In August we received notice from Elizabeth O. Johnson that Joseph Johnson was at her home and in need of immediate assistance. We looked up the case and found Mr. Johnson's legal settlement was in Gorham. We notified the Overseers of the Poor of Gorham and they immediately removed Mr. Johnson and settled his bill with Miss Johnson. December 2d Mr. Joseph Hamilton notified us that Andrew M. Smith was at his home sick and in need of immediate assistance. We immediately provided for Mr. Smith and investigated the case and found his legal settlement was in the city of Bangor. We notified the Overseers of the Poor of that city and they denied his settlement but on further evidence furnished by us they acknowledge his settlement and requested us to send Mr. Smith to Bangor if he was able to travel alone. We did not consider Mr. Smith able at that time to travel so far alone and notified the overseers of Bangor to that effect and asked for further instructions from them. Before we heard from them again Mr. Smith received notice from the officers of the National Home at Togus that there was room for him at that institution, and as soon as the necessary papers could be forwarded to the Home they would be ready to admit him. The papers were at once sent and Feb. 7, we saw him safely there, where we think he has a good and permanent home.

REPORT OF WILLIAM OSGOOD, TREASURER

On account of so many different teachers during the year, and with such varied results, I have concluded to divert somewhat from the regular custom; and instead of giving each teacher an individual record, a general summary of the condition of the schools during the year.

It is very ungratifying for a Supervisor to make suggestions from year to year for the prosperity of our schools, and have them wholly unheeded by the several districts.

The consequence of this remissness of duty is, that our schools fall from that state of efficiency to which they should be brought.

This is one of the many faults of the district system. Under this system the agent is authorized to engage the teachers, and on their selection practically depends the success or failure of the schools.

This town has been for too long a time the training schools for inexperienced teachers. Our failures during the past year have been due chiefly to this condition.

No task can be more responsible, or require the exercise of greater care, than that which has for its object the proper education of the young, and to realize this responsibility trained and experienced teachers ought to be engaged. When teachers conceive that the sole end of their efforts is to enable pupils to recite verbatim the contents of a particular text book, or to repeat with verbal accuracy rules, definitions, formulæ, or solving abstruse arithmetical puzzles, whether their true meaning is grasped or not, such persons are profoundly ignorant of the science of teaching.

In teaching, imitation is dominant. No teacher can be eminently successful by adopting the methods of another. They should not put off their own individuality. "David could not fight in Saul's armor for very cogent reasons."

I would not say that all untrained, inexperienced teachers fail in their efforts, for some endowed with a natural ability have in three months' practice had a larger experience with the characteristics of pupils, their needs, and all that pertains to them as pupils, than others who have occupied a teacher's chair for a quarter of a century.

"Education is divided into three periods: Objective, Transition and Subjective." In our common, ungraded schools, the objective period should be chiefly cultivated. Children's first lessons are taken from their surroundings, and their opportunities for observation should not be circumscribed.

This pictorial or objective period every child experiences, and as development is more easily made through this period, than any other, every means should be offered for its advancement.

Prof. Corthell says: "I can teach a child the word wheelbarrow, if he knows a wheelbarrow when he sees one, quicker than I can teach him the word "at."

To assist in a limited degree this objective work in our schools I introduced Shepp's Photograph Series, embracing nature, engineering, architecture, panorama, art, race types and antiquities.

"Pictures are keys which unlock for us many libraries."

I also introduced during the the year an English classic series, to be used as supplementary reading. This course is indorsed by all eminent literary authorities.

Very few pupils extend their education beyond the district school, and how important it is during their school days and while habits of expression are forming that they acquire a taste for good reading. Some would displace the fictitious grammar for this cause, and this is a very plausible theory when we consider that the earlier writers of Greek, Roman and English literature attained their excellence of style by the study of the best models of writing.

Some of the schools have been closed several times on account of infectious diseases; this of course has interrupted the work. Many cases of sickness no doubt have been due to the unsanitary condition of the schoolhouses.

Each school has been visited twice every term, although in Districts Nos. 1, 2, 3, 5 and 6, they are still in session.

By the abolishment of the district system our schools will enter upon an era of renewed prosperity. We shall have better modeled and equipped schoolhouses, better supervision and experienced teachers, small and weak schools will be consolidated, and the general condition will be improved.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING.

To Henry E. Skillin, Constable of North Yarmouth,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of North Yarmouth, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House, in said town, on Monday the nineteenth day of March, A. ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ART. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

ART. 3. To hear the report of the Town Treasurer, and act on the same.

ART. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Overseers of the Poor.

ART. 6. To hear and act on the report of the Supervisor of Schools.

ART. 7. To hear the report of the Trustees of the School Fund, and vote how the money shall be expended.

ART. 8. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.

ART. 9. To raise money for support of schools.

ART. 10. To raise money for support of poor.

ART. 11. To raise money for the repair of bridges.

ART. 12. To raise money for the repair of roads, and vote how the money shall be expended, and fix the price of men, oxen and horses per day.

ART. 13. To raise money for the payment of town officers.

ART. 14. To see if the town will vote to have the reports of its officers for the ensuing year printed.

ART. 15. To receive accounts against the town, and raise money for such as may be allowed.

ART. 16. To raise money for the Contingent Fund.

ART. 17. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer and Town Clerk on revising the Jury Box.

ART. 18. By request of William Osgood to see if the town will vote to abate the tax assessed on the Walnut Hill Creamery Co. for the year 1893.

ART. 19. To see if the town will vote to have the Assessors go over town in the month of April, and take the valuation.

ART. 20. To see what action the town will take in regard to repairing the fence around Walnut Hill Cemetery, and raise money for the same.

ART. 21. To see what action the town will take in regard to disposing of the old Road Machine.

ART. 22. To see what action the town will take in regard to building or repairing Schoolhouses in town, and raise money for the same.

ART. 23. To see if the town will vote for the Collector for the ensuing year to receive and settle for all properly avouched highway and snow bills.

The Selectmen give notice that they shall be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House at eight o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
