September 28, 1891 we received notice from Judith B. Titcomb that Mary Wells was at her house and in need of immediate assistance. We investigated the case and found that her settlement was in New Gloucester. immediately notified the overseers of the poor of that town, and they claimed her settlement. We have notified them according to law since that time, the last notice being sent February 29, 1892. Mr. Hatch, one of the overseers of New Gloucester came to North Yarmouth in February, 1892, and said they would look up the case and take counsel, and he would guarantee that New Gloucester would pay all bills that they were legally obliged to pay. We have taken counsel with J. W. Symonds, Esq., and his opinion is that her settlement is in New Gloucester without any doubt. We agreed with Mrs. Titcomb for her board at \$2.50 per week.

#### DISTRICT No. 1.

This school was under the instruction of Miss Jessie E. Andrews for the entire year. At each visit during the spring and fall terms the school appeared orderly, and Miss Andrews seemed to be very much interested in her school. Good improvement was made especially by some of the younger ones.

The winter school, although the order was not what it

should have been, has not been a total failure by any means. Wages of teacher, \$5.00, board summer \$2.50, fall and winter \$3.00.

### DISTRICT No. 2.

Spring, fall and winter terms thirty weeks in all, Miss Carrie T. Whitney, teacher. I visited the school twice each term and always found the order first-class. The recitations prompt and correct, and for all I know the school gave general satisfaction. Wages \$5.00, board \$2.25

### DISTRICT No. 3.

Miss Della S. Hayes, taught two terms in this district, twenty-three weeks in all. The order was good which is always the first requisite. There was manifest among the scholars, a fair degree of interest, and was pleased to notice improvement especially in writing. Wages in fall, \$4.00, in winter \$5.00, board \$2.00.

#### DISTRICT No. 4.

Miss Addie M. Libby, taught the school for the entire year. This is the smallest district in town, consequently it is difficult to awaken that degree of interest among the scholars that we find in some of our larger districts. At each visit the teacher and scholars seemed interested in their work. I think that Miss Libby is rather mild in the treatment of her pupils. Wages of teacher spring \$3.00, fall \$3.50, winter \$4.00, price of board \$2.00.

### DISTRICT No. 5.

Spring term eight weeks. Winter term twelve weeks Miss Viola V. Burnham, teacher. This school was orderly, and I think the time was profitably spent. Wages of teacher, spring \$3.25, winter \$4.00, board \$1.75.

### DISTRICT No. 6.

Spring term, Miss Della S. Hayes, teacher. When the school was visited the scholars were orderly and attentive to their studies, and the teacher seemed to be doing all in her power to promote the best interests of her pupils. Wages \$4.00, board \$2.00.

Miss Grace Blake taught the fall term. Miss Blake worked hard to have a good school, and as far as I know gave good satisfaction. Wages \$3.50, board \$2.00.

Winter term was under the instruction of Miss Mary A. Lawrence. Miss Lawrence is one of our oldest teachers, and her experience gives her decided advantage in organizing and conducting her school. The order was good and the appearance of the school, although somewhat broken up by sickness, was very gratifying. The scholars of this district are deserving of one of our best teachers, and such they have surely had. Wages of teachers including board, \$8 00.

#### DISTRICT No. 7.

Is under the supervision of Pownal.

#### DISTRICT No. 8.

Is under the supervision of Yarmouth.

#### DISTRICT No. 9.

Miss Abbie S. Loring, taught the spring term of eight weeks. This was Miss Loring's first school. At each visit the order was excellent, and I was pleased to find at the close of the term, a noticeable improvement. Wages \$3 00, board \$2 00.

Winter term, Miss Florence Loring teacher. Although the school was badly broken up by sickness, I think a fair degree of progress was made. Wages of teachers, \$4 00, board \$2 00. Many schools in the past year have been very successful, while other were only partially so.

I do not wish you to understand that in our best schools every-scholar makes good progress.

Some are absent from school a large part of the time, and their parents manifest little or no interest in their welfare as scholars. School after school passes in some districts without receiving a single visit from parents in the district. It is indispensable to the success of any school that the teacher have the cordial coöperation of the parents, and when reports unfavorable to the teacher reach the ears of parents, they should not be too hasty in expressing their opinion. They should visit the school and see for themselves. If this were done we should hear less complaining, and our schools would be much more profitable.

### WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING.

To Edward G. Hayes, Constable of North Yarmouth.

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of North Yarmouth, qualified by law, to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House, in said town, on Monday the twenty-first day of March, A. D. 1892, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit.

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator, to preside at said meeting.
  - ART. 2. To choose a Clerk, for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To hear the report of the Town Treasurer, and act on the same.
- ART. 4. To hear the report of the Selectmen, and act on the same.
- ART. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Overseers of the Poor.
- ART. 6. To hear and act on the report of the Supervisor of Schools.
- ART. 7. To hear the report of the Trustees of the School Fund and vote how the money shall be expended.
- ART. 8. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.
  - ART. 9. To raise money for the support of Schools.
  - ART. 10. To raise money for the support of the Poor.
  - ART. 11. To raise money for the repair of Bridges.
- ART. 12. To raise money for the repair of Roads, and vote how the money shall be expended, and fix the price of men, oxen, and horses per day.

- ART. 13. To raise money for the payment of town officers.
- ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to have the reports of its offices for the ensuing year printed.
- ART. 15. To receive accounts against the town, and raise money for such as may be allowed.
  - ART. 16. To raise money for the Contingent Fund.
- ART. 17. To see if the town will vote to accept such persons for bondsmen as the treasurer and collector for the ensuing year may present.
- ART. 18. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen on laying out private way as petitioned by Fred Hamilton and thirteen others.
- ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to pay the land damages as assessed by the Selectmen on private way and raise money for the same.
- ART. 20. To see if the town will vote for the Collector for the ensuing year, to receive and settle for all properly avouched highway and snow bills.
- ART. 21. By request of Samuel H. Sweetser and ten others. To see if the town will vote to raise money to defray the expenses of tuition of such pupils of this town who may wish to avail themselves of the high school privileges of Yarmouth, Gray and Cumberland, conditions of attendance the same as prescribed by law.
- ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to buy a new road machine and raise money for the same.
- ART. 23. To see if the town will vote to have the old plan of the town copied and raise money for the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the town house at eight o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not and make due return of this warrant and your doings thereon to one of us, on or before the day of said meeting.
