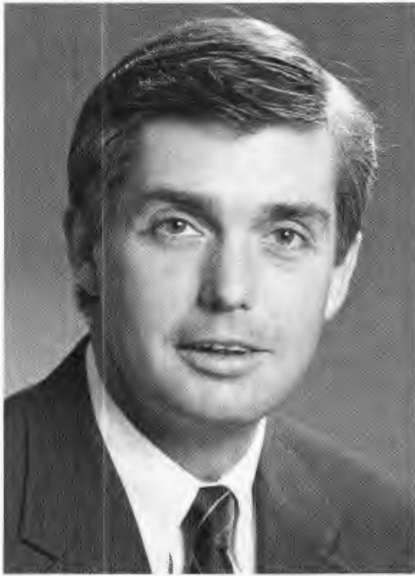
Dr. Aceto has also served as Dean of Student Affairs at Keene State College, Dean of Students at Eastern Michigan University, a graduate instructor at Syracuse University, Assistant Dean at The State University of New York at Geneseo, and Director of Student Aid at Clarkson University.

A 1959 graduate of The State

University of New York at Potsdam, Aceto was awarded a master's degree in personnel studies from Southern Illinois University in 1961. He received his doctorate in Higher Education Administration from Indiana University in 1967. He also attended the Institute for Educational Management at Harvard University in 1985, and has served on the boards and commissions of several national educational organizations.

Dr. Aceto is married, and he and his wife, Susan, have two children.





DR. KEVIN WHITE
Director of Athletics

Dr. Kevin White, 39, is in his fourth year as Director of Athletics at the University of Maine. Regarded as an innovative and progressive administrator, White has very quickly made an impact on the athletic department's staff, scholarship funds, academic services, facilities, fund-raising, marketing, corporate sponsorship efforts and broadcast properties.

Athletic and recreation facilities have been a major focus lately at the University of Maine and White has worked with university officials to facilitate the \$1.2 million Memorial Gym Renovation and Addition project. He was also a driving force behind Harold Alfond's \$2 million donation to increase the capacity of Alfond Arena to 6,000 for hockey and 6,500 for basketball. Other major projects include renovation of the Memorial Gym Lobby by the Graduate M Club, the new Mahaney Diamond baseball clubhouse, and a new all-weather running track.

A primary consideration for White has been having a top quality personnel. Over the past several years, Maine has seen the recruitment and hiring of several coaches and administrators from among the nation's top major universities.

University of Maine broadcast properties have also seen growth under White's guidance. State-wide

Black Bear radio and television networks have been formed for the first time with multi-year agreements involving Maine Broadcasting Systems of Portland and WABI of Bangor.

Prior to his appointment at Maine, White was at Loras College in Dubuque, Iowa. At Loras, he served in several capacities, including Athletic Director and Assistant to the President for Institutional Marketing, Promotions and Special Events, and Vice President. His most recent assignment at Loras was Vice President for College Development, where he oversaw a successful \$15 million capital campaign and an annual fund drive in excess of \$1 million. Additionally, White is the founder and served as the Executive Director of the National Catholic Basketball Tournament in Dubuque. The NCBT annually invites 32 Catholic colleges from around the country to play 40 games over a four-day period, culminating in a live national cable telecast of the finals. White is presently a member of the NCBT advisory board.

Prior to his tenure at Loras, he was the assistant to the athletic

director and head track coach at Southeast Missouri State University and the head track coach at Central Michigan University. A highly successful college coach, White guided 22 NCAA Division I and II All-Americans and two national champions.

With a varied background, he has served as director of numerous special events, including the State of Michigan Special Olympics, NCAA Division II National Cross Country Championships, and the Coors Semotion Relays at Southeast Missouri. He also served as sprint, hurdle and relay analyst for Saudi Arabia and as an executive fitness consultant for Aramco International of Saudi Arabia in 1978.

A graduate of St. Joseph's College in Rensselaer, Ind., White earned his master's degree in athletic administration from Central Michigan University. He received his doctorate in education from Southern Illinois in 1983. His post-doctoral work includes attendance at Harvard University's Institute for Educational Management in 1985. In 1989, he was named to the NCAA Executive Council Nominating Committee. He is married, and he and his wife, Jane, have four children.

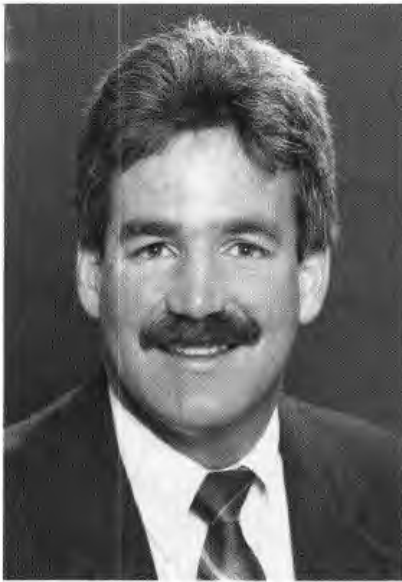

In his six seasons at Maine, Shawn Walsh has delivered Black Bear hockey fans a top national contender. He inherited a sub-par ECAC team, and turned it into a perennial HOCKEY EAST contender. Walsh's intensity and strong work ethic have been key ingredients in the rise of Maine hockey. Twice in the past three seasons, the Black Bears have reached the final four. In each of the last four years Maine has advanced to the NCAA Tournament. The Black Bears are the only team in the East to boast that accomplishment.

Despite receiving 85 per cent of its scoring from sophomores or freshmen, Walsh guided the 1989-90 Black Bears to a 33-11-2 overall record and a 14-6-1 HOCKEY EAST mark. Maine fell in the HOCKEY EAST Finals, but it marked their fourth consecutive trip to that game, the most in league history.

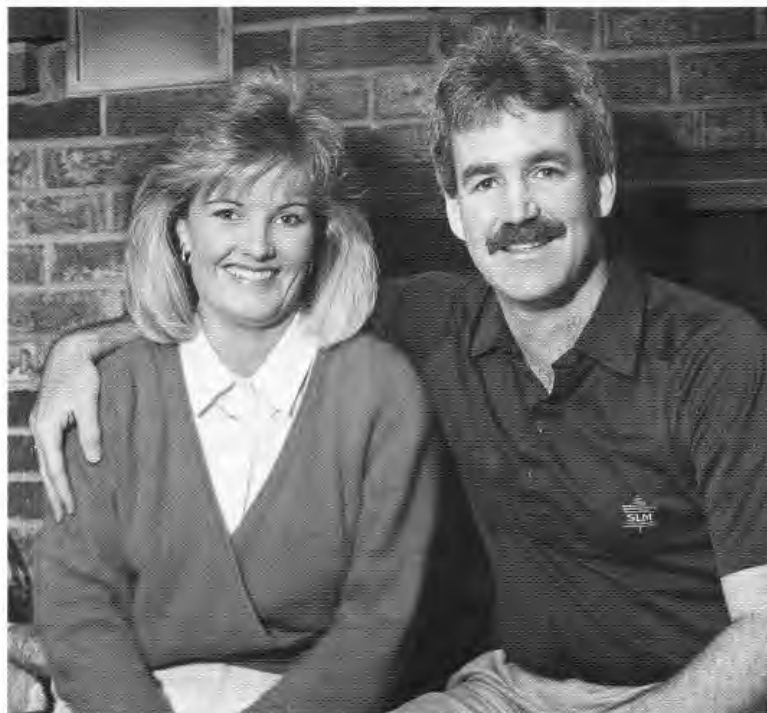
Walsh's career record stands at 145-106-8, a remarkable mark considering that his first two teams won 12 and 11 games, respectively. His record over the past four years is 122-49-6. With 145 victories, he has become the winningest coach in Maine hockey history.

Recruiting has certainly been a key to his success. His teams have produced nine All-Americans including a U.S. Olympian. The Black

Bears will enter the 1990-91 season with 16 NHL draft choices, one of the highest totals of any team in the nation.

Despite his impressive list of accomplishments, the 35-year old native of White Plains, New York, is one of the youngest coaches in Division I hockey. He is a 1978 graduate of Bowling Green State University, where he earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees in education.

It was there that he began to concentrate on coaching, working with current Boston Bruins assistant coach Ted Sator at a high school in Ohio. In his senior year at Bowling Green, Walsh coached the junior varsity hockey team, and also worked with head coach Ron Mason at the varsity level. Walsh remained at Bowling Green for two additional seasons with Mason, before the two men moved to Michigan State to



boost its sagging program.

Prior to Walsh and Mason arriving at MSU in 1979, the Spartans had failed to qualify for the WCHA playoffs in three straight seasons. While at MSU, Walsh helped lead the Spartans to three consecutive CCHA titles, and the NCAA finals in 1983-84, his final year.

In just his fourth season at Maine, Walsh guided the Black Bears to 34-8-2 record. Maine marched through HOCKEY EAST with a 20-4-2 record, clinching the title quicker than any team in history. Maine held the nation's number one ranking for the final eight weeks, before falling to national champion Lake Superior in the NCAA semi-finals.

For Walsh, the personal acco-

lades were soon to follow as he was the HOCKEY EAST Coach of the Year and New England Division I Coach of the Year in 1988. He followed that with HOCKEY EAST Coach of the Year honors again in 1990.

Walsh is the Director of the Maine and Sun Valley hockey schools. He is also the first Vice President of the American Hockey Coaches Association.

In December of 1989, he served as the head coach of Team USA which defeated the touring Soviet Spartak team in the Minolta Cup series.

This past summer, he guided the gold-medal winning Team North at the U.S. Olympic Sports Festival

in Minneapolis-St. Paul. He also coached the gold-medal winning team in 1981, giving him a perfect 8-0 record in Sports Festival competition.

His collegiate, national and international coaching successes, make him a leading candidate for an Olympic coaching position in the near future.

Walsh is married to the former Tracey Mason, and the couple resides in Veazie.





**GRANT
STANDBROOK**
Assistant Coach

Grant Standbrook is in his third season as Maine's primary recruiter. He also provides the Bears with a strong collegiate and international coaching background.

Since coming to Maine in 1988, Standbrook has coordinated the recruiting of two of the most promising freshman classes in Maine hockey history.

Grant was previously the recruiting coordinator at Wisconsin where he played an integral part in the Badgers winning three national championships during his 12-year tenure at that school. Wisconsin won the national title in 1976-77, 1980-81 and 1982-83 in addition to reaching the final four on two other occasions. Some of his top recruits at UW include current NHL players Scott Melanby (Philadelphia), Chris Chelios (Montreal), Pat Flatley (New York Islanders), Gary Suter (Calgary), and Mark Johnson (New Jersey).

In 1987-88, Grant was the head coach of Varese-Kronenberg of the Italian league. He led the team to a second place finish in the 10-team league.

He was an assistant coach of the 1976 U.S. Olympic hockey team, and the U.S. National teams in 1974 and 1975. He worked with head coach Bob Johnson, now the General Manager of the New York Rangers.

The 54-year old is a native of Winnipeg, Manitoba. He began his hockey coaching career at Churchill High School in Winnipeg. He currently runs the Grant Standbrook Hockey Training Center in Faribault, Minn.

A 1961 graduate of the University of Minnesota-Duluth, Standbrook captained the Bulldog hockey team his senior season.

He is married, and he and his wife, Joy, have three children.

GENDRON**
Assistant Coach

Red Gendron begins his first season with the Black Bears. Gendron replaces Bruce Crowder, who left to become the associate head coach at Lowell.

Gendron comes to Maine after a celebrated prep school coaching career at Bellows Free Academy in St. Albans, Vt. , where he coached for nine seasons. He was twice selected the Vermont Hockey League Coach of the Year. He was also a two time recipient of the National Federation of Interscholastic High School Coaches' Outstanding Person in Vermont Hockey.

Gendron has guided several U.S. national teams. In 1990, his U.S. Select 17 team went 2-0-1 at Minneapolis-St. Paul, including a victory over Team Canada. He has also been very active in the USA Hockey development programs, and serves as the Director of the Coaching Achievement Program for USA Hockey.

A 1979 graduate of New England College with his bachelor's degree in secondary education, Gendron was a four-year letterman on the hockey and baseball teams. He captained the Golden Bears' hockey team for three seasons, and was twice selected Most Valuable Player.

Gendron is married, and he and his wife, Janet, have two children, Katelyn, 7, and Allison, 5.





TIM WHITEHEAD
Assistant Coach

Tim Whitehead joins the Maine staff this season as he pursues his master's degree in education.

Whitehead comes to Maine from Middlebury College where he has spent the past two years as an assistant varsity hockey coach and head junior varsity hockey coach. His responsibilities with the Panthers included recruiting, practice, game planning, road trip coordination and the alumni hockey newsletter. Last season, Whitehead helped the Panthers to a 22-4-1 record and the ECAC East (Division II) finals.

Prior to his appointment at Middlebury, Whitehead was the player/head coach of the Herentals Ijshockey Club of the Belgian first division from 1986-87. While in Belgium, he also coordinated Herental's youth hockey program and was involved in several community projects.

Whitehead has also served as player/head coach of the Whitley Bay Ice Hockey Club from 1982-83, which competed in the British Premier Division; and as the General Manager and head coach of the Sportex Selects European Tour in 1989. Among his numerous summer hockey clinics are the Philadelphia Flyers Camp, Can-Am Hockey Clinic, Ocean Hockey School, Wissahickon Hockey Camp, and the Mennon Hockey School.

A 1985 graduate of Hamilton College, in Clinton, N.Y., Whitehead received his bachelor's degree in government. He has also taken graduate courses toward a master's degree at Trenton State College.

As the Black Bears' assistant coach, Whitehead's responsibilities will include working on-ice practice, video analysis and opponent scouting.

Tim is single, and serves as an in-house advisor for Alpha Tau Omega fraternity during the academic year.



CAMPBELL BLAIR
Undergraduate Assistant Coach

Joining the Black Bears this season as an undergraduate assistant coach is Campbell Blair, 24, who will continue to work toward his degree in education.

For the past two seasons, Blair was a defenseman with the Black Bears. In 44 games at Maine, he scored two goals and added 13 assists for 15 points.

Blair came to Maine after an outstanding career with the Vernon Lakers of the British Columbia Junior Hockey League. He was chosen the league's top defenseman in 1986-87, when he scored 38 goals and added 72 assists for 110 points in 52 games. The assists and points totals established single-season records for the BCJHL. In addition, Blair holds the BCJHL career scoring marks for assists and points.

Born in Glasgow, Scotland, Blair is a native of Prince George, British Columbia. He has spent the past four summers as a forest fighter in the British Columbia Forest Service.

Blair assisted coach Tim Whitehead in the pre-season cross-training program, designed to get the Black Bears in top physical condition before taking the ice on October 1. His responsibilities also include opponent scouting, video analysis, and on-ice instruction.

Blair is single and will reside in Orono during the academic year.



1990-91 Maine Hockey Outlook

Last year, Maine remained among the nation's college hockey elite with the team's third consecutive 30-win season and its fourth straight NCAA Tournament appearance. The Black Bears finished with a 33-11-2 overall record, and competed in the HOCKEY EAST Championship game for the fourth consecutive year.

Maine finished the regular season with a 14-16-1 league record, earning second place. The Black Bears posted a 7-3 victory over Lowell in the first game of their HOCKEY EAST playoff series, before shattering the post-season conference record book with a 16-0 dismantling of the Chiefs.

Maine then defeated Boston University, 3-1, before losing to Boston College, 4-3, in the HE finals.

The Black Bears continued their college hockey attendance standards, drawing more than 115,000 fans to Alford Arena. It marked the third straight season the Bears had drawn over 100,000 fans. Jean-Yves Roy and Keith Carney were

named second team All-Americans. In addition, head coach Shawn Walsh was honored with the HOCKEY EAST Coach of the Year Award for the second time in three seasons.

This season, Walsh once again goes to work with a talented cast, looking to carry on the excellence now expected of Maine hockey.

This young team will be without eight veteran players including several standouts lost from last year.

Key losses from the 1988-89 team include goalie Matt DelGuidice (16-4, 3.25), who signed with the Boston Bruins, foregoing his final year of eligibility.

Also lost were seniors Claudio Scremin (4-26-39), who signed with the Minnesota North Stars; Jim Burke (6-23-29), who signed with the Hartford Whalers; Guy Perron (13-13-26), who signed a contract to play with a professional team in Sweden; Christian Lalonde (2-13-15), who signed with the Pittsburgh Penguins; All-HOCKEY EAST goalie

Scott King (17-7-2, 2.63), who signed with the Detroit Red Wings; John Massara (2-4-6), Brian Bellefeuille (13-10-23) and Campbell Blair (0-4-4), now an assistant coach with the Black Bears.

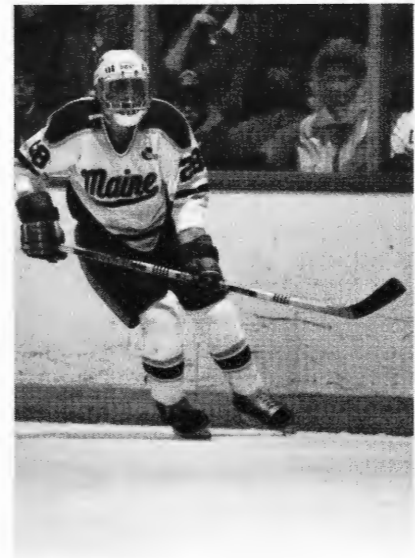
The team will once again face one of the toughest schedules in the nation. The Black Bears will play or are possible tournament opponents of seven of the nine teams (in addition to Maine) in *The Hockey News* pre-season top ten poll.

In addition to its difficult HOCKEY EAST schedule, the Black Bears host the annual Dexter Classic, and are the guests of the renowned Great Lakes Invitational. Maine also plays traditional WCHA power Denver, pre-season top five choice Northern Michigan, and the CCHA's Lake Superior State Lakers, national champions in 1988.

GOALIES:

The loss of Matt DelGuidice (16-4, 3.25 GAA, .891 SV%), who signed with the Boston Bruins in late August, leaves the Bears inexperienced in net.

But, freshman Mike Dunham brings very impressive credentials to Maine. He is expected to see considerable action in his first year. He was a third-round draft pick of the New Jersey Devils in this sum-



mer's NHL draft, making him the highest U.S.-born goalie selected. Last year at Canterbury Prep School in Connecticut, he was 27-6-1, with a 1.96 goals against average. In *The Hockey News* pre-season poll, he was voted the nation's number one freshman, and that was before the loss of DelGuidice.

Dunham was a standout at the Olympic Sports Festival this summer, playing for the silver medal East squad which lost only to Walsh's and DelGuidice's North squad, 2-1.

The other goalie who will be a factor is sophomore Garth Snow, who missed last season following wrist surgery. Snow was a sixth-round draft pick of the Quebec Nordiques in 1987. He saw limited action in 1988-89, sporting a 2-2 record and 3.49 goals against average.

DEFENSE:

The loss of three key defensemen from last season will leave Walsh with this important area to reconstruct for the upcoming season. Leading the returnees is second team All-American Keith Carney (3-41-44). He and senior Brian Straub (7-14-21) will team to form what could be one of the top defensive pairings in the nation. The other two experienced defensemen returning are junior Tony Link (0-3-3), and sophomore Dan Murphy (1-9-10). Redshirt freshman Jon Norton will also compete for a berth in the starting lineup.

There will be four freshmen counted upon to play important roles on the blue line this season. Matt Martin (12-29-41) of Avon Old Farms was a fourth-round draft pick of the Toronto Maple Leafs in 1989. At 6-foot-4, 210-pounds, he will add size, strength and offensive ability to the Maine defense. Jason Weinrich, younger brother of Eric Weinrich, a former All-American with the Black Bears and currently a defenseman with the New Jersey Devils, is also expected to contribute immediately. Weinrich stands 6-foot-3, 195-pounds, and was a sixth-round selection of the New York Rangers in the 1990 NHL Draft. The third rookie on the Black Bear blue line will be Chris Imes, who is

5-foot-11, 180-pounds. Last season he played for Notre Dame College in Wilcox, Saskatchewan. Imes attended the U.S. 18-and-over junior national camp. Dave MacIsaac comes to Maine from Arlington (Mass.) High School, where he was a Greater Boston League All-Star.

LEFT WING:

Leading the returnees at this position will be 1989 HOCKEY EAST Co-Rookie of the Year Scott Pellerin (22-34-56). Pellerin was the leading freshman scorer in the nation two seasons ago with 66 points. Last year, in addition to having a fine season at Maine, he played for the Gold Medal winning Canadian National Junior team in the World Championships. Sophomore Brian Downey (11-15-26) showed signs of the scoring touch that enabled him to record more than 200 points in his final year of junior hockey.

Sophomore Justin Tomberlin will see more playing time this season, and his offensive totals should increase accordingly. Last year he had 10 goals and seven assists for 17 points despite not being utilized on the powerplay. Sophomore Martin Mercier impressed when he was in the lineup scoring three goals and adding eight assists for 11 points in just 17 games. He possesses tremendous speed, and could be one of the team's biggest surprises this season. Sophomore Dave Lacouture will offer the Maine lineup a physical, strong defensive presence.

Freshman Patrice Tardif (62-40-102), who stands 6-foot-2, 190-pounds, broke Jean-Yves Roy's scoring records in the CJEP AA league last season. He was a third-round draft pick of the St. Louis Blues in this summer's NHL draft.

CENTER:

If strength in the middle is an important ingredient of a winning team, the Black Bears should be well on their way to a fifth consecutive successful season. Leading the list at this position is junior Martin Robitaille (24-28-52), who has earned the monicker Mr. March. Robitaille has been the Black Bears' scoring leader in post-season in each of the last two years, scoring

10 playoff goals last season. Despite his 5-foot-10, 170-pound frame, he has never missed a game at Maine in two full seasons. Sophomore Randy Olson (17-25-42) has proven to be one of the most talented players ever to wear the blue and white. His offensive creativity gives the Bears a quarterback for the powerplay, and a dangerous offensive threat every time he steps onto the ice.

Junior captain Mike Barkley (11-19-30) is coming off his best season at Maine. He combined excellent offensive output with his role as the Bears' checking center. Barkley is one of the hardest workers on the team, in addition to being one of its most complete players. Junior Steve Tepper (10-6-16) offers the Bears a tremendous physical presence on the fourth line. At 6-foot-4, 220-pounds, Tepper is immovable in front of the net or in the corners. Sophomore Eric Fenton (2-2-4) has a fine scoring touch, and could see considerable playing time.

RIGHT WING:

Maine is blessed with two of the premier right wingers in HOCKEY EAST in sophomores Jean-Yves Roy (39-26-65) and Jim Montgomery (26-34-60). Roy was a second team All-American as a freshman, leading all first-year players in goal scoring nationally. Montgomery was one of the team leaders down the stretch last season, and will play an important role again this year. Both Roy and Montgomery were named to the HOCKEY EAST All-Rookie team.

One of the sparkplugs for Maine last year was sophomore Kent Salfi (6-10-16). He was a defensive standout for Maine on the checking line and in penalty killing situations. Junior Steve Widmeyer (5-1-6), who was a 10th-round pick of the St. Louis Blues in this summer's NHL draft gives the Bears a strong physical presence on the right side. Freshman Matt McKerrow (Orono), and Chuck Texeira, a transfer from the University of Rhode Island, will press the veterans for playing time.

This Is HOCKEY EAST

HOCKEY EAST is one of the premier hockey conferences in the nation. The league is comprised of eight institutions of higher learning, including Boston College, Boston University, University of Lowell, University of Maine, Merrimack College, University of New Hampshire, Northeastern University and Providence College. HOCKEY EAST will begin its seventh season of intercollegiate ice hockey with the advent of the 1990-91 season.

HISTORY OF THE LEAGUE

The impetus behind the formation of HOCKEY EAST came as a result of a move by the presidents of six Ivy League schools in June of 1983 to form their own hockey league outside the ECAC structure. Rather than sit back and wait to see what might happen, the Athletic Directors at five non-ivy schools - Boston College, Boston University, New Hampshire, Northeastern and Providence - joined together to form the new college hockey conference. On July 11, 1983, the five schools became charter members, and later that same year, Maine and Lowell were added. Merrimack joined the league in January 1989, and completed its first year in the conference last season.

SUCCESS IN SEVEN SHORT YEARS

HOCKEY EAST has brought together eight strong college hockey programs, each with a major commitment to developing and maintaining a balance of academic excellence and strong athletic competition.

The caliber of student-athletes that HOCKEY EAST has been able to attract is second to none. During the 1989-90 season, over thirty of the top players in the league were named to the HOCKEY EAST Academic Honor Roll. Each student-athlete named to this honored group posted at least a 3.00 grade point average in each of the two semesters of the academic year. Scott King of Maine led the group with a 3.62 grade point average. Other HOCKEY EAST Honorees were three of the top college hockey players in the nation - Division I All-Americans Greg Brown, Rob Cowie and David Emma.

In addition to the classroom excellence, HOCKEY EAST teams have succeeded on the ice as well. Five times in six years, HOCKEY EAST has been represented in the NCAA final four (BC 1985 and 1990, BU 1990, Maine 1988 and 1989, and Providence 1985). Last year, for the second consecutive season, HOCKEY EAST placed three teams in the final eight, more than any other conference. Even more impressive, HOCKEY EAST sent two teams to the 1990 NCAA final four.

In just seven short years, HOCKEY EAST teams have proven themselves among the top teams in the nation. As a league, the 1989-90 HOCKEY EAST teams combined to post a winning percentage against each of the other three conferences. HOCKEY EAST teams posted a .700 winning percentage versus the CCHA, a .650 mark against the ECAC and a .521 percentage versus the WCHA.

Stuart P. Haskell, former Director of Athletics at the University of Maine, was appointed as HOCKEY EAST's second Commissioner on June 20, 1988. The HOCKEY EAST athletic directors agreed to the shared hiring of Haskell with the North Atlantic Conference. He also serves as the first full-time Commissioner of that eight-team multi-sport conference, a position which he accepted on January 1, 1988. Four institutions in HOCKEY EAST (BU, Maine, UNH and NU) also hold membership in the NAC. HOCKEY EAST and the North Atlantic Conference share office space at Orono, Me.

During Haskell's first year at the helm of HOCKEY EAST, he took a firm stand on high-sticking and fighting penalties and, throughout the first half of the 1989-90 season, several player suspensions were handed down from the Commissioner's office. His message was clear, and during the second half of the season, the average number of penalties per game was down from almost 19 to less than 13 per game.

Haskell was instrumental in league expansion, and on January 30, 1989, admitted Merrimack College as the eighth team in HOCKEY EAST. Also under Haskell's tenure, the league enjoyed successful championship tournaments at BC's new Conte Forum, a new three-year television contract was signed with the New England Sports Network, and an agreement was reached with the ECAC and the Boston Garden to hold the two league championships on the same weekend at Boston.

Haskell, a 1956 graduate of the University of Maine, was employed as a sports writer for the Bangor Daily News for a year following his graduation. In 1957, he joined the athletic department staff at his alma mater. During his 30-year tenure at Maine, Haskell served in a number of positions including Sports Information Director, Athletic Business Manager, and Assistant Athletic Director. He was named Director of Athletics in 1982.

Haskell and his wife, Gloria, have four children and five grandchildren. The Haskells reside in Stillwater, Me.

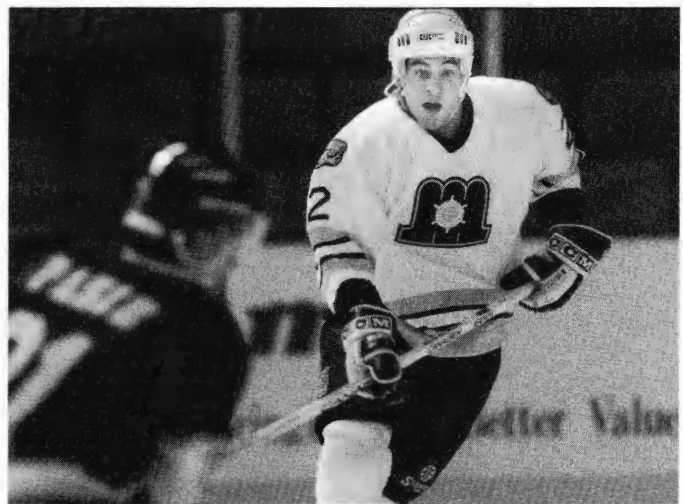

Alfond Arena Home of the Black Bears

One of the finest college hockey facilities in the country, the Harold Alfond Sports Arena has served the University community since 1977. Completed in February of that year, the building was dedicated by Mr. Alfond and officials of the University on November 18 at the Maine-Acadia hockey game.

Entering the 1990-91 season, the Black Bears had played before standing room only crowds in 83 consecutive games. Due to that demand, Alfond Arena expansion has been contemplated for a number of seasons, and with a \$2 million gift from Mr. Alfond, expansion is set to begin following the completion of the 1990-91 hockey season.

Mr. Alfond's generous gift represents the largest one-time (non-posthumous) cash contribution ever received by the University of Maine.

Since 1968, Mr. Alfond has donated more than \$4 million to the University of Maine.

The proposed construction calls for 70-foot by 140-foot additions to be put on the East and West sides of the Arena, adding 1,200 additional seats to each side.

With this increase in seating, Alfond Arena will be able to accommodate 6,000 fans for hockey contests.

Included in the Arena expansion proposed plans are additional concession areas and rest rooms, locker rooms, ticket offices and souvenir stands and improved media facilities.

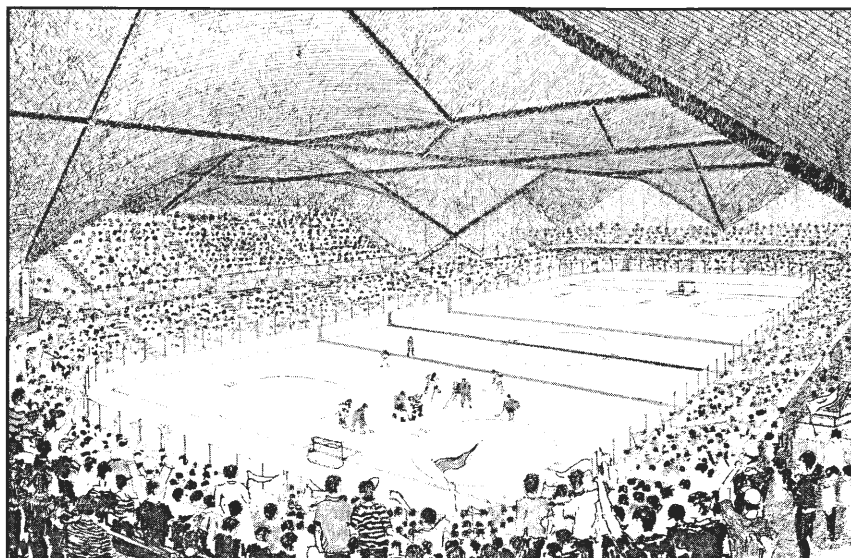
With the expansion, Alfond Arena will become the home of the Black Bear basketball teams, which have played home games at the Bangor Auditorium since 1988.

In addition to being the Home

of the Black Bears, the building is used by youth, high school and senior hockey leagues, and for concerts and graduation ceremonies.

The complex is a modern facility that has a standing room capacity of more than 4,100. There are virtually no obstructed seats in the building and everyone is afforded an excellent view of the ice.

Alfond Arena was built with the generous contributions of more than 2,000 people, headed by Harold Alfond. Athletic Academic Support

Each time Margaret Zillioux attends a University of Maine hockey game she sees more than a team of athletes. Her sights go beyond athletic achievement and into the academics and personalities which lie beneath the helmets, gloves, pads and blue and white uniforms.

As Assistant Athletic Director for Academic Support, Zillioux's responsibilities include making the student aware of existing support services on campus like the tutoring service, the career center or the faculty advisor program. She also makes sure the student is attending class on a regular basis.

"I work extremely closely with first-year students," says Zillioux. "I wear many different hats. Some students need help with time management. Others need faculty advice or mediating with coaches. I try to ensure that the athletes get off to a good start."

Head coach Shawn Walsh realizes first hand the importance of an education and the guidance an Academic Support Coordinator can provide. Early in his collegiate hockey career at Bowling Green, Walsh suffered a knee injury, but his classwork remained constant.

Both Walsh and Zillioux feel a strong, open relationship between coaches, athletes and support staff is a necessity for academic success.

"He is very enthusiastic about this plan," says Zillioux. "He's given me a lot of authority. We both want to prevent academic problems."

Zillioux feels Walsh's interest in academics is genuine, making her job more rewarding.

"He's very involved with his kids academically," says Zillioux. "There's a lot of pressure on coaches around the country to say 'academics are our first priority,' but from my experience, I think Coach Walsh is very sincere."

Zillioux sees her role as a communicator with the student. She prefers working face-to-face, rather than writing memos or making telephone calls.

"I like to work closely with the students," says Zillioux. "I want to work first hand with their problems. If we're going to solve any

problems, the athletes need someone to trust."

One way of earning that trust is by attending hockey practices, or by finding a standing-room-only spot at a packed Alfond Arena

"If I talk to a player about his position, a good game he's played, a goal, an assist, he may open up," says Zillioux. "It's important that I'm not always sitting across a desk."

In addition to her work with all freshmen, Zillioux is involved with upper-class students with marginal grades, any students with questions, and students involved in the mandatory study hall.

"It's important the students are actually studying in study hall," she says. "We need to teach them not only to play hockey, but how to play the academic game."

She is also responsible for the Student-Athlete Newsletter, which

highlights academic achievements and available support services on campus. And last season, Zillioux initiated the Scholar-Athlete Recognition Awards which praises the academic accomplishments of Maine's student-athletes.

"I think it's important that our student-athletes come to Maine to develop as people," says Zillioux. "They need to mature as complete people. Athletics are just one part of the college experience. Academics are another. There are countless experiences. My job is to make sure the academic experience is fruitful."

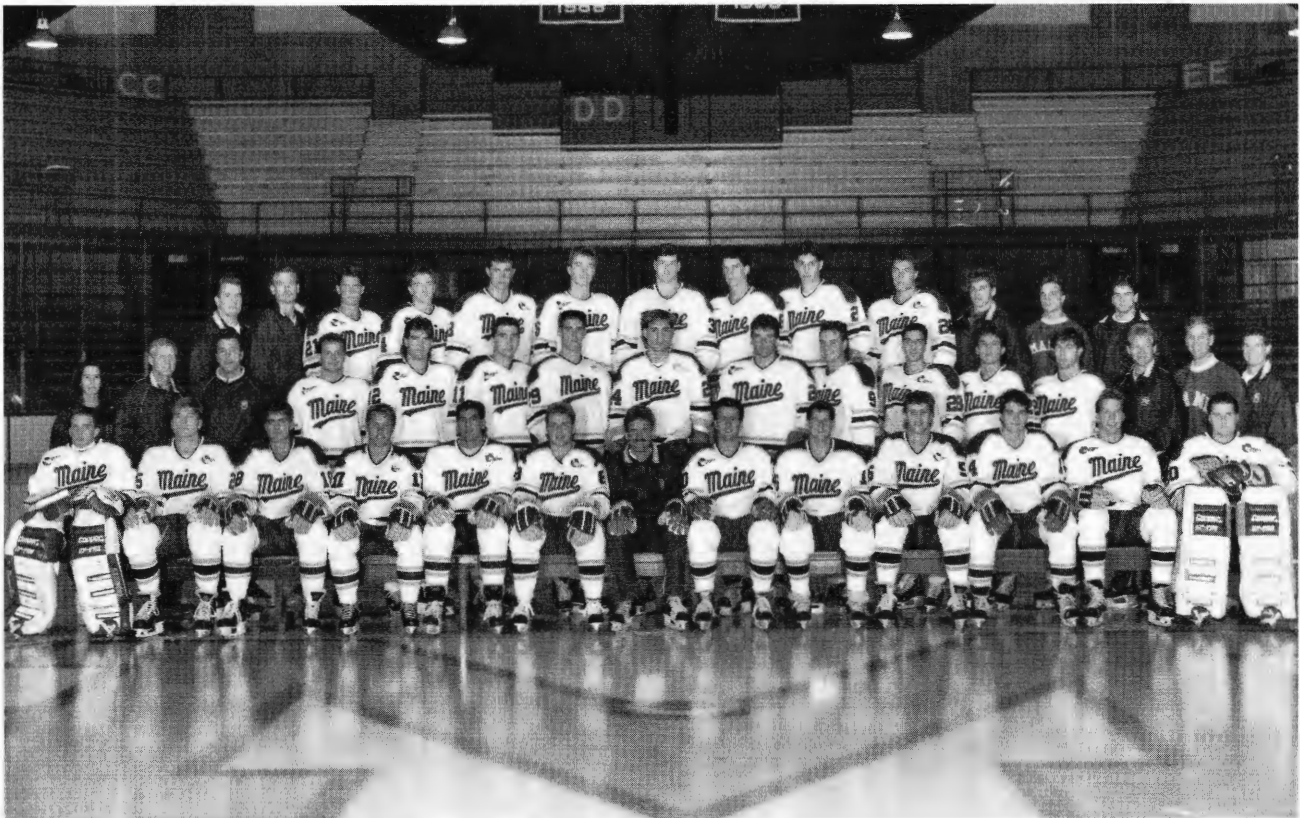

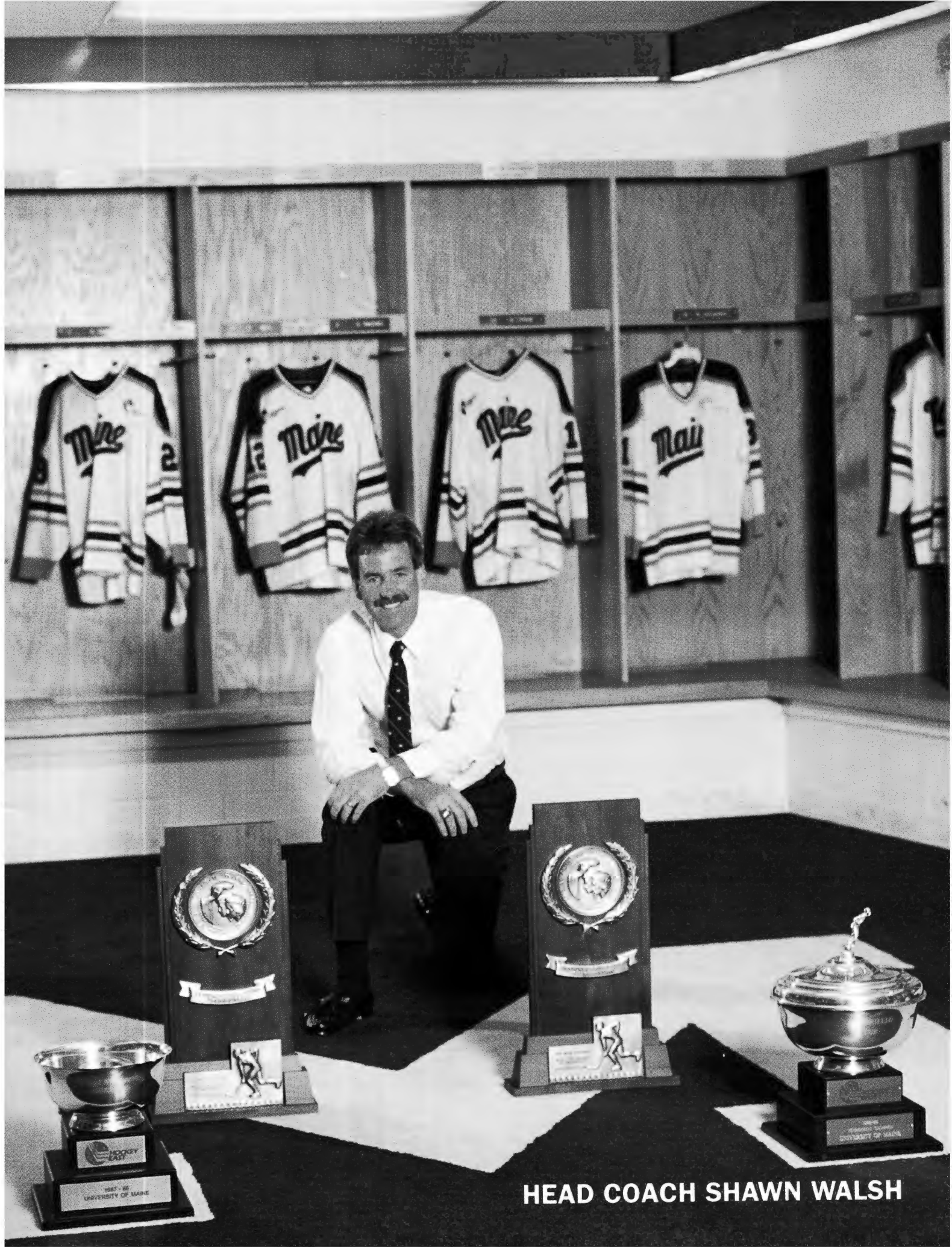
