### Warrant for Annual Town Meeting.

To E. W. Ross, Constable of the Town of North Yarmouth, in the County of Cumberland. Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby requested to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town on Monday, the fourteenth day of March, A. D. 1904, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- ART. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
  - ART. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To hear the report of the Town Treasurer and act on the same.
- ART. 4. To hear the report of the Selectmen and act on the same.
- ART. 4. To hear the report of the Overseers of the Poor and act on the same.
- ART. 6. To hear the report of the Superintendent of Schools and act on the same.
- ART. 7. To hear the report of the Trustees of School Fund and vote how the money shall be expended.
- ART. 8. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.
  - ART. 9. To raise money for the support of schools.
  - ART. 10. To raise money for the support of poor.
  - ART. 11. To raise money for the repair of bridges.

- ART. 12. To raise money for the repair of roads, and vote how the money shall be expended, and fix the price of men, oxen and horses per day.
- ART. 13. To raise money for the payment of town officers.
  - ART. 14. To raise money for text-books.
  - ART. 15. To raise money for the contingent fund.
  - ART. 16. To raise money for the repair of schoolhouses.
  - ART. 17. To raise money for the care of cemeteries.
  - ART. 18. To raise money for interest.
- ART. 19. To raise money for payment of high school tuition.
- ART. 20. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- ART. 21. To see if the town will vote to have the reports of the officers for the ensuing year printed.
- ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to accept such persons as bondsmen as the Treasurer and Collector for the ensuing year may present.
- ART. 23. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer and Town Clerk on revising the jury box.
- ART. 24. To see what sum of money the town will raise for insurance, apparatus, appliances, and other school supplies.
- ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to make a discount on such taxes as are paid before a certain date, and charge interest on all after same date.
- ART. 26. To see if the town will vote to repair the Town House and raise money for the same.
- ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to tax hens in excess of a certain number.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting. Hereof fail not, and make due return of this warrant and your doings thereon to one of us, on or before the day of said meeting.

#### REMARKS.

In reviewing the work of the past year it is evident that much good has been accomplished, although there is still a good chance for improvement in many ways.

We were fortunate enough to be able to keep several of our teachers in the same schools, although the resignation of Miss Wilton at the close of the fall term made one change inevitable.

The school committee found it necessary to make some repairs in the schoolhouses, particularly in District No. 6. All of the buildings are in fairly good condition now, and a small appropriation will be all that is necessary for the coming year.

The school in District No. 9 was discontinued, and the pupils conveyed to No. 2. Although this plan was objectionable to some of the parents, it has not only saved the town quite a large sum of money but has been beneficial to the pupils as well.

Special mention should be made of the progress made by the Lincoln League in District No. 2. This society has earned enough money for a weekly music lesson during the fall and winter terms. It is to be regretted that many of our teachers do not teach music, but this school has solved the difficulty in a very creditable manner.

As stated in last year's report, the geographies were in a very dilapidated condition, and it was decided to make a change. The Roddy Geography was substituted and is giving general satisfaction.

This year it will be necessary to make quite a large appropriation for text-books, as some of the arithmetics, readers and histories will have to be replaced.

The following appropriations will be needed for the ensuing year: \$1000 for schools; \$400 for tuition; \$200 for text-books; \$50 for repairs.

In closing we wish to thank all those who have aided us in the performance of our duties, particularly the parents who have shown unusual interest and have given us their hearty coöperation.
