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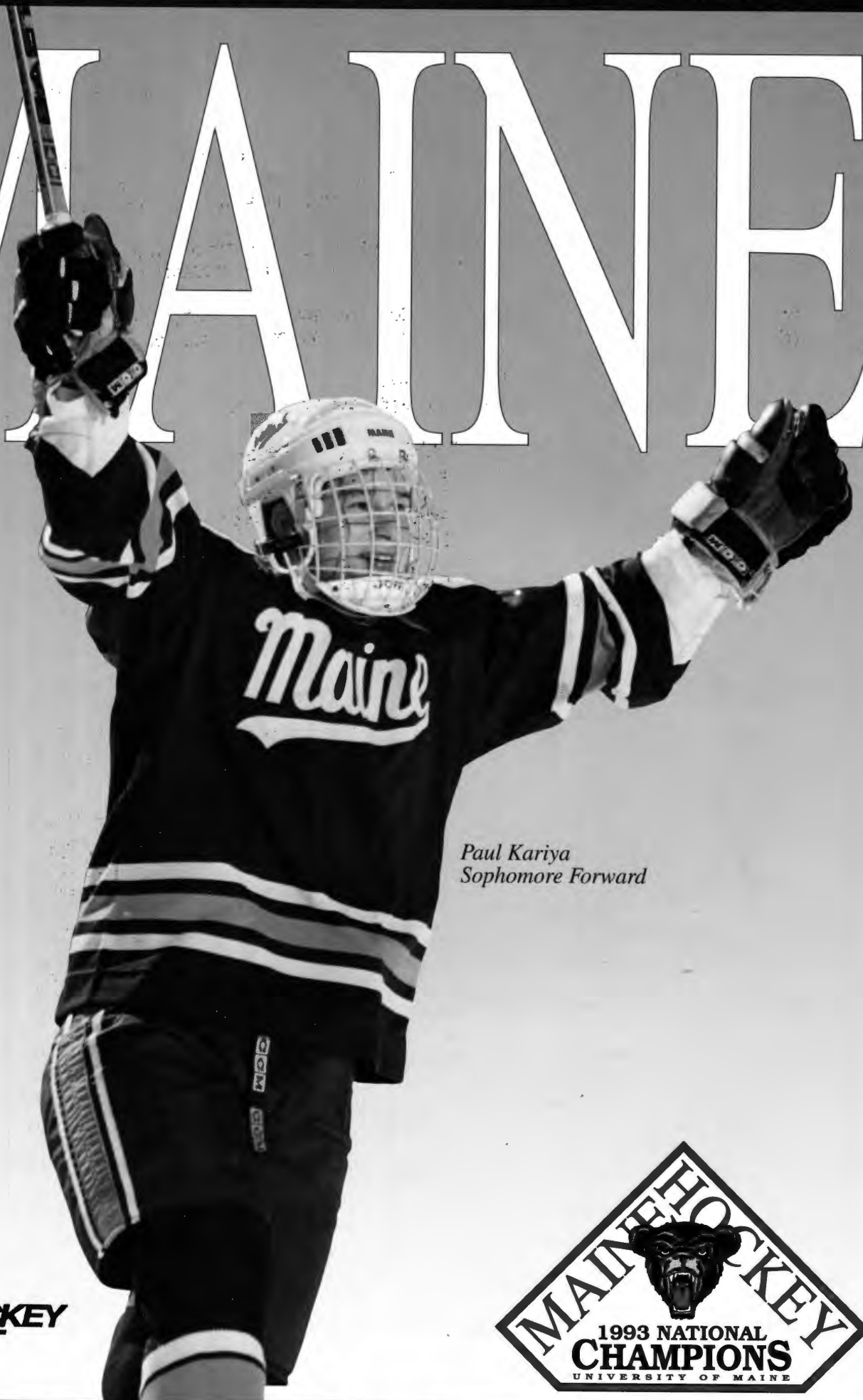
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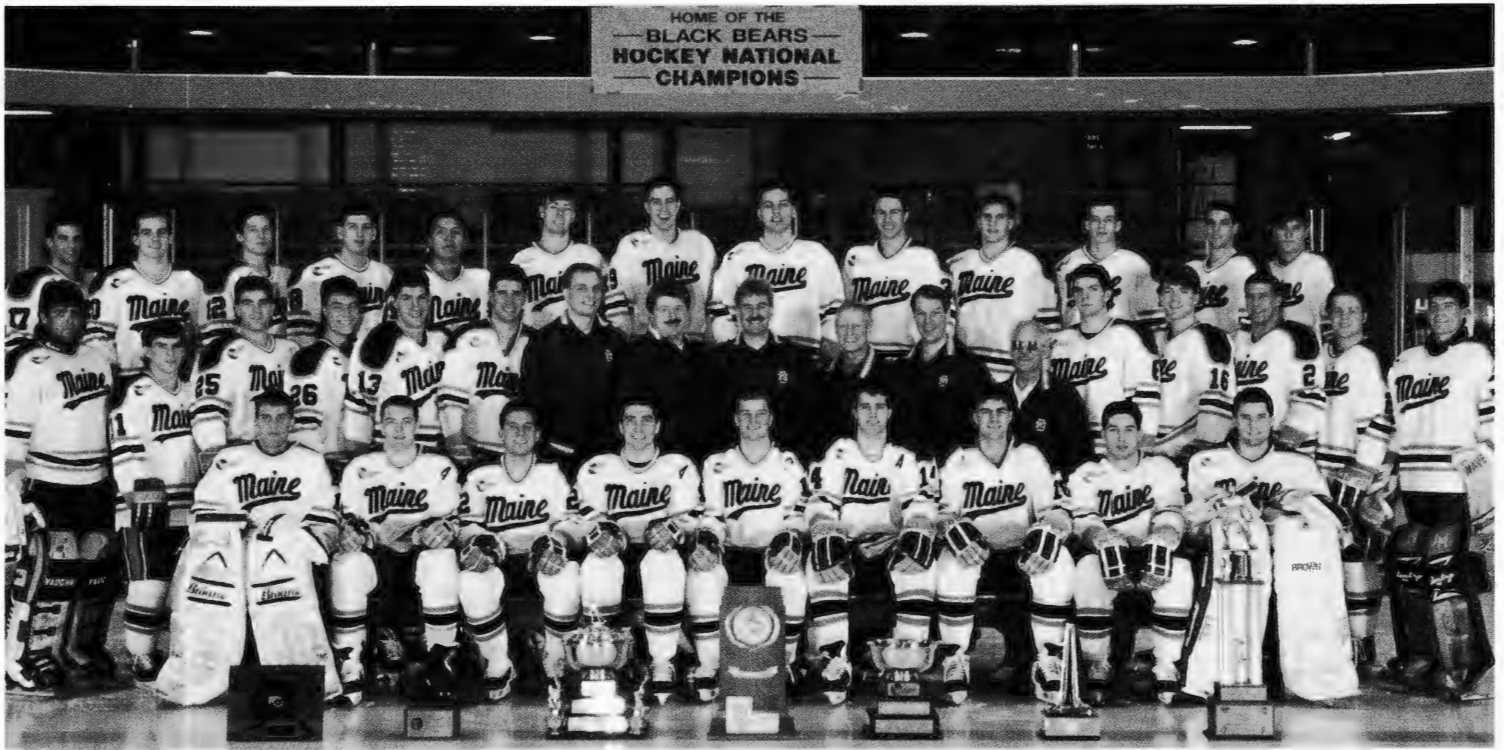

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The University of Maine

The University of Maine is the state's center of learning, discovery, and service to the public. As the flagship campus of the University of Maine System and the state's land-grant and sea-grant institution, the University of Maine has the unique responsibility for providing high-quality undergraduate and graduate education programs, public services, and basic and applied research.

Located in Orono, within close proximity to the ocean, lakes and mountains, the University offers an inspiring learning environment. There is plenty of open space on its 1,200 acres, where students are offered the diversity and the challenge of a large university in an invigorating atmosphere of a small college. The campus is located 10 miles north of Bangor, Maine's third largest city.

The University's undergraduate and graduate educational offerings are built upon a liberal arts and sciences foundation, complemented with profession-oriented education in a wide range of disciplines, many of which are found nowhere else in the state. Because of their responsibility to teach, conduct research and serve the public, faculty members are able to incorporate the new

knowledge they uncover with classroom activities, often giving students hands-on experience in the research process.

The campus houses the expansive Raymond H. Fogler Library and a number of respected modern research facilities to give the student an excellent learning environment.

Student activities at the University create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. The 1,600-seat Maine Center for the Arts attracts some of the world's top performers to the University of Maine campus.

The University offers its students, faculty, and staff, as well as the people of the community and the state, an outstanding athletic tradition. Several Black Bear teams have excelled to regional and national prominence, including the Black Bear ice hockey team, the 1993 NCAA Division I national champions.

Included on Maine's athletic staff is a full-time academic coordinator responsible for closely monitoring the progress of each of the 600 varsity student-athletes. Coaches also monitor and advise their student-athletes, frequently holding meet-

ings specifically to discuss academic situations. Study halls and special tutorial sessions are scheduled daily as a way to enhance the learning process. This support and close scrutiny has been a significant reason that the overall grade point average of student-athletes has been higher than that of the general student body. The primary goal of the University and the athletic department is to see each individual reach his or her academic potential.

The office of recreation and intramurals offers organized competition in a number of events throughout the year. Students can participate in a variety of intramural and club sports, while open facilities are also available for informal play.

Maine's 19 Division I athletic teams entertain more than 100 intercollegiate events on campus each year, attracting over 200,000 spectators.

The Department of Athletics contributes to the University goals of attracting motivated undergraduate and graduate students and producing graduates with the intellectual preparedness necessary for the personal and societal challenges of today and tomorrow.





**DR. FREDERICK
HUTCHINSON**
President

By action of the University of Maine System Board of Trustees, Dr. Frederick E. Hutchinson became the 16th president of the University of Maine on April 1, 1992. A native of Atkinson, Maine, Hutchinson was born June 1, 1930. In 1952, he married Dione Williams, and they have two daughters, Juliana and Karen.

Hutchinson earned his bachelor's ('53) and master's degrees in agronomy at the University of Maine. He earned his doctorate in agronomy from Pennsylvania State University.

Hutchinson was praised by the campus community, the media, and the citizens of the state for his handling of a strict budget cut in his first month on campus.

In addition, Hutchinson has given his support to the athletic program.

"I subscribe to the idea that athletics are a part of the University's image," said Hutchinson in an interview in *MAINE*, the publication of the University of Maine Alumni Association. "There are very good schools in the country that have built a tremendous image with athletic success.

"I'd like to see us maintain all of our sports, the major sports and the Olympic sports, because we need them both. What is important

to me is to decide at what level we are going to compete and be sure that we are putting our athletes on the playing field with an equal chance."

Prior to returning to the University of Maine, Hutchinson was vice president for academic affairs and provost of The Ohio State University. He joined the faculty there in 1985 as director of the Ohio Agricultural Research and Development Center. In 1986, he was named vice president for agricultural administration and dean of the College of Agriculture and later became acting provost on July 1, 1989. On Dec. 1, 1989, Hutchinson was permanently appointed to that position. In addition, he was named senior vice president for academic affairs and provost on Nov. 2, 1990.

As Ohio State's chief academic officer, Hutchinson was responsible for the academic environment on campus. Among the areas reporting to him were all instructional programs, the library system, the Office of Student Affairs, the Office of Minority Affairs, Continuing Education, the Biotechnology Center, the Graduate School, the Honors Center, ROTC, the Sea Grant College, the SuperComputer Center, the University Press, and the Wexner Center for the Visual Arts. The office also oversaw the promotion and tenure process for members of the faculty and initiated a recent revision to the undergraduate curriculum. Academic Affairs also worked with various offices and groups on campus to develop an action plan for the recruitment and retention of black students and a Hispanic action plan.

Before joining Ohio State, Hutchinson was executive director of the Board of International Food and Agricultural Development of the United States Agency for International Development. Earlier, he was a faculty member and vice president for research and public services at UMaine.

Hutchinson joined the faculty at Maine in 1957. He held the positions of chairman of the Department of Plant and Soil Sciences from 1971-72; dean of the College of Life Sciences and Agriculture and director of the Maine Agricultural Experiment Station from

1972-75; vice president for research and public services from 1975-80; and acting vice president for academic affairs from 1980-81. He returned to his post as vice president for research and public services from 1981-82, before taking the federal post.

He has authored numerous journal articles, technical bulletins, and research articles. In addition, he has presented invitational papers at numerous scientific and professional meetings and has participated in several international programs.

Hutchinson is recognized as a leader among agricultural administrators and was instrumental in building the research program at UMaine. He had a positive impact on the significant increase in federal, state and private grant support for research at UMaine.

He has served as chairman of the Maine Food and Farmland Study Commission, the Committee on Erosion and Sediment Control, and the Advisory Committee on the Selection of Coastal Natural Areas. In addition, he served as a member of the Governor's State Energy Resources Advisory Board, the Governor's Committee on Coastal Development Conservation, and the Governor's Land and Water Resources Council.

He has also held the positions of administrative advisor to four regional and interregional agricultural experiment station projects; chairman of the Northeast Association of Agricultural Experiment Station Directors and the Joint Committee under the Board of International Food and Agricultural Development.

From 1986-89, he was on the board of directors of agriculture for the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges. In 1987, he chaired a panel of the National Academy of Sciences Board of Agriculture before accepting a one-year term as president of the Agricultural Research Institute in Washington, D.C.

Currently, he is a member of the board of directors for the International Center for Tropical Agriculture in Colombia.





MICHAEL PLOSZEK
Director of Athletics

Michael Ploszek, 38, begins his third year of leadership at UMaine. Ploszek was appointed director of athletics on August 20, 1991.

A creative and progressive administrator, Ploszek has made an impact on the Athletic Department and the state of Maine.

Ploszek designed and implemented the "Team Maine" concept, which is a comprehensive statewide outreach program developed to enhance the Athletic Department's relationship with various constituencies. The concept includes the A+ Attendance program which recognizes and encourages the academic achievement and dedication of Maine students in grades 7-12. Almost 500 students from 58 Maine schools participated during 1992-93.

In addition, "Team Maine" includes the "Dream Big Dreams" aspirations series, an annual high-school athletic director's visitation program with Walt Abbott and athletic staff members. Together, the "Dream Big Dreams" team made over 75 public speaking appearances in 1992-93 at schools, civic organizations, and various other meetings.

Ploszek is a founding member and co-director of the Maine Center for Coaching Education, a new initiative throughout the state created to

enhance and upgrade the coaching profession throughout the high schools and recreation programs.

Under his direction, the Athletic Department implemented several budget reductions during the past two years and achieved an all-time high in private donations with over \$750,000 raised through the newly created Black Bear Club in 1992-93.

Ploszek was an integral member of the NCAA Division I-AA Football Issue Committee, a group established to evaluate the wide scope and future of Division I-AA football. In addition, he was named director at large to the North Atlantic Conference's Executive Committee and is one of the three members of the HOCKEY EAST Executive Committee.

Before coming to Maine, Ploszek had worked as assistant athletic director for development at Rutgers University in New Brunswick, New

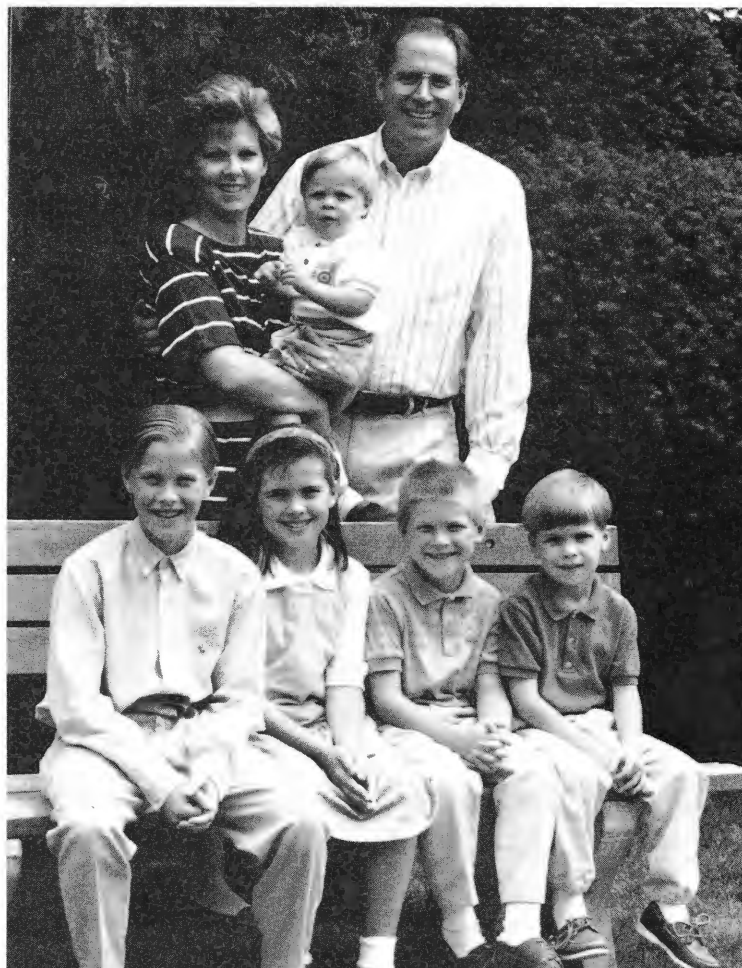
Jersey since 1986. He was responsible for all fund-raising activities related to Rutgers' 30 intercollegiate sports. While at Rutgers, he achieved athletic fund-raising records amounting to over \$10 million.

A 1977 graduate of the University of Notre Dame with a bachelor's degree in business administration, Ploszek was a backup center for the Fighting Irish football team for two seasons.

Following graduation, he spent seven years working in sales, marketing, and management for United States Steel Corporation.

He then accepted a job as regional director of development for Notre Dame in the Chicago area, a position he held until his appointment at Rutgers in 1986.

Ploszek and his wife, Karen, have five children, Mike, 12; Lauren, 10; Matt, 8; Pete, 6; and Luke, 2. The Ploszek family resides in Orono.



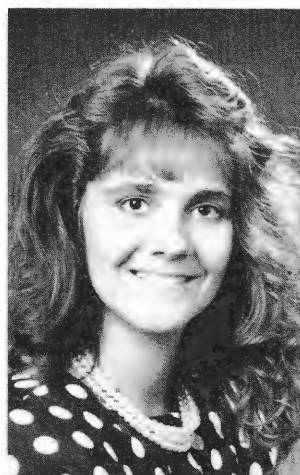

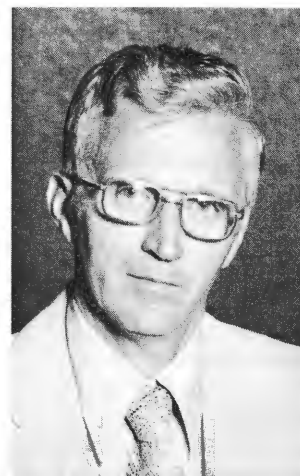

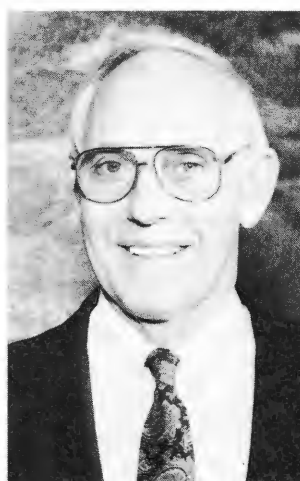

1992-93 Athletic Highlights at UMaine

Baseball

• John Winkin's team wins the NAC Championship and returns to the NCAA Tournament led by NAC Player of the Year Chad White, an All-American, and NAC Pitcher of the Year Mark Ballard.

Basketball (Men)

• Francois Bouchard becomes the 10th player in school history to score 1,000 points and grab 500 rebounds in a career. Casey Arena is named to the NAC's All-Rookie team.

Basketball (Women)

• First-year head coach Joanne Palombo leads the Black Bears to the NAC Championship game for the fourth consecutive year.

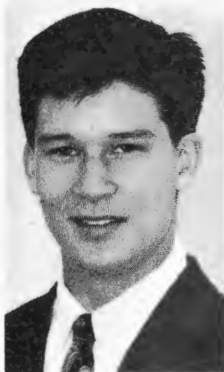

Athletic Academic Support

Each time Margaret Zillioux attends a University of Maine hockey game she sees more than a team of athletes. Her sights go beyond athletic achievement and into the academics and personalities which lie beneath the helmets, shoulder pads and blue and white uniforms.

As Associate Athletic Director for Academic Support, Zillioux's responsibilities include making the student aware of existing support services on campus like the tutoring service, the career center or the faculty advisor program. She also makes sure the student is attending class on a regular basis.

"I work extremely closely with first-year students," says Zillioux. "I wear many different hats. Some students need help with time management. Others need faculty advice or mediating with coaches. I try to ensure that the athletes get off to a good start."

According to Zillioux, head coach Shawn Walsh, a former goalie who suffered a career ending knee injury at Bowling Green State University, realizes the importance of a college degree. He is also aware of the education and guidance an academic support coordinator can provide.

Both Walsh and Zillioux feel a strong, open relationship between coaches, athletes and support staff is a necessity for academic success.

"He is very enthusiastic about this plan," says Zillioux. "He's given me a lot of authority. We want to prevent academic problems."

Zillioux feels Walsh's interest in academics is genuine, making her job more rewarding.

"He's very involved with his kids academically," says Zillioux. "There's a lot of pressure on coaches around the country to say 'academics are our first priority,' but from my experience thus far, I think Coach Walsh is very sincere."

Zillioux sees her role as a communicator with the student. She prefers working face-to-face, rather than writing memos or making telephone calls.

"I like to work closely with the students," says Zillioux. "I want to work first hand with their problems. If we're going to solve any problems, the athletes need someone to trust."

One way of earning that trust is by attending hockey practices, or by sitting near the red line at Alford

Arena on a winter evening.

"If I talk to a player about his position, a good game he's played, a goal he has scored, an assist, he may open up," says Zillioux. "It's important that I'm not always sitting across a desk."

According to Maine's first-year students, the program works.

"The study hall program is a great way to make sure our studies are in order," says first-year player Blair Marsh. "Without this atmosphere it might be tough to get motivated about your school work. But we all realize that you never know when your hockey career is going to end and when you will need that degree. This helps assure we will get a good start on our degrees."

Zillioux is a firm believer in the fact that academic and athletic success can go hand-in-hand. She points to the last two Hobey Baker Memorial Award winners. In addition to the athletic accolades as college hockey's top players over the past two seasons, both Scott Pellerin and Paul Kariya earned HOCKEY EAST All-Academic honors. Last season, eight of nine UMaine seniors received their degrees in May. Jim Montgomery, the school's career scoring leader, Garth Snow, who owns nine career goalie marks, and Dan Murphy, a 1992-93 alternate captain, were named to the HOCKEY EAST All-Academic team.

In addition to her work with the first-year students, Zillioux is involved with upper-class students with marginal grades, any students with questions, as well as students involved in the mandatory study hall.

"It's important the students are actually studying in study hall," she says. "We need to teach them not only to play hockey, but how to play the academic game."

SHAWN WALSH Head Coach

Since his arrival on the Maine campus in 1984, Shawn Walsh has built the nation's dominant hockey program of the past six years. Consider that the Black Bears' record since 1987 is 203-47-10. No team has generated as many wins in that period and the .800 winning percentage bests all others.

Last year, Walsh guided Maine to its sixth consecutive 30-win season, its third HOCKEY EAST regular season title, its third HOCKEY EAST Tournament Championship, its seventh straight NCAA Tournament appearance and its first NCAA National Championship. En route to UMaine's first NCAA Division I team title in any sport, Walsh set a school-record for wins with 42.

Walsh was selected 1993 HOCKEY EAST Coach of the Year, the third time he has received such honors in the last six seasons. In addition, he has been named New England Coach of the Year by the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston three times since 1988.

Walsh's teams have competed in a league-record seven consecutive HOCKEY EAST Championship games. With 140 league wins, Walsh is now the winningest coach in HOCKEY EAST history.

He is a three-time finalist for the Spencer Penrose Trophy given to the nation's Coach of the Year.

Walsh's career record now stands at 250-120-14, a remarkable feat considering that in his first two seasons at Maine, his teams posted 12- and 11-win years. His record of 203-47-10 over the last six seasons is unparalleled by any other Division I coach during that period.

In addition to team excellence, Walsh's teams have produced 22 All-Americans and a pair of U.S. Olympians in the last six years. In addition, Scott Pellerin earned college hockey's most prestigious honor two seasons ago when he was selected to receive the Hobey Baker Memorial Award. And Paul Kariya became the first freshman to win the award in 1993.

Presently, six of Walsh's players from the 1992-93 National Championship squad are skating with Team USA, the nucleus which will comprise the U.S. Olympic Team at Lillehammer, Norway in 1994.

In addition, Kariya has been invited to become a member of the Canadian Olympic Team.

Each of the seven seniors on the

1992-93 roster signed a professional contract following the season. No fewer than 24 former Black Bears were invited to National Hockey League training camps this year, with several others playing in Europe.

In addition, eight members of this year's team have been drafted by NHL teams, while three other underclassmen skating for Team USA have also been claimed in NHL drafts.

Walsh has twice guided the gold-medal winning team at the U.S. Olympic Sports Festival. He also coached the U.S. National Select team to a win over the Soviet Union in 1989.

Although excellence has become tradition for Walsh and the Maine program, success did not come easily for the then youngest Division I hockey coach in the nation.

Prior to the 1984-85 season, Walsh inherited a sub-par ECAC team, and began turning it into a perennial HOCKEY EAST contender. His intensity and strong work ethic have



been key ingredients in the rise of UMaine hockey.

With 250 victories, he is the winningest coach in UMaine hockey history.

In just his third season at UMaine, Walsh guided the Black Bears to the NCAA Tournament. The following year, he led his team to a 34-8-2 record. UMaine marched through HOCKEY EAST with a 20-4-2 record, clinching the title more quickly than any previous team. The Black Bears held the nation's number one ranking for the final eight weeks before falling to eventual national champion Lake Superior in the NCAA semifinals.

For Walsh, the personal accolades were soon to follow as he was the HOCKEY EAST Coach of the Year and New England Division I Coach of the Year in 1988.

In 1989-90, Walsh took an underclass squad and guided it to a 31-14 mark and the team's third consecutive trip to the HOCKEY EAST Championship game. The Black Bears earned their second straight trip to the NCAA semifinals, falling to local favorite Minnesota at St. Paul.

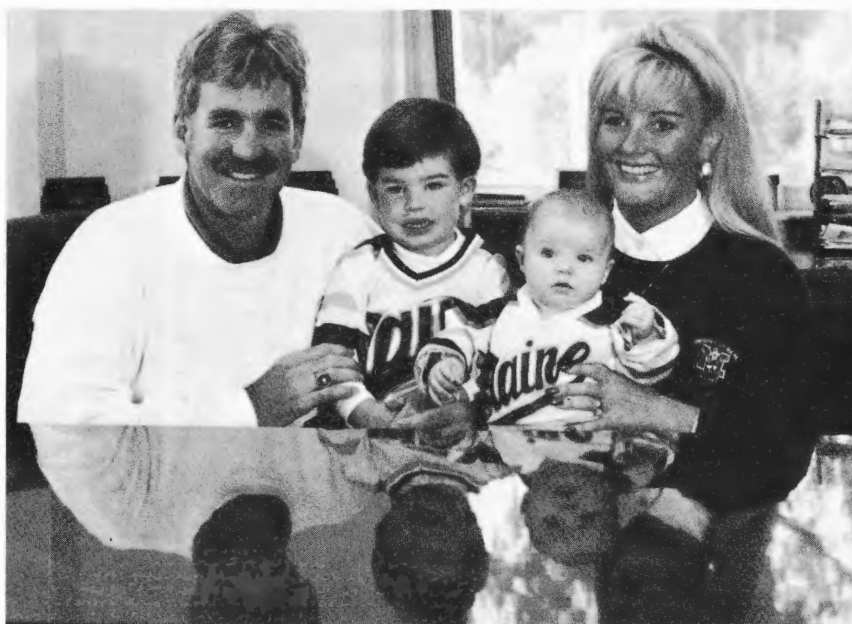
The following year, UMaine posted a 33-11-2 record and again played in the HOCKEY EAST Championship game. The Black Bears' fourth straight trip to the NCAA Tournament resulted in a quarter-final loss at Madison to eventual national champion Wisconsin.

The 1990-91 season was another fruitful one for Walsh as the Black Bears returned to the NCAA semifinals for the third time in four years. The Black Bears' 32-9-2 mark earned them a top seed in the NCAA Tournament, but eventual national champion Northern Michigan ended the season in the semifinals.

In 1991-92, Walsh's team finished the regular season with a nation-best 31-4-2 mark before falling to Michigan State, 3-2, at the NCAA East Regional at Providence, R.I.

In 1992-93, the team marched to a school record 42 wins en route to the HOCKEY EAST regular season and tournament titles and the NCAA National Championship. The record of 42-1-2 ranks among the best single-season winning percentages in the history of college hockey.

The Black Bears flirted with hockey immortality, posting a 32-game un-



beaten streak to start the season.

Following an overtime loss to Boston University, UMaine won its last 12 games including a dramatic win over Lake Superior in the title game at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee, Wis.

Trailing 4-2, senior captain Jim Montgomery scored three goals in a span of 4:35 to give the Black Bears a 5-4 advantage and the NCAA Championship.

Walsh has turned UMaine hockey into one of the hottest commodities in college athletics. His Black Bears have played before 138 consecutive standing-room only crowds at Alford Arena and UMaine consistently ranks among the top 10 teams in the nation in overall attendance.

Walsh is a 1978 graduate of Bowling Green State University, where he earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees in education.

It was at Bowling Green where he began to concentrate on coaching, working with Ted Sator at a high school in Ohio. In his senior year at Bowling Green, Walsh coached the junior varsity hockey team and also worked with head coach Ron Mason at the varsity level. Walsh remained at Bowling Green for two additional seasons with Mason, before the two men moved to Michigan State to boost its sagging program.

Prior to Walsh and Mason arriving at MSU in 1979, the Spartans had failed to qualify for the WCHA playoffs in three straight seasons. While

at MSU, Walsh helped lead the Spartans to three consecutive CCHA titles and to the NCAA semifinals in 1983-84, his final year.

In addition to his collegiate coaching, Walsh is the first vice president of the American Hockey Coaches Association. He directs the Maine Hockey School and is co-owner of the Huron Hockey School.

Walsh is married to the former Tracey Mason, and the couple resides in Veazie with their three-year-old son Tyler and six-month-old son Travis.

GRANT STANDBROOK
Assistant Coach

Grant Standbrook is in his sixth season as UMaine's primary recruiter. Since coming to UMaine in 1988, Standbrook has coordinated the recruiting of five outstanding freshman classes. Last season's first-year group, which included Paul Kariya and Chris and Peter Ferraro, was considered by many to be one of the top recruiting classes in college hockey history.

Before coming to UMaine, Standbrook was an assistant coach at Wisconsin where he played an integral part in the Badgers winning three national championships during his 12-year tenure at that school. Wisconsin won national titles in 1977, 1981 and 1983 in addition to reaching the NCAA championships on two other occasions.

From 1970-75, he was the head coach at Dartmouth College where his teams posted a 52-66-3 mark.

In 1987-88, Grant was the head coach of Varese-Kronenberg of the Italian league where he led the team to a second place finish.

He was an assistant coach of the 1976 U.S. Olympic hockey team and the U.S. National teams in 1974 and 1975.

A 57-year old native of Winnipeg, Manitoba, he began his hockey coaching career at Churchill High School in his hometown.

He is a 1961 graduate of the University of Minnesota-Duluth, where he captained the Bulldog hockey team in his senior season.

He is married, and he and his wife, Joy, have three children.



GREG CRONIN
Assistant Coach

Greg Cronin begins his second tenure with the Black Bear hockey program. Cronin previously coached at UMaine as a graduate assistant from 1988-90 when he coordinated all conditioning programs in addition to his duties with game preparation and opponent scouting. He received his master's degree from UMaine in 1990.

Cronin most recently served as an assistant coach at Colorado College from 1990-93. He was the interim co-head coach from September until November of 1992.

While at Colorado College, he coordinated practices and all pre-and post-season conditioning programs. In addition, he handled all video work and was involved in recruiting.

A 1986 graduate of Colby College, Cronin was a four-year letter winner for coach Mickey Goulet. He later served as an assistant coach at Colby from 1987-88.

Cronin has also worked with USA Hockey at several Elite Training Development Camps.

1993-94 Maine Hockey Outlook

The 1992-93 season marked a year of unparalleled accomplishments for the University of Maine hockey team: The school celebrated its first NCAA Division I team championship in any sport, four in-season tournament titles, the HOCKEY EAST regular season crown and the HOCKEY EAST Championship. With a school record 42 wins, and an incredible .956 winning percentage the accolades afforded last year's team might not be seen at any college in the near future.

When UMaine takes the ice to open the season at Providence College nearly seven months will have passed since the Black Bears' 5-4 win over Lake Superior in the National Championship game. Of the 20 players who were in uniform on that memorable night, only seven return to the Orono campus this fall. Two of those players will likely depart before this season ends.

While head coach Shawn Walsh and his Black Bears are in the enviable position of defending their National Championship, the task at hand is both exhilarating and precarious. If UMaine is to become the first team to repeat as the nation's best team since 1972 it will need solid efforts from many unproven players.

Start in net where both Garth Snow and Mike Dunham have departed. The duo posted a combined record of 105-14-6 with a 2.59 goals against average and an .875 save percentage since 1990.

Dunham, a junior who signed with New Jersey and is playing for Team USA, was a first team All-HOCKEY EAST choice last season after a 21-1-1 year with a 2.46 goals against average.



Snow was simply the nation's top goalie in 1992-93 going 21-0-1 with a 2.08 goals against average and a .915 save percentage. Like Dunham, Snow is playing for Team USA before embarking on a professional career.

The unproven talent in net is centered around a pair of first-year players. Blair Marsh, who sat out 1992-93 as a redshirt, is a former first team All-Star for Victoria of the Coastal Division of the British Columbia Junior Hockey League.

Blair Allison will join UMaine this fall after leading Estevan to the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League championship series last season.

Junior Peter Nordell was the Most Valuable Player of the 1993 National Junior College Tournament for the University of Minnesota-Crookston.

A question mark entering the 1993-94 season as three regulars are gone from a team that allowed just 108 goals in 45 games a season ago.

Senior Chris Imes, an alternate captain and All-America choice last

season when he scored 12 goals and added 23 assists with a nation-best +59 rating, is currently skating for Team USA. A supplemental draft choice of the Florida Panthers in June, Imes may return to UMaine following the Olympics.

Matt Martin opted to forgo his final season of eligibility and signed with the Toronto Maple Leafs following last season's title run. After scoring six goals and 26 assists and compiling 88 penalty minutes, Martin, like Imes, has taken his

talents to Team USA.

Dan Murphy has graduated and is playing in the Boston Bruins' organization. The senior was a solid defenseman playing in 164 games in his career with a +64 rating.

Returning veteran defensemen include junior Dave MacIsaac (5-32-37), a HOCKEY EAST All-Rookie choice last season; junior Andy Silverman (1-7-8), a former UMaine Rookie of the Year; and seniors Jason Weinrich (1-8-9) and Lee Saunders (7-12-19), who is best remembered for his game-winning goal in overtime in Maine's 4-3 victory over Michigan in the NCAA semifinals. Junior Jacque Rodrigue, a former All-USHL selection with North Iowa, had a pair of assists in limited action last season.

Newcomers Jason Mansoff, who played for Merritt in the British Columbia Junior Hockey League and Jeff Tory, who played for Penticton of the BCJHL are also being counted upon to help eliminate any deficiencies along the blueline.

Another new face at defense is Leo Wlasow, who will become the third European player to wear the UMaine uniform. Wlasow may also play forward for the Black Bears.

Seven of the 12 forwards who skated at the NCAA Championship game have departed.

First and foremost, UMaine's career scoring leader, Jim Montgomery (103-198-301 in 170 games), has graduated. The only player in Eastern college hockey to score more than 300 points, Montgomery has taken his talents to the St. Louis Blues this season. Perhaps more important than Montgomery's 95 points last season (32-63) was his invaluable leadership. The first lone captain in Walsh's nine years at Maine, Montgomery's "follow me" attitude was never more evident than in the NCAA Championship game. With UMaine trailing defending national champion Lake Superior 4-2 entering the third period, Montgomery registered a natural hat trick in a span of 4:35 for a 5-4 Black Bear advantage.

Gone to Team USA are the Ferraro twins, Chris and Peter, who registered the seventh and ninth highest first-year scoring totals in UMaine history.

Chris Ferraro was a HOCKEY EAST All-Rookie choice with 25 goals and 26 assists. Peter Ferraro, a first round draft choice of the New York Rangers in 1992, had 18 goals and 32 assists with a school-record 106 penalty minutes.

Also departed are seniors Eric Fenton, who scored a career-high 21 goals in 1992-93; alternate captain Dave LaCouture, who played in 118 games over his final three years at Maine; Kent Salfi (10-13-23 in 1992-93), one of the Black Bears' top penalty killers; and Martin Mercier, who scored 23 goals and added 25 assists in his career. Each player will play professionally this season.

One player returning for Maine, for the time being, is 1993 Hobey Baker Memorial Award recipient Paul Kariya.

Kariya dominated college hockey like no freshman before, registering a school-record 100 points (25-75) while scoring in 38 of 39 games for the Black Bears. The first player since Brian Leetch to win both the

HOCKEY EAST Player of the Year and Rookie of the Year awards in the same season, Kariya is the first freshman to win the Hobey Baker award.

A first round draft choice of the Anaheim Mighty Ducks (fourth overall) this past June, Kariya has returned to UMaine for the first semester while following his dream of playing for Team Canada at the 1994 Winter Olympics.

Forgotten among last season's accomplishments are those of senior Cal Ingraham, a second team All-America choice. The 5-4 right wing scored a school-record 46 goals while leading the nation in that category.

Hidden among the outstanding first-year performances was that of junior Mike Latendresse. After missing the first four games of the season while serving a suspension for playing Major Junior A in 1990, Latendresse quietly scored 21 goals and added 30 assists in 40 games.

Senior Patrice Tardif was a linemate of Latendresse for most of the season, recording a career-high 48 points (23-25).

The play of Ingraham, Tardif and Latendresse, while out of the shadows of the likes of Montgomery, could go a long way in determining how far the Black Bears will go this season.

Senior Justin Tomberlin was one of 10 Black Bears to sign professional contracts last season. However, Tomberlin inked a deal with the Minnesota Twins after a season at UMaine in which he hit .333 for the NCAA Tournament participants.

The third baseman hit .258 in his first season of professional ball at Ft. Wayne (Class A).

Tomberlin scored 13 goals and added nine assists in 34 games last season and plans to play hockey at UMaine until the Twins call in the spring.

Sophomore Brad Purdie (3-7-10 in 20 games), senior Chuck Teixeira (1-3-4 in 13 games) and sophomore Wayne Conlan (8-4-12 in 24 career games), who played baseball at UMaine in 1993, are other veterans expected to contribute offensively this year.

Redshirt freshmen expected to play this season include Barry Clukey, the nation's top high school

career scorer (356 points) and Brad Mahoney, who previously played at Tabor Academy.

Newcomers in the fold include Dan Shermerhorn, Trevor Roenick, Reg Cardinal, Tony Frenette, Mike Ray, Tim Lovell and Marcel Pineau.

Shermerhorn was the top scorer in the British Columbia Junior Hockey League a season ago when he had 46 goals and 84 assists in 60 games for the Vernon Lakers. Shermerhorn narrowly missed the BCJHL totals of Kariya (46-86-132) in his final season.

Roenick, the younger brother of Chicago Black Hawks All-Star Jeremy Roenick, played last season for the Boston Junior Bruins where he scored 61 goals and added 48 assists in 58 games. This past summer, Roenick participated in the U.S. Olympic Sports Festival.

Cardinal played for Ft. McMurray in the Alberta Junior Hockey League in 1991-92 before enrolling in classes at UMaine last season. Cardinal scored 35 goals and added 54 assists in his last season of competitive hockey.

Frenette was a teammate of Cardinal at Ft. McMurray two seasons ago when he scored 42 goals and added 35 assists in 48 games. Last season, Frenette played in 30 games at Ft. McMurray scoring 38 goals with 20 assists before enrolling in classes at UMaine.

Lovell was a teammate of Roenick's with the Boston Junior Bruins after playing at Norwood (Mass.) High School. Last season, he scored 86 goals and added 116 assists in 72 games in the NEJHL.

Ray, a native of Lynnfield, Mass., played his high school hockey at Governor Dummer Academy.

Pineau scored 41 goals over the past two seasons at Kimball Union Academy.

Schedule

In addition to its HEA slate, UMaine travels to Minnesota for the Mariucci Classic. Host Minnesota, NCAA finalist Lake Superior and Cornell round out the field.

This season's Dexter Classic includes fifth-ranked Rensselaer, Bowling Green and Illinois Chicago.

UMaine plays a two-game series with Ferris State and single games with ECAC powers Clarkson, St. Lawrence and Harvard.

This Is HOCKEY EAST

In the 1989-90 HOCKEY EAST yearbook, the introduction contained the following quote: "HOCKEY EAST, now in its Fifth Anniversary season, has evolved as one of the premier intercollegiate hockey conferences in the nation. HOCKEY EAST is an organization with a past full of achievement and a vision for an even greater future.

As we begin the 10th Anniversary of HOCKEY EAST, the achievements have continued to grow and the greater future has been assured. The league is composed of eight institutions of higher learning, with campuses located throughout New England. Membership in HOCKEY EAST includes Boston College, Boston University, University of Massachusetts - Lowell, University of Maine, Merrimack College, University of New Hampshire, Northeastern University and Providence College. In January of its 10th year, HOCKEY EAST will welcome the University of Massachusetts - Amherst to membership and the Minutemen will begin a full season of league competition in 1994-95.

History of the League

The impetus behind the formation of HOCKEY EAST came as a result of a move by the presidents of six Ivy League schools, in June of 1983, to form their own hockey outside the ECAC structure. Anticipating this move, the Athletic Directors at five schools — Bill Flynn of Boston College, John Simpson at Boston University, Andy Mooradian at New Hampshire, Joe Zabiliski at Northeastern and Lou Lamoriello of Providence — joined together to form the new college hockey conference ... the HOCKEY EAST ASSOCIATION. On July 11, 1983, the five schools became charter members, and later that summer, Maine and the University of Lowell were added. HOCKEY EAST officially began competition in the 1984-85 season. Merrimack College joined in January 1989, and completed its fourth year in the conference last season.

Success in Nine Short Years

HOCKEY EAST has brought together eight strong college hockey programs, each with a major commitment to developing and maintaining a balance of academic excellence and strong athletic competition.

The caliber of student-athletes that HOCKEY EAST has been able to attract is second to none. During the 1992-93 season, 37 of the top players in the league were named to the HOCKEY EAST Academic Honor Roll. Each of the student-athletes named to this honored group posted at least a 3.00 grade point average in each of the two semesters of the academic year. Among the HOCKEY EAST academic honorees were some of the top college hockey players in the nation- Paul Kariya, the league's Rookie and Player of the Year and recipient of the 1993 Hobey Baker Memorial Award; Jim Montgomery, the Most Outstanding Player in the NCAA Tournament and the leading career scorer in eastern hockey; and Garth Snow, who led the nation's goaltenders with a 22-0-1 record, a 2.08 goals against average and a .915 save percentage.

In addition to the classroom excellence, HOCKEY EAST teams have succeeded on the ice as well. HEA has been represented at the NCAA semifinal round 10 times in nine years (BC 1985 and 1990, BU 1990, 1991 and 1993, Maine 1988, 1989, 1990 and 1993, and Providence 1985). Maine became the first HEA team to win the National Championship last season.

In just nine short years, HOCKEY EAST teams have proven themselves among the top teams in the nation. As a league, the 1992-93 HOCKEY EAST teams combined to post a 57-25-7 (.680) record against non-league competition. HEA teams earned a 13-3-0 mark vs. the CCHA; 6-2-0 vs. the WCHA and a 23-17-6 record vs. the ECAC.

Over the past four years HOCKEY EAST teams have posted a 257-129-14 (.660) record versus non-league competition including. HEA is .667 against the CCHA, 624 vs. the ECAC and .586 vs. the WCHA since the start of the 1989-90 season.

Robert M. DeGregorio, Jr., Director of Athletics at Merrimack College, will serve as Commissioner of HOCKEY EAST for the 1993-94 season. He succeeds Stuart P. Haskell, Jr., who resigned to devote full-time energies to his position as Commissioner of the North Atlantic Conference, an eight-team, 20-sport league.

DeGregorio has served as the leading force in the growth and development of athletics at Merrimack College over the past 10 years and was, in great part, responsible for Merrimack joining HOCKEY EAST in the 1989-90 season. He has been a member of the Board of Directors of the league since that time, serving on the Finance and Executive Committees, and is currently the Chair of the Executive Committee for the league.

Boasting an extensive administrative and coaching background dating back nearly 20 years, DeGregorio joined the staff at Merrimack in 1978 as the business manager for the Department of Athletics and for the college's S. Peter Volpe Physical Education Center.

Since his promotion to Director of Athletics in May 1983, DeGregorio has sat on numerous committees and held many posts at Merrimack, as well as serving his institution nationally on NCAA committees and regionally with the Northeast-10 Conference and the ECAC.

Under DeGregorio's leadership at Merrimack, thousands of dollars in athletic scholarship monies have been raised and three new fields have been constructed to accommodate baseball, softball, soccer and lacrosse teams. In addition, the Warrior athletic program has expanded from 12 to 15 varsity sports. In the summer of 1993, construction began on a major addition to and renovation of the Volpe Athletic Complex, to include new offices, physical training and weight room, aerobics room, and major alterations to other existing spaces.

As Merrimack's softball mentor for eight years, Bob guided the Warriors to four Northeast-10 Conference titles and an appearance in the NCAA Division II Tournament in 1991.

A current resident of Methuen, Mass., and a native of Winthrop, Mass., DeGregorio graduated from Boston State College with a bachelor of science degree in education in 1973.

Bob and his wife, Nancy, have two children: Leah, 8, and Robert, 5.

Dr. Norinne "Nonni" Daly began her first year as HOCKEY EAST Assistant Commissioner on August 15, 1991 and shared her duties, serving also as Assistant Commissioner of the North Atlantic Conference. On July 1, 1992, she became full-time Assistant Commissioner for HOCKEY EAST. Her primary responsibilities include marketing, promotions and public relations. In her first year on the job, the HOCKEY EAST 1991-92 Yearbook earned a Citation of Excellence and a fifth place finish in the country among all Division I conference publications from CoSIDA, the College Sports Information Directors of America organization.

In addition to writing and editing all publications produced by the league, Daly is responsible for the weekly press releases and statistical updates. She coordinates the playoff tournament, the HOCKEY EAST Gift Line which offers clothing and promotional souvenirs, assists with the league schedules and with league officials. She also works with the Commissioner in securing corporate sponsorships for the league and league playoffs.

Daly, a graduate of the University of Maine in 1959, received both her master's and doctoral degrees from the University of Georgia in 1965 and 1967 respectively. Her academic work has been in the areas of psychology and education, with concentration in research on behavioral and learning styles. She joined the publishing firm of Harcourt Brace Jovanovich, Inc., in New York City, in 1968 and served in several capacities, the last as President of the Center of Curriculum Development, which produced educational materials for elementary and high school students in all content areas.

The Dexter Hockey Classic

Recognized as one of the premier college hockey holiday tournaments in the nation, the Dexter Classic is now in its seventh consecutive year. The annual tournament, sponsored by the Dexter Shoe Company, was first played in 1987, the brainchild of University of Maine head coach Shawn Walsh and Harold Alfond, the former owner of the Dexter Shoe Co.

Last season the Dexter Classic attracted a tournament-record 10,816 fans for the two-day event. Each of the four teams invited to last season's classic, Brown, Lake Superior, Miami and UMaine, competed in its respective conference's championship game and each was an NCAA Tournament participant. UMaine and Lake Superior were NCAA finalists.

The first four Dexter Classics were played in late December, while the last two were played in early January. This season, the Dexter Classic moves to November 26-27.

Bowling Green, the only team other than UMaine to claim a Dexter title and the first three-time invitee, returns to the tournament. The Falcons were Dexter Classic champions in the inaugural year of 1987 when they defeated Alaska Fairbanks, 6-3, and UMaine, 6-5.

BGSU was also a participant in 1989 when it dropped the title game to the Black Bears, 7-4.

Illinois-Chicago and Rensselaer will make their first appearance in the Dexter Hockey Classic this year. UMaine and the Flames have never met, while the Black Bears and Engineers have not played since 1984 when the two were members of the ECAC.

Rensselaer and Bowling Green will play the opening game at 4 p.m. on November 26 with UMaine and Illinois-Chicago to follow.

Consolation and championship games will take place at 4 and 7 the following evening.

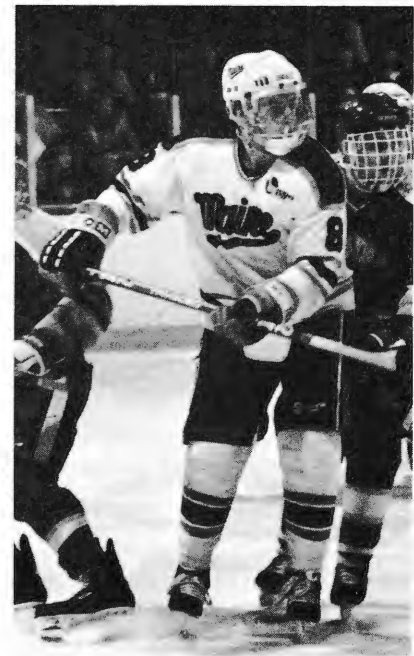

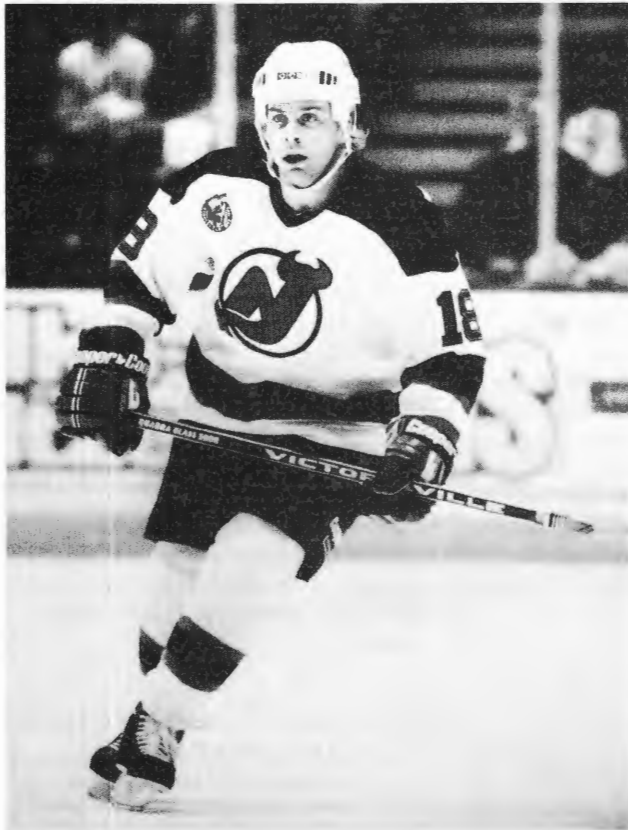

Alfond Arena

One of the finest college hockey facilities in the country, the Harold Alfond Sports Arena has served the University community since 1977. Completed in February of that year, the building was dedicated by Mr. Alfond and officials of the University on November 18 at the Maine-Acadia hockey game.

Due to the demand of sellout-after-sellout at the old capacity of 3,800 and a \$2 million gift from Mr. Alfond, the Alfond Arena underwent a significant expansion project prior to the 1991-92 season.

Mr. Alfond's generous gift represents the largest one-time (non-posthumous) cash contribution ever received by the University of Maine.

Since 1968, Mr. Alfond has donated more than \$4 million to the University of Maine.

The construction provided an ad-

ditional 1,200 seats to each side to increase in capacity to 5,200 for hockey games.

Included in the Arena expansion were additional concession areas and rest rooms, locker rooms, ticket offices and souvenir stands and improved media facilities.

With the expansion, Alfond Arena became the home of the Black Bear basketball teams, which had played home games at the Bangor Auditorium from 1988-91.

In addition to being the home of the Black Bears, the building is used by youth, high school and senior hockey leagues, and for concerts and graduation ceremonies.

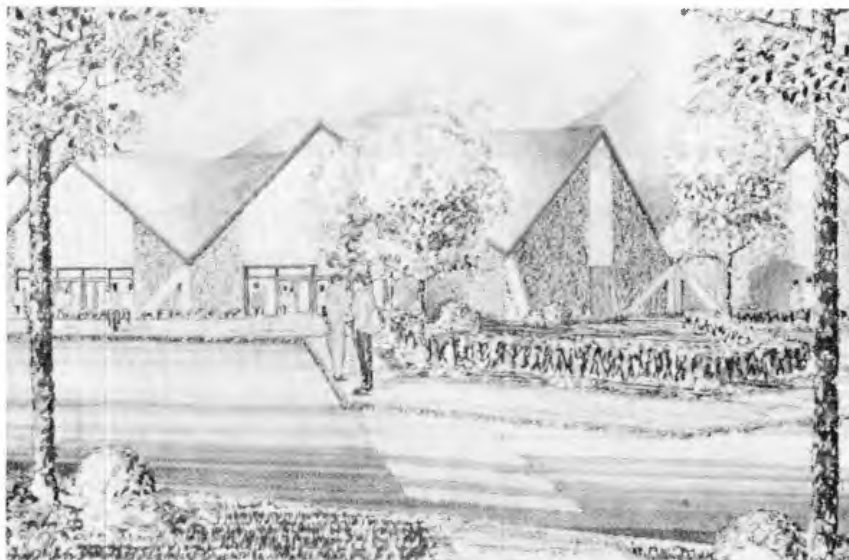
The complex is a modern facility with virtually no obstructed-view seats in the building and an excellent view of the ice.

Alfond Arena was built with the generous contributions of more

than 2,000 people, headed by Mr. Alfond. An addition to the south end of the Arena in 1988 houses the Black Bears' impressive new locker room facility, which includes fully equipped weight and training rooms. Included in that expansion project was an attractive lounge for use by the hockey program and the University community.

In 1990, an office addition was completed, providing the coaching and administrative staffs much needed room to perform effectively. Entering the 1993-94 season, the Black Bears had played before standing-room-only crowds in 138 consecutive regular season games.

In 1992-93, Maine again led all HOCKEY EAST schools in attendance and was sixth in the nation with an average of 5,353 at each game.
