

### **Report of Superintendent**

To the Board of Education and Citizens of the Town of Manchester:

I have the pleasure once more to report the condition of the educational system of our town.

Too many changes in the teaching force this year have come about for the best results in our work, but these changes seem reasonably necessary.

Much sickness has caused irregularity in attendance, especially during the winter term, and in a few cases attendance has not been looked after by parents carefully enough.

Three of the schools have been closed one week on account of sickness.

In some cases the parents are depending too much upon the teacher and school for results to which they are looking forward. The child looks first to the parent and home for example, advice and instruction, thus forming ideas which largely effect the school work.

The number of visits this year with criticisms and suggestions show the continued interest and effort of parents. Let this increase each year as best results can be obtained only by co-operation of parent and teacher.

Miss Izetta Royal of Readfield has had charge of No. 1 the entire year. Only a teacher of experience, industry and ability can put this school in its present condition. The large number of scholars here has caused a little congestion, but proper seating capacity will make this an ideal school. The presence of scholars on the Meadow Hill road made it advisable to open No. 2 in the fall term. Mrs. L. W. Lanpher was engaged to teach here and transport pupils from No. 3 to No. 2. This proved a very satisfactory arrangement and the school made good progress.

The fall term was opened by Mrs. Viola Brann, but closed at the end of four weeks on account of ill health. Miss Bessie H. Grant of Randolph a teacher of experience and ability is at present in charge and no doubt the final examination will prove satisfactory results.

No. 4 was continued spring and fall by Miss Eda Hayward. Her interest and steady work raised the condition of this school far above the average. A position near her home made sufficient excuse for a resignation. Miss Marion Clark from Farmington Normal class of 1916 was secured for the Winter Term. Miss Clark is using all the modern methods possible and proving to be a very efficient instructor.

No. 6 in the spring and fall was taught by Miss Susie Carr and the witer term is taught by Mr. Maurice Brann of Jefferson. This school is doing very good work but under the present conditions of this room cannot do its best.

#### Conditions and Repairs

No. 1 must be cleansed, the walls repaired and tinted and a few new desks placed to provide proper seating capacity. The wood shed here is in a dilapidated condition.

No. 6 also needs extensive repairs. The foundation, floor timbers, floor and desks need repairs or be replaced by new. The walls and ceiling need cleansing.

No. 2 and No. 4 are in suitable condition for present. All of the yards are neglected. New books have been purchased this year only to replace those in poor condition and supply new scholars. Many classics have been used by advanced classes. A new series of readers should be adopted for the lower grades to increase interest and supply modern methods.

The school Leagues have not done the usual amount of work this year. The crowded condition of No. 1 leaves no time for this work.

Two of our flags are in poor condition.

In closing I wish to thank all those who have connected themselves with this department for the purpose of promoting the welfare of our country, by properly guiding our young people.
