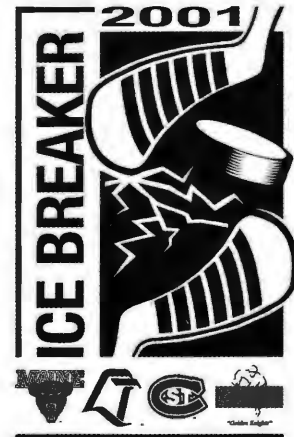
Directions to UMaine Campus/Alfond Arena

The University of Maine is the state's center of learning, discovery, and service to the public. As the flagship university of the University of Maine System and the state's land-grant and sea-grant institution, The University of Maine has the unique responsibility for providing high-quality undergraduate and graduate education programs, public service, and basic and applied research.

Located in Orono, within close proximity to the ocean, lakes, and mountains, The University of Maine offers an inspiring learning environment. There is plenty of open space on its 1,200 acres, where students are offered the diversity and the challenge of a large university in an invigorating atmosphere of a small college. The campus is located 10 miles north of Bangor, Maine's third largest city.

The University's undergraduate and graduate educational offerings are built upon a liberal arts and sciences foundation complemented by profession-oriented education in a wide range of disciplines, many of which are found nowhere else in the state. Because of their responsibility to teach, conduct research, and serve the public, faculty members are able to incorporate the new knowledge they uncover with classroom activities, often giving students hands-on experience in the research process.

The University offers its students, faculty, and staff, as well as the people of the community and the state, an outstanding athletic tradition. Several Black Bear teams have excelled to regional and national prominence, including the Black Bear ice hockey team, the 1993 and 1999 NCAA Division I national champions. UMaine's 19 Division I sports

entertain more than 100 intercollegiate events on campus each year attracting 200,000 spectators.

Included on UMaine's athletic staff is an academic coordinator responsible for closely monitoring the progress of each of the over 500 varsity student-athletes. Coaches also monitor and advise their student-athletes, frequently holding meetings specifically to discuss academic situations. Study halls and special tutorial sessions are scheduled daily as a way to enhance the learning process. This support and close scrutiny has been a significant reason the overall grade point average of student-athletes has been higher than that of the general student body. The primary goal of the University and the athletic department is to see each individual reach his or her academic potential.

The Maine Facts:

- Enrollment is on the rise at The University of Maine. First-year students enrolling at UMaine in the fall of 2000 totalled 1,633. The class is approximately 42 percent larger than the class that enrolled in 1997.
- The average SAT score of the 2000 entering class was 1,085, 66 points above the national average.
- Seventy-two percent of the 1999 entering class cited The University of Maine as their first choice.
- The Maine Business School, one of 300 accredited by the American Association of Colleges of Business Administration, offers students innovative student-oriented programs such as SPIFFY, in which students manage a University of Maine foundation investment portfolio. Since the program began in 1993 the fund has grown from \$250,000 to \$735,634.
- The UMaine graduate forestry program is ranked in the top five nationally.
- UMaine's graduate program in secondary education is ranked 21st out of nearly 200 programs in the U.S.
- UMaine offers 90 BA and BS degree, 61 master's degree, and 24 doctoral programs.
- Each year over 90 percent of UMaine engineering graduates pass a nationally-standardized pre-professional examination, well above the national average of 74 percent.
- Thirty-eight members of the Maine State Legislature hold at least one degree from UMaine and five members of Governor Angus King's cabinet hold at least one degree from UMaine.

Dr. Peter S. Hoff

President

A dramatic and steady increase in student enrollment, improved state support and progress toward achieving his stated objectives for the future have marked Dr. Peter S. Hoff's tenure as president of The University of Maine.



Since assuming the presidency in August 1997, Hoff has crisscrossed the state as an advocate for education and, specifically, the numerous ways UMaine can contribute to the betterment of Maine and its people. In visits to schools, service

organizations, and businesses around the state, Hoff has talked about the University's interest in serving as both partner and catalyst to address Maine's diverse needs and concerns. He has also spoken of the University's role in helping Maine's young people find educational and economic opportunities in Maine, and promoting high aspirations among those younger citizens.

During Hoff's four years as President, first-year student enrollment rose each year without lessening the university's admissions standards. In 1998, Hoff

was instrumental in gaining voter support for a \$20 million bond issue to support university-based research and development. In addition, he has worked successfully to help promote greater state investment in public higher education, promoting UMaine as an essential and valuable state resource.

Hoff is a strong believer in the special role the University of Maine plays in the lives of Maine people.

"As the state's flagship university and its land-grant and sea-grant institution, the University of Maine serves the entire state," he explains "UMaine is actively working in every county with local businesses, industries, farmers, governments, and citizens to address their most pressing social and economic needs.

"Simply put, UMaine's role and purpose is to provide Maine citizens a world class education, and — through research and engagement — help create the kind of state where citizens can put their educations to work right here in their home state, at the highest and most rewarding level. That is a challenge we tackle in many ways every single day."

As President, Hoff has established seven objectives:

- maintaining UMaine's leadership position among public higher education in Maine
- continued recruitment of Maine's most talented and motivated high school graduates
- continued expansion of the University's research enterprise
- even greater engagement with Maine people, business, and industry through outreach and public service activity
- ongoing review of opportunities to better serve the interests and needs of today's and tomorrow's students and citizens

- increased national prominence as a university where student learning is integrated into all classroom, social, and recreational experiences

- commitment to providing all students with a strong liberal arts education preparing them for the personal, professional, and civic demands and opportunities of the new century.

A recognized national leader in public higher education, Hoff is one of 27 university presidents and former presidents who served as members of the Kellogg Commission on the Future of State and Land-Grant Universities, which works to define and draw attention to the current state of land grant institutions while helping to position those institutions for their future.

Prior to his appointment as UMaine's president, Hoff served as Senior Advisor to the Chancellor of The California State University. He joined the California system in 1993 as Senior Vice Chancellor, Academic Affairs, a position he held until 1996. President Hoff also served as Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at the University System of Georgia (1990–1993) and Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs at Indiana University Southeast (1987–1990).

He received a B.A. degree in 1966, from the University of Wisconsin in Madison. He began his career teaching English in 1970 at the University of Wisconsin System after completing his M.A. and his Ph.D. in English and Humanities at Stanford University in 1968 and 1970, respectively.

Hoff is married to Dr. Dianne Hoff of UMaine's College of Education & Human Development faculty.

Dr. Suzanne J. Tyler

Director of Athletics

Under the guidance of Dr. Suzanne J. Tyler, the University of Maine continues to strive to greater heights. She began her tenure as director of athletics in October of 1995.



Among the accomplishments the department has attained under her leadership are the grand openings of Morse Field at Alford Sports Stadium and the Michael Kessock Softball Field. In the last three years, UMaine has completed the NCAA Certification process

and the Office of Civil Rights approved its gender equity plan.

In 1999, the men's ice hockey team captured its second national championship and the women's

basketball team won its first-ever NCAA Tournament game in its sixth-straight 20-win season. The men's basketball program leads the conference in attendance and is in the midst of its best three-year win total record in the history of the program. Last year 129 student-athletes were recognized as Scholar-Athletes, maintaining GPAs of 3.0 or higher.

As UMaine's athletic director, Tyler is responsible for programs involving 19 intercollegiate athletic teams, as well as facilities involving approximately 6,500 students, employees, and members of the community. She oversees a budget of approximately \$9 million, much of which is generated through ticket and merchandise sales, private donations, and fees.

Tyler came to UMaine after serving as the senior associate athletic director at the 25,000-student University of Maryland at College Park. She earned a Ph.D. in physical education, sports psychology from that university in 1986.

Since 1973 she had been employed by Maryland, starting as an instructor and coach.

Tyler coached lacrosse in 1974 and from 1976–90, directing the Terrapins to the NCAA title in 1986. She was the national Coach of the Year in 1984 and 1986.

She served as head field hockey coach from 1974–87, leading the Terrapins to the NCAA title in her final season. She holds the distinction of being the only

Division I coach to win NCAA national titles in two different sports, lacrosse and field hockey.

From 1987–89 she served as an assistant athletic director before being elevated to associate athletic director in 1989. She held that title until 1991 when she was named the senior associate athletic director and senior woman administrator.

Tyler also served as the acting athletic director at Maryland from July–October, 1990.

In 1995, Tyler became the second woman ever elected to the University of Maryland Hall of Fame and in 1999, she was inducted into the US Lacrosse National Hall of Fame. In 1998, she was named to *Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal* top 50 female athletic administrators. She has served on numerous national committees and currently is a member of the NCAA Women's Basketball committee and the I-AA Director of Athletics Football Executive Committee. She will serve as Chair of the 2001 Atlantic 10 Football Committee.

Tyler received her B.S. in physical education from Northeastern University in 1969. She earned her M.S. in physical education, sports psychology from The Pennsylvania State University in 1972.

Tyler and her husband, Dennis Casey, have two children—Andrew, 10, and Alexis, 9. They live in Glenburn.

Academic Support/Life Skills Programs

The University of Maine has a commitment to offering a comprehensive academic support program for student-athletes. The University of Maine Academic Support Program for Student Athletes Services includes a variety of progressive and proactive support programs to assist the student-athlete in developing academically, professionally and personally.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

All student athletes receive academic support upon committing to The University of Maine. After the signing of the letter of intent, student-athletes are given information regarding admission and registration procedures.

Orientation. The first-year student-athlete participates in an orientation program informing them of athletic and eligibility issues, in addition to resources available on campus. This orientation draws together many campus constituencies and provides first-year student-athletes with the opportunity to discover all that The University of Maine has to offer both academically and culturally.

Academic Monitoring. Throughout their college career, student-athletes are monitored by the academic counseling staff to ensure academic progress toward their degree program. In order to enhance knowledge of the academic progress of student-athletes during the semester, grade reports are sent to faculty twice per semester. In addition, the student-athletes receive information frequently regarding the requirements of their degree program as well as the academic requirements of the NCAA.

Academic Mentoring. When deemed necessary, academic mentors are made available to student-athletes. These mentors teach and reinforce skills



necessary for high academic achievement, focusing on time management, study and test-taking skills.

Tutorial Program. All students at the University of Maine have access to tutors free of charge for 100 and 200 level courses through the Tutor Program. Tutorial support is also provided on a limited basis to student-athletes through the Academic Support Programs.

Computer Facilities. In addition to the computer facilities available to all University of Maine students, the Sam Sezak Academic Lounge houses a computer facility for the exclusive use of student-athletes. This facility is open at accommodating hours to fill the needs of student-athletes' hectic schedules. Additional areas on campus are used to provide quiet study areas for monitored study sessions available at night for underclassmen.

LIFE SKILLS

The goal of the life skills program is to assist student-athletes as students, citizens and aspiring professionals.

Life Skills Seminars.

Student-athletes work with the Life Skills Coordinator and campus members to design and participate in life skills workshops covering a variety of areas: career development, alcohol and drug education, teambuilding, nutrition, and study skills.

Multicultural Programs.

The University of Maine and its Athletic Department have a commitment to supporting diversity within the cam-

pus community. A liaison relationship involving full-time staff members has developed between the Office of Multicultural Affairs and the Department of Athletics to promote an appreciation of diversity and to serve the student-athletes of different cultures.

Student-Athlete Advisory Board. The board is comprised of members of intercollegiate sports teams. This group meets with athletic and academic administrators regularly to discuss issues relevant to the student-athlete community.

Outreach. Opportunities exist through the Community Outreach Program for student-athletes to gain valuable public speaking experience while they give back to the community. Student-athletes speak at numerous schools and community groups throughout the year. In the spring of 2000, the UMaine Student-Athlete Outreach Program received the 12th Annual Barbara Bodwell Community Service Award.

Scholar-Athlete Recognition. In addition to providing academic support to the student-athletes at UMaine, the staff also recognizes their academic accomplishments. Each spring a recognition reception and ceremony is held at which those athletes who have earned a 3.0 minimum grade point average are acknowledged and presented with medallions. The ceremony is held during halftime of a basketball game, so members of the community can recognize the academic achievements of the student-athletes at the University of Maine. Last February, 129 medallions were awarded.

Sport Psychology. Performance enhancement training is available to teams and individuals from the accredited sport psychology consultant, Dr. Bruce Hale. Student-athletes are instructed in mental training skills such as goal setting, imagery and visualization, anxiety management, concentration, building self-confidence, and team cohesion which can be practiced to improve psychological preparation for practice and competition.

• Behind America East Pitcher of the Year Rusty Tucker, Rookie of the Year Mike Collar, and Coach of the Year Paul Kostacopoulos, UMaine enjoys its best start (8-0) since 1903 and compiles its most wins (36-15) since 1991. Tucker is drafted by the San Diego Padres. Jon Hamblton and Joe Drapeau earn All-America East honors.

Basketball (Men)

• The Black Bears win 18 or more games (18-11) for the third straight season, an unmatched trio of seasons in UMaine history. Carvell Ammons (first team) and Julian Dunkley (second team) earn All-America East honors and UMaine advances to the league semifinal for the third straight year.

Basketball (Women)

• Despite being selected sixth in the preseason poll by league coaches, first-year head coach Sharon Versyp leads UMaine to a fourth-place finish in America East. Senior Kizzy Lopez and freshman Heather Ernest receive third team All-America East honors. Ernest was also placed on the All-Rookie team.

Field Hockey

• Goalkeeper Danielle Burke, a graduate student, earns National Field Hockey Coaches Association (NFHCA) 2000 Division I National Academic Squad and Verizon CoSIDA District Academic All-American honors. Kristi Knights and Jen Johnstone are named NFHCA second team Northeast Regional All-Americans.

Football

• UMaine wins three of its final four games and posts statistics that match it with the best in the league over that time span. Place-kicker/punter Todd Jagoutz, TE Chad Hayes, and WRs Dwayne Wilmot and Phil McGeoghan earn All-Atlantic 10 honors. Wilmot (Indianapolis) and McGeoghan (New York Jets) sign free agent contracts with NFL teams.

Hockey (Men)

• UMaine advances to NCAA Quarterfinals with an overtime 5-4 win against Minnesota. The Black Bears are 7-1-1 in their final nine games of the regular season to gain an at-large berth in the NCAA Tournament and finish second in Hockey East. The NCAA appearance is UMaine's 11th in 17 years. Martin Kariya, the team's leading scorer, earns District I Verizon Academic All-America honors.

Hockey (Women)

• The Black Bears set nine school records and fall just one point out of the ECAC playoffs in the program's strongest season yet. Newcomers, led by All-ECAC Rookie team member Karen Droog, record 60 percent of UMaine's scoring. Raffi Wolf is selected to the German National team for the 2002 Olympics.

Soccer (Men)

• First-year head coach Travers Evans has 11 of his players on the America East Academic Honor Roll, including leading scorer Russell Hutchison (6-2-14) and starting goaltender Mat Cosgriff (2-7, 2.40).

Soccer (Women)

• Eleven Black Bears earn America East Academic Honor Recognition, including three on the Commissioner's Honor Roll (3.50 GPA or higher). First-year midfielder Katie Hodge is called up to the Canadian National Team.

Softball

• Juniors Erica Sobel and Leigh Ann Hylwak gain All-America East honors for the third straight year. The duo combine to lead UMaine in 11 offensive categories.

Swimming and Diving

• The UMaine men and women both finish sixth at the America East Championship held in the Black Bears' Stanley Wallace Pool Complex. Second-year swimmer Krystal Fogler earns America East Outstanding Swimmer of the Year for the second year in a row. The women's team sets seven school marks at the championship meet. Jamie Cunningham scored 52 individual points to lead the UMaine swimming team, including a win in the 200 freestyle and a second in the 100-yard freestyle.

Track and Field

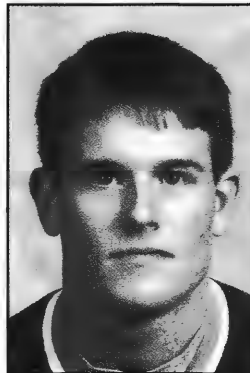
• Vanessa McGowan earns All-New England and All-America East honors along with twice receiving Verizon Academic All-American honors on two national teams. McGowan, a graduate student, won the 1,500-meter New England title and the 800-meter America East titles in outdoor track. Julie Williams (hammer throw), and the 4x800 relay team won championships at the AE outdoor meet. Viktoriya Rybalko won the long jump in the Indoor America East Championship. 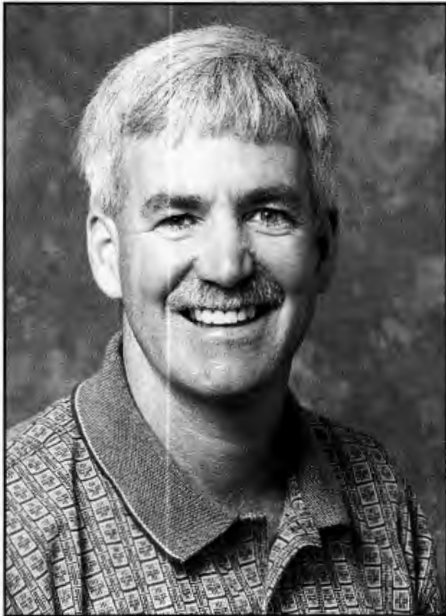

Tim Whitehead, a former assistant under Shawn Walsh, returns to UMaine after serving as an assistant coach, five years, and head coach, the last five years, at the University of Massachusetts Lowell.

"I'm excited to be back at Maine, and I'm looking forward to working with Grant (Standbrook) again. I love to coach, and this is a great coaching opportunity for me," said Whitehead.

He added, "We have a lot of family in Maine, and my wife and I will really enjoy being close to them."

"Tim will help us keep consistency in our program. He knows our system, and he knows the league inside-out," said Shawn Walsh when Whitehead was hired in early September. "He's a top-notch teacher and coach, that will add a lot to the success of our program."

"We think Tim is the right person at the right time for UMaine," said Director of Athletics Suzanne Tyler. "He joins our staff at a critical juncture and certainly his knowledge of The University of Maine and Hockey East will help his transition back into the Black Bear fold. We expect continued success from our program with Tim at the helm."

The 1990–91 Black Bear team Whitehead coached as an assistant, made it to the Hockey East championship game and advanced to the semifinals of the NCAA Tournament. UMaine finished the season with an impressive 32-9-2 mark that year; only three Black Bear hockey teams have won more games in a season. Whitehead also coached for two seasons at Middlebury College prior to coming to UMaine. With

the Panthers he received the William Wallace Award, presented by the hockey players to the person with the most positive impact on the Middlebury program.

After serving five years as an assistant coach at UMass Lowell under another former Black Bear assistant coach Bruce Crowder, Whitehead took hold of the coaching reigns prior to the 1996–97 season. As the River Hawks' head coach, he was honored as a finalist for the American Hockey Coaches Association (ACHA) Spencer Penrose Coach of the Year Award in 1997 and 2001. He was also runner-up for Hockey East Coach of the Year honors in 1997 and 2001.

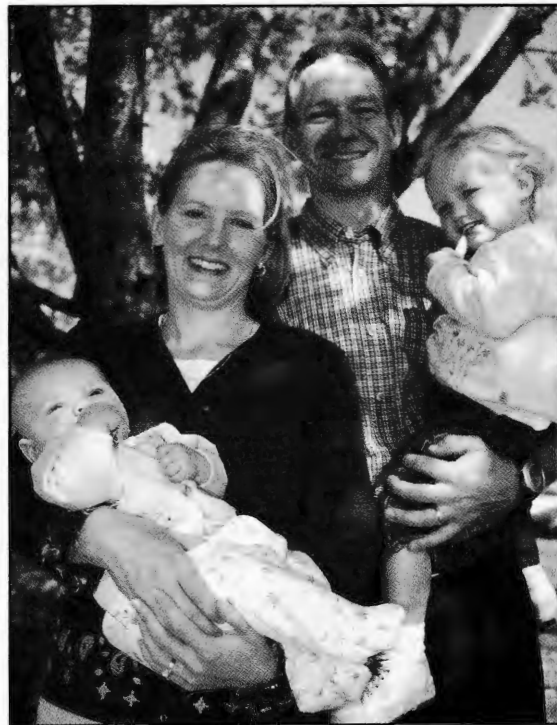
As an assistant coach, Whitehead has an all-time record of 131-84-21. In five years as a head coach at UMass Lowell, his overall record was 76-95-13, in-

cluding a 19-16-3 mark last season. UMass Lowell came from behind to defeat New Hampshire in the opening round of the Hockey East Tournament and advanced to the semifinal round at the FleetCenter

in Boston last year. The River Hawks advanced to the semifinals of the Hockey East Tournament seven of the last 10 years, more than any other Hockey East team with the exception of the Black Bears.

Whitehead, 40, graduated from Hamilton College in 1985 with a bachelor's degree in government, and earned a master's degree in education from UMaine in 1991.

Whitehead, his wife Dena, are the parents of two children, a daughter, Natalie 2, and a son, Zachary born June 16.





GRANT STANDBROOK

■ Assistant Coach

Grant Standbrook begins his 14th season as UMaine's primary recruiter. Since coming to UMaine in 1988, Standbrook has coordinated recruiting of classes which have consistently ranked among the best in the nation.

At UMaine, he has coached 25 All-Americans, including David Cullen, Steve Kariya, Paul Kariya, Scott Pellerin, Jim Montgomery, Garth Snow and Mike Dunham. Eight of his players at UMaine were U.S. Olympians, two were Canadian Olympians.

Standbrook has been on coaching staffs that have won five national championships, including UMaine's in 1993

and 1999. Before joining the Black Bear staff, Standbrook was an assistant coach at Wisconsin where he played an integral role in the Badgers winning three national championships during his 12-year tenure at that school. Together with head coach Bob Johnson, Standbrook built a college hockey dynasty winning national titles in 1977, 1981 and 1983 in addition to reaching the NCAA championship game on two other occasions.

While at Wisconsin he recruited and coached several All-Americans, Olympians and future NHL players including Chris Chelios and Mike Richter.

A noted coach of goaltenders, Standbrook recruited and guided current NHL players Dunham and Snow while at UMaine.

From 1970-75, Standbrook was the head coach at Dartmouth College where he inherited a program with just 29 wins in the previous 10 years, and led the team to the Ivy League Championship game in his third season. He also coached soccer and lacrosse for the Big Green.

In 1987-88, he was the head coach of Varese-Kronenberg of the Italian league where he led the team to a second place finish.

He was an assistant coach of the 1976 U.S. Olympic hockey team, and the U.S. National teams in 1974 and 1975 and has coached several teams for USA Hockey.

Always an innovator in training methods and techniques, Standbrook initiated weight and interval training with his teams in the 1960's, well before such training methods were accepted by most in coaching circles.

A native of Winnipeg, Manitoba, he is a 1961 graduate of the University of Minnesota-Duluth. He was a two-year letter winner for the Bulldogs, scoring 22 goals and adding 24 assists in 31 career games as a center on the hockey team. He also pole vaulted and ran sprints for Duluth's track and field team. An accomplished athlete, Standbrook also played on a Canadian national championship soccer team in 1962.

Standbrook and his wife, Joy, are the parents of three children and live in Bangor.

▪ Assistant Coach

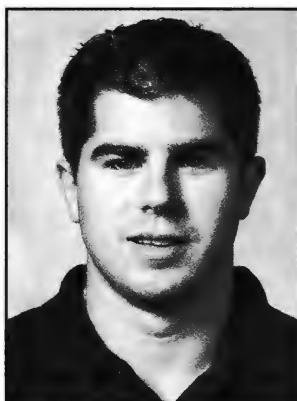
Campbell Blair, the former head coach and general manager of the British Columbia Junior Hockey League's Victoria Salsa, begins his first season as UMaine assistant coach.

Blair returns to UMaine, where he played two seasons as a defenseman (1988-89, 1989-90) and was an undergraduate assistant coach. Blair coached with current Black Bear Interim Head Coach Tim Whitehead and top assistant coach Grant Standbrook during the 1990-91 season. UMaine advanced to the NCAA Frozen four that year and amassed a 32-9-2 record.

While with Victoria, Blair logged a 105-73-16 record to become the winningest coach in Salsa history. He led Victoria to one Island Division, one Coast Conference and one British Columbia Hockey League Championship. Blair coached current UMaine assistant captain Martin Kariya during his stint with the Salsa. He was named the 1999-2000 Coastal Conference Coach of the Year.

Prior to coming to UMaine as a student-athlete in 1987-88, he played Junior Hockey with Vernon and now-defunct Summerland of the British Columbia Junior Hockey League, where he still holds records for goals (38), and points (109) in a season, as well as career assists (169), and career points (247) by a defenseman.

A native of Prince George, British Columbia, Blair is a 1991 graduate of The University of Maine with an honors degree in education. He is pursuing his masters of science in exercise physiology from the University of Victoria.



MATT THOMAS

▪ Assistant Coach

Matt Thomas, former assistant coach of the Rochester Institute of Technology Tigers, begins his second season as a UMaine assistant coach.

As an assistant at R.I.T., Thomas helped the Tigers to an impressive 27-1-2 record and a berth in the NCAA Division III Frozen Four. He coached two All-Americans and four ECAC West All-Stars, while assisting in all aspects of hockey operations.

A former center and team captain at R.I.T., he led the Tigers to a No. 1 national ranking and a trip to the NCAA tournament his senior campaign. Thomas capped off his college career by being selected to the College Division West All-Star Team.

A product of the heralded Junior A franchise at Toronto St. Michaels, Thomas honed his skills growing up in Toronto, Ontario.

Thomas earned a bachelor of science degree in criminal justice/prelaw, graduating from R.I.T. in 1998. He lives in Orono, and is currently completing work towards a masters degree at UMaine.

Bob Lehnhard returned to assist the Black Bear hockey team this year after last working with the team during the 1993-94 season. Dr. Lehnhard served as UMaine's strength and conditioning coach from 1991-94. During that time, he helped develop some of the Black Bears' most dominate teams, including the 42-1-2 national championship team of 1993.

Lehnhard earned his Ph.D. in exercise physiology at Ohio State University in 1984.

He served as a graduate teaching assistant at Ohio State and the University of Michigan, where he performed metabolic and strength testing in conjunction with many of the two school's varsity programs.

Lehnhard is an assistant professor in UMaine's College of Education, and has authored several strength and conditioning articles and publications.



MARK BADURAK, ATC

▪ Athletic Trainer

Mark Badurak begins his first season as UMaine's trainer after serving as a certified athletic trainer with Union College's men's and women's ice hockey programs for two years. Prior to Union, he served as a graduate assistant athletic trainer at Old Dominion University.

Badurak earned a bachelor of science in athletic training from the University of Delaware in 1996 and a master of science in education, with an emphasis in athletic training from Old Dominion in 1998. The Salem, N.H. native is engaged to Andrea Allington, and resides in Brewer.



2001-02 UMaine Hockey Outlook

The 2001-02 University of Maine hockey team may return several familiar faces, but it's strengths and weaknesses will not at all resemble last year's 20-12-7 Black Bear squad.

Defense carried the 2000-01 Black Bears to their 11th NCAA appearance in 17 seasons under the direction of Head Coach **Shawn Walsh**. UMaine finished last season ranked seventh nationally and sixth in scoring defense, allowing only 2.44 goals against per contest.

This year's squad returns only three defensemen from that team, but has also seen the influx of several talented forwards. The extra offensive punch will be a welcome addition after UMaine finished fifth in Hockey East in scoring with 2.97 goals per game.

Walsh passed away this September from complications of renal-cell carcinoma, but made sure his team was in good hands when he hired former assistant coach **Tim Whitehead** in late August. Whitehead, a two-time finalist for the Spencer Penrose Award, given annually to college hockey's top coach, in his five-years as head coach at UMass Lowell, will serve as UMaine's interim head coach.

"We're very excited about getting this season under way," said Whitehead. "We have a real good group of hockey players. Our biggest asset as a team is our overall team speed. We can play the game at a high tempo. We also have a lot of hockey sense on the team, good decision makers. I think those factors will be big advantages for us this year."

He also added, "This team has already been through a lot together already. The experience of losing Shawn has only drawn this team closer together, and will help them when they have to face adversity this season. It will also help us all keep things in perspective."

FORWARDS:

"We have good depth at the forward position, good two-way hockey players," said Whitehead. UMaine will be without five forwards from last year's team, but six of last year's top seven scorers return. Add to that a strong first-year class of six forwards, and one can see the potential for a big offensive year.

The Black Bears return a solid base offensively, anchored by four of last year's top five scorers: **Martin Kariya** (12-24-36), **Michael Schutte** (15-10-25), **Niko Dimitrakos** (11-14-25) and **Chris Heisten** (5-19-24).

Kariya was the mark of consistency last season, leading all UMaine scorers almost from wire to wire. Schutte made the transition from defenseman to forward after a brief stint on Kariya's line in early February revealed his scoring touch. Kariya, 19 points (6-13-19), and Schutte, 18 points (11-7-18), led the Black Bears late season charge, combining for 37 points in UMaine's last 12 games.

Dimitrakos tallied two four-point games last year, including his first career hat trick in a 6-3 Hockey East Tournament victory over Northeastern (3/9). Heisten has emerged as the emotional leader of the UMaine offense. His playmaking ability and hardnosed work in the corners was highlighted by 19 assists, second to only Kariya last year.

Add to that mix the speed of **Lucas Lawson** (9-11-20) and **Todd Jackson** (4-8-12), the playmaking ability of **Robert Liscak** (11-9-20), and a veteran core is established. **Don Richardson** (0-4-4), **Cameron Lyall** (0-1-1) and **Gray Shaneberger** (3-0-3) all return, after gaining experience last season.

Colin Shields, who practiced with the Black Bears last season and led the North American Hockey League in scoring in 2000, tallying 95 points (46-49-95) in only 55 games for the Cleveland Barons, is one of the reasons for such optimism.

The first-year class also boasts Eastern Junior Hockey League leading scorer **John Ronan**, who recorded 83 points (39-44-83) in 39 league games for the Walpole Junior Stars last year.

Cushing Academy's Most Valuable Player and leading scorer, **Ben Murphy**, is another highly regarded sniper who tallied 58 points (19-39-58) in only 23 league games last year. Freshman **Chad Anderson** broke the century mark last year, tallying 101 points (40-61-101) in 57 games for the Nipawin Hawks of the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League.

Matt Greeyes, **Paul Falco** and versatile **Jon Jankus** are three other first-year players that will see playing time this season at forward.

DEFENSEMEN:

"Our defense is less experienced than in recent years, but we have considerable talent at the position. I am sure our defensive unit will improve as they get more game experience under their belts," said Whitehead.

Captain **Peter Metcalf** (5-9-14) leads a defensive unit that returns only three regulars from a year ago. Metcalf is a gritty defender who trailed only **Doug Janik**, in scoring by a UMaine defenseman last year.

Cliff Loya (1-2-3) enters his second campaign as a solid defensive defenseman. While **Francis Nault** (2-11-13) led the freshman class in scoring.

Tom Reimann (5-12-17) anchored the point during power plays a year ago while playing forward, and will make the transition to defense this year.

First-year players will need to step up and fill the remaining defensive holes.

Highly regarded defender **Prestin Ryan**, like Shields, also practiced with UMaine last year and will be a key figure on the blueline this year. Ryan was selected as the Saskatchewan Junior Hockey League's Best Defenseman in 2000.

Freshman **Paul Lynch** was a fifth round draft pick of the Tampa Bay Lightning this year. A physical defenseman, he is expected to play a key role on this year's defensive unit. Freshmen **Troy Barnes**, **Matt Deschamps** and Jankus will also contribute to the defensive effort this season.

GOALTENDERS:

"We're obviously very deep in goal," said Whitehead. "We have two goaltenders that any program in the country would be thrilled to have in net."

The tandem of **Matt Yeats** and **Mike Morrison** in goal has been one the hardest duos to beat in college hockey over the last two seasons.

Yeats ranks first all-time among UMaine goalies for career goals against average, 2.50, and save percentage, .905. His 38 victories over the last two seasons is tied for sixth all-time among Black Bear netminders, and he has earned an overall record of 38-15-8.

Yeats posted a remarkable .903 save percentage over five postseason games last year, including .907 against Minnesota and .903 against Boston College in the NCAA Tournament.

Morrison has earned a 9-5-4 record over the last two seasons. In 10 games last year, he allowed only 16 goals. His goals against average of 1.96 and save percentage of .924 during the 2000-01 season would have both led Hockey East had he appeared in enough games.

Consistently labelled the strongest conference from top to bottom, the Hockey East Association, encompassing nine established hockey programs, proudly enters its 18th season as the home stage for the defending NCAA champions, the Boston College Eagles.

Hockey East has continued a steady rise to prominence since its founding charter on July 11, 1983, when the possibility of an apparent Ivy League breakoff threatened the existence of the ECAC. In response, the athletic directors from Boston College, Boston University, New Hampshire, Northeastern, and Providence announced the formation of a new Division I men's ice hockey conference. Together, William Flynn of Boston College, John Simpson of Boston University, Andy Mooradian of New Hampshire, Joe Zabalski of Northeastern, and Lou Lamoriello of Providence launched Hockey East. Lamoriello assumed the role of the league's first commissioner.

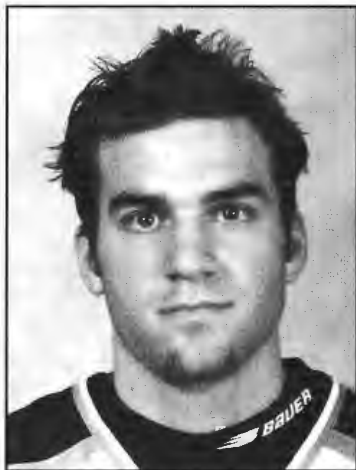
Later that same summer, the Board of Directors added The University of Maine and the University of Lowell (now UMass-Lowell). Official conference competition of the seven-team league began with the 1984-85 season, and expansion broadened the league to nine teams with the additions of Merrimack College (1989) and the University of Massachusetts at Amherst (1993).

Since the league's inception, Hockey East has set new competitive standards for college hockey success. In the 17 seasons of league play to date, Hockey East has placed 23 teams in the Frozen Four, and has boasted four NCAA title winners: Boston University in 1995, The University of Maine in 1993 and 1999, and most recently Boston College in 2001. Additionally, Hockey East has maintained a collective winning record against all non-conference opponents (891-535-68 combined) for a .619 overall winning percentage outside of Hockey East play.

However, it is the quality of its individual players as leading athletes that most sets Hockey East apart from the rest. Over 50 Hockey East alumni played in the NHL in 2000-01, and three former Hockey East players stand as captains of NHL franchises: the Anaheim Mighty Ducks' Paul Kariya (Maine), the Chicago Blackhawks' Tony Amonte (Boston University), and the Nashville Predators' Tom Fitzgerald (Providence).

Hockey East has proven to be an equally strong presence off the ice. Both in the classroom and in the community, Hockey East athletes continue to demonstrate their commitment to overall excellence. In its 13th season, the Hockey East All-Academic Team honored 50 student-athletes for outstanding academic achievement during the 2000-01 campaign. Hockey East athletes also make a tremendous impact on many community service programs across the region, volunteering with organizations such as D.A.R.E. and numerous youth hockey associations.

The reach of Hockey East continues to grow as member institutions construct new state-of-the-art facilities, increasing capacities and amenities for the growing body of college hockey fans in New England.

Championships - the Maine Way

The decade of the 90's witnessed the historic rise of UMaine Hockey under the guidance of Shawn Walsh to national prominence. National championships in 1993 and 1999 further cemented the 90's as the 'Decade of the Black Bear.'



'93 The 1992-93 University of Maine hockey team stands as one of college hockey's legendary teams. The Black Bears 42-1-2 record has never been threatened in the modern era of college hockey. Only Cornell University's 27-0 record in 1970, the only NCAA Division I team to go undefeated, even approaches the mark set by UMaine's first national championship team.

The Black Bears blazed through the regular season, suffering only one loss, a 7-6 overtime loss to Boston University (2/19), and two ties, a 3-3 tie with Providence College (10/24) and a 4-4 tie to Clarkson University (1/15). While freshman sensation Paul Kariya tallied a 100-point season (25-75-100) and won the 1993 Hobey Baker Award, linemates Jim Montgomery, 95 points (32-63-95), and Cal Ingraham, 85 points (46-39-85), chipped in on college hockey's most prolific scoring line. Montgomery would also be a Hobey Baker Award finalist.

Not to be outshone by the offensive display, future NHL standout goaltenders Garth Snow (21-0-1) and Mike Dunham (21-1-1) formed the nation's top goaltending tandem.

The national championship wouldn't come easy however, as UMaine had to claw back from behind to defeat Michigan 4-3 to advance to the championship game. In the championship game, three Lake Superior State goals in the second period staked the Lakers to a 4-2 lead entering the third period. But, Montgomery and Kariya would answer, forever etching their mark in championship history, as Montgomery scored three goals in a span of 4:35, all three goals set up by Kariya, to give UMaine its first national title and a come-from-behind 5-4 victory.

'99 The 1998-99 University of Maine hockey team traveled a much less direct route to its title. Unlike the '93 team, there would be no Hockey East title, regular season (finished second to New Hampshire) or tournament (Boston College would defeat UMaine 3-2 in a semifinal game).

Regular season setbacks didn't deter this gritty Black Bear team however, as UMaine got even with both Boston College and New Hampshire when it meant the most, in the Frozen Four.

This team would also be led by a Kariya, Paul's younger brother Steve. All-American's Kariya and defenseman David Cullen would provide the leadership for a tenacious team that just never quit. The Black Bears clawed their way to a 31-6-4 record and a second national championship.

As with the '93 title, nothing came easy in the Frozen Four. After defeating Ohio State 4-2 and blitzing Clarkson University 7-2, the Black Bears would have to face Boston College in their semifinal game. Goaltender Alfie Michaud matched Eagles' goaltender Scott Clemmensen save for save, each stopped 35 shots, but shot number 37 by Bobby Stewart gave UMaine a 2-1 overtime win.

New Hampshire, and Hobey Baker Award winner Jason Krog awaited UMaine in the championship game. The Black Bears couldn't protect a one-goal lead in the third period, and UMaine found itself in overtime once again. In the end, Michaud simply would not let his team lose, making 46 saves to earn tournament MVP honors, and Marcus Gustafsson's goal broke the deadlock 10:50 into overtime, to give the Black Bears their second national title.

Back-to-back Hobey Baker Award winners Scott Pellerin (above) and Paul Kariya (top right) are just two of the eight Black Bears who have been finalists for college hockey's most prestigious award.

Pellerin capped off a stellar career at UMaine when he became the first Black Bear to win the Hobey Baker in 1992. He currently ranks third on the UMaine all-time list in goals (106) and assists (117), and is second in total points at 223. In 1997, he was inducted into the UMaine Hall of Fame. He is currently with the Boston Bruins of the NHL.

Kariya, the 1993 winner, joined fellow finalist Jim Montgomery to lead UMaine to its first Division I national championship. He holds the Black Bear single season record with 25-75-100 and was the first freshman to win the award. Kariya is currently the captain of the NHL's Mighty Ducks of Anaheim.

Steve Kariya, younger brother of Paul, was a finalist in 1999, when he led the Black Bears to their second national championship. He led the team in scoring with 27 goals and 38 assists and also served as captain. He is currently with the Vancouver Canucks of the NHL.

Montgomery, the captain of the 1993 national championship club, finished his senior season 32-63-95. He scored three third period goals to lift UMaine to a 5-4 win over Lake Superior State in the national championship game. He was inducted into the UMaine Hall of Fame in 1998 and currently plays for the Dallas Stars of the NHL.

As a sophomore David Capuano led the 1987-88 squad to a 34-8-2 finish and the Frozen Four with a 34-51-85 season. As a junior, Capuano posted a 37-30-67 season while leading the Black Bears to their second consecutive Frozen Four appearance.

Mike Golden, a senior captain of UMaine's first Frozen Four club in 1987-88 finished his career with a 31-44-75 year. He joined Capuano as a finalist for the award in 1988.

Chris Imes, a Birchdale, Minn., native finished his senior season as the runner-up for the 1995 award. He led UMaine to a 32-6-6 season and its second appearance in the National Championship game in three seasons.

Jean-Yves Roy was a finalist following the 1991 and 1992 seasons. As a sophomore, Roy finished the season 39-26-65 and earned first team All-American and All-Hockey East honors. As a junior, he finished the season 32-24-56 to earn his second straight spot amongst the finalists as well as All-America honors.

An assistant captain on the 1999-2000 Frozen Four team, he was rewarded for his leadership of organizations on campus like the Student Athletic Advisory Board, where he served as president his senior year, and work with many charities, including: the Blair House Conference, 1999 Toys for Tots program, and countless other examples of community outreach that he initiated himself.

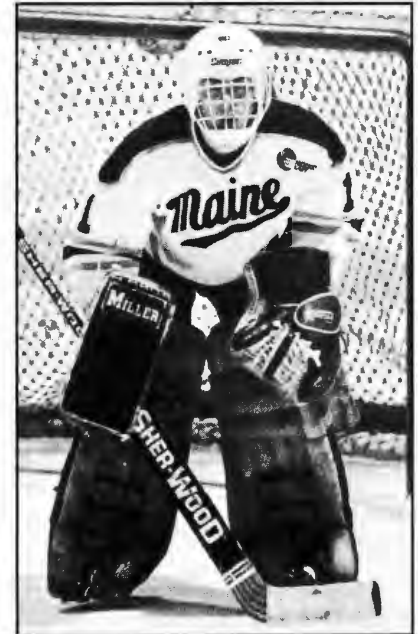

ALFOND ARENA

One of the finest college hockey facilities in the country, the Harold Alfond Sports Arena has served the University community since 1977. Completed in February of that year, the building was dedicated by Mr. Alfond and officials of the University on November 18 at the Maine-Acadia hockey game.

Due to the demand of sell-out-after-sellout at the old capacity of 3,800 and a \$2 million gift from Mr. Alfond, the Alfond Arena underwent a significant expansion project prior to the 1991-92 season.

Mr. Alfond's generous gift represented, at that time the largest one-time (non-posthumous) cash contribution ever received by The University of Maine.

Since 1968, Mr. Alfond has donated more than \$6.5 million to The University of Maine.

The construction provided an additional 1,200 seats to each side to increase the capacity to over 5,200 for hockey games. In 1998, two more luxury boxes were added and the arena's capacity is now 5,641.

Included in the Arena expansion were additional concession areas and rest rooms, locker rooms, ticket offices and souvenir stands and improved media facilities.

With the expansion, Alfond Arena became the home of the Black Bear basketball teams, which had played home games at the Bangor Auditorium from 1988-91.

In addition to being the home of the Black Bears, the building is used by youth, high school and senior hockey leagues, and for concerts and graduation ceremonies.

The complex is a modern facility with virtually no obstructed-view seats in the building and an excellent view of the ice.

Alfond Arena was originally built with the generous contributions of more than 2,000 people, headed by Mr. Alfond. An addition to the south end of the Arena in 1988 houses the Black Bears' impressive locker room facility, which includes fully equipped

weight and training rooms. Included in that expansion project was an attractive lounge for use by the hockey program and the university community.

In 1990, an office addition was completed, providing the coaching and administrative staffs much needed room to perform effectively. Entering the 1993-94 season, the Black Bears had played before standing-room-only crowds in 138 consecutive regular season games.

In 1995-96 UMaine led HOCKEY EAST in total attendance for the fourth straight year. The Black Bears finished 10th in the nation in total attendance (104,176) and 11th in average attendance (5,483) last season, 2000-01.
