There has been no school in district No. 5, the past year. The scholars were sent to No. 6, and to a school in Pownal.

DISTRICT No. 1.

Spring, Fall and Winter terms, 34 weeks in all. Miss Leonora Whitney, teacher. Miss Whitney's second year in this district closes with this term. This teachers efforts in this district are so well appreciated that it is sufficient to say I always found at each visit good order, excellent recitations, and think the money well expended. Wages of teacher, \$5.30, price of board per week spring and fall, \$2.00.

DISTRICT No. 2.

Miss Carrie T. Whitney, taught three terms in this district. We always found the best of order and recitations. The improvement in reading was especially pleasing.

Wages of teacher, spring, \$4.00; fall 4.50; winter \$5.00; price of board per week \$2.00.

DISTRICT No. 3.

Miss May C. Morrill, had charge of the fall term of 7 weeks. This school was orderly, and we think the term was profitably spent.

Wages of teacher, \$3.50, price of board per week, \$2.25.

Miss Emma F. Whitney is teaching the winter term. This district was highly fortunate in securing the services of so experienced a teacher for this term. We have visited this school twice, and were well pleased with its appearance in order and improvement.

We feel like complimenting the young gentlemen in this district upon their gentlemanly behavior.

DISTRICT No. 4.

Two terms Fall and Winter. Miss Della Hayes, teacher. At each visit the teacher and scholars seemed interested in their work. The school was orderly and made a fair degree of progress.

Wages and board of teacher, fall, \$6.00. Winter, \$6.50.

DISTRICT No. 6.

Whole number weeks school for the year, 30.

Miss Alice Perley teacher for the year.

This is one of the largest schools in town. The spring and fall terms, under the excellent methods and management of Miss Perley will rank among the best. On my first visit to the winter term, the school appeared well and I was hoping for a prosperous term; but on my second visit I was greatly disappointed to find that some of the larger scholars were laboring hard to keep up the past poor reputation of the school, and doing all they could to disturb the school and annoy the teacher. Some of the scholars made a fair degree of improvement.

Wages and board of teacher, summer and fall, \$6.00. Winter, \$8.50.

DISTRICT No. 7.

School-house in Pownal.

School-house in Yarmouth.

DISTRICT No. 9.

Fall term 8 weeks. Winter term to be 15 weeks.

Miss Annie Reed teacher.

This is Miss Reed's first attempt at teaching, and we think that under the circumstances she has met with very good success.

Wages of teacher, \$3.50, price of board per week, \$2.00.

The black-board in district No. 9, needs repairing. In district No. 3, they have one small black-board, for 26 scholars. The expense to the town for school-books, has been light for the past year, but some of the Readers, Spellers, and Geographies, which have been in use for nearly six years, will soon have to be replaced by new ones.

On the whole, we think the school will rank well for the past year. We have visited every school twice, and have endeavored to report them as they appeared to us at the time, but as five schools out of six are still in session at the time this report was printed, they cannot be fully reported.

*To Frank M. Ross, Constable of North Yarmouth, in the
County of Cumberland,* GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of North Yarmouth, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the town house in said town on Monday, the eighteenth day of March, A. D. 1889, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

ART. 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2nd. To choose a town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3rd. To hear the report of the town Treasurer and act on the same.

ART. 4th. To hear the report of the Selectmen and act on the same.

ART. 5th. To hear the report of the Overseers of the poor and act on the same.

ART. 6th. To hear the report of the Supervisor of schools and act on the same.

ART. 7th. To hear the report of the Trustees of the school fund and vote how the money shall be expended.

ART. 8th. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be choosen in the month of March, annually.

ART. 9th. To raise money for the support of schools.

ART. 10th. To raise money for the support of the poor.

ART. 11th. To raise money for the repair of bridges.

ART. 12th. To see how much money the town will raise for repair of roads, and vote how it shall be expended, and fix the price of men, oxen and horses per day.

ART. 13th. To raise money for the payment of town officers.

ART. 14th. To see if the town will vote to have the reports of its officers for the ensuing year printed, and raise money for the same.

ART. 15th. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.

ART. 16th. To raise money for the contingent fund.

ART. 17th. To see if the town will vote to accept such persons for bondsmen, as the Treasurer and Collector for the ensuing year may present.

ART. 18th. To see what action the town will take in regard to relieving the Collectors of 1882, '83, '84, and '86, of certain taxes on their books.

ART. 19th. To see if the town will vote a sum of money to repair the town office.

ART. 20th. To see if the town will vote to abate the taxes of John Bowie, real and personal, as long as he maintains his son John W. Bowie.

ART. 21st. To see if the town will vote to repair the fence enclosing the Cemeteries near Crockett's Corner and John R. Young's, and right the head stones in all of the Cemeteries in town, and raise money for the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the applications of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the town house at eight o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
