ABSTRACT OF TOWN WARRANT.

FOR MARCH 5, 1900.

ARTICLE FIRST. To choose a moderator to preside in said meeting.

- ARTICLE SECOND. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- ARTICLE THIRD. To see if the town will elect a Superintendent of Schools.
- ARTICLE FOURTH. To see if the town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools, and the poor, and repair of roads and bridges, and to defray all other town charges for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE FIFTH. To see if the town will vote to re-establish a school in what was formerly district No. 7.
- ARTICLE SIXTH. To see if the town will vote to lay out a road across the land of C G. Atkins, a distance of about 35 rods, to connect the Fifield road with the Readfield road, and appropriate money to build the same, or act anything thereon.
- ARTICLE SEVENTH. To see if the town will appropriate money for the purchase of a hearse, or act anything thereon.
- ARTICLE EIGHTH. To see if the town will accept a list of jurors as made out by the revising board.
- ARTICLE NINTH. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

The schools of Manchester have had a successful year; there has been less sickness than in many years heretofore and we have had some exceptionally fine teachers.

We put in a course of study in the spring which has been of some assistance to the teachers and the schools are now almost perfectly graded—it is found to be much better for a pupil to be in the same grade in all of his studies instead or being, perhaps, in the Fourth Reader while just commencing Arithmetic.

Improvement Leagues have been formed which the teachers think have been helpful, in some of the schools, at least. The Longfellow school has procured a fine framed picture of Longfellow, one of the State Superintendent of Schools a small but choice library and a bookcase for their library; these together with a dictionary which the school purchased last year make an outfit to be proud of.

The Washington school has a hand-ome framed portrait of Washington, one of the State Superintendent of Schools and one other framed picture; they have taken the Youth's Companion for a year and have many plans for the future.

While it is praiseworthy that our young people are anxious for a broader education than they can receive in our schools, and I am very glad that so many are able to procure this, I do regret that they are in such haste to leave our excellent schools. When they leave these they leave the more practical studies and there is much comment on all sides that High school graduates are deficient in the common English branches, espec ally spelling and grammar, and if those who consider themselves ready to go would devote as much time to study while in our schools as they are obliged to do when they go away they would be much better prepared for advanced work.

There is one lack which has been spoken of many times probably in the reports, and that is the lack of visitors. If the parents would show their interest by a call each term and those who have no children would sacrifice a few hours it would do much to spur on both teachers and pupils.

Smith, teacher; Winter Term: whole number 24; average number 20. Tommy Martin, Roy Martin, Fred Martin, Eva Weeks were not absent one half day.

WASHINGTON SCHOOL.

Bertha M. Nickerson, teacher; Spring Term: whole number 18; average number 15.3. Wallace Welch, Mary Welch, James Welch, Ernest Welch. Mattie Welch were not absent one half day Fall Term: whole number, 13; average number, 11.51; Wallace Welch, Mary Welch, James Welch. Ernest Welch, Mattie Welch, Verna Spear were not absent one half day Winter Term: whole number, 11; average attendance 9.33. Wallace Welch, James Welch, Ernest Welch, Mary Welch not absent one half day.

LINCOLN SCHOOL.

Mary E. True, teacher; Spring Term: whole number 27; average attendance 28. Harry Rhino, Harold Young, Maurice Young, Perry Caldwell, May Young were not absent one half day. Bertha L. Irving, teacher; Fall Term: whole number 26; average 22; Margaretta Ballard, Dottie Ballard, Helen Frost, Maurice Young were not absent one half day. Effie L. Josslyn, teacher; Winter Term: whole number 20; average attendance 15 6-25. Harry Ballard, Harry Rhino, Harold Young, Maurice Young were not absent one half day.

An appropriation should be made sufficient to include some necessary repairs upon the Lincoln school room and to make it as attractive as the other school rooms in town. The teachers and pupils will then feel an ambition to follow up the good work. No appropriation will be needed for books other than to cover the wear and tear. The books wear out very quickly but as we now keep an accurate account of the condition of the books we hope that better care will be taken of them than in the past.
