The University of Maine is the state's center of learning, discovery, and service to the public. As the flagship university of the University of Maine System and the state's land-grant and sea-grant institution, the University of Maine has the unique responsibility for providing high-quality undergraduate and graduate education programs, public service, and basic and applied research.

Located in Orono, within close proximity to the ocean, lakes, and mountains, the University of Maine offers an inspiring learning environment. There is plenty of open space on its 1,200 acres, where students are offered the diversity and the challenge of a large university in an invigorating atmosphere of a small college. The campus is located 10 miles north of Bangor, Maine's third largest city.

The University's undergraduate and graduate educational offerings are built upon a liberal arts and sciences foundation complemented by profession-oriented education in a wide range of disciplines, many of which are found nowhere else in the state. Because of their responsibility to teach, conduct research, and serve the public, faculty members are able to incorporate the new knowledge they uncover with classroom activities, often giving students hands-on experience in the research process.

The University offers its students, faculty, and staff, as well as the people of the community and the state, an outstanding athletic tradition. Several Black Bear teams have excelled to regional and national promi-

nence, including the Black Bear ice hockey team, the 1993 NCAA Division I national champions. UMaine's 19 Division I sports entertain more than 100 intercollegiate events on campus each year attracting 200,000 spectators.

Included on UMaine's athletic staff is an academic coordinator responsible for closely monitoring the progress of each of the 600 varsity student-athletes. Coaches also monitor and advise their student-athletes, frequently holding meetings specifically to discuss academic situations. Study halls and special tutorial sessions are scheduled daily as a way to enhance the learning process. This support and close scrutiny has been a significant reason the overall grade point average of student-athletes has been higher than that of the general student body, and over the past two calendar years, fully one-third of all student-athletes at UMaine have achieved Scholar-Athlete status (grade point average over 3.0 for two consecutive semesters). The primary goal of the University and the athletic department is to see each individual reach his or her academic potential.

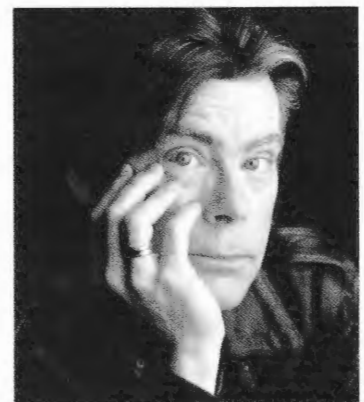
## THE UNIVERSITY OF MAINE

### The Maine Facts:

- Enrollment is on the rise at the University of Maine. Approximately 1,600 first-year students enrolled at UMaine in the fall of 1999. The class is 450 students larger than the class that enrolled in 1997.
- The average SAT score of the 1998 entering class was 1,088, 79 points above the state average and 74 above the national average.
- Over 70 percent of the 1998 entering class cited the University of Maine as their first choice.
- The Maine Business School is one of 300 accredited by the America Association of Colleges of Business Administration and the lone accredited program in the state.
- The UMaine graduate forestry program is ranked in the top five nationally.
- The College of Education and Human Development offers the only teacher preparation and professional development programs in Maine that are accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education.
- In the College of Engineering, the 1998 class has an average SAT score of 1197, 201 points above the national average.

## President

**D**r. Peter S. Hoff became president of the University of Maine on August 1, 1997, following his appointment by the University of Maine System Board of Trustees upon the recommendation of System Chancellor Terrence J. MacTaggart.

During his first year in office, President Hoff focused on several major issues facing the university and the people of Maine.

Around the state, in visits to schools, service organizations, and businesses, President Hoff has talked about the University's role in improving Maine's quality of life and the state's economy. He has also spoken of the University's role in helping Maine's young people find educational and economic opportunities in Maine, and promoting high aspirations among those younger citizens. His first year as President was recognized by many for its action and leadership.

One of President Hoff's most ambitious undertakings was the development of a University action plan called BearWorks. That 80-item document, provides a list of priorities, goals and objectives designed to enable the University of Maine to fulfill its mission and potential as the flagship of the state university system. The plan calls for UMaine to achieve the following fundamental goals:

- a land-grant University with a Maine focus and a human scale
- a strong and dynamic University
- a collegial community of learners, and
- Maine's college of choice.

During President Hoff's brief tenure, first-year student enrollment has risen and, recognizing the University's importance and value to Maine, state appropriations for research and development at UMaine have increased.

President Hoff says he is a strong believer in the special role the University of Maine plays in the lives of Maine people.

"As the state's flagship university and its land-grant and sea-grant institution, the University of Maine serves the entire state," he explains "UMaine is actively working in every county with local businesses, industries, farmers, governments, and citizens to

address their most pressing social and economic needs.

"The University is an essential, relevant, and valued resource for the state," President Hoff stresses. "It is a thriving and vital institution with major responsibilities and public expectations."

Prior to his appointment as UMaine's president, Hoff served as Senior Advisor to the Chancellor of The California State University. He joined the California system in 1993 as Senior Vice Chancellor, Academic Affairs, a position he held until 1996. President Hoff also served as Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University System of Georgia (1990-1993) and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at Indiana University Southeast (1987-1990).

He received a B.A. degree in 1966, from the University of Wisconsin in Madison. He began his career teaching English in 1970 at the University of Wisconsin System after completing his M.A. and his Ph.D. in English and Humanities at Stanford University in 1968 and 1970, respectively.

Hoff, his wife Dianne, and 15-year-old son Jay, reside in the President's House, a stately Victorian home located on campus.

## Director of Athletics

**U**nder the tenure of Dr. Suzanne J. Tyler, the University of Maine

continues to strive to greater heights. She began her tenure as director of athletics on October 1, 1995.

Among the accomplishments the department has reached under her guidance are the grand opening of Morse Field at Alford Sports Stadium, plans for the Michael Kessock Softball facility, and balancing the department budget in 1998 and 1999. Last year, the men's ice hockey team captured its second national championship and the women's basketball team won its first-ever NCAA Tournament game in its sixth-straight 20-win season.

As UMaine's athletic director, Tyler is responsible for programs and facilities involving 20 intercollegiate athletic teams, as well as intramural and recreational programs involving approximately 6,500 students, employees, and members of the community. She oversees a \$7.9 million budget, much of which is generated through ticket and merchandise sales, private donations, and fees.

Tyler came to UMaine after serving as the senior associate athletic director at the 25,000-student University of Maryland at College Park.

She earned a Ph.D. in Physical Education, Sports Psychology from Maryland in 1986. Since 1973 she had been employed by that university, starting as an instructor and coach. She holds the distinction of being the only Division I coach to win NCAA national championships in two different sports, lacrosse and field hockey.

Tyler coached lacrosse at Maryland in 1974 and from 1976-90, directing her team to the NCAA title in 1986. She was the national Coach of the Year in 1984 and 1986.

She served as head field hockey coach at Maryland from 1974-87, leading the Terapins to the NCAA title in her final season.

From 1987-89 she served as an assistant athletic director before being elevated to associate athletic director in 1989. She held that title until 1991 when she was named the senior associate athletic director and senior woman administrator.

Tyler also served as the acting athletic director at Maryland from July-October, 1990.

In 1995, Tyler became the second woman ever elected to the University of Maryland Hall of Fame. She has served on numerous national committees and currently is a member of the NCAA Women's Basketball committee.

Tyler received her B.S. in Physical Education from Northeastern University in 1969. She earned her M.S. in Physical Education, Sports Psychology from The Pennsylvania State University in 1972.

Tyler and her husband, Dennis Casey, have two children — Andrew, 9, and Alexis, 7. They live in Glenburn.



## ACADEMIC SUPPORT PROGRAMS

The University of Maine has a commitment to offering a comprehensive academic support program for student-athletes. The University of Maine Academic Support Program for Student Athletes has expanded its services to include a variety of progressive and proactive support programs to assist the student-athlete in developing academically and personally.

### ACADEMIC SUPPORT

All student athletes receive academic support upon committing to the University of Maine. After the signing of the letter of intent, student-athletes are given information regarding admission and registration procedures.

**Orientation.** The first-year student-athlete is provided an orientation program informing them of athletic and eligibility issues, in addition to resources available on campus. This orientation draws together many campus constituencies and provides the first-year student-athletes with the opportunity to discover all that the University of Maine has to offer—both academically and culturally.

**Academic Monitoring.** Throughout their college career, student-athletes are monitored by the academic counseling staff to ensure academic progress toward their degree program. In order to enhance knowledge of the academic progress of student-athletes during the semester, grade reports are sent to faculty twice per semester. In addition, the student-athletes receive information frequently regarding the requirements of their degree program as well as the academic requirements of the NCAA.

**Academic Mentoring.** In some cases it is necessary to provide additional support to

student-athletes. When this is deemed necessary, academic mentors are made available to student-athletes. These mentors provide time management and study skill instructions as well as tutorial assistance when necessary.

### Tutorial Program.

All students at the University of Maine have access to tutors free of charge for 100 and 200 level courses through the Onward program. Tutorial support is also provided on a limited basis to student-athletes through the Academic Support Programs.

**Computer Facilities.** In addition to the computer facilities available to all University of Maine students, the Sam Sezak Academic Lounge houses a computer facility for the exclusive use of student-athletes. This facility is open at accommodating hours to fill the needs of student-athletes' hectic schedules.

### LIFE SKILLS

The goal of the life skills program is to help student-athletes as people, students and aspiring professionals.

**Life Skills Seminars.** Student-athletes work with the Life Skills Coordinator and campus members to design and select life skills workshops covering a variety of areas: career development, alcohol and drug education, team building, nutrition, and study skills.

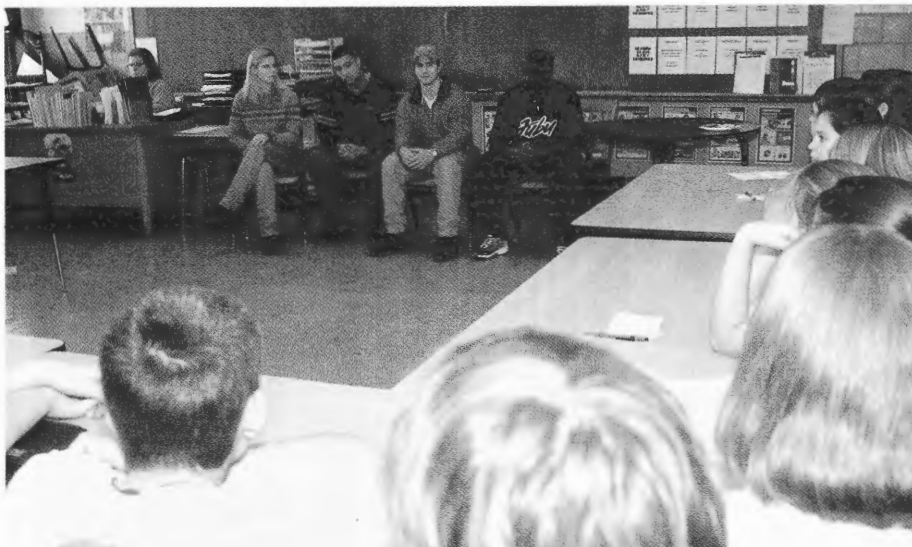


**Multicultural Programs.** The University of Maine and its Athletic Department have a commitment to supporting diversity within the campus community. A liaison relationship involving full-time staff members has developed between the Office of Multicultural Affairs and the Department of Athletics to promote an appreciation of diversity and to serve the student-athletes of different cultures.

**Student-Athlete Advisory Board.** The board is comprised of members of all intercollegiate sports teams at UMaine. The board meets with pertinent athletic and academic administrators regularly to discuss issues of relevance to the student-athlete population, and to lobby for changes which the student-athletes feel are necessary to promote their growth as athletes and members of the community.

**Outreach.** Opportunities exist through the Community Outreach Program for student-athletes to gain valuable public speaking experience while they give back to the community. Student-athletes speak at numerous schools and community groups throughout the year.

**Scholar-Athlete Recognition.** In addition to providing academic support to the student-athletes at UMaine, the staff also recognizes their academic accomplishments. Each spring a recognition reception and ceremony is held at which those athletes who have earned a 3.0 minimum grade point average are acknowledged and presented with medallions. The ceremony is held during halftime of a basketball game, so members of the community can recognize the academic achievements of the student-athletes at the University of Maine. Last February, 106 medallions were awarded.

# 1998-99 ATHLETIC HIGHLIGHTS AT UMAINE

## Baseball

- First-year outfielder Mike Ross earns Collegiate Baseball Freshman All-American and AMERICA EAST Rookie of the Year honors in leading UMaine back to the league tournament. Senior captain Gregg Jarvais is drafted and signed by the Boston Red Sox.

## Basketball (Men)

- UMaine ties the school record for wins (19) and the University mark for league wins (13) while Andy Bedard, Nate Fox, and Allen Ledbetter received All-Conference honors and freshman Huggy Dye is named to the All-Rookie team.

## Basketball (Women)

- America East Coach of the Year Joanne Palombo-McCallie guides the Black Bears to their seventh regular season league championship and fifth-straight NCAA Tournament. The squad upsets Stanford in the first round of the NCAA Championship. Jamie Cassidy is selected America East Player of the Year and was also joined by Kristen McCormick and Amy Vachon on the All-Conference teams.

## Field Hockey

- The Black Bears celebrate the grand-opening of a new facility, Morse Field at Alford Stadium, and also broke into the national rankings (16th). Dedra DeLilli, Mary Beth Coughlin, and Becky Blue receive Astro Turf/NFHCA Regional All-American honors.

## Football

- Over 9,000 people were on hand to watch Coach Jack Cosgrove's team dedicate the new Morse Field at Alford Stadium. Aaron Dashiell earns All-America honors. Dashiell, Drew O'Connor, Pat Sheehan, Jojo Oliphant, Eric Lewis, Brent Naccara, and Darrick Brown earn All-League honors.

## Golf

- Coach Ted Woodward's team places six players on the America East Academic Honor Roll, tying for the league lead and also maintains the highest GPA among UMaine men's teams. Freshmen Joey Alvarez finishes eighth overall as UMaine places fourth in the America East Championship.

## Hockey (Men)

- Coach Shawn Walsh's team wins its second national championship behind the efforts of NCAA Tournament MVP goalie Alfie Michaud. Hobey Baker Award finalist Steve Kariya earns GTE/CoSIDA Academic All-America honors and his third Len Ceglarski Sportsmanship Award. David Cullen joins Kariya on the Titan All-America team.

## Hockey (Women)

- The Black Bears complete their first Division I season 13-18-1, 7-18-1 with a team made up of mostly rookies. Raffi Wolf leads UMaine with 43 points (31 goals and 12 assists) while classmate Kira Misikowetz adds 12 goals and a team-high 28 assists (40 points).

## Soccer (Men)

- UMaine wins the Best Western/Black Bear Inn Classic with wins over Army and St. Francis. Ten Black Bears receive America East Academic Honor Rolls recognition.

## Soccer (Women)

- Sixteen Black Bears earn America East Academic Honor Recognition. Senior captain Suzanne Grant is named All-America East and also receives the Wes Jordan Service Award for her efforts as a student-athlete and student trainer.

## Softball

- Coach Janet Anderson completes her career with a record of 26-17 in her final season. Sara Jewett ties an NCAA record with three home runs in a game while also earning All-America East honors and Northeast All-Region honors. Jen Burton and Jill Cassie earn GTE Academic All-District I honors.

## Swimming and Diving

- UMaine serves as host to the America East championship and the men's team finishes sixth and the women seventh. Susie Herrick was the top individual finishing third in the 200-yard butterfly and fourth in two other events. Academically, Joe Dinan, Ann Murphy, Shannon Smith, Trina Smith, and Jason Williams all earned gold medal academic honors.

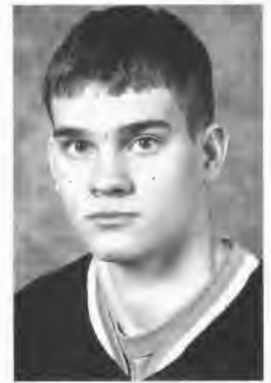
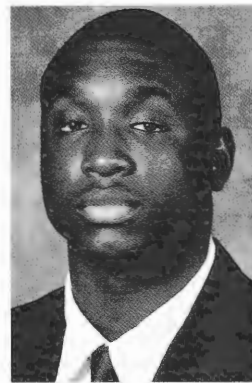
## Track and Field

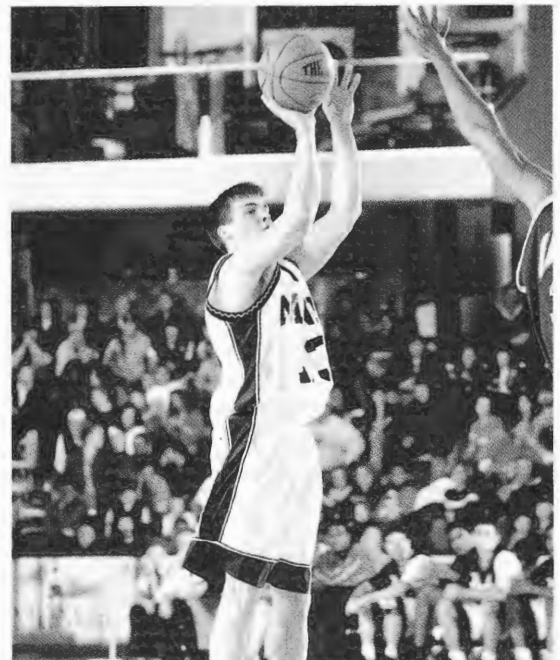

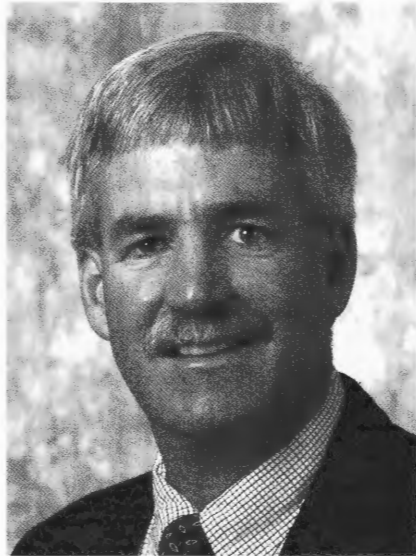


# 1998-99 ATHLETIC HIGHLIGHTS AT UMAINE

**SHAWN WALSH**  
Head Coach

Walsh, a former National Coach of the Year, led the Black Bears to their second NCAA Division I National Championship in 1998-99. UMaine will look to follow that performance as Walsh begins his 16th season behind the UMaine bench. His overall record stands at 352-195-32.

As one of two coaches to have been a member of Hockey East since its infancy, his win total ranks 26th all-time and 11th among all active coaches.

Walsh led last year's team to the Frozen Four held in Anaheim, Calif., and dominated by teams from Hockey East. UMaine topped Boston College 2-1 in overtime to advance to the title game against New Hampshire. The Black Bears beat the Wildcats 3-2 in overtime to capture the national title and achieve a record of 31-6-4. By winning four games in last year's tournament, Walsh's UMaine teams have won 11 of their last 12 NCAA Tournament contests.

He has previously coached UMaine to its first national championship when his hockey team went 42-1-2 in 1992-93. It was the first NCAA Division I team title win in UMaine history.

Walsh guided UMaine to its second trip to the NCAA Championship game in 1994-95. The 32-6-6 Black Bears eclipsed the 30-win mark for the sixth time since 1988.

Walsh was rewarded for his accomplishments following the 1994-95 season when he was named the winner of the Spencer Penrose Trophy as the National Coach of the Year. He was also selected Hockey East and New England Coach of the Year for the fourth time.

His Black Bears have won or shared the Hockey East regular season title four times and have won the Hockey East Tournament crown three times.

In 1992-93, the Black Bears posted a school record for wins with a 42-1-2 mark. The winning percentage of .956 ranks among the best in college hockey history.

That Black Bear team also flirted with hockey immortality, posting a 32-game unbeaten streak to start the season.

UMaine won its last 12 games, including a dramatic win over Lake Superior in the title game at the Bradley Center in Milwaukee, Wis.

Trailing 4-2, senior captain Jim Montgomery scored three goals in a span of 4:35 to give the Black Bears a 5-4 advantage and the NCAA Championship.

En route to the Hockey East regular season and tournament titles, Walsh's team competed in a league-record seventh consecutive Hockey East Championship game.

In the three years prior to his arrival at UMaine, the Black Bears were 27-65-0.

In just his third season, Walsh guided the Black Bears to the NCAA Tournament. The following year, he led his team to a 34-8-2 record. UMaine marched through Hockey East with a 20-4-2 record, clinching the title quicker than any previous team. The Black Bears held the nation's top ranking for the final eight weeks before falling to eventual national champion Lake Superior in the NCAA semifinals.

For Walsh, the personal accolades were soon to follow as he was the Hockey East Coach of the Year and New England Division I Coach of the Year for the first time in 1988.

In 1988-89, Walsh took an underclass squad and guided it to a 31-14 mark and the team's third consecutive trip to the Hockey East Championship game. The Black Bears earned their second straight trip to the NCAA semifinals, falling to local favorite Minnesota at St. Paul.

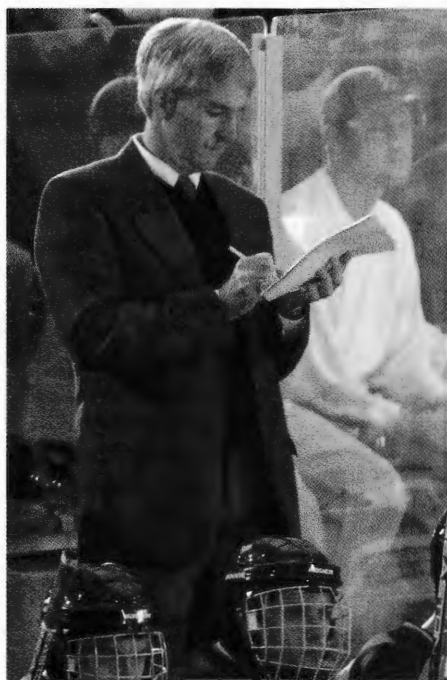

# THE UMAINE COACHING STAFF



The following year, UMaine posted a 33-11-2 record and again played in the Hockey East Championship game. The Black Bears' fourth straight trip to the NCAA Tournament ended in a quarter-final loss to eventual national champion Wisconsin.

The 1990-91 season was another fruitful one for Walsh as the Black Bears returned to the NCAA semifinals for the third time in four years. The Black Bears' 32-9-2 mark earned them a top seed in the NCAA Tournament, but eventual national champion Northern Michigan ended the season in the semifinals.

In 1991-92, Walsh's team finished the regular season with a nation-best 31-4-2 mark before falling to Michigan State, 3-2, at the NCAA East Regional at Providence, R.I.

In addition to team excellence, Walsh's teams have produced 27 All-Americans, seven U.S. Olympians, two Canadian Olympians and 29 National Hockey League players. He has also produced an 11-0-1 record in international competition. Twice teams that Walsh coached have won the gold medal at the U.S. Olympic Festival (1981, 1990). He also coached the U.S. Select team to victories in 1989 and 1993.

Scott Pellerin earned college hockey's most prestigious honor in 1992 when he was selected to receive the Hobey Baker Memorial Award. Paul Kariya became the first freshman to win that award in 1993 as UMaine became just the second school to have back-to-back winners.

Walsh has also had a profound effect on the careers of his former assistant coaches. Red Gendron (New Jersey Devils), Jay Leach (Atlanta Thrashers), Greg Cronin (New York Islanders), Bruce Crowder (Northeastern), Tim Whitehead



(UMass Lowell). Dave Nonis, another former UMaine assistant coach, serves as the Assistant General Manager of the Vancouver Canucks.

Walsh's Black Bears play before standing-room only crowds at Alford Arena nearly every night and his teams consistently rank among the top 10 in the nation in attendance. His club is traditionally one of the least penalized in the nation and is known for their fast and clean style of play.

Walsh is a 1978 graduate of Bowling Green State University, where he earned both his bachelor's and master's degrees in education.

It was at Bowling Green where he began to concentrate on coaching. In his senior year at Bowling Green, Walsh coached the junior varsity hockey team and also worked with head coach Ron Mason at the varsity level. Walsh remained at Bowling Green for two additional seasons with Mason, before the two men moved to Michigan State.

Prior to Walsh and Mason arriving at MSU in 1979, the Spartans had failed to qualify for the WCHA playoffs in three straight seasons. While at MSU, Walsh helped lead the Spartans to three consecutive CCHA titles and to the NCAA semifinals in 1983-84, his final year.

In addition to his collegiate coaching, Walsh has served as president of the American Hockey Coaches Association and served on the board for 10 years.

He directs the Maine Hockey School and is a former owner of the Huron Hockey School.

Walsh has also been active in the community. He has served as the Eastern Maine Spokesman for the United Way while also assisting other charities. He annually helps the Muscular Dystrophy Telethon, Children's Miracle Network and speaks on the behalf of charities throughout the community, region, and state.

Walsh is the father of sons Tyler, 8, and Travis, 6. He resides in Veazie with his wife, the former Lynne Vickery and her daughter, Alejandra, 9, and their new son, Sean, who was born in June.

**GRANT STANDBROOK**  
Assistant Coach

Grant Standbrook is in his 11th season as UMaine's primary recruiter. Since coming to UMaine in 1988, Standbrook has coordinated recruiting of classes which have consistently ranked among the best in the nation.

At UMaine, he has coached 24 All-Americans, including David Cullen, Steve Kariya, Paul Kariya, Scott Pellerin, Jim Montgomery, Garth Snow and Mike Dunham. Seven of his players at UMaine were U.S. Olympians, two were Canadian Olympians.

Standbrook has been on coaching staffs that have won five national championships, including UMaine's in 1993 and 1999. Before joining the Black Bear staff, Standbrook was an assistant coach at Wisconsin where he played an integral role in the Badgers winning three national championships during his 12-year tenure at that school. Together with head coach Bob Johnson, Standbrook built a college hockey dynasty winning national titles in 1977, 1981 and 1983 in addition to reaching the NCAA championship game on two other occasions.

While at Wisconsin he recruited and coached several All-Americans and future NHL players including Chris Chelios, Tony Granato, Bruce Driver and Patrick Flatley.

A noted coach of goalies, Standbrook recruited and guided current NHL players Dunham and Snow while at UMaine, and Mike Richter while at Wisconsin. In addition, former Badgers Marc Behrend and Terry Kleisinger enjoyed NHL careers.

From 1970-75, Standbrook was the head coach at Dartmouth College where he inherited a program with just 29 wins in the previous 10 years, and led the team to the Ivy League Championship game in his third season. He also coached soccer and lacrosse for the Big Green.

In 1987-88, he was the head coach of Varese-Kronenberg of the Italian league where he led the team to a second place finish.

He was an assistant coach of the 1976 U.S. Olympic hockey team, and the U.S. National teams in 1974 and 1975 and has coached several teams for USA Hockey.

A native of Winnipeg, Manitoba, he is a 1961 graduate of the University of Minnesota-Duluth. He was a two-year letter winner for the Bulldogs, scoring 22 goals and adding 24 assists in 31 career games as a center.

Standbrook and his wife, Joy, are the parents of three children and live in Bangor.

# 1999-2000 UMAINE HOCKEY OUTLOOK

The University of Maine won its second national title in 1998-99. After hanging around the nation's top five for most of the season, UMaine easily won first round and quarterfinal NCAA Tournament games, then dramatically defeated Hockey East foes Boston College and New Hampshire in overtime to capture the championship.

So how do the Black Bears top that renaissance season? Become the first college hockey team to repeat as national champions since 1971 and 1972, when archrival Boston University did it.

The challenge will be demanding for UMaine with 16 lettermen returning. The Black Bears, 31-6-4, 17-5-2 in Hockey East, lost not only talent but a lot of experience and character in last year's senior class.

UMaine loses key players from its forward corps and the blueline but perhaps the biggest loss may be Alfie Michaud in net. A junior last year, he signed a pro contract with the Vancouver Canucks after receiving NCAA Frozen Four MVP honors. Like a number of Black Bears who stepped up their play in postseason, Michaud was 4-0 in postseason, allowing just seven goals (1.65 GAA) and compiling a .945 save percentage. For the year, Michaud garnered wins in 28 of UMaine's 31 victories.

Despite the loss of Michaud, the Black Bears still have the potential to be among the best in the league in goaltending with the return of sophomore Mike Morrison (Exeter, N.H.) and red shirt Matt Yeats (Innisfail, Alberta). Both goaltenders were selected in the NHL Draft in June of 1998. Yeats was a ninth round selection of the Los Angeles Kings, while Morrison was chosen in the seventh round by the Edmonton Oilers.

Morrison, the lone goaltender with college experience, played 11 games last winter, compiling a 3-0-1 record and a 1.73 GAA. Freshman Trapper Clark (Waterville, Maine) will give the Black Bears depth, backing up Yeats and Morrison.

UMaine returns 9 of 14 forwards from last season, including two of its top three scorers. Hobey Baker Award finalist Steve Kariya, the Black Bears' leading scorer last year with 27-38-65, has graduated and joined Michaud in Vancouver. Seniors Bobby Stewart and Marcus Gustafsson, who both scored game-winning overtime goals at the Frozen Four, will also be missed.

Senior Cory Larose (Tide Head, New Brunswick), and junior Dan Kerluke (Brampton, Ontario) are the top two returning scorers. Larose was 21-31-52 last year, and assisted on the national championship-clinching goal. He will serve as one of the Black Bears' four captains. Kerluke, UMaine's top returning goal scorer with 23 goals, possesses one of the most accurate shots on the team.

Ben Guite (Montreal, Quebec), also a senior captain, adds 12-16-28. Sophomores Barrett Heisten (Anchorage, Alaska) and Niko Dimitrakos (Somerville, Mass.) contributed 12-16-28 and 8-19-27, respectively. Heisten was selected in the first round (20th overall) of last June's NHL draft by the Buffalo Sabres while Dimitrakos went in the fifth round to the San Jose Sharks.

Seniors Brendan Walsh (Dorchester, Mass.) and Jim Leger (Saugus, Mass.) will also serve as captains. Walsh is already considered a vocal leader in the locker room while Leger has received the Most Inspirational Player and Unsung Hero Team awards over the last two seasons.

Junior Matthias Trattmig (Graz, Austria) played in 39 of 41 games last season and gives UMaine size and experience. Trattmig was selected in the fourth round of the 1998 June NHL draft by Chicago.

A slew of first-year players have a chance to make an impact this season.

Ed Boudreau (Weymouth, Mass.), Tommy Reimann (Blaine, Minn.), and Gray Shaneberger (Sewell, N.J.) are redshirts who will compete for ice time. Martin Kariya (N. Vancouver, British Columbia) joins UMaine this fall, following in the footsteps of older brothers Paul and Steve. Lucas Lawson (Braeside, Ontario), Chris Heisten (Anchorage, Alaska), older brother of Barrett, and Robert Liscak (Skalica, Slovakia) are freshmen who will also join the club this fall.

The Black Bear blueline will be more experienced in 1999-2000, but still remains rather young. Sophomores Pete Metcalf (Pembroke, Mass.) 6-17-23 and Doug Janik (Agawam, Mass.) 3-13-16 were instrumental in UMaine's title run. Janik was chosen in the second round (55th overall) by the Buffalo Sabres in last June's NHL draft. The Toronto Maple Leafs took Metcalf in the ninth round.

Anders Lundback (Lulea, Sweden) played in all 41 games defensively and was 1-11-12. Robert Ek (Lulea, Sweden) contributed 0-6-6 in 39 games on the blueline. A.J. Begg (Vancouver, British Columbia), like Lundback, is a converted forward. He played in 26 games defensively. Eric Turgeon (Augusta, Maine) played in 12 contests last winter and notched two assists.

The big loss defensively for UMaine will be David Cullen. Prior to graduating and signing an NHL contract, Cullen earned All-America honors for UMaine last year and was third on the team with 11-33-44.

Kevin Clauson (Hanover, N.H.) enrolled last spring and will be eligible in the second semester. He is a transfer from Western Michigan University.

First-year defensemen Cliff Loya (Pittsburgh, Pa.) and Michael Schutte (Burlington, Ontario) could also make an impact.

# THIS IS HOCKEY EAST

Hockey East celebrated its fifteenth anniversary last season with what might very well have been the finest season for any college hockey conference in history...Three teams in the Frozen four including NCAA Champion University of Maine...Its second Hobey Baker recipient in as many years, and its fifth in nine seasons...A winning record against all three major conferences for the second year in a row...Record breaking attendance for the Hockey East Championship...The announcement of the largest corporate partnership in the history of the sport with Bauer/NIKE Hockey USA.

Hockey East has continued a steady rise to preeminence since July, 11 1983, when the possibil-

ity of an apparent Ivy League breakout threatened the existence of the ECAC, and the athletic directors from Boston College, Boston University, New Hampshire, Northeastern, and Providence announced the formation of a new Division I men's ice hockey conference. Together, William Flynn of BC, John Simpson of BU, Andy Mooradian of UNH, Joe Zabalski of Northeastern, and Lou Lamoriello of Providence launched Hockey East, with Lamoriello assuming the role of the league's first commissioner.

Later that same summer, the Board of Directors added the University of Maine and the University of Lowell (now UMass Lowell). Official conference competition of the seven-team league began with the 1984-85 season, and expansion broadened the league to nine teams with the inclusion of Merrimack College (1989) and UMass Amherst (1993).

In the short 16 years since the league's inception, Hockey East has set new competitive standards for college hockey success. In the 15 seasons of league play to date, Hockey East has placed 20 teams in the national semifinals, with the University of Maine having won two national titles and Boston University having won one. In fact, Hockey East has maintained a winning record against each of the other three conferences and all independent opponents (774-468-56 combined) for an overall .618 winning percentage.

It is the quality of players, not just as athletes but as people and leaders, that has set Hockey East apart from the rest. Last season, UNH captain Jason Krog was named the 1999 Hobey Baker recipient, marking the fourth time a Hockey East player had earned national player of the year honors in the decade of the '90's. While over 70 Hockey East alumni are playing under contract with the NHL this fall, five former Hockey East players stand as captains of National Hockey League franchises; Anaheim Mighty Ducks' Paul Kariya (Maine), Chicago Blackhawks' Tony Amonte (Boston University), Phoenix Coyotes' Keith Tkachuk (Boston University), New York Rangers' Brian Leetch (Boston College) and Nashville Predators' Tom Fitzgerald (Providence).

Hockey East has proven to be an equally strong presence off the ice as well. Both in the classroom and the community, Hockey East athletes continue to demonstrate their commitment to overall excellence. In its eleventh season, the Hockey East All-Academic Team honored 48 student-athletes for outstanding academic achievement in 1999. Hockey East athletes also make a tremendous impact on many community service and youth programs across the region, including organizations such as D.A.R.E. and numerous youth hockey organizations.

The reach of Hockey East continues to grow as member institutions construct new state-of-the-art facilities, increasing capacities and amenities for the growing body of college hockey fans in New England. Additionally, the league is entering into the third year of a multi-season agreement with FOX Sports Net New England which brings the hottest college hockey action into over three million homes across New England on a weekly basis.

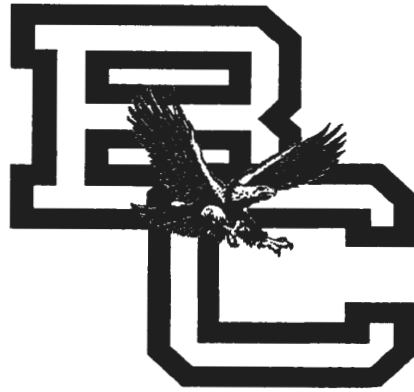

## UMAINE'S HOBEY BAKER FINALISTS

Back-to-back Hobey Baker Award winners Scott Pellerin (above) and Paul Kariya (right) are just two of the eight Black Bears who have been finalists for college hockey's most prestigious award.

Pellerin capped off a stellar career at UMaine when he became the first Black Bear to win the Hobey Baker in 1992. He currently ranks third on the UMaine all time list in goals (106), assists (117) and is second in total points at 223. In 1997, he was inducted into the UMaine Hall of Fame. He is currently with the St. Louis Blues.

Kariya, the 1993 winner, joined fellow finalist Jim Montgomery to lead UMaine to its first Division I national championship. He holds the Black Bear single season record with 25-75-100 and was the first freshman to win the award. Kariya is currently the captain of the Mighty Ducks of Anaheim.

Steve Kariya, younger brother of Paul, was a finalist in 1999, when he led the Black Bears to their second national championship. He led the team in scoring with 27 goals and 38 assists and also served as captain.

Montgomery, the captain of the 1993 national championship club, finished his senior season 32-63-95. He scored three third period goals to lift UMaine to a 5-4 win over Lake Superior State in the national championship game. He was inducted into the UMaine Hall of Fame in 1998 and currently plays for the Philadelphia Phantoms in the AHL.

As a sophomore David Capuano led the 1987-88 squad to a 34-8-2 finish and the Final Four with a 34-51-85 season. As a junior, Capuano posted a 37-30-67 season while leading the Black Bears to their second consecutive Final Four appearance.

Mike Golden, a senior captain of UMaine's first Final Four club in 1987-88 finished his career with a 31-44-75 year. He joined Capuano as a finalist for the award in 1988.

Chris Imes, a Birchdale, Minn., native finished his senior season as the runner-up for the 1995 award. He led UMaine to a 32-6-6 season and its second appearance in the National Championship game in three seasons.

Jean-Yves Roy was a finalist following the 1991 and 1992 seasons. As a sophomore, Roy finished the season 39-26-65 and earned first team All-American and All-Hockey East honors. As a junior, he finished the season 32-24-56 to earn his second straight spot amongst the finalists as well as All-America honors.

# ALFOND ARENA

One of the finest college hockey facilities in the country, the Harold Alfond Sports Arena has served the University community since 1977. Completed in February of that year, the building was dedicated by Mr. Alfond and officials of the University on November 18 at the Maine-Acadia hockey game.

Due to the demand of sellout-after-sellout at the old capacity of 3,800 and a \$2 million gift from Mr. Alfond, the Alfond Arena underwent a significant expansion project prior to the 1991-92 season.

Mr. Alfond's generous gift represents the largest one-time (non-posthumous) cash contribution ever received by the University of Maine.

Since 1968, Mr. Alfond has donated more than \$6.5 million to the University of Maine.

The construction provided an additional 1,200 seats to each side to increase the capacity to 5,200 for hockey games. In 1998, two more luxury boxes were added

and the arena's capacity is now 5,587.

Included in the Arena expansion were additional concession areas and rest rooms, locker rooms, ticket offices and souvenir stands and improved media facilities.

With the expansion, Alfond Arena became the home of the Black Bear basketball teams, which had played home games at the Bangor Auditorium from 1988-91.

In addition to being the home of the Black Bears, the building is used by youth, high school and senior hockey leagues, and for concerts and graduation ceremonies.

The complex is a modern facility with virtually no obstructed-view seats in the building and an excellent view of the ice.

Alfond Arena was built with the generous contributions of more than 2,000 people, headed by Mr. Alfond. An addition to the south end of the Arena in 1988 houses the Black Bears' impressive new locker room facility, which includes fully equipped weight and training rooms. Included in

that expansion project was an attractive lounge for use by the hockey program and the University community.

In 1990, an office addition was completed, providing the coaching and administrative staffs much needed room to perform effectively. Entering the 1993-94 season, the Black Bears had played before standing-room-only crowds in 138 consecutive regular season games.

In 1995-96 UMaine led HOCKEY EAST in total attendance for the fourth straight year. The Black Bears finished 10th in the nation in both total attendance and average in attendance.

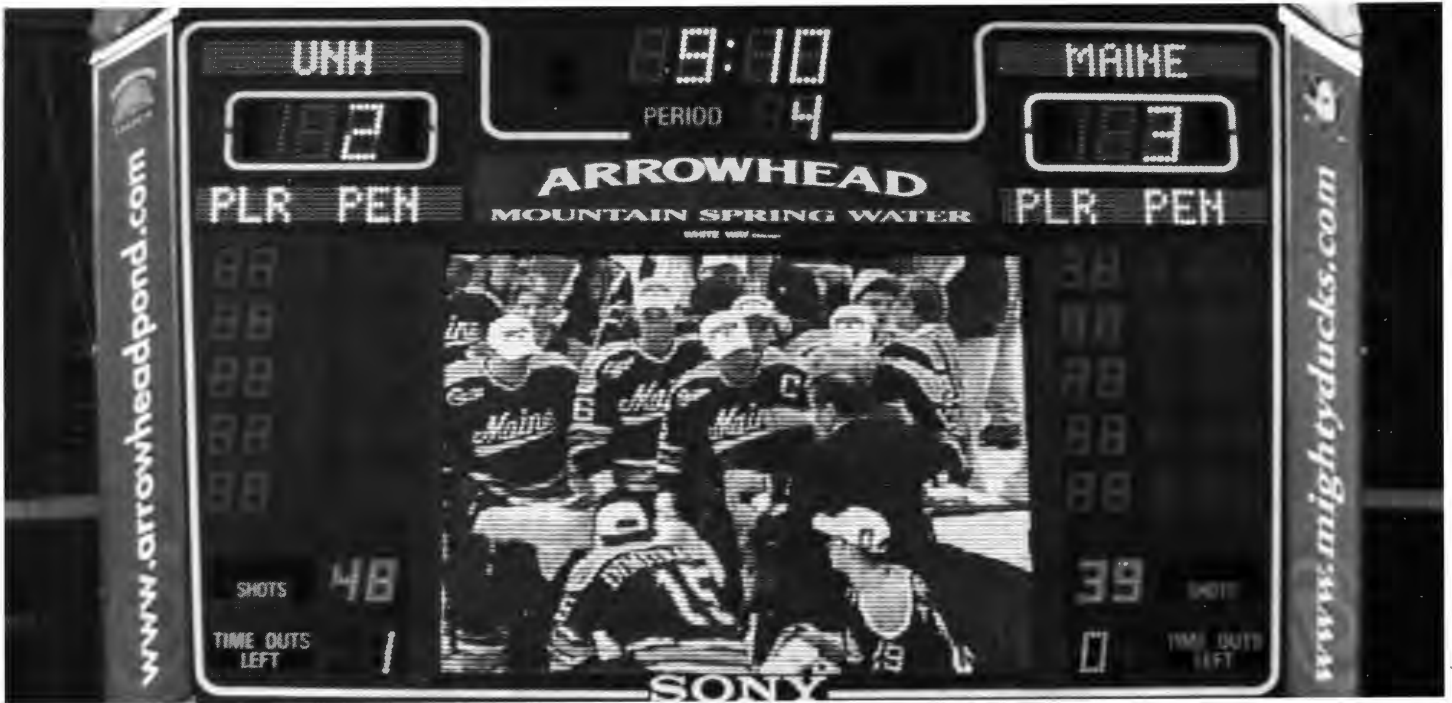
