# REPORT OF SUPERVISOR OF SCHOOLS.

#### To the citizens of North Yarmouth:

The Supervisor of schools respectfully submits the following report :

#### SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 1.

The Summer, Fall and Winter terms were taught by Miss Carrie T. Whitney, who was in charge last year.

At each visit the school was in a flourishing condition. The recitations were prompt, accurate and intelligent, the school making advancement from term to term.

In the course of the Winter term Miss Whitney was obliged, on account of measles, to close her school for a short time. It is now in session again.

#### SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 2.

Miss Mabel Winn taught the Summer term. Miss Winn, though inexperienced, did her work in a creditable manner. The examination at the close of the term showed clearly that the instruction had been kind, judicious and efficient.

Fall and Winter terms in this district were taught by Miss Abbie S. Hall, who had charge of the school last year. Miss Hall possesses qualifications which render her labors in the schoolroom easy and with good success. The school made good advancement under her discipline.

#### SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 3.

There were but two terms in this district throughout the year. The Fall and Winter terms were taught by Miss Luna Dolloff. The progress made was good. Miss Dolloff displays an earnestness for her work which promises success.

#### SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 4.

Summer and Fall terms were taught by the same teacher, Miss Addie Hodsdon. This was Miss Hodsdon's first attempt at teaching, and had the school been larger more work might have been done. The teacher worked for the good of her pupils, and those who attended school learned well.

#### SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 5.

Summer and Winter terms taught by Miss Minnie Morse. Although a teacher of little experience, Miss Morse manifests an interest in school work, and makes every effort for the advancement of her pupils. The terms gave general satisfaction.

#### SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 6.

Summer term taught by Miss Margaret L. Drinkwater. In this respect the agent has undoubtedly carried out the practically unanimous wishes of the citizens of this dis-Miss Drinkwater did faithful and efficient work. trict. She has merited and has received the hearty commendation of parents and supervisor. Fall term taught by Miss Josephine Hodsdon. This was Miss Hodsdon's Her methods of teaching are good, and the first term. school did well under her care. Her kind attention endeared herself to all her scholars. Miss Hodsdon will make one of our best teachers. The Winter term in this district has been in charge of the same teacher as last winter, Mr. Conrad S. Snow. Mr. Snow is a teacher of superior excellence. The intelligent interest in the different exercises indicate that the minds of the scholars are thoroughly awake, and are in process of development in the right way.

#### SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 9.

The Summer term was taught by Miss Inez Rowe, who soon gained the good will of her scholars, and by her untiring effort made them very proficient in their studies. Winter term taught by Miss May C. Morrill. Miss Morrill's qualification and experience as a teacher well fit her to take charge in the schoolroom. When the term was within two weeks of finishing, Miss Morrill was obliged to leave for a a short time at least on account of diphtheria, Miss Edith Rowe taking her place during her absence.

The past year of instruction has witnessed on the whole most gratifying results. The schools have been very good. There have been exceptions, but for the most part teachers and scholars have worked together with a commendable degree of enthusiasm, to the attainment of the best results. The zeal and interest manifested have been most praiseworthy.

Prompt and regular attendance has been aimed at. Regular attendance, it need hardly be said, is indispensable if the best work is to be done, by both teacher and scholar. Of course the teacher will always be there, but too little consideration is given in most cases to the fact of how little the best of teachers can do for a scholar whose work is continually being interrupted by tardiness or absence. And, though there is still room for improvement here, it is reason for congratulation that so large a proportion of the parents have recognized this, and laid their plans to co-operate with the teachers in securing a uniform attendance.

### WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING.

To Henry E. Skillin, Constable of North Yarmouth, Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of North Yarmouth, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House, in said town, on Monday the the twenty-third day of March, A. D. 1891, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following, to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To hear the report of the town Treasurer and act on the same.

Art. 4. To hear the report of the Selectmen and act on the same.

Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Overseers of the Poor.

Art. 6. To hear and act on the report of the Supervisor of Schools.

Art. 7. To hear the report of the Trustees of the School fund, and vote how the money shall be expended.

Art. 8. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.

Art. 9. To raise money for support of schools.

Art. 10. To raise money for support of poor.

Art. 11. To raise money for the repair of bridges.

Art. 12. To raise money for the repair of roads, and vote how the money shall be expended, and fix the price of men, oxen and horses per day.

Art. 13. To raise money for the payment of town officers.

Art. 14 To see if the town will vote to have the reports of its officers for the ensuing year printed.

Art. 15. To receive accounts against the town, and raise money for such as may be allowed.

Art. 16. To raise money for the Contingent Fund.

Art. 17. To hear and aet on the report of the selectmen, town elerk and town treasurer on revising the jury box.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to accept such persons for bondsmen as the treasurer and collector for the ensuing year may present.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise money to defray the expenses of tuition of such pupils of their town who may wish to avail themselves of the high school privileges of Yarmouth, Gray and Cumberland; the conditions of attendance the same as prescribed by law.

Art. 20. To raise money to purchase text books.

Art. 21. To see what action the town will take in regard to money due the town on the several collectors' books.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to establish a free high school, locate and raise money for the same.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote for the collector for the ensuing year to receive and settle for all properly avouched highway and snow bills.

The selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the town house at eight o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
