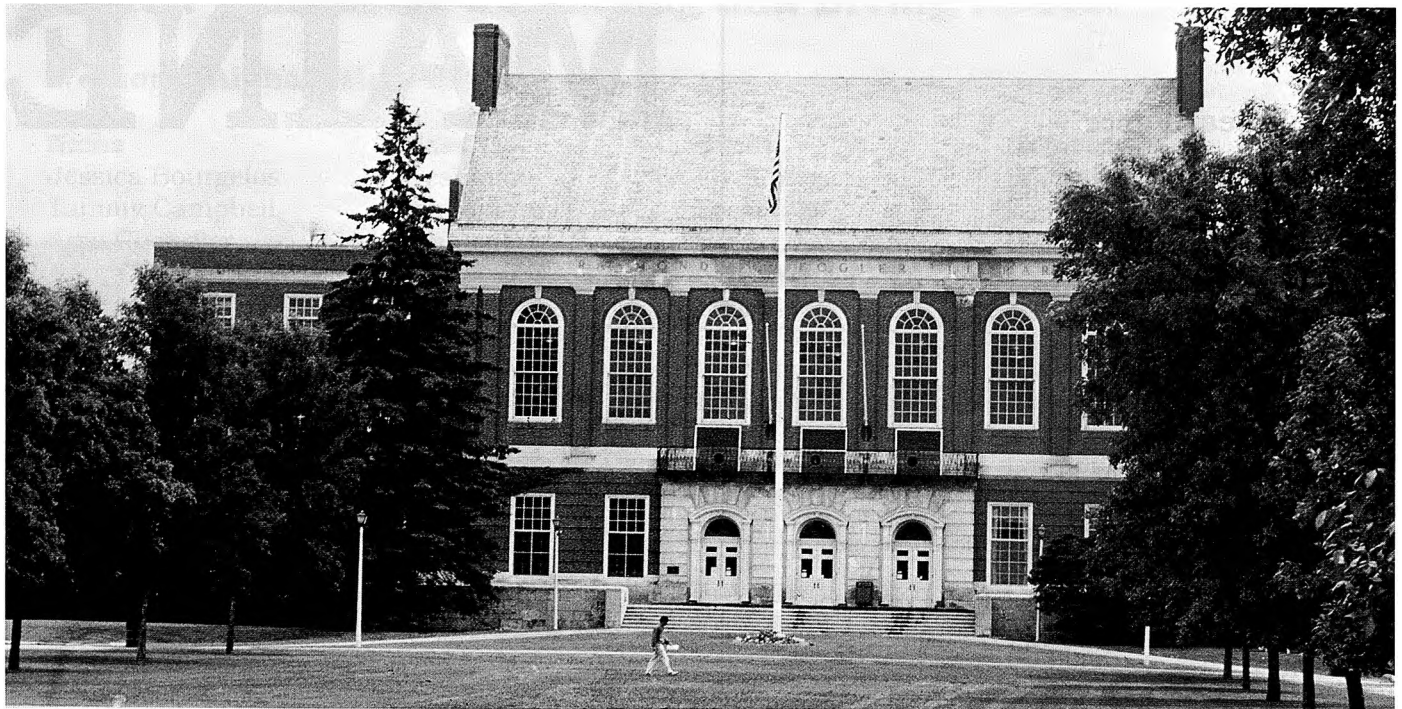

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The University of Maine

The University of Maine, located in Orono, is the largest campus in the statewide university system. There is plenty of open space on its 1,200 acres, where students are offered the diversity and the challenge of a large university in an invigorating atmosphere of a small college. The campus at Orono is in a classic New England setting, located 10 miles north of Bangor, Maine's third largest city. The region is conveniently located close to ski slopes, outdoor recreation areas and the beautiful Maine coastline.

The University, with a variety of exciting and challenging course opportunities, offers an outstanding faculty. Baccalaureate degree programs are offered through eight colleges: Applied Sciences and Agriculture, Arts and Humanities, Business Administration, Education, Engineering and Technology, Forest Resources, Sciences, and Social and Behavioral Sciences. The campus houses the expansive Raymond Fogler Library and a number of respected research facilities to give the student an excellent learning environment.

Students from 45 states and 74 countries studied at the University

last year, and more than 20 percent of the total enrollment of 12,165 is admitted from outside the state of Maine.

Student activities at the University create an important balance between the classroom experience and the personal life of the individual scholar. There are seven scholastic honor societies, four non-scholastic honor societies, 22 departmental honor societies, 56 associations, clubs and organizations, and six religious groups. Twelve fraternities and seven sororities have chapters in Orono. In short, a variety of opportunities exists for students, both academically and socially, outside the classroom. The Maine Center for the Arts, host to concerts, comedy, theatre, recitals and other popular entertainment, is located on campus and features nationally and world renowned entertainers.

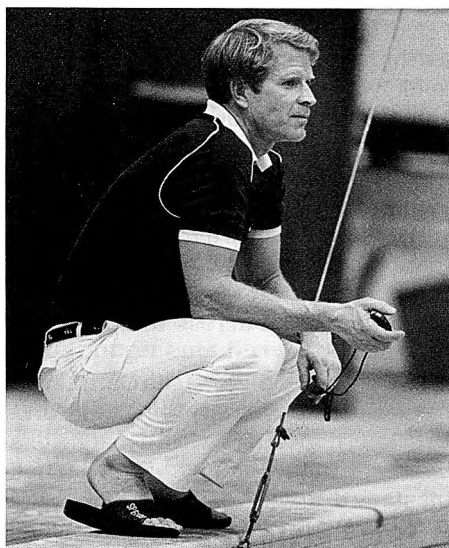
The University offers its students, the community and the state an outstanding athletic tradition. Several Black Bear teams have excelled to regional and national prominence.

Included on Maine's athletic staff is a full-time academic coordinator responsible for closely monitoring the progress of each of the 600 varsity stu-

dent-athletes. Coaches also monitor and advise their student-athletes, frequently holding meetings specifically to discuss academic situations. Study halls and special tutorial sessions are scheduled daily as a way to enhance the learning process. This support and close scrutiny has been a significant reason the overall grade point average of student-athletes has been higher than that of the general student body. The primary goal of the University and the athletic department is to see each individual reach his or her academic potential.

The recreation and intramural department offers organized competition in a number of events throughout the year. Students can participate in a variety of sports from basketball, softball and soccer to waterpolo, mountain bike racing and broomball. Open facilities are also available to students for informal play. Maine's 19 Division I athletic teams entertain more than 100 intercollegiate events on campus each year. The University offers students a wide spectrum of opportunities to enhance the overall college experience.





JEFF WREN
Head Coach

Jeff Wren begins his third season as head coach of both the men's and women's swim teams.

Despite being a relative newcomer as the head coach of two programs, Wren is not new to Black Bear swimming.

Wren has been a part of Maine swimming since the program's inception in 1971.

Projected as a graduate assistant coach with the men's team while he completed his master's degree, Wren established a women's program at Maine upon his arrival, due to campus demand. He served as a graduate assistant coach under Alan Switzer, founder of the men's program, and as head coach of the women's program until 1979, when scheduling conflicts made direct involvement with both programs impractical.

During his career at Maine, Wren has made significant contributions to the men's New England Championships during the 1970s, and has guided the women's team to six New England titles.

Wren is a 1971 graduate of the College of William and Mary, where he earned his bachelor's degree in biology. He came to Maine in the fall of that year, coinciding with the opening of the Stanley M. Wallace Pool. Wren completed his master's degree in physical education in the summer of 1974.

The 1990-91 season marked a new beginning in Black Bear swimming. With the combination of the men's and women's programs, Wren became the head coach of both the men's and women's squads.

Wren took on the challenge of coaching both teams. Throughout the season, he continued to preserve the success and the achievements previously made in the program.

Wren guided the women's team to a 4-6 record a year ago, while the men's team posted a record of 3-7 and finished the season in fifth place at the men's New England Championships in Rhode Island. The women's team placed 10th at the New England Championships. Overall, Wren has an impressive 118-45 record in women's dual meets and a two-year mark of 8-12 with the men's program.

In addition to his work with the varsity programs, Wren also directs and supervises the swimming clinics offered through the Sam Sezak Summer Camps at the University of Maine campus.

Diving Coach
Assistant Swim Coach

Now in his fourth season as the Black Bears' diving coach, Lance Graham

brings experience and enthusiasm to the program.

Graham, a former standout diver for the University of Maine, is equipped with a long list of accomplishments and goals. Graham serves as the head diving coach for both the men's and women's programs, while also assisting Jeff Wren in the swimming programs.

Last season, Graham earned his second New England Diving Coach of the Year honor. In his first season as diving coach at Maine, Graham received the same award. During that year, Rick Keene became a New England Champion on both the one- and three-meter boards.

Before coaching at Maine, Graham was head diving coach at University of Northern Iowa from 1986-89. Previously, he was head diving coach at Williams College from 1982-86, where he guided four All-Americans and two New England Diving champions.

He also worked extensively with the United States Junior Olympic diving

program, and has guided several divers to zone, regional and national competitions.

A 1981 graduate of Maine with a bachelor's degree in physical education, Graham enjoyed tremendous success as a diver on the Black Bear team.

In his two seasons at Maine, Graham was a New England champion on both the one- and three-meter boards. He finished in the top four at the Eastern Seaboard Championships, and competed at the NCAA Division I National Championships.

Prior to his undergraduate work at Maine, Graham attended Alfred (N.Y.) Agricultural and Technical College where he was a four-time junior college All-American selection, and national record holder on the one- and three-meter boards.

Graham, a native of North Towa-wanda, N.Y., earned his master's degree in educational administration from North Adams State College in 1986.



Academic Support



MARGARET ZILLIOUX Academic Support

Margaret Zillioux begins her third year as Associate Athletic Director for Academic Support, having previously served at Maine as Academic Support Coordinator for two years.

Zillioux is responsible for the development and the implementation of the school's academic support services for

student-athletes.

Zillioux closely monitors the academic progress of over 600 varsity student athletes at Maine. Working with the existing campus-wide academic assistance programs, Zillioux has geared programs specifically for student-athletes and their busy schedules.

While at Maine, Zillioux has been responsible for converting the mandatory study hall sessions into learning centers.

"Students are no longer just attending the study halls," says Zillioux. "They are developing study and time management skills."

In addition, Zillioux has developed the current means of monitoring academic progress, coordinated the first-year students' orientation programs, and established the Scholar-Athlete Awards Recognition Program and the Student-Athlete Newsletter.

Last season under Zillioux's guidance, 62 student-athletes were presented with Scholar-Athlete Recognition Awards.

"It's important that we recognize the academic accomplishments, as well as the athletic accomplishments," says Zillioux. "It is quite a feat to excel both

in the classroom and on the playing field."

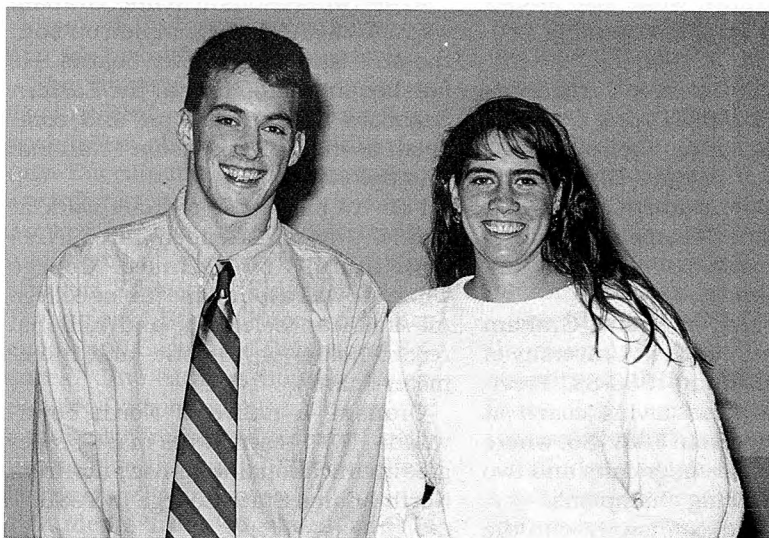
A great fan of athletics, Zillioux often attends Maine sporting events to also monitor their athletic achievements.

"If I attend games and work closely with the athletes as a mentor, they are more likely to open up and explain their problems. It's important that I'm not always seen across the desk in a time of crisis."

Zillioux graduated Magna Cum Laude from State University of New York-Brockport in 1976 with a bachelor's degree in psychology. She earned master's degrees from State University of New York-Genesee in counseling psychology, and from the University of Iowa in counseling and human development.

At Iowa, Zillioux served as an Academic Advising intern in 1984. She later became a counselor and advisor in the Office of Athletic Student Services for the Hawkeyes' Men's Athletics.

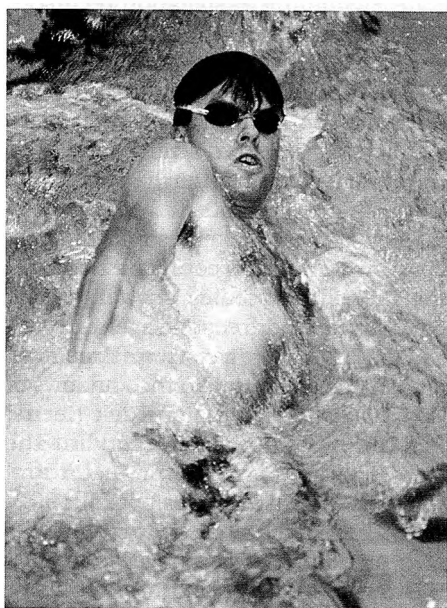
Swimming and Diving at Maine

In 1971, the University of Maine Swimming and Diving program began upon the completion of the Stanley M. Wallace Pool, one of the top swimming and diving facilities in the East. Through its 21 years of competition, Maine has enjoyed much success, including several New England Championships.

The Maine swimming program endured its greatest challenge a year ago. With budget cuts threatening its very existence, the program received overwhelming support, even revitalization. With the leadership of Stephen and Tabitha King stepping forward with their generous donation and others to follow, the fiscal demands of the program will be met.

"The swimming and diving program is looking forward to a bright future as we have dedicated ourselves to the renewal of its proud tradition," said Director of Athletics Michael Ploszek.

With the future of swimming reaffirmed, Maine enters the 1992-93 season under coach Jeff Wren. Upon the retirement of 19-year head coach Alan Switzer, who started and directed the men's team, both programs fell under women's head coach Wren. Wren has been a part of the women's program since it began in 1971, and he has since lifted it to a comfortable position among New England's best.

The combination of the two programs required much of the training and all of the meets to be conducted simultaneously. Fourth-year diving coach Lance Graham, 1989-90 and 1991-92 New England Diving Coach of the Year, will continue to assist Wren with the swimming, in addition to being one of the few full-time diving coaches in the Northeast.

Under Switzer, the men's program won two New England championships, before moving to the Eastern Seaboards and Eastern Intercollegiates in 1979. The 1989-90 season saw the men's team return to the New England with a fourth place finish. The last two seasons, the men have placed fifth.

From the beginning, Switzer's program has been committed to excellence both to individuals and to the team. Wren has continued guiding the program under this philosophy.

The women's program has enjoyed comparable success. Winning six New England titles (1978, 79, 80, 84, 86 and 87), Wren's teams have finished shy of the top three places just three times in 15 years. One of the most highly-regarded women's programs in the country, Maine has consistently enjoyed one of the largest squads in the region. Team unity, with all members contributing, has been a cornerstone of Wren's teams.

Both programs have outstanding dual meet records. The women have suffered just one losing season since becoming an intercollegiate activity in 1973 and post an impressive record of 118 wins and 45 losses. The men have been consistently successful and enjoy an overall record of 146-78. There is a lot of energy and optimism to continue the winning tradition as the two groups combine efforts for a third season together.

The Black Bear swimming and diving program is fortunate to have one of the most outstanding facilities in the Northeast, the Stanley M. Wallace Pool. Its eight lanes measure 25 yards by 25 meters, with a separate diving area and a full eight-line Colorado scoring and judging system.

The Michael and Georgia Latti fitness center, one of the most well-equipped facilities of its kind, is located immediately adjacent to the pool. In addition, the diving program is supplemented by a trampoline, dryboard and a one-meter platform, all located on the deck.

These facilities, coupled with the dedication of past and present coaches and swimmers, have provided the University of Maine with one of the most successful swimming and diving programs in the Northeast.



1992-93 Season Outlook

Like in years past, the 1992-1993 Maine swim teams will reach for regional team and individual goals.

Led by a firm commitment from the community and the athletic department, the University of Maine swim programs begin a new era.

Jeff Wren begins his third season as head coach of both the women's and men's programs. He is assisted by two-time New England Diving Coach of the Year Lance Graham.

For the third year, Maine will compete in the North Atlantic Conference Championships. The schedule has been modified from what has been accomplished in years past. The NAC Championship will be the goal of the season. Maine's Stanley Wallace pool will be the showcase location of the 1992-93 NAC Swimming and Diving Championships. In addition to this championship goal, Maine will concentrate more on training and group events which include a reduced dual meet schedule.

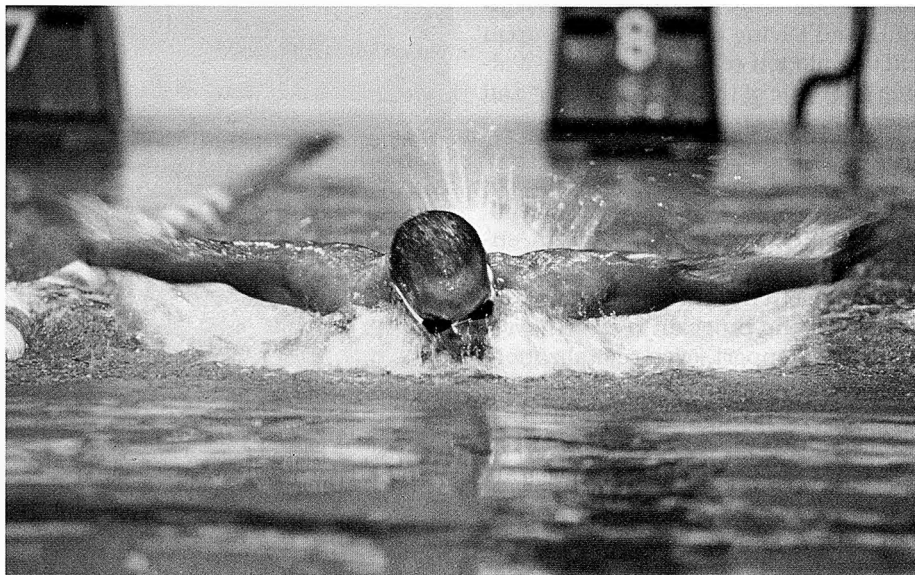
The Women's Team

The women's team will have seniors Laurie Deputy, Alexis Livingston, Betsy Lewis and captain Wendy Woodbury to lead the team in 1992-93.

A strong sophomore class which includes Tammy Campbell, Jen Riley, Mary Conley, Jen Truscheit, Colley Johnson and Amy Chandler should step up and fill the holes from graduation losses.

Deputy (freestyle), Livingston (freestyle, breaststroke) and Woodbury (freestyle, I.M.) will give Maine strength in freestyle events and also lend some versatility. Lewis, who swims the backstroke, freestyle and individual medley, won the Switzer Dedication Award last year.

Jenkins (breaststroke, I.M.) and Truscheit (backstroke, I.M.) should also earn UM some points. Chandler (breaststroke, freestyle), Campbell (breaststroke, I.M.), Riley (breaststroke) and Conley (freestyle) give Maine some depth and added points. Jessica Bour-

geios, Karin O'Donnell and Holly Jo Doyon are first-year swimmers hoping to make an impact.

The Men's Team

Todd Springer, A.J. Rog, Keith Nickels and Derek Marshall make up a powerful foursome in the backstroke and individual medley. Marshall set school marks in the 100 and 200 backstroke. His 200 backstroke time of 1:52.2 set a New England Intercollegiate Swimming Association record.

Marshall and Todd Springer formed half of UM's school record-breaking 200 medley relay team. Brett Astor and Bill Stone, both seniors a year ago, were also record breakers on that relay.

Rog, a senior captain, will provide leadership and points in the individual medley events. Nickels is another versatile swimmer who could see action in the individual medley as well as the backstroke and freestyle events.

Tom Hines, a diver from Brockton, Mass., has competed in the shadows of New England Champion Rick Keene. For Hines, who placed second at the New Englands on the one-meter and third on the three-meter board, 1992-93 represents a chance to create his own niche in Maine diving history.

Brian Livingston, who joins his sister Alexis in the Maine swim program, and Maxim Maximov of Moscow, Russia, are two new faces that add depth and strength to the breaststroke.



1991-92 In Review

The 1991-92 season was the most demanding on the Maine program in recent history. The women's program suffered its first-ever sub .500 dual meet season. The men, while finishing a solid fifth in the 17-team New England Championship meet, compiled a 4-6 dual meet mark.

The programs, in their second season under one coach and second in the North Atlantic Conference, continued to go through a transition stage with schedules and goals. Last season, both programs participated in the NAC Championships and the New England Championships. The women chose to swim through the New Englands and shave for the NAC Championship, while the men shaved for New Englands and held on for the NAC meet.

Highlighting the championship meets was the men's fifth place finish at the New Englands. Derek Marshall set school marks in the 100 and 200 backstroke with times of 52.2 and 1:52.2 respectively. His 200 backstroke time set a New England Intercollegiate Swimming Association standard. The 200 medley relay team of Todd Springer, Brett Astor, Derek Marshall, and Bill Stone set a school mark with their time of 1:35.89.

The dynamic diving duo of Rick Keene and Tom Hines placed 1-2 in the one-meter board and 1-3 in the three-meter board. With the continued success of Maine divers, Lance Graham, Black Bear diving coach, received his second New England Diving Coach of the Year honors in three years.

At the North Atlantic Conference Championships, the men placed sixth and the women seventh. Derek Marshall set a NAC record with his 52.43 in the 100 backstroke. Marshall was also fourth in the 200 backstroke. Diver Keene placed first on the one-meter board. Keene was second on the three-meter followed by Hines, who placed third.

Senior captain Clem Whaling ended a brilliant collegiate career with a fourth place finish in the 1650 freestyle and sixth in the 500 freestyle and 400 I.M. Jill Abrams was fifth and sixth in the 100 and 200 butterfly. Maine's 200 freestyle and 200 medley relays placed fourth.

The Maine women also won the New

Brunswick Invitational over seven Canadian schools.

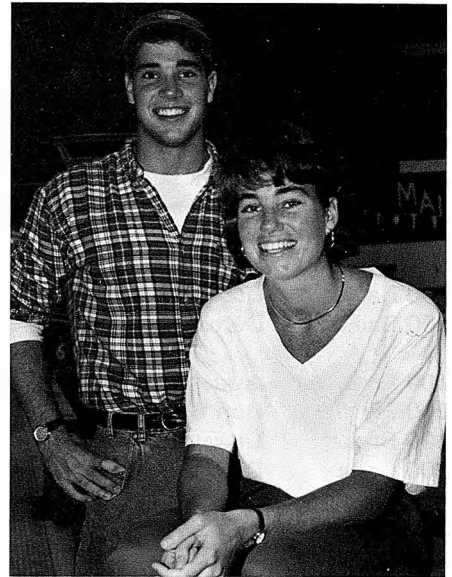
The women's dual meet schedule included wins over Massachusetts 163-131, Rhode Island 175-119 and Colby 148-135. In the win over UMass, the Black Bears placed first in 11 of 16 events. Whaling, Laurie Deputy and Jennifer Denison each won two events.

Whaling won the 1000 freestyle in the win over URI, but it was Michelle Giroux's sweep of the one and three-meter boards that helped lead Maine over the Rams. Whaling returned to form against UNH. She won the 1000 freestyle while setting a new UM record of 10:37.94

The men, while second in the New Brunswick Invitational, captured wins over Vermont 95-45, McGill 148-109, New Hampshire 125-118 and Colby 166-118.

Keene's sweep of the one- and three-meter boards led UM in a losing cause against Massachusetts. Marshall also won the 200 backstroke as Maine took the top three spots in that event.

A pair of A.J. Rog wins led Maine over UNH in the last conference dual meet. Hines and Keene took the top two spots in the diving events to aid one of Maine's best wins of the season.

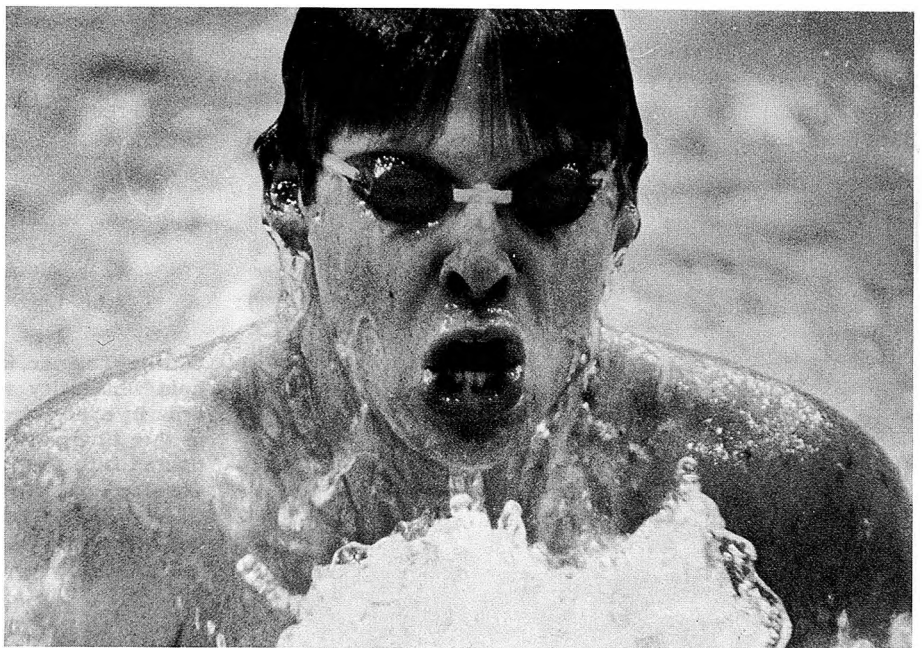

Senior Nick Volkos competes in the breaststroke and individual medley events for the Black Bears.



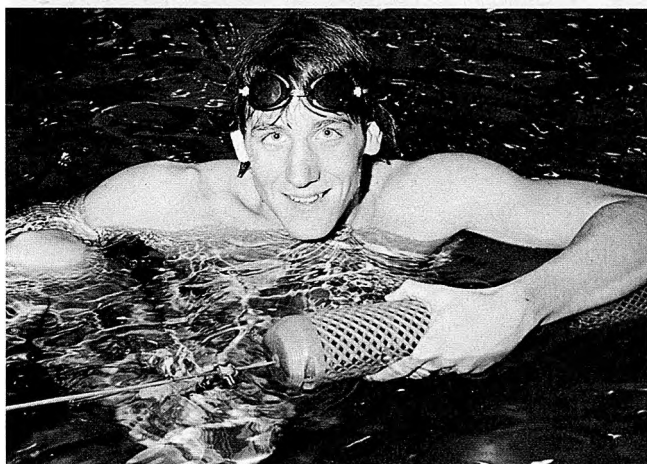

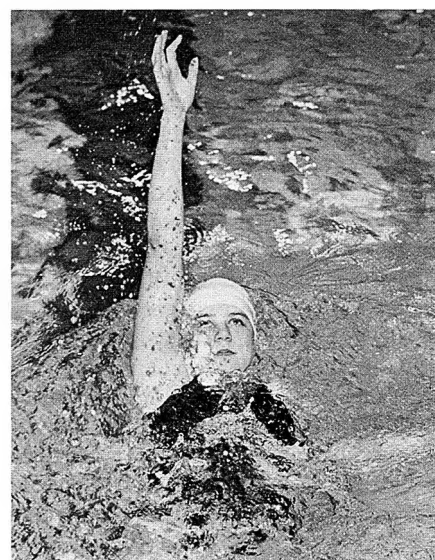

The Stanley M. Wallace Pool Complex

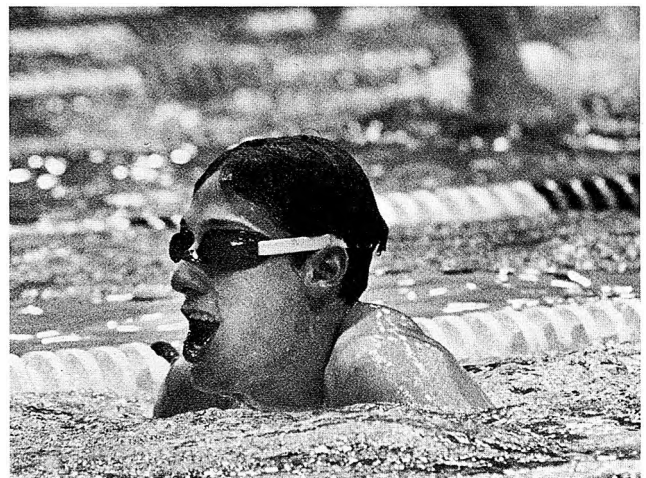
