- No. 1. The spring term was taught by Miss Charlotte M. Parsons, who was so successful in this school during previous years. The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Rita N. Wilson. Miss Wilson was a teacher of considerable experience and this, combined with her ready tact in imparting her knowledge to others, made her work in this school very satisfactory. Miss Wilson's illness during the winter term made it necessary to engage Miss Elsie M. Dolloff to finish the term. Miss Dolloff's former success in this town is well known, and we were very fortunate in securing her services.
- No. 2. Miss Ethel F. Kimball taught the spring term in this district, and her former success was repeated during this term. The fall and winter terms were taught by Miss Susie B. Kimball. The order and discipline in this school were exceptionally good and the pupils made excellent progress under Miss Kimball's instructions.
- No. 4. The spring and fall terms were taught by Miss Idolyn Atherton. Miss Atherton was one of our best teachers, and it is to be regretted that the town was unable to retain her services in some of its schools. The winter term was taught by Miss Vinnie Lawrence. Miss Lawrence is undoubtedly capable of becoming one of our best teachers, and, considering the disadvantages under which she labored, her work was remarkably good.
- No. 6. Miss Elizabeth B. Mountfort taught this school the entire year. Miss Mountfort is a capable teacher, and worked hard for the advancement of her pupils. The closing visit of each term showed that good work had been done.
- No. 9. Miss Florence G. Hilton taught this school the entire year. The progress of the pupils in this school proves her to be a very efficient and progressive teacher.

REMARKS.

Although the progress of the schools in town would undoubtedly have been more rapid had there been fewer changes

both in teachers and superintendents, the school year has not been wholly unsuccessful. The advantage gained by retaining the same teachers through the entire school year are very apparent in Districts No. 6 and 9. The pupils advance much more rapidly and the teacher has a much better chance to carry out her plans without interruption, and thereby obtain the best results from her work.

It should be gratifying to us all to see evidence of interest in the improvement of our schools. In several districts during the past year the teachers and pupils have worked hard for the purpose of decorating their school rooms, and in District No. 2 the teacher and pupils have formed a school improvement league. Any and all of the movements are worthy of the support and encouragement of every citizen in town.

There is one evil which is threatening the advancement of our schools, and that is the opposition of parents towards the teachers. The undisguised support which a child receives at home not only hinders its own advancement and that of others, but causes the teacher much unnecessary trouble and worry. It would be a step in the right direction if parents would thoroughly investigate their children's complaints before withdrawing their support from the teacher.

During the past year the repairs have been mostly on the schoolhouse at District No. 1, and next year it will be necessary to repair the foundation of the school building in District No. 6.

The most of the books are in very good condition, but it will be necessary to replenish the supply of arithmetics and geographies.

In closing I sincerely thank all those who have so kindly assisted me in my endeavors to improve the condition of our schools.
