### Report of Superintendent

To the Board of Education and Citizens of the Town of Manchester:

I herewith submit my annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The work of this department has passed on with the usual amount of interest and as a whole is giving very satisfactory results.

The earnest work of our teachers in co-operation with the interest of parents is keeping our school system up with the rapid pace of advancement of civilization.

Much sickness has prevailed this year and shown its evil effects, but the general effort for good attendance deserves compliment, as no truant officer has been called for the year.

The School Leagues are doing a fair amount of work by adding new books to their libraries and pictures to the rooms. More entertainments than usual have been given and these have been well attended.

Miss Grant substituted in No. 1 spring term during the sickness of Miss Royal who was able to return in the fall. A smaller number of pupils in attendance here has removed the congested condition and rapid progress is being made. The music of this school is proving a special interest.

No. 2 has been in session during the entire year, Genevieve Harris taught the spring term and put the school in a working condition,

Miss Weatherbee in charge the remainder of the year has kept the work going very satisfactorily.

Pupils in No. 3 are transported to No. 2.

No. 4 is taught the entire year by Miss Pratt, a graduate of Farmington, Normal. Only a visit to this school can explain its efficiency. The condition of the room, number of pupils, interest of teacher and parents harmonize making this an ideal country school. Much special work has been done here in the line of botany and agriculture.

No. 6 is bearing the congested conditions this year on account of large attendance. A change of teachers each term has interfered with the best progress. At the close of the spring Mr. Brann resigned. Myra Dunn a teacher of Normal training taught the fall term with success but was unable to return. Miss Longfellow with 23 terms experience is at present in charge and no doubt the final examination will see proper conditions and advancement.

The high school examination was given at the close of the spring term. Five were found prepared for work in the secondary schools and were granted certificates. One did not take the examination and has attended Cony at his own expense.

The only extensive repair work has been done in No. 6. The wall stones were put in place, broken floor timbers replaced, a hardwood floor laid and walls and ceiling repaired and tinted. No. 2 and No. 4 have received necessary minor repairs, No. 1 has had very little done the past four years and should at once be overhauled and put in modern condition according to plans approved by our state department.

The matter of joining with other towns for obtaining supervision has again come to our attention, and I hope will be understood by every voter. I consider this a golden opportunity to obtain expert supervision over our greatest asset. At present 84% of the school population of the state is under supervision by union of towns. The state pays two-thirds of the cost of such supervision.

When we can do enough for the education of our children the vast sums of money now used for asylums and prisons can be put to a better use.

In closing I wish to thank all who are interested and have supported me in the past four year's work, and ask you to accept this step of advancement.
