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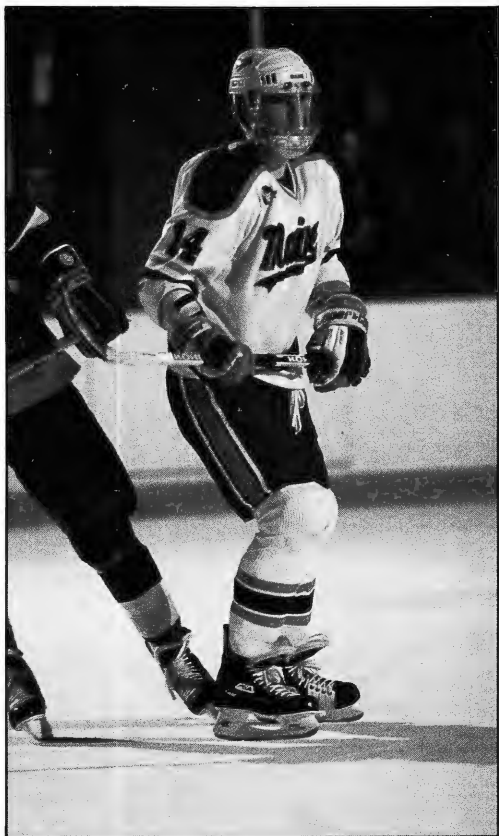

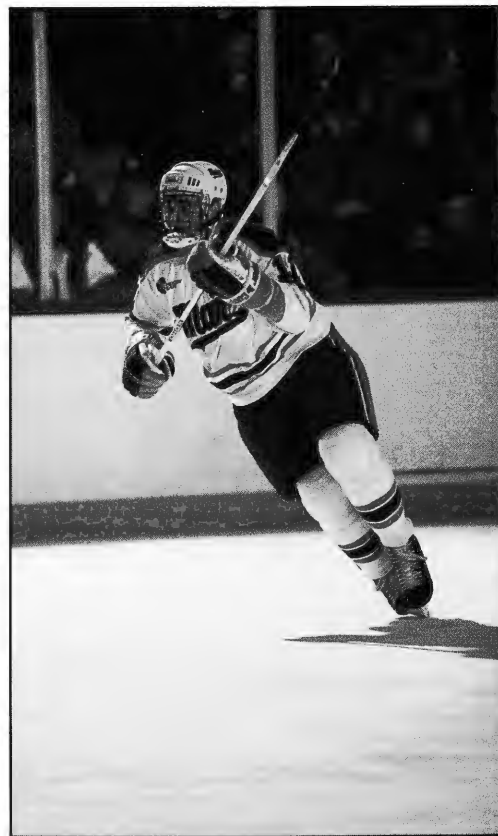

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The University of Maine

The University of Maine, located in Orono, is the largest campus in the statewide university system. There is plenty of open space on its 1,200 acres, where students are offered the diversity and the challenge of a large university in an invigorating atmosphere of a small college. The campus at Orono is in a classic New England setting, located 10 miles north of Bangor, Maine's third largest city. The region is conveniently located close to ski slopes, outdoor recreation areas and the beautiful Maine coastline.

The University, with a variety of exciting and challenging course opportunities, offers an outstanding faculty. Baccalaureate degree programs are offered through eight colleges: Applied Sciences and Agriculture, Arts and Humanities, Business Administration, Education, Engineering and Technology, Forest Resources, Sciences, and Social and Behavioral Sciences. The campus houses the expansive Raymond Fogler Library and a number of respected research facilities to give the student an excellent learning environment.

Students from 45 states and 74 countries studied at the University

last year, and more than 20 percent of the total enrollment of 12,165 is admitted from outside the state of Maine.

Student activities at the University create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. There are seven scholastic honor societies, four non-scholastic honor societies, 22 departmental honor societies, 56 associations, clubs and organizations, and six religious groups. Twelve fraternities and seven sororities have chapters in Orono. In short, a variety of opportunities exists for students, both academically and socially, outside the classroom. The Maine Center for the Arts, host to concerts, comedy, theatre, recitals and other popular entertainment, is located on campus and features nationally and world renowned entertainers.

The University offers its students, the community and the state an outstanding athletic tradition. Several Black Bear teams have excelled to regional and national prominence.

Included on Maine's athletic staff is a full-time academic coordinator responsible for closely monitoring

the progress of each of the 600 varsity student-athletes. Coaches also monitor and advise their student-athletes, frequently holding meetings specifically to discuss academic situations. Study halls and special tutorial sessions are scheduled daily as a way to enhance the learning process. This support and close scrutiny has been a significant reason the overall grade point average of student-athletes has been higher than that of the general student body. The primary goal of the University and the athletic department is to see each individual reach his or her academic potential.

The recreation and intramural department offers organized competition in a number of events throughout the year. Students can participate in a variety of sports from basketball, softball and soccer to waterpolo, mountain bike racing and broomball. Open facilities are also available to students for informal play. Maine's 19 Division I athletic teams entertain more than 100 intercollegiate events on campus each year. The University offers students a wide spectrum of opportunities to enhance the overall college experience.





DR. FREDERICK HUTCHINSON President

By action of the University of Maine System Board of Trustees, Dr. Frederick E. Hutchinson became the 16th president of the University of Maine on April 1, 1992. A native of Atkinson, Maine, Hutchinson was born June 1, 1930. In 1952, he married Dione Williams, and they have two daughters, Juliana and Karen.

Hutchinson earned his bachelor's ('53) and master's degrees in agronomy at the University of Maine. He earned his doctorate in agronomy from Pennsylvania State University.

Hutchinson was praised by the campus community, the media and the citizens of the state for his handling of a strict budget cut in his first month on campus.

In addition, Hutchinson has given his support to the athletic program.

"I subscribe to the idea that athletics are a part of the university's image," said Hutchinson in an interview in *MAINE*, the publication of the University of Maine Alumni Association. "There are very good schools in the country that have built a tremendous image with athletic success.

"I'd like to see us maintain all of our sports, the major sports and the Olympic sports, because we need them both. What is important

to me is to decide at what level we are going to compete and be sure that we are putting our athletes on the playing field with an equal chance."

Prior to returning to the University of Maine, Hutchinson was vice president for Academic Affairs and provost of The Ohio State University. He joined the faculty there in 1985 as director of the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center. In 1986, he was named vice president for Agricultural Administration and dean of the College of Agriculture and later became acting provost on July 1, 1989. On Dec. 1, 1989, Hutchinson was permanently appointed to that position. In addition, he was named senior vice president for Academic Affairs and provost on Nov. 2, 1990.

As Ohio State's chief academic officer, Hutchinson was responsible for the academic environment on campus. Among the areas reporting to him were all instructional programs, the library system, the Office of Student Affairs, the Office of Minority Affairs, Continuing Education, the Biotechnology Center, the Graduate School, the Honors Center, ROTC, the Sea Grant College, the SuperComputer Center, the University Press, and the Wexner Center for the Visual Arts. The office also oversaw the promotion and tenure process for members of the faculty and initiated a recent revision to the undergraduate curriculum. Academic Affairs also worked with various offices and groups on campus to develop an action plan for the recruitment and retention of black students and an Hispanic action plan.

Before joining Ohio State, Hutchinson was executive director of the Board of International Food and Agricultural Development of the United States Agency for International Development. Earlier, he was a faculty member and vice president for Research and Public Services at Maine.

Hutchinson joined the faculty at Maine in 1957. He held the positions of Chairman of the Department of Plant and Soil Sciences from 1971-72; Dean of the College of Life Sciences and Agriculture and Director of the Maine Agricul-

tural Experiment Station from 1972-75; Vice President for Research and Public Services from 1975-80; and acting Vice President for Academic Affairs from 1980-81. He returned to his post as vice president for Research and Public Services from 1981-82, before taking the federal post.

He has authored numerous journal articles, technical bulletins and research articles. In addition, he has presented invitational papers at numerous scientific and professional meetings and has participated in several international programs.

Hutchinson is recognized as a leader among agricultural administrators and was instrumental in building the research program at Maine. He had a positive impact on the significant increase in federal, state and private grant support for research at Maine.

He has served as chairman of the Maine Food and Farm Land Study Commission, the Committee on Erosion and Sediment Control, and the Advisory Committee on the Selection of Coastal Natural Areas. In addition, he served as a member of the Governor's State Energy Resources Advisory Board, the Governor's Committee on Coastal Development Conservation, and the Governor's Land and Water Resources Council.

He has also held the positions of administrative advisor to four regional and inter-regional agricultural experiment station projects; chairman of the Northeast Association of Agricultural Experiment Station Directors and the Joint Committee under the Board of International Food and Agricultural Development.

From 1986-89, he was on the Board of Directors of Agriculture for the National Association of State University and Land Grant Colleges. In 1987, he chaired a panel of the National Academy of Sciences Board on Agriculture before accepting a one-year term as president of the Agricultural Research Institute in Washington, D.C.

Currently, he is a member of the Board of Directors for the International Center for Tropical Agriculture in Colombia.





MICHAEL PLOSZEK **Director of Athletics**

Michael Ploszek, 37, begins his second year of leadership at Maine. Ploszek was appointed director of athletics on August 20, 1991.

An innovative and progressive administrator, Ploszek has quickly made an impact on the athletic department and the state of Maine.

In January, Ploszek instituted the A + Attendance Program, which recognizes and encourages the academic achievement and dedication of Maine students in grades 7-12. Students who earn straight A's in a grading period, or who earns perfect attendance in that time receive two free tickets to Black Bear athletic events of their choices.

"The University of Maine athletic department is deeply committed to the success of our student-athletes and the educational aspirations of all students throughout the state," said Ploszek when making the announcement of the program. "I firmly believe in the positive role athletics can perform in shaping a student's academic ambition and encouraging the educational mission of any school."

Ploszek has also insitituted the new "Team Maine" concept which is designed to create a strong relationship for Maine athletics throughout the entire state. As part of the concept, Ploszek and Walter Abbott visited every high school athletic

director in the state through conference meetings.

"The concept is simple and embodies our pledge to the people in this state," said Ploszek. "Whenever and wherever we can, we want to help."

The plan is designed to impact primarily the younger people in the state with a focus on aspirations. Team Maine Coaches' Nights with community groups, coaching clinics, athletic personnel appearances in schools and industry, alumni gatherings and a special logo are all included in this effort.

Under Ploszek's direction, the athletic department moved forward through difficult budget challenges, and achieved a new high in annual athletic private donations.

Before coming to Maine, Ploszek had worked as assistant athletic director for development at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, N.J.

since 1986. He was responsible for all fund-raising activities related to Rutgers' 30 intercollegiate sports. While at Rutgers, he achieved athletic fund-raising records amounting to over \$10 million.

A 1977 graduate of the University of Notre Dame with a bachelor's degree in business administration, Ploszek was a backup center for the Fighting Irish football team for two seasons.

Following graduation, he spent seven years working in sales, marketing and management for United States Steel Corporation. He then accepted a job as regional director of development for Notre Dame in the Chicago area, a position he held until his appointment at Rutgers in 1986.

Ploszek and his wife, Karen, have five children, Mike, 11; Lauren, 9; Matt, 7; Pete, 5; and Luke, 1. The Ploszek family resides in Orono.



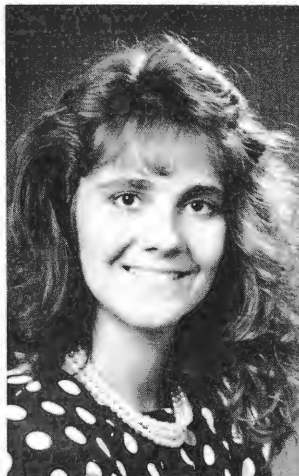

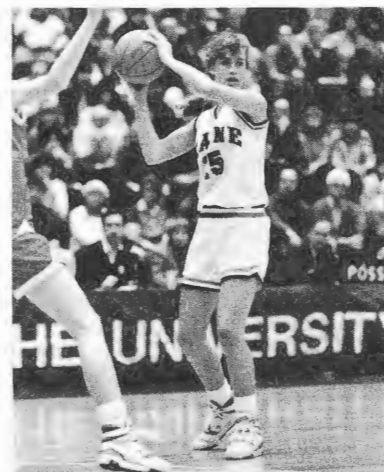

Athletic Academic Support

Each time Margaret Zillioux attends a University of Maine hockey game she sees more than a team of athletes. Her sights go beyond athletic achievement and into the academics and personalities which lie beneath the helmets, shoulder pads and blue and white uniforms.

As Associate Athletic Director for Academic Support, Zillioux's responsibilities include making the student aware of existing support services on campus like the tutoring service, the career center or the faculty advisor program. She also makes sure the student is attending class on a regular basis.

"I work extremely closely with first-year students," says Zillioux. "I wear many different hats. Some students need help with time management. Others need faculty advice or mediating with coaches. I try to ensure that the athletes get off to a good start."

According to Zillioux, head coach Shawn Walsh, a former goalie who suffered a career ending knee injury at Bowling Green State University, realizes the importance of a college degree. He is also aware of the education and guidance an academic support coordinator can provide.

Both Walsh and Zillioux feel a strong, open relationship between coaches, athletes and support staff is a necessity for academic success.

"He is very enthusiastic about this plan," says Zillioux. "He's given me a lot of authority. We want to prevent academic problems."

Zillioux feels Walsh's interest in academics is genuine, making her job more rewarding.

"He's very involved with his kids academically," says Zillioux. "There's a lot of pressure on coaches around the country to say 'academics are our first priority,' but from my experience thus far, I think Coach Walsh is very sincere."

Zillioux sees her role as a communicator with the student. She prefers working face-to-face, rather than writing memos or making telephone calls.

"I like to work closely with the students," says Zillioux. "I want to work first hand with their problems. If we're going to solve any problems, the athletes need someone to trust."

One way of earning that trust is by attending hockey practices, or by sitting near the red line at Alford

Arena on a winter evening.

"If I talk to a player about his position, a good game he's played, a goal he has scored, an assist, he may open up," says Zillioux. "It's important that I'm not always sitting across a desk."

According to Maine's first-year students, the program works.

"The study hall program is a great way to keep us atop our studies," says Peter Ferraro a freshman and 1992 first round draft choice of the New York Rangers. "Without this atmosphere it might be tough to get motivated about your school work. But we all realize that you never know when your hockey career is going to end and when you will need that degree. This helps assure we will get a good start on our degrees."

Zillioux is a firm believer in the fact that academic and athletic success can go hand-in-hand. She points to 1992 Hobey Baker Memorial Award winner Scott Pellerin as evidence. In addition to his accolades as college hockey's top player last season, Pellerin earned HOCKEY EAST All-Academic honors and received his degree in business administration last May.

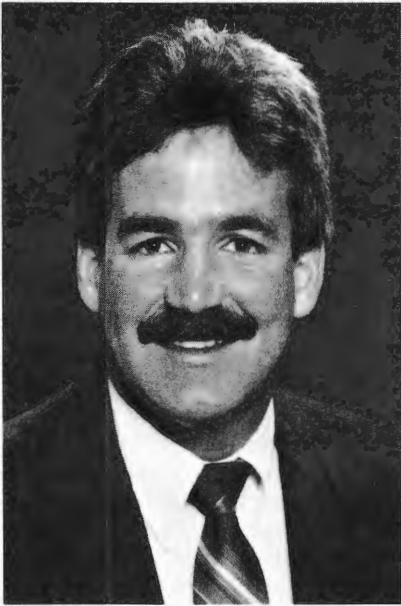
In addition to her work with the first-year students, Zillioux is involved with upper-class students with marginal grades, any students with questions, as well as students involved in the mandatory study hall.

"It's important the students are actually studying in study hall," she says. "We need to teach them not only to play hockey, but how to play the academic game."

SHAWN WALSH **Head Coach**

Since his arrival on the Maine campus in 1984, Shawn Walsh has built the nation's dominant hockey program of the past five years. Consider that the Black Bears' record since 1987 is 163-46-8. No team has generated as many wins in that period and the .770 winning percentage bests all others.

Last year, Walsh guided Maine to its fifth consecutive 30-win season, its second HOCKEY EAST regular season title and its second HOCKEY EAST Tournament Championship. The Black Bears finished with a nation best record of 31-4-2, while competing in their sixth consecutive NCAA Tournament. After the season, Walsh was selected New England Coach of the Year by the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston. It marked the fourth time in the last six years that Walsh had been selected either HOCKEY EAST or New England Coach of the Year.

Walsh's career record now stands at 208-119-12, a remarkable feat considering that in his first two seasons at Maine, his teams posted 12- and 11-win years. His record of 163-46-8 over the last five seasons is unparalleled by any other Division I coach during that period.

In addition to team excellence, Walsh's teams have produced 17 All-Americans and a pair of U.S.

Olympians in the last six years. In addition, Scott Pellerin earned college hockey's most prestigious honor last season when he was selected to receive the Hobey Baker Memorial Award.

Walsh has seen 23 of his players sign professional contracts in the last six years and the Black Bears have 14 players on the current roster drafted by National Hockey League teams.

Walsh has twice been selected HOCKEY EAST Coach of the Year (1988, 1990), and he has twice guided the gold-medal winning team at the U.S. Olympic Sports Festival. He also coached the U.S. National Select team to a win over the Soviet Union in 1989.

Although excellence has become tradition for Walsh and the Maine program, success did not come easily for the then youngest Division I hockey coach in the nation.

He inherited a sub-par ECAC team, and turned it into a perennial HOCKEY EAST contender. His intensity and strong work ethic have

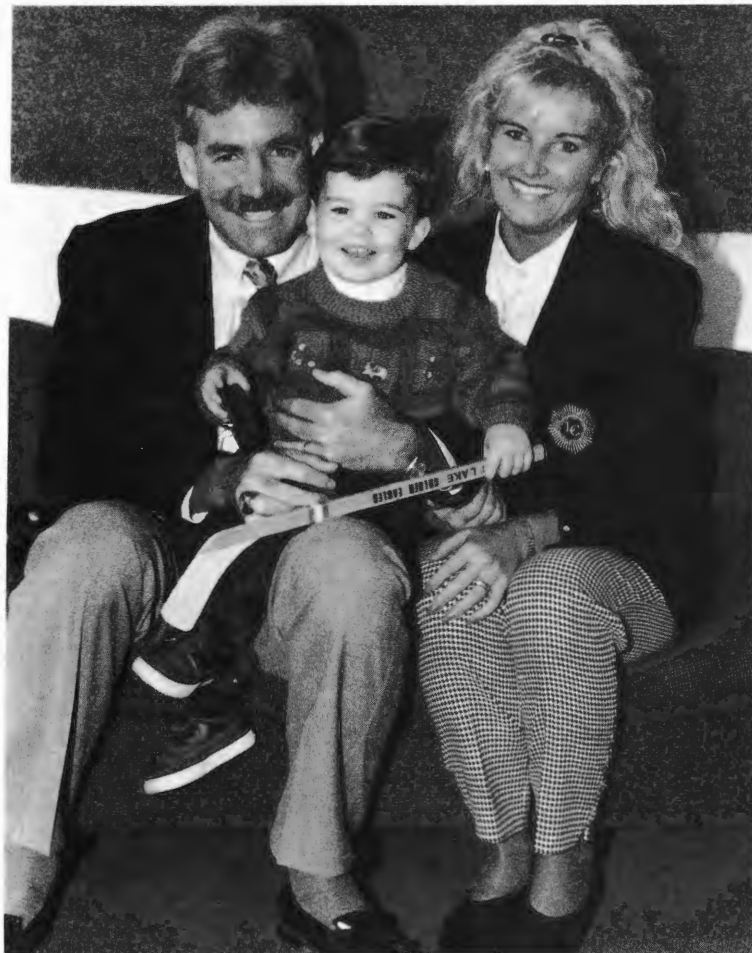
been key ingredients in the rise of Maine hockey.

With 208 victories, he is the winningest coach in Maine hockey history.

In just his third season at Maine, Walsh guided the Black Bears to the NCAA Tournament. The following year, he led his team to a 34-8-2 record. Maine marched through HOCKEY EAST with a 20-4-2 record, clinching the title quicker than any team in history. Maine held the nation's number one ranking for the final eight weeks, before falling to eventual national champion Lake Superior in the NCAA semi-finals.

For Walsh, the personal accolades were soon to follow as he was the HOCKEY EAST Coach of the Year and New England Division I Coach of the Year in 1988.

In 1989-90, Walsh took an underclass squad and guided it to a 33-14 mark and the team's third consecutive trip to the HOCKEY EAST Championship game. The Black Bears earned their second straight trip to



the final four, falling to local favorite Minnesota at St. Paul.

The following year, Maine posted a 33-11-2 record and again played in the HOCKEY EAST Championship game. The Black Bears' fourth straight trip to the NCAA Tournament resulted in a quarter-final loss at Madison to eventual national champion Wisconsin.

The 1990-91 season was another fruitful one for Walsh as the Black Bears returned to the final four for the third time in four years. The Black Bears' 32-9-2 mark earned them a top seed in the NCAA Tournament, but eventual national champion Northern Michigan ended the season in the semifinals.

Walsh is a 1978 graduate of Bowling Green State University, where he earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees in education.

It was at Bowling Green where he began to concentrate on coaching, working with Ted Sator at a high school in Ohio. In his senior year at

Bowling Green, Walsh coached the junior varsity hockey team and also worked with head coach Ron Mason at the varsity level. Walsh remained at Bowling Green for two additional seasons with Mason, before the two men moved to Michigan State to boost its sagging program.

Prior to Walsh and Mason arriving at MSU in 1979, the Spartans had failed to qualify for the WCHA play-offs in three straight seasons. While at MSU, Walsh helped lead the Spartans to three consecutive CCHA titles and to the NCAA final four in 1983-84, his final year.

In addition to his collegiate coaching, Walsh is the first vice president of the American Hockey Coaches Association. He directs the Maine Hockey School and is co-owner of the Huron Hockey School.

Walsh is married to the former Tracey Mason, and the couple resides in Veazie with their two-year old son, Tyler.

GRANT STANDBROOK **Assistant Coach**

Grant Standbrook is in his fifth season as Maine's primary recruiter.

Since coming to Maine in 1988, Standbrook has coordinated the recruiting of four outstanding freshman classes.

Standbrook was previously the recruiting coordinator at Wisconsin where he played an integral part in the Badgers winning three national championships during his 12-year tenure at that school. Wisconsin won the national title in 1976-77, 1980-81 and 1982-83 in addition to reaching the final four on two other occasions. Some of his top recruits at UW include NHL players Scott Melanby, Chris Chelios, Patrick Flatley, Gary Suter and Mark Johnson (New Jersey).

In 1987-88, Grant was the head coach of Varese-Kronenberg of the Italian league. He led the team to a second place finish in the 10-team league.

He was an assistant coach of the 1976 U.S. Olympic hockey team, and the U.S. National teams in 1974 and 1975.

A 56-year old native of Winnipeg, Manitoba, he began his hockey coaching career at Churchill High School in Winnipeg.

A 1961 graduate of the University of Minnesota-Duluth, Standbrook captained the Bulldog hockey team his senior season.

He is married, and he and his wife, Joy, have three children.



RED GENDRON **Assistant Coach**

Red Gendron begins his third season with the Black Bears, after a celebrated prep school coaching career at Bellows Free Academy in St. Albans, Vt., where he coached for nine seasons.

At Bellows Free Academy, he was twice selected the Vermont Hockey League Coach of the Year. He was also a two-time recipient of the National Federation of Interscholastic High School Coaches' Outstanding Person in Vermont Hockey.

Gendron has guided several U.S. national teams. In 1990, his U.S. Select 17 team went 2-0-1 at Minneapolis-St. Paul, including a victory over Team Canada. He has also been very active in the USA Hockey development programs, and serves as the director of the Coaching Achievement Program for USA Hockey.

A 1979 graduate of New England College with his bachelor's degree in secondary education, Gendron was a four-year letterman on the hockey and baseball teams. He captained the Pilgrims' hockey team for three seasons and was twice selected Most Valuable Player.

Gendron is married, and he and his wife, Janet, have two children, Katelyn, 9, and Allison, 7.



DR. ROBERT LEHNHARD **Strength and Conditioning**

Dr. Robert Lehnhard begins his second season as Strength and Conditioning coach with the Black Bear hockey team.

Lehnhard is responsible for the pre-season dryland conditioning regimen and year-long weight-lifting program which are designed to help each player reach peak physical and mental development throughout the entire season.

He is also the director of the Exercise Science Institute Laboratory of Work Physiology and an assistant professor in the College of Education at Maine.

Lehnhard, who received his Ph.D in Exercise Physiology from The Ohio State University in 1984, also works with the other Black Bear athletic teams to develop specific conditioning and training programs.

Lehnhard has worked as the director of Professional Services at the Grant Fitness Center in Columbus, Ohio, where he directed cardiac rehabilitation and wellness programs.

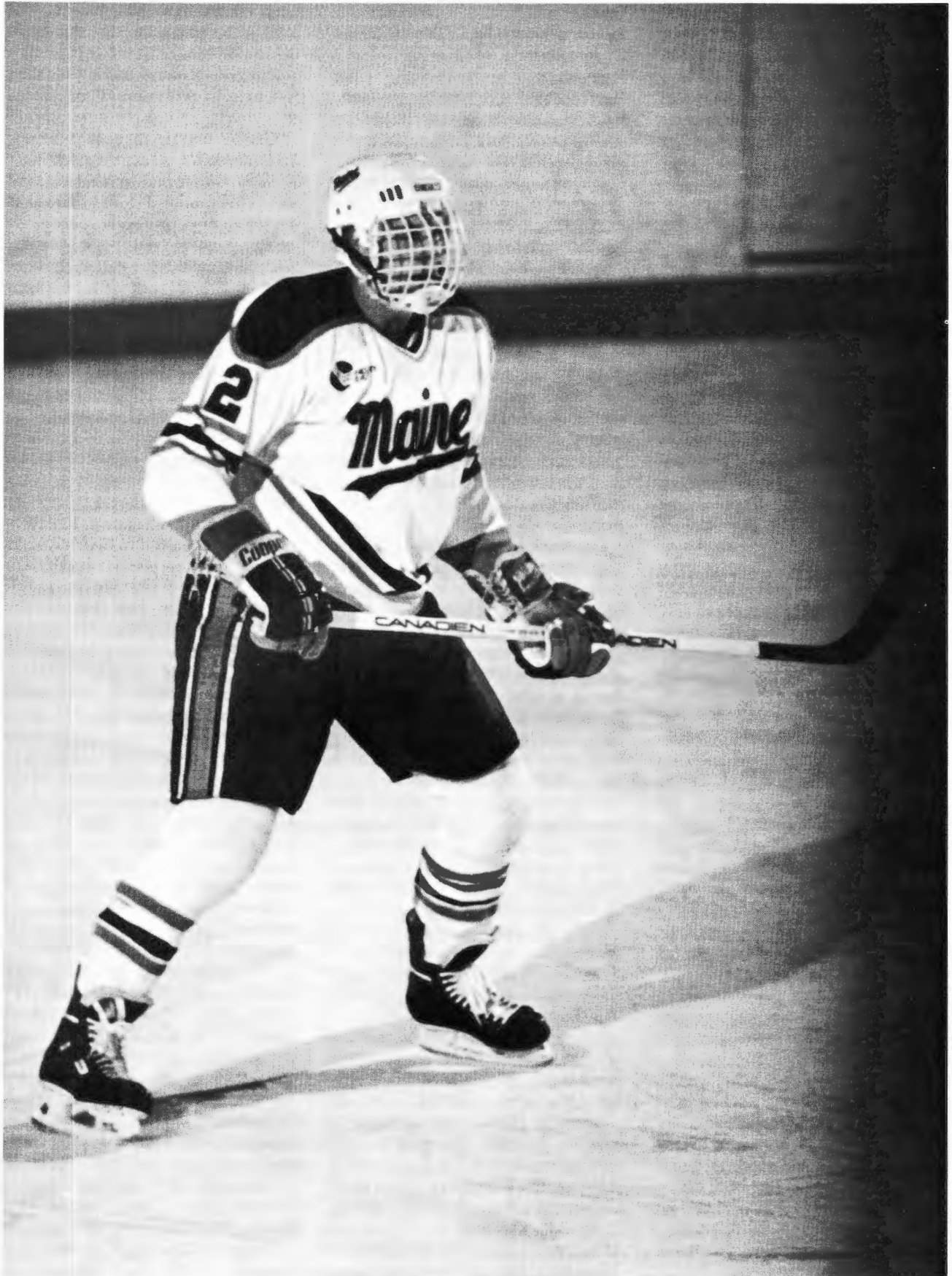
He has also served as a graduate teaching assistant at both The Ohio State University and the University of Michigan, where he performed metabolic and strength testing on many of each school's athletes.

The 1992-93 Season



1992-93 Maine Hockey Outlook

For 15 weeks last season, the University of Maine proved it deserved the pre-season accolades as best in the nation. But following a 3-2 loss to Michigan State at the East Regional in Providence, Maine's hopes for its first national championship were dashed.

Enter 1992-93.

In what is supposed to be a rebuilding year, head coach Shawn Walsh will need to find replacements for 1992 Hobey Baker Award winner Scott Pellerin and three-time All-American Jean-Yves Roy, who opted to forgo his senior season and sign with the New York Rangers. Gone, too, are defenseman Tony Link, two-year captains Mike Barkley and Martin Robitaille, Brian Downey, who scored 48 goals and added 66 assists in his final two years at Maine, and grinders Randy Olson, Steve Tepper and Steve Widmeyer.

In Pellerin, the Black Bears lose not only the school's career scoring leader (223 points), but a dominant physical player (276 career penalty minutes) and a tremendous on-ice leader. In addition, in the three games following UM regular season losses last year, Pellerin scored eight goals and added five assists.

Roy, who holds the school's career goal scoring record with 108 in 124 games, was the Black Bears' most explosive player over the past three seasons. Roy's single-season goal totals of 39, 37 and 32 rank first, second and sixth in UM history and he was a two-time Hobey Baker Award finalist.

Robitaille, Maine's top defensive forward, completed his career as the seventh all-time leading scorer with 175 points. His leadership and intelligence were underscored by the likes of Pellerin and Roy, but will be sorely missed.

Walsh is hoping that a highly-touted class of newcomers coupled with the continued development of the veterans, will allow the Black Bears to keep their place atop the upper echelon of college hockey.

In all, 19 letterwinners return from the team that established a school mark for winning percentage in a season.

If success is built from the goal out, than the Black Bears should be well on their way to their seventh straight HOCKEY EAST championship game and their seventh consecutive NCAA berth.

The Black Bears return perhaps the nation's top goaltending duo in **Garth Snow** and **Mike Dunham**.

Senior Snow, an All-HOCKEY EAST second team choice, led the nation in winning percentage with a 25-4-2 mark, while compiling a 2.44 goals against average. All of his losses were by a goal. Snow, a walk-on who redshirted in 1989-90, is now 45-10-2 with a 2.71 goals against average in his career at Maine. He spent part of the summer in the U.S. 20-Over training camp.

Junior Dunham played just seven games with the Black Bears last year, yet encountered one of the most demanding schedules of any goaltender in the country.

Dunham missed the first nine games of the UM season after suffering a broken bone in his left hand during a pre-season workout. After posting a 2-0 mark, including a shutout of nationally-ranked New Hampshire, Dunham left the Black Bears to join the U.S. Junior National team. His All-World Junior Tournament performance led Team USA to a bronze medal and gave him a berth on the U.S. Olympic Team, where he served as a backup to Ray LeBlanc. In June, Dunham was presented with the Bob Johnson Medallion, given to the top U.S. player at the World Junior Tournament.

Upon returning from Albertville, France, he posted a 4-0 mark down the stretch to lead Maine to the HOCKEY EAST title.

Dunham, 6-0-0 with a 2.20 goals against average and a .897 save percentage in 1991-92, is now 20-5-2 with a 2.79 goals against average in his UM career.

He was recently named to the U.S. 20-Over Team which competed in both the Tampere Cup and Sauna

Cup Tournaments and is considered a top candidate for the 1994 Olympic Team.

Dunham expects to play his first full season with the Black Bears this year.

Also returning in goal is senior **Rob Howland**, who provided Snow with much needed relief last season. Howland did not record a decision, but posted a 3.18 goals against average in six games. Redshirt freshman **Greg Hirsch**, who sat out last season, and newcomer **Blair Marsh**, a first team All-Star for Victoria of the Coastal Division of the British Columbia Junior Hockey League are others in the fold.

A question mark entering the 1991-92 season, the Black Bear defense should be a team strength this season. Only graduated Tony Link is missing from last year's team which set a HOCKEY EAST record for fewest goals allowed in a season (54).

Anchoring the defense is junior **Chris Imes**. Imes, who led Maine's blueliners in plus/minus (+40) and scoring (4-19-23) a year ago, has participated in the last two World Junior Tournaments. This summer, he was a teammate of Dunham on the U.S. 20-Over Team.

Imes serves as an alternate captain with senior **Dan Murphy**, who had six assists in 1991-92 and a +29 rating.

Other veteran defensemen include sophomore **Andy Silverman** (2-9-11 in 1991-92), last season's UM Rookie of the Year; junior **Matt Martin** (4-14-18), who participated in the U.S. 20-Over Team training camp; junior **Jason Weinrich** (1-15-16), an All-Tournament selection at the Badger Hockey Showdown and the Dexter Hockey Classic; junior **Lee Saunders** (1-8-9 in 13 games), and sophomore **Jim Burcar** (1-3-4 in 12 games), who participated in the U.S. Junior Olympic Festival this summer.

Sophomore **Dave MacIsaac**, an

Sophomore **Jacque Rodrigue**, a former All-USHL selection with Northern Iowa, should contribute after sitting out last season at Maine.

Pellerin, Downey and even Roy labored along the left wing last season and their presence will be missed. But junior **Patrice Tardif**, the Black Bears' Most Improved Player in 1991-92, leads a group of three returnees at left wing. He has the size (6-2, 210) and offensive skills (18-20-38) to become a dominant player in the league. Maine's coaching staff hopes Tardif picks up where he left off last season after scoring 16 goals and 18 assists in his final 21 games.

Senior **Kent Salfi**, like Tardif, played his best hockey over the second half of the season. One of the nation's top penalty killers, Salfi scored 12 goals and added 10 assists last season. He was 10-8-18 in his final 19 games.

Senior **Martin Mercier** is the other veteran at this position. Mercier, a grinding wing, had an assist in 15 games last season after suffering a broken wrist in the first game of the year. Walsh and his staff expect Mercier to return to the form that brought him nine goals and eight assists in 1990-91.

Leading the newcomers is **Paul Kariya**, the Canadian Tier II Junior Player of the Year. Kariya notched 65 goals and 86 assists in 41 games for Penticton a season ago. He was also the youngest player (17 years) on the Canadian National Junior Team.

Among other first year players are **Mike Santonelli**, who had 35 goals and 34 assists in 24 games for Massachusetts Catholic Central League champion Matignon High; **Craig Gwinn**, who had 18 goals and 25 assists in 22 games for New England Prep runner-up Westminster; and **Jamie Thompson** of St. John's Prep who led all scorers at the Hockey Night In Boston summer tournaments.

Captains Barkley and Robitaille have graduated, but Walsh has plenty of talent left at this position.

Senior **Jim Montgomery**, who will serve as the first lone captain in Walsh's nine years at Maine, leads the returnees. Montgomery, whose talents have often been overshadowed by the likes of Pellerin or Roy, led the team in scoring last season with 21 goals and 44 assists in 37 games. He holds school records for assists in a season (57 in 1991-92) and career (135) and Pellerin's career scoring mark of 223 points is endangered by Montgomery's 204.

Senior **Dave LaCouture**, an alternate captain, has become a valuable two-way player for the Black Bears. He had five goals and four assists in 28 games last season and often draws the assignment of marking opponents' top center.

Senior **Eric Fenton** enjoyed his finest season as a Black Bears in 1991-92 when he scored seven goals and added eight assists in 22 games.

Senior **Devin Mintz** will get a long look after scoring a goal and adding an assist in three games with the Black Bears last year.

Sophomore **Michel Latendresse**, who scored 54 goals and 79 assists in 43 games for the Olympiques de Montreal in 1990-91, becomes eligible after sitting out last season at Maine. The former Montreal Junior Tier II Player of the Year will miss the first four games of 1992 after playing a like number of games with a Major Junior team.

Half of the most highly-touted freshman twins will see action at center. Freshman **Peter Ferraro**, a first-round choice of the New York Rangers this past summer, is expected to contribute immediately. He scored 48 goals and 53 assists for Dubuque and Waterloo while being named the USHL's Most Valuable Player. He also led the U.S. Junior Team in scoring with three goals and five assists while earning All-World Junior accolades. 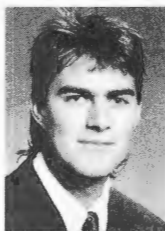

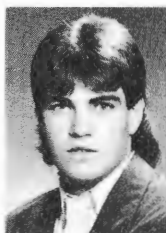

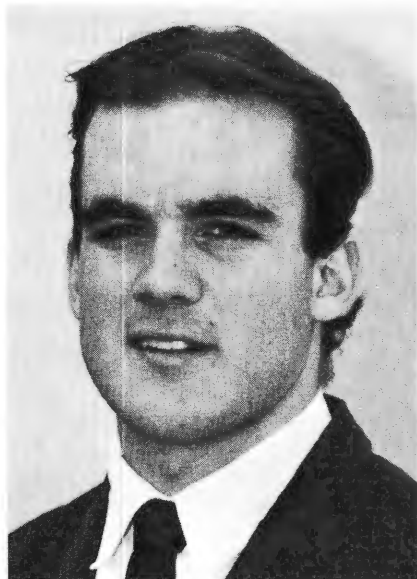

This Is HOCKEY EAST

HOCKEY EAST is one of the premiere hockey conferences in the nation. The league is composed of eight institutions of higher learning, with campuses located throughout New England. Membership in HOCKEY EAST includes Boston College, Boston University, University of Massachusetts - Lowell, University of Maine, Merrimack College, University of New Hampshire, Northeastern University and Providence College. HOCKEY EAST will begin its ninth season of intercollegiate ice hockey with the 1992-93 season.

History of the League

The impetus behind the formation of HOCKEY EAST came as a result of a move by the presidents of six Ivy League schools, in June of 1983, to form their own hockey outside the ECAC structure. Anticipating this move, the Athletic Directors at five schools - Bill Flynn of Boston College, John Simpson at Boston University, Andy Mooradian at New Hampshire, Joe Zabiliski at Northeastern and Lou Lamoriello of Providence - joined together to form the new college hockey conference ... HOCKEY EAST. On July 11, 1983, the five schools became charter members, and later that summer, Maine and the University of Lowell were added. Merrimack College joined in January 1989, and completed its third year in the conference last season.

Success in Eight Short Years

HOCKEY EAST has brought together eight strong college hockey programs, each with a major commitment to developing and maintaining a balance of academic excellence and strong athletic competition.

The caliber of student-athletes that HOCKEY EAST has been able to attract is second to none. During the 1991-92 season, 359 of the top players in the league were named to the HOCKEY EAST Academic Honor Roll. Each of the student-athletes named to this honored group posted at least a 3.00 grade point average in each of the two semesters of the academic year. Among the HOCKEY EAST academic honorees was Scott Pellerin of Maine who was named the HOCKEY EAST Player of the Year and won the prestigious Hobey Baker Memorial Award as the top collegiate player in the nation.

In addition to the classroom excellence, HOCKEY EAST teams have succeeded on the ice as well. Six times in eight years, HOCKEY EAST has been represented in the NCAA final four (BC 1985 and 1990, BU 1990 and 1991, Maine 1988, 1989 and 1990, and Providence 1985). This year, HOCKEY EAST placed three teams in the NCAA Tournament.

In just eight short years, HOCKEY EAST teams have proven themselves among the top teams in the nation. As a league, the 1991-92 HOCKEY EAST teams combined to post a 60-33-1 record against non-league competition. They posted a .617 win percentage versus the ECAC, and a .781 against independent teams.

STUART P. HASKELL, Jr.
Commissioner

Stuart P. Haskell, former Director of Athletics at the University of Maine, was appointed Commissioner of HOCKEY EAST on June 20, 1988. Haskell became the second Commissioner in the league's history.

The HOCKEY EAST Athletic Directors agreed to the shared hiring of Haskell with the North Atlantic Conference. He also serves as the first full-time Commissioner of the eight-team, 19-sport conference, a position which he accepted on January 1, 1988. Four institutions in HOCKEY EAST (Boston University, Maine, New Hampshire and Northeastern) also hold membership in the NAC. HOCKEY EAST and the North Atlantic Conference share office space at Orono, Maine.

During Haskell's first year at the helm of HOCKEY EAST, he took a firm stand on high-sticking and fighting penalties. Through the first half of the 1989-90 season, several player suspensions were handed down from the Commissioner's office. His message was clear, however, and during the second half of the season, the average number of penalties per game was down from almost 19 to less than 13 per game and has been maintained at or near that level.

Haskell was instrumental in league expansion, and on January 30, 1989, Merrimack College was admitted as the eighth team in HOCKEY EAST. Also under Haskell's tenure, the league enjoyed successful championship tournaments at Boston College's new Conte Forum, a third three-year television contract was signed with the New England Sports Network, and agreements were reached with the ECAC and the Boston Garden to hold the two league championships on the same weekend at the North Station site. The second Hockeyfest featuring HOCKEY EAST and the ECAC was held in 1992. In 1992, he negotiated a three-year agreement under which HOCKEY EAST will continue to appear in the Boston Garden with its own Championship Tournament. Should construction be completed, the 1995 tournament will be held in the new Boston Garden. Haskell produced another significant achievement for the league by negotiating a contract with CCM/Masko US in which replica game and practice jerseys and other sportswear featuring HOCKEY EAST schools are marketed throughout North America.

She took an early retirement for family reasons in 1981 and returned to Maine, where she did volunteer work for the University of Maine Alumni Association and Athletic Departments, including publicity of alumni and athletic activities, and served as director of the Dexter Hockey Classic for four years.

A native and current resident of Old Town, Maine, Nonni is married to John P. Daly and has a son, Thomas K. Fitzgibbon of New York.

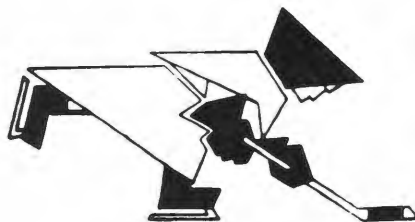

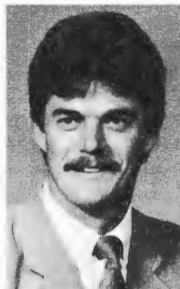

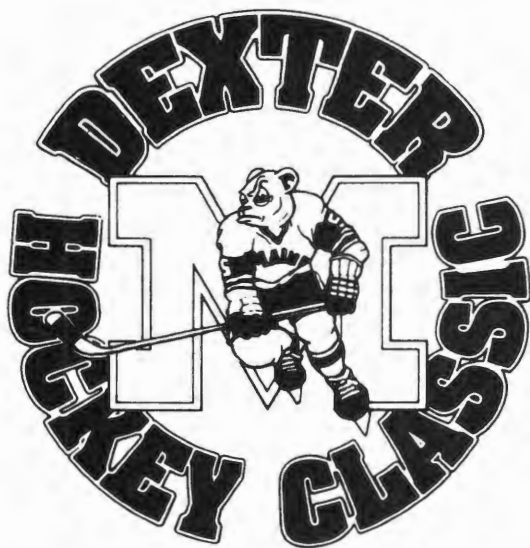

Alfond Arena

One of the finest college hockey facilities in the country, the Harold Alfond Sports Arena has served the University community since 1977. Completed in February of that year, the building was dedicated by Mr. Alfond and officials of the University on November 18 at the Maine-Acadia hockey game.

Entering the 1992-93 season, the Black Bears had played before standing room only crowds in 118 consecutive regular season games. Due to that demand and a \$2 million gift from Mr. Alfond, the Alfond Arena has undergone a significant expansion project.

Mr. Alfond's generous gift represents the largest one-time (non-posthumous) cash contribution ever received by the University of Maine.

Since 1968, Mr. Alfond has donated more than \$4 million to the

University of Maine.

The construction entailed 70-foot by 140-foot additions to the East and West sides of the Arena, providing an additional 1,200 seats to each side.

With this increase in seating, Alfond Arena will be able to accommodate 5,200 fans for hockey games.

Included in the Arena expansion were additional concession areas and rest rooms, locker rooms, ticket offices and souvenir stands and improved media facilities.

With the expansion, Alfond Arena becomes the home of the Black Bear basketball teams, which had played home games at the Bangor Auditorium from 1988 until early last season.

In addition to being the home of the Black Bears, the building is used by youth, high school and

senior hockey leagues, and for concerts and graduation ceremonies.

The complex is a modern facility with virtually no obstructed-view seats in the building and an excellent view of the ice.

Alfond Arena was built with the generous contributions of more than 2,000 people, headed by Mr. Alfond. An addition to the south end of the Arena in 1988 houses the Black Bears' impressive new locker room facility, which includes fully equipped weight and training rooms. Included in that expansion project was an attractive lounge for use by the hockey program and the University community.

In 1990, an office addition was completed, providing the coaching and administrative staffs much needed room to perform effectively.

Post-game interviews will take place in an area designated by the Sports Information Director, after a 10-minute cooling-off period.

RADIO POLICY: Permission to broadcast may be obtained by either calling or writing the Maine Sports Information Office at least one week prior to the day of the game. Carr, who is also the program director for WABI-TV, and the Black Bear radio network follow the Black Bears both home and away throughout the season.

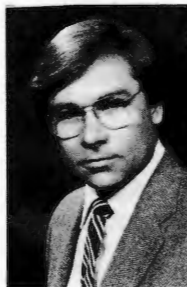


DALE DUFF Black Bear Television Network
