

Report of Superintendent of Schools

No. 1-LONGFELLOW SCHOOL.

Emma E. Jones, of Augusta, had charge of this school for the entire year. It is hardly necessary to state that her work was entirely satisfactory. This is Miss Jones' eleventh consecutive term in this school, and the advancement which has been made illustrates the wisdom of retaining teachers for a series of terms.

Whole number of scholars, spring term 30, average 28.

Whole number of scholars, fall term 27, average 24.

Whole number of scholars, winter term, 24, average 20.

No. 2-McKINLEY SCHOOL.

Elsie S. Jones, of Augusta, has taught this school for the past eight terms. She is an earnest, painstaking teacher, working for the interest of her pupils at all times. It is a well-known fact that scholars in small schools as a rule do not make the advancement of pupils in larger ones, but it will have to be admitted that under Miss Jones' instruction, satisfactory progress has been made, although at greater expense per pupil.

Whole number of scholars, spring term 9, average 8.

Whole number of scholars, fall term 10, average 9.

Whole number of scholars, winter term 9, average 7.

No. 4-WASHINGTON SCHOOL.

Frank H. Williams, of Augusta, taught the spring and fall terms. Mr. Williams' services in this school were very satisfactory. Good order was maintained, and good advancement made by the pupils in their studies.

The winter term was in charge of Alvin Morse, a student at Bates college. This was Mr. Morse's first attempt at teaching, but his efforts were attended with a good degree of success. The good work begun in the two preceding terms, was carried on by Mr. Morse.

Whole number of scholars, spring term 24, average 21.

Whole number of scholars, fall term 23, average 19.

Whole number of scholars, winter term 18, average 12.

No. 6-LINCOLN SCHOOL.

Harold L. Packard, of Monmouth, had charge of the spring and fall terms. Mr. Packard is an carnest, conscientious teacher, having the interest of his pupils at heart and striving at all times for their advancement.

H. C. Miller, of Winthrop, a student at Bates college, was employed for the winter term. This was Mr. Miller's first experience at teaching. He won the good will of his pupils, and conducted a pleasant and profitable term of school.

Whole number of scholars, spring term 26, average 20.

Whole number of scholars, fall term 22, average 18.

Whole number of scholars, winter term 17, average 13.

No school was held in No. 7 the past year, the scholars being accommodated at Hoyt's Hill, in Readfield, and at No. 6 School.

The schools for the past year have averaged better than usual, every teacher has done fairly good work. Good teachers make good schools, good wages secure good teachers as a rule, and in order to maintain the present standard and length of schools the same amount should be appropriated as last year, nine hundred dollars.

Much sickness prevailed during the winter, thus reducing the average attendance. One pupil, Etta Gilbert, attended school every day during the entire school year; nor was she tardy during that time. Number of scholars, April 1, 1906, 157.
