

REPORT

—OR—

SUPERVISOR OF SCHOOLS.

To the citizens of North Yarmouth:

The Supervisor of schools respectfully submits the following report:

School District No. 1.

The agent of this district secured the services of Miss Carrie T. Whitney as teacher for the entire year. Miss Whitney has previously taught a number of terms with success in this town, and she has well sustained her reputation in this school. The most prominent feature in her teaching being thoroughness, which is highly commendable.

School District No. 2.

This school was taught by Miss Abbie S. Hall throughout the entire year. The teacher gained the good will of her scholars, which is very essential to their successful instruction. Both teacher and scholars were interested and a good school was the result of their efforts.

School District No. 3.

Miss Carrie Webster taught the school for the entire year. The teacher commenced these terms in her usual cheerful and energetic manner, and labored with the same efficiency as in former years, and her efforts were apparently appreciated by the pupils in her charge.

School District No. 4.

The school for the entire year was taught by Miss Alice L. Perley. Both teacher and pupils were interested in their work, and the school was one of pleasure and profit to each member.

School District No. 5.

There was but one term of school in this district, which was taught in the winter by Miss Mabel M. Morse. At the commencement of this term there was promise of a profitable term. At the close the promise was realized.

School District No. 6.

Teacher for spring and fall terms, Miss Margaret S. Drinkwater. The teacher brought experience and all other qualifications necessary for a person in her position. At the close the result was very pleasing.

Winter term taught by Mr. C. S. Snow. The earnest efforts of the teacher were seconded by a thoroughly interested school. The success of Mr. Snow, as a teacher, is beyond question. The scholars showed a good amount of improvement, and many of the classes acquitted themselves in a highly creditable manner both to teacher and scholars.

Spring term taught by Miss Della S. Hayes. Miss Hayes had a way of interesting her pupils by quickly winning their respect and good will. There was evidently a oneness of purpose felt by each member of the school to make it one of profit. It is needless to say that such was the result.

Fall term taught by Miss Mattie Greene. This was Miss Greene's first term of school. Perhaps she was a little unfortunate in securing this school for her first attempt at teaching; but undoubtedly she tried hard to make it a successful one.

Winter term taught by Miss Stella A. Cain. Miss Cain seemed to understand the needs of the school and began at once to interest and instruct. The teacher obtained the good will and co-operation of both parents and scholars, which made it a very profitable term of school.

Each of the schools in town have been visited twice every term by your Supervisor, although some are yet in session. The past year of instruction has witnessed on the whole most gratifying results, except in a few cases, all that could be desired.

Credit is due the agents of the several districts who have taken much pains to secure the best teachers their means would allow. Most of the teachers have been retained for the school year in the several districts, a practice which cannot be too highly recommended.

Our State Superintendent of common schools has requested me to place before the town an estimate upon which to base the appropriation to be then made for the purchase of school text-books under the new law. The following is a list of the number of books of each grade and price of the same.

NORTH YARMOUTH, March 1, 1890.

Warrant for Town Meeting.

To O. F. Dolloff, Constable of North Yarmouth, in the County of Cumberland,

GREETING :

In the name of the State of Maine, you are required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of North Yarmouth, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town on Monday, the seventeenth day of March, A. D. 1890, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit :

ART. 1st. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2d. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3d. To hear the report of the Town Treasurer and act on the same.

ART. 4th. To hear the report of the Selectmen and act on the same.

ART. 5th. To hear the report of the Overseers of the Poor and act on the same.

ART. 6th. To hear the report of Supervisor of schools and act on the same.

ART. 7th. To hear the report of the Trustees of the school fund and vote how the money shall be expended.

ART. 8th. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March, annually.

ART. 9th. To raise money for the support of schools.

ART. 10th. To raise money for the support of poor.

ART. 11th. To raise money for the repair of bridges.

ART. 12th. To see if the town will erect at all crossings of highways, and where one public highway enters another substantial guide post and raise money for the same.

ART. 13th. To see how much money the town will raise for repairs of roads, and vote how it shall be expended, and fix the price of men, oxen and horses per day.

ART. 14th. To raise money for the payment of town officers.

ART. 15th. To see if the town will vote to have the reports of its officers for the ensuing year printed, and raise money for the same.

ART. 16th. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.

ART. 17th. To raise money for the contingent fund.

ART. 18th. To see if town will vote to accept such persons for bondsmen, as the Collector and Treasurer for the ensuing year may present.

ART. 19th. To see what action the town will take in regard to repairing the washout near I. E. Hayes' Mill, and raise money for the same.

ART. 20th. To see what action the town will take in regard to money due the town on the different Collector's books.

ART. 21st. To see what action the town will take in regard to furnishing text books, as required by act of Legislature, and raise money for the same.

ART. 22d. To see if the town will authorize its S. S. Committee or Supervisor of Schools to contract with, and pay the trustees or directors of any academy or high school in adjoining towns, for the tuition of scholars resident within this town, who may after a suitable examination be adjudged qualified to enter such schools, and raise money for the purpose of defraying the expense of said tuition. Any applicant not adjudged qualified, not to receive any aid in payment of his tuition.

ART. 23d. By request of B. F. Hamilton and eight others, to see if the town will vote to build a receiving tomb at Walnut Hill Cemetery, and raise money for the same.

ART. 24th. By request of Charles Milliken. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Assessors to apportion the money raised for the repair of highways to the several districts in the town, in proportion to the number of miles in each district, with some consideration to the cost of repairing and present condition of the roads in the several districts.

ART. 25th. By request of Charles Milliken. To see if the town will vote to instruct or advise the road commissioner to work in conjunction with the surveyors of the several districts, in repairing their roads.

ART. 26th. By request of Charles Milliken. To see if the town will instruct the Assessors to place a certain part of the money raised for the repair of the highways at the disposal of the several surveyors, to be expended by them to the best advantage, for the repair of their roads.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the town house at eight o'clock in the forenoon, on the day of said meeting.
