# Reports of Superintendent

TO THE BOARD OF EDUCATION AND CITIZENS OF THE TOWN OF MANCHESTER:

I have the honor to submit my second report.

The educational factor of this town has been handled this year as far as possible by the teachers who have proven their skill by past experience here. Their work is giving results above the average in towns having the natural disadvantages of ours. Time has been given to the study of grading our schools. This is a difficult proposition on account of the location of pupils.

Let us watch closely the small items that will help to make our schools rank among the best. A little help with school work evenings and an occasional new book for the home library will help regulate attendance which has been fairly well governed this year.

Advanced Histories and Physiologies have been placed with the more advanced pupils and many are making very rapid progress.

Algebra has taken a small place in the work and much benefit will be derived from this as a preparation for secondary schools.

While our work in penmanship has received its share of time and care it is not showing what it should. Next year I wish to see a new method introduced.

Supplementary reading from classics combined with the study of literature has proven very satisfactory.

I believe a change in books for mathematics is necessary if we obtain the greatest development possible in this subject. The present books do not prove interesting and are lacking in work which develops reasoning power.

The test of sight and hearing has been a great assistance to the teachers in solving problems of difficulty with many pupils. Parents should heed the notices and give immediate attention as a disease or defect in one of the senses of a child may easily be cured now, but if allowed to accumulate will lead to a world of trouble.

#### Repairs.

This account has been very small the past year. Next year hard wood floors should be laid in part of the rooms, at least, in No. 4 and No. 6. About \$25 for each room will change from the loose, dusty, and worn out floors to sanitary and durable ones. In No. 1 many of the seats are broken and pupils are sitting in poor chairs, some without backs; these are uncomfortable, and noisy, making much unnecessary irritation for pupils and teacher.

Most of the blackboards in town need painting.

The expense of transportation has been very large for the amount of benefit received. I hope this may be properly adjusted.

The examination for High School certificates was given to seven pupils, four were found qualified and are meeting the requirements of higher schools. The other three will be better prepared next year and find the work easier.

The School Improvement League is still on duty. A nice globe has been ordered for No. 4, and the piano purchased by No. 1 is nearly paid for. New books have been placed in the libraries.

Our teachers have accepted their troubles gently and made every effort toward best results, and deserve a kind word from every parent. In closing I wish to thank the members of the board, the teachers and every citizen for any assistance in this struggle to educate our future generation.

Let us be a friend to this work and the result will be a friend to us.
