No 1.

The summer term was taught by Miss L. E. Ladd. She was the right teacher in the right place, being an excellent disciplinarian, a first class instructor, and having had a very large experience in this vocation she could not help gaining the goal for which she aimed.

The winter term was under the charge of Bert. Andrews of Augusta. Mr. Andrews, although not having had the experience of Miss Ladd, but having both tact and ability, gained just as good results. Any town is fortunate in securing the services of such good teachers.

No. 2.

The summer term was under the care of Emma Gordon of Readfield. This is quite a large, hard school, composed of many mischievous, restless scholars, and it wants a teacher with much firmness. Mess Gordon did as well perhaps as a majority of young teachers would, fair progress being made.

The winter term was commenced by Miss Ida Stevens of Mr. Vernon, who was compelled by ill health to resign at the expiration of two weeks. The school was resumed and finished by Mi-s Addie F. McLain. Miss McLam is a conscientious, hard working teacher, and some of the pupils showed marked progress under her excellent instruction.

No. 3.

The summer term was 'aught by Miss Mae Palmer of Augusta. This was her first effort, and she manifested an aptitude for teaching which we hope will make her a successful teacher. In thorough drill and interest the school ranked well.

The winter term was under the instruction of Miss Addie F. McLain of Augusta. In this school she did splendid work and maintained her reputation as a first class teacher.

No. 4.

The summer term was taught by Ida Stevens of Mt. Vernon, who succeeded in bringing order out of confusion. The discipline was excellent and the instruction good.

The winter term was taught by Lillian Hopkins of this town, this being her first school. The school opened well and did excellent work, until near the close, when there arose some outside disturbance which greatly affected the interest of the school. We think Miss Hopkins acquitted herself well and will succeed.

No. 5.

This is one of Manchester's living schools. The teachers of both summer and winter schools understood their business and attended to it, and acceeded in infusing their enthusiasm into their scholars. Miss Januic Lard of Augusta had charge of the summer term, and Miss Eva Muchell, of Hallowell, the winter term.

No. 6.

Eva Penney of Augusta, a teacher of much natural ability developed considerable experience, had charge of the school during the summer term. It is needless to report the improvement, as it was manifest to all.

The winter term was under the charge of J. C. Hewitt, a member of your committee. This school has been quite large, and a majority of the scholars punctual and regular in attendance, many missing not more than one-half day the entire term. This district has some fine scholars and, it they receive the advantages they deserve, will find a place among the first in town.

No. 7.

The school house being finished before the winter schools commenced, we thought it best to have a school. It was taught by Miss Mae Farnham, of Belgrade. This being her first school, she entered upon her duties in a faithful manner, and by hard work of both teacher and pupils, gained a good degree of success, and with experience we think will rank among the first.

Here closes the report of the workmen who have been employed in schools during the past year. But few words of censure will be found and from our standpoint we see but little chance for more. Nearly all of the teachers we regard par excellence, while only a few have in any degree disappointed us. We are aware that the people of Manchester appreciate the advantages of a good education, and are doing much that their sons and daughters may acquire it. Our purpose has been to keep abreast with the enterprise of the town, and we have done our utmost to make the schools profitable and to taise the standard as much as possible. Though several of the school buildings have been improved during the past year, a few yet remain in a deplorable condition. It is not to be expected that every school room can be modernized, but they can be kept clean, well ventilated and well lighted. In regard to the books in this town, there should be a change in some branches, either by the committee or by the town. The best way to furnish books to pupils is by the town, as Mr. Wadsworth, in his interview by a reporter, stated that the town of Orono furnished books at a cost of about 30 cents per pupil, which is much less than they can be furnished any other way, and in that manner each scholar that needed books would get them.
