Report of Superintendent

To the Board of Education and Citizens of the Town of Manchester:

Again it gives me pleasure to report the condition of our educational department.

Under the continued effort and co-operation of parents and teachers I am sure that a very prosperous year is ending and our school system reaching a higher degree of excellency. Much better work is being done in mathematics this year. The new books are proving very satisfactory.

Many advanced books have been put in this year and a better prepared class is expected to take examination for the high school. This year only five from a class of nine were found prepared for work in secondary schools.

All the teachers have given us their undivided effort and are worthy, and will appreciate our sympathy and assistance in every possible way to make this work a greater success in the coming year.

The world's greatest industry, that of preparing a noble generation to follow us, must be considered the vital organ of our present struggle. It is only through a more practical education and a scientific classification of the right and wrong that this world can be brought to a condition of peaceful happiness which our Creator has put within our reach.

The Spring term in No. 1 was taught by Miss Kilbreth with her usual amount of interest and effort. Miss Cole, a graduate of Castine, taught the Fall term, and Miss Carr is in charge for the Winter term. This school has been held in good condition the entire year. Effort toward grading has been given but without satisfactory result. Two term average 25.

In No. 2 Miss Carr taught the Spring term and Mr. F. N. Bailey, a graduate of Kent's Hill, the Fall and Winter. Sickness, and the removal of one family, made the school too small for good work and was closed after a nine weeks' session. The pupils are transported to No. 1 the remainder of the year. Average attendance 7.

No. 3 was continued in the Spring by Maude Hayward, but was not opened in the Fall and Winter as only one pupil would attend.

Miss Eda Hayward returned to No. 4 for the entire year and is doing ideal work. Average attendance 17.

No. 6 has been unfortunate in having a new teacher each term, but this condition was unavoidable. Each teacher has continued the work as outlined and this school has made good progress. Average attendance 19.

Repairs

Beyond the common, minor repairs of all rooms, No. 4 has been thoroughly cleansed inside and outside with paint and wall tints. A hardwood floor was laid and oiled and desks repaired. This expense is rapidly returning in the increase of interest and amount of work done by the school.

A hardwood floor should be laid at once in No. 6, and new individual desks placed in this room.

As our transportation and some other bills have not been as large as usual our funds allow us to carry the Winter term fourteen weeks, making a thirty-eight week school year.

In closing I will thank parents, teachers and S. S. Committee for all interest and advice, and urge everyone to advance co-operation and give this work our leading effort.
