# ANNUAL REPORT

— OF THE —

## ✦ Supervisor of Schools. ✦

### PREAMBLE.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF NORTH YARMOUTH :

In making this our second annual report on the condition of the several schools in town, it will of necessity be somewhat incomplete, as four of the six schools will be in session at the time of this report going to print.

The school in district No. 5 was discontinued altogether for the past year. Some of the scholars were sent to district No. 4, some to district No. 6, and two to a school in Pownal.

After paying the tuition of the two scholars sent to Pownal, the rest of the money belonging to said district was divided among the other districts in town, the most of it going to Nos. 4 and 6, as the scholars from No. 5 were added to these districts.

A statement of the apportionment of the money among the several districts will appear in the Selectmen's report, therefore we do not deem it necessary to reprint it here.

#### District No. 1.

Whole number of scholars in the district, 55 ; whole number weeks school for the year, 33 ; greatest number

in attendance at one time, 35 ; average number for the year, about 22. Miss Leanora Whitney, teacher.

Miss W. has taught this school during the entire year, and with as good success as is allowed the most of us, in our undertakings. She being very popular with both scholars and parents, the average attendance for the spring and fall terms was good, but owing to sickness in the district, the average for the winter term will greatly reduce the average for the year. Wages of teacher, spring, \$7.00 ; fall, \$7.50 ; winter,—

#### District No. 2.

Whole number scholars in the district, 36 ; whole number weeks school for the year, 30 ; greatest number in attendance at one time, 16 ; average number for the year, about 15. Miss Carrie L. Webster, teacher.

Miss W. is about to close her second year's school in this district. There seems to be the best of feeling between scholars and teacher, with a good degree of improvement. A teacher who can have a school for six successive terms, needs no recommendation from us. Wages of teacher, spring, \$6.00 ; fall, \$6.00 ; winter,—

#### District No. 3.

Whole number scholars in the district, 20 ; whole number weeks school for the year, about 21 ; greatest number in attendance at one time, 19 ; average number for the year, about 15. Miss Della S. Hayes, teacher.

We visited Miss H.'s school twice during the fall term and were well pleased with its appearance ; there being sickness in the district, the winter term did not begin until the first of Jan., instead of the first of Dec., as usual. As yet we have visited the winter term but once. Wages of teacher.—

## District No. 4.

Whole number scholars in the district, 19 ; whole number weeks school for the year, 16 ; greatest number in attendance at one time. 19 ; average number for the year, 15. C. W. Mountfort, teacher.

If it were not blowing our own horn too loudly, we should like to brag a little about this school. Not about the teacher, oh no ! but about the scholars. We had fourteen constant ones, and five that were not so constant. The constant ones are such scholars as a teacher likes to have, always at school—unless something urgent keeps them out—and when they are determined to make the most of their time ; such scholars are sure to improve, even with one term a year. Wages of teacher, \$40.00

## District No. 6.

Whole number scholars in the district, 39 ; whole number weeks in the spring term, 7 ; greatest number in attendance for the term, 24 ; average number for the term, 20. Miss Isa L. Dean, teacher.

Considering Miss Dean's experience, or rather inexperience as a teacher, and the condition of the school when she took it, her success was far above our most sanguine expectations. Wages of teacher, \$5.00.

Fall term, 8 weeks ; greatest number in attendance for the term, 30 ; average number for the term, 24. Miss Emma Watkins, teacher.

The first half of this term suited us the best of any in the District since we have had anything to do with the schools. The last half did not suit us as well but we think it gave better satisfaction in the District, so we will compromise and call it all good. Wages of teacher, \$7.00

Winter term, to be 14 weeks ; greatest number in attendance for the term, 29 ; average number for the term, about 23. Mr. D. N. Woodman, teacher.

Mr. Woodman seems to be a man who tries to do his whole duty. We have visited his school twice during the term and found a fair degree of order and the interest good. Wages of teacher, \$36.00

District No. 7.

School-house in Pownal.

District No. 8.

School-house in Yarmouth.

District No. 9.

Whole number scholars in the district, 13 ; whole number weeks school for the year, 21 ; greatest number in attendance for the year, 11 ; average number for the year, 10. Miss May C. Morrill, teacher.

Miss Morrill is a live teacher and we think the district was fortunate in securing her for both terms. Wages of teacher, spring, \$4.45 ; winter \$5.48.

#### SUMMARY.

We have exchanged Arithmetics and Primary Geographies, as per vote at the last annual town meeting ; putting in fifty-five of the first book in Arithmetic, ninety-five of the second, and fifty Geographies, at a total cost of \$64.21.

Most of the books are in good condition at the present time but there are some that will need to be replaced by new ones, and we would recommend the sum of fifty dollars be added to the contingent fund, subject to the order of the Supervisor, to pay for the same.

TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE TOWN OF NORTH YARMOUTH :

By the request of your Municipal Officers, I submit the following :

During the year ending March 1887, I made a complete canvass of the town for the purpose of making the Records of the town as perfect as possible. The result of that canvass was the obtaining and placing upon the Records 327 births and 274 deaths. There had been no complete record of births or deaths for over forty years. In the canvass of the town I was unable to obtain all of the births and deaths as some of the families upon whom I called were away.

During the year ending March 1888, I have been able to obtain through the kindness of some of the families and from other sources, a considerable number more of births and deaths and have placed them on the Records.

Your Selectmen also suggest that I include in this Report a list of the Intentions of Marriages, and the deaths which have occurred in town the past year, which are as follows :

As these Records are of great value to the town, and that they may be kept as perfect as possible in future, I would suggest to the heads of the different families in town that they may be very particular to send to the Town Clerk the dates of all births and deaths that may come to their knowledge, and I would most respectfully call their attention to a part of Sections 21 and 22 of Chapter 59 of the Revised Statutes: "And parents, householders, masters of workhouses, almshouses, prisons and vessels *shall* give notice to the Clerk of their town of the births and deaths which take place in their families, houses or vessels, and the elder person next of kin, shall give notice of the death of his kindred.

Whoever neglects to perform the duties required of him in the preceding sections, forfeits not exceeding ten dollars for each offence, to be recovered by complainant, half to the town and half to the prosecutor."

## Warrant for Annual Town Meeting.

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*To Henry E. Skillin, Constable of North Yarmouth,  
in the County of Cumberland,* GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house in said town on Monday, the nineteenth day of March, A. D., 1888, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit :

ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To hear the report of the Town Treasurer, and act on the same.

ART. 4. To hear the report of the Selectmen and act on the same.

ART. 5. To hear the report of the Overseers of the Poor and act on the same.

ART. 6. To hear the report of the Supervisor of schools and act on the same.

ART. 7. To hear the report of the Trustees of the School fund and vote how the money shall be expended.

ART. 8. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March, annually.

ART. 9. To raise money for the support of schools.

ART. 10. To raise money for the support of the poor.

ART. 11. To raise money for the repair of bridges.

ART. 12. To see how much money the town will raise for the repair of Roads, and vote how it shall be expended, and fix the price of men, oxen and horses per day,

ART. 13. To raise money for the payment of town officers.

ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to have the reports of its officers for the ensuing year printed, and raise money for the same.

ART. 15. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.

ART. 16. To raise money for contingent fund.

ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to accept such persons for bondsmen, as the Treasurer and Collector for the ensuing year may present.

ART. 18. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to furnish wire to fence the road in places where it would be for the interest of the town.

ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to tax dogs.

ART. 20. To see if the town will vote to abolish the school District system.

ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to raise such sums of money as may be necessary to accommodate the scholars when the districts are abolished.

ART. 22. To see if the town will authorize the Town Officers to sell the houses now occupied by the several districts and make such other arrangements as shall be necessary for putting the new system in operation.

ART. 23. To see what action the town will take in regard to relieving the Collectors of 1883, 1884 and 1885, of certain taxes on their books.

ART. 24. To see if the town will vote to buy land in different parts of the town for the purpose of repairing the highway.

ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to raise Fifty Dollars to repair the town office.

ART. 26. To see what plan the town will adopt to prevent drawing orders against appropriations before the money is assessed.

ART. 27. To see if the town will vote, if a corn factory be built in town by responsible parties, to abate the taxes on the same also abate taxes on machinery therein, for a term of five years.

ART. 28 To see if the town will vote to accept the list of Jurors as prepared by the municipal officers.

ART. 29. To see if the town will vote to build a new fence on the road-side of the Walnut Hill burying-ground.

ART. 30. To see if the town will vote to have public watering places kept accessible throughout the year.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the applications of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House at eight o'clock in the forenoon on day of said meeting.
