Report of Superintendent of Schools.

NO. 1 LONGFELLOW SCHOOL.

Miss Emma E. Jones had charge of this school for the entire year. It is hardly necessary to state that her work was entirely satisfactory. She has been employed eight consecutive terms here, which, of itself, is a sufficient guaranty of a successful teacher. A "rolling stone gathers no moss," and it is plainly evident, by examination of the several schools, that a continual change of teachers, is detrimental to the best interests of those schools.

Spring term: number of pupils registered 21, average 20. Thirteen pupils not absent one-half day. Number of visits by citizens, 20.

Fall term: number of pupils registered 22, average 21. Thirteen pupils not absent one-half day. Number of visits by citizens 4.

Winter term: number pupils registered 22, average, 20.

Twelve pupils not absent one-half day. Number visits by citizens, 12.

NO. 2 MCKINLEY SCHOOL.

Miss Elsie S. Jones, teacher. This is Miss Jones' 5th successive term in this school. Although coming here without previous experience as a teacher, it was evident from the first, that her work would be successful. Too much cannot be said, in praise of the condition of this schoolroom. It is neat and attractive and the teacher has taken great pains to adorn the walls with pictures and otherwise beautify the room and make it home-like.

Spring term: number of pupils registered, 14, average 10. Two pupils not absent one-half day. Number of visits by citizens, 15.

Fall term: number of pupils registered 12, average, 10. Four pupils not absent one-half day. Number visits by citizens, 5.

Winter term: number pupils registered 13, average 10. One pupil not absent one-halt day. Number visits by citizens, 15.

NO. 4 WASHINGTON SCHOOL.

The spring term, Miss Emma Neale, teacher, gave promise of a successful school. Miss Neale is one of the best teachers employed for the year. At the end of the ninth week, the school closed without examination, because of the illness of the teacher.

The fall term was taught by Miss Annie L. Goodwin of Augusta, who has had an experience of fifteen years, in our public schools. She labored diligently to advance her pupils in their studies, but prevailing conditions overcame her efforts, in a great measure, and at the close of the term she decided not to teach the winter school.

Miss L. J. Hanscome was employed for the winter term. She is a teacher of even wider experience than her predecessor and whatever else may be stated, it cannot be said that she was a teacher of youth and inexperience. She early encountered the difficulties, which beset the teacher of the fall school, such as non-attendance, quarreling and fighting outside the schoolroom, profanity and vile language. Lack of interest by the pupils in their studies cannot but attend such conditions, and the school became reduced to five scholars.

The school board learning how matters stood, took measures to compel the attendance of the scholars. J. W. Emery was appointed Truant officer and succeeded in securing a full attendance for the remainder of the term.

Miss Hanscome is a thorough, earnest, painstaking teacher and the pupils, who had attended constantly made good progress.

Spring term: number of pupils registered, 18, average 15.5. Two pupils not absent one-half day. Number of visits by citizens, 12.

Winter term: number pupils registered 16, average 10. Number visits by citizens, 8.

NO. 6 LINCOLN SCHOOL.

Miss Izetta Royal had charge of this school for the entire year. Miss Royal has the faculty of securing the love of her pupils and the regard of all those with whom she associates. It is needless to say her school was entirely satisfactory.

Spring term: number of pupils registered 23, average 19. Three pupils not absent one-half day. Number of visits by citizens 8.

Fall term: number of pupils registered 26, average 22. Three pupils not absent one-half day. Number visits by citizens 3.

Winter term: number pupils registered 21, average 19. Number of visits by citizens 2.

NO. 7 FRANKLIN SCHOOL.

Miss Verna V. Wadleigh of Readfield was teacher of the spring term. She had had some experience in teaching and her efforts were as successful, perhaps, as many young teachers who had not particularly fitted themselves for their work.

Miss Emma Neale taught the fall term to the entire satisfaction of both pupils and parents. Rapid progress was made during this period and it is regretted she could not be secured for the winter school.

Winter term: Miss Bessie E. Jackson teacher. Miss Jackson is an experienced teacher, having taught several schools in her own town.

This school is the smallest in town, registering only eight pupils for the winter term. It cannot be expected that such good results can be obtained in a school of this size, as in larger schools, even with a teacher of equal experience and ability; but notwithstanding the disadvantage of numbers, good advancement was made for the year.

Spring term: number of pupils registered 9, average 8. Three pupils not absent one-half day. Number of visits by citizens 6.

Fall term: number of pupils registered 9, average 8. Number of visits by citizens 4.

Winter term: number of pupils registered 8, average 6. One pupil not absent one-half day. Number visits by citizens 2.

The responsibility resting on parents and those having children in charge is great, as regards their education. It is a serious matter to keep a child from the schoolroom. Nothing less than illness should be accepted as an excuse.

See to it that your children attend school every day; no trivial matter should keep them away, for in any school, no matter how unprofitable it may be, some advancement may be made, if there is a good healthy home influence.

Never criticise a teacher or her methods in the presence of children, for by so doing oftentimes a school is a failure, which, otherwise might have been a success.

Parents, get in closer touch with the schools, visit them, get acquainted with the teachers, invite them to your homes, show them that you are interested in them, then the cry of poor schools and irregular attendance will cease in a great measure.

It is gratifying to note that there are several pupils attending schools out of town, six at secondary schools, and five at the Grammar school, Augusta.
