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

Report of Superintendent of Schools.

The spring terms of school were in care of Miss Irena L. Pope as superintendent, who is a teacher of experience and ability, having taught in and had charge of a large school in New York for many years. It was hoped that Miss Pope would be able to take charge of the schools for a term of years, but at the close of the spring terms she felt that she did not care to continue the duties longer. G. M. Knowles was chosen to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Pope. The fall and winter schools were fully up to the average in efficiency, your superintendent having been able to secure the services of teachers of experience and ability for the largest schools. Two of the teachers, Misses Langley and Neal, held State certificates.

It is to be regretted that lack of funds necessitated the shortening of the school year from thirty to twenty-eight weeks. Teachers might have been secured for a smaller compensation but it is not thought advisable to place young and inexperienced teachers in our largest schools. A few dollars more and success is as nothing compared to failure to secure best results. Sufficient money should be appropriated to maintain the schools three terms of at least ten weeks each.

Our school buildings are nearly all in fair condition but a small sum should be raised for general repairing.

No change in books is needed at this time, only additions to those we have will be necessary. It is recommended that the sum of fifty dollars be appropriated for that purpose.

It will also be necessary to raise money to defray the expenses of pupils of the town attending secondary schools. At present there are seven such, one at Ment's Hill, one in Mallowell and five at Angusta. 'The tuition for these pupils is about one hundred and seventy dollars, one-half of which is paid by the state, so the sum of eighty-five dollars will be necessary to defray this exponse.
