REMARKS.

I desire to preface my statements regarding the work of your schools during the past year by some brief remarks in commendation of the present arrangement and condition of your school system as a whole.

Before my official connection with the schools of this town, my relations as teacher with a number of pupils who came from them led me to believe that they possessed many points of excellence; for the attainments of these pupils have in general compared very favorably with those coming to me from any of the neighboring towns. This view has been amply verified during my six months of service as your superintendent.

The judicious combination of the old-time districts into four schools; the comfort and convenience of most of your school houses; the liberal supply of suitable text books and other working material; the well arranged course of study; the experience and ability of the teachers employed,—all show that a wise and liberal policy has been pursued by the Town and its School Officers in matters relating to education.

SCHOOL BUILDINGS.

In no other town of the district are the schools better supplied with books or with school room accommodations.

With one exception your school houses are excellently adapted to the comfort of the pupils and the work done in them, while two of them are well nigh models of their kind, a condition very seldom encountered in rural communities.

The school house at No. 1 however, where at present the largest number of pupils attend, will need either extensive repairs or renewal, at an early date. With this building in good condition and a few minor repairs on one or two of the others, the needs of the town in this direction will be met for several years.

Of the work of the first term of the past year I can say little except that from the records left by my predecessor its character must have been very similar to that of the two terms which have been under my supervision. During these terms the attendance while not so large as might have been expected, has been fairly uniform and regular. In only one instance has contagious disease interrupted the work of any school, and in this case it was confined to one family, though the fear of its spreading kept others from attending school for a time.

In all the schools your teachers have worked faithfully and effectively, and their pupils have, on the whole, been obedient and receptive, and I believe good progress has resulted. The work which I have observed has shown care and skill on the part of teachers, and preparation and interest on the part of pupils.

The course of study has been followed closely except in one or two cases where the conditions seemed to require slight deviations from it; and these have been made only through the direction or suggestion of the Superintendent.

TEACHERS.

As has already been stated, the skill and experience of your teachers has evinced wisdom on the part of those who employed them.

The teacher is the most important factor in a school of any description; but in a mixed school where such a variety of subjects have to be taught to pupils of so many grades and degrees of attainment, the importance of the teacher's work is increased many fold.

It has been a common error among those who employ teachers in rural schools, to think that young and inexperienced teachers are often capable of attaining as satisfactory results as those whose ability has been attested to by years of successful work; but it is now generally acknowledged by Educators that inexperienced and poorly equipped teachers

are far more likely to make failures in smaller schools of many grades than in much larger ones where only a limited number of subjects are to be taught to pupils of only one or two grades.

The policy of employing only well equipped and experienced teachers has been followed in your schools, and I believe the results have fully justified that course. But a single change has been made during the present year and that by the advice of the former Superintendent.

Your present corps of teachers will compare favorably with that of any neighboring town, and their continuance throughout the school year is recommended.

TEXT BOOKS.

I found the text books of your schools in excellent condition and, in the main, well adapted to the needs of the schools. In the case of Readers only has a change been made. This was done, not because of the lack of books on this subject, but to provide a set of graded readers as a basic series which the others might supplement.

In several of the towns of this Superintendency I found that supplementary reading matter had largely supplanted the regular text book on this subject. As a result the drill work so necessary to produce good readers, was not being done in all of the schools, and pupils of the same grade were reading matter of a widely different character. My object has been to produce more uniformity in this direction, by having each grade complete the regular readers before passing to supplementary work, and then using only as much additional matter as the progress of each class may require.

A large amount of excellent supplementary reading matter is on hand and will be used to supplement, but not to supplant, the regular reader.

The only other text books which seem to me to need

attention are the Arithmetics. With the present text book on this subject I have no fault to find, except that the later methods of dealing with this subject differ somewhat from those in use when the books were published, and a revised edition arranged for work along these lines has been prepared by the author, a few copies of which are already in use in one of the schools. It may prove expedient to change to this later edition in the near future.

INSTRUCTION.

The conditions surrounding the different schools of the town do not vary enough to necessitate any especial modification in the character of the instruction in each school, and it would seem that the rate of progress should be quite uniform; but as was stated in the last school report, there exists quite a diversity in the attainments of the same grades in the different schools. In general the schools which have changed teachers least often are at the highest standard. This perhaps is what might be expected, although, of course, the continuance of a poor teacher in a school will not produce the best results.

It has been my purpose to make the instruction in all the schools as nearly uniform as possible by directing the energies of the teachers along the same lines, and endeavoring to make clear the desired results.

In this work, on the whole, I have received the hearty co-operation of the teachers and some progress has been made. If the schools were situated so that frequent teachers' meetings might be held this end would be much more easily attained. But all of the teachers of the town are endeavoring to instruct their pupils along lines that will lead them to a thorough and practical knowledge of the subjects taken, so far as their work extends.

MUSIC.

In two of the schools Music has been taught throughout the year. The books required for this purpose have been supplied by the town, but the rest of the expense incurred has been met by the teachers and pupils of these schools with the proceeds of entertainments given for this purpose. But this expedient makes too great a demand upon both the resources and time of teachers and pupils and provision should be made to prevent its continuance.

It is earnestly recommended that instruction in music be extended to all the schools and that the sum named by your Committee be raised to meet the expenses thereof.

IN GENERAL.

While as I have said there is much to be commended in connection with the schools of the town, there is also much to be done to bring their efficiency to the high standard required for the work they are expected to do.

The price of good schools, like that of liberty, is eternal vigilance, not only on the part of school officers and teachers but also on the part of parents and everyone interested in progress and good citizenship. There is at present a forward movement all along the line in educational matters, and those who do not wish to be left behind must make a strong and determined effort to get and keep the best that their circumstances will permit. This town has not been behind in the past and your superintendent expects, with your assistance, to keep it with the van in the future.

Warrant for Town Meeting.

*To George W. Smith, Constable of the Town of North Yarmouth
in the County of Cumberland.*

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town on Monday the ninth day of March A. D. 1908, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art 3. To hear and act on the reports of the Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art 4. To hear the report of the Trustees of the School Fund and vote how the money shall be expended.
- Art 5. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.

- Art 6. To see if the town will vote to elect a Road Commissioner for a term of one, or of three years.
- Art 7. To raise money for the support of Schools and of the Poor, for the repair of Roads, Bridges and School-houses, for the care of Cemeteries, for the payment of Town Officers, for Text Books, High School Tuition, extermination of Browntail moths and Contingencies.
- Art 8. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art 9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for insurance, apparatus, appliances and other school supplies.
- Art 10 To see if the town will vote 'yes' or 'no' upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1908.
- Art 11. To see if the town will raise, appropriate and set apart, for the permanent improvement of the main highways within the town, such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by Section 5 of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, being the sum of \$54 50.

Art 12. To see if the town will vote to co-operate with the town of Yarmouth in accepting a law passed for the better protection of shell fish in said Yarmouth, and to arrange for any details to carry out the purpose of the same.

Art 13. To see if the town will vote to accept such persons as bondsmen as the Treasurer and Collector may present.

Art 14. To see if the town will vote to build a new school-house in District No. 1, so called, and raise money for the same.

Art 15. To see if the town will vote to fix the salaries of the Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor.

Art 16. To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay in part for the printing of the old No. Yarmouth records.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
