TEACHERS

As was stated last year, the teacher is the most important factor in the making of a good school, other conditions if favorable will assist in the attainment of this result; but unless the teacher is capable of taking a dvantage of them, the most favorable conditions will prove of but little value in this direction. wide-awake, enthusiastic teacher, who is willing to work as long as there is any work to be done to improve her school, will accomplish more under very unfavorable conditions than her inefficient ease-loving sister will accomplish when surrounded with all the advantages that modern ideas can supply. and comfortable school rooms, abundant supplies of text books and appliances, careful supervision, and good pupils are of secondary importance, when compared with the work of the teacher. Indeed I doubt whether the success of any other institution of equal importance is so dependent upon the skill and efficiency of one person as the school which is placed in charge of a single teacher. In larger schools the efficiency of the assistants may in a measure, atone for the lack of it in the principals, but the success or failure of the small school lies with its teacher.

It is of the utmost importance then, that the best material possible be obtained for such schools; but under present conditions, it is becoming more and more difficult to procure the grade of teachers which such schools require; for with our modern facilities for communication and travel, the market for teachers of experience and ability has become much broader, and opportunities of procuring and retaining efficient teachers at small salaries have grown correspondingly fewer.

I believe that North Yarmouth has been fortunate in this respect and in some cases the town has been able to retain the sevices of teachers, which were worth much more than was being paid for them.

The wages paid to the teachers of this town, however, compare favorably with those paid in the neighboring towns and I am confident that the work done by them in many respects will bear the same relation to the work of the teachers of these towns.

MUSIC.

The committee decided at the opening of the fall term to have music taught in all of the schools in town, and Mrs. John M. Hamilton who had for some time carried on this work at the Buxton and Walnut Hill schools, was hired to direct the work in the other schools also. During the fall and winter terms she has visited the schools weekly and I think the result of her work has fully justified the action of the committee both in the introduction of music and the choice of the teacher.

Instruction in the rudiments of music is fast becoming general in public schools of all kinds and I believe the town will make no mistake in providing for its continuance in the schools for an indefinite period. Of course in rural schools where the element of time is

such an important factor, the greatest care should be exercised to prevent this subject from encroaching upon the time that should be devoted to others; for while the advantages of this instruction is now generally recognized, its importance must not be overestimated in comparison with the studies that form the essentials and foundation of a public school education.

TEXT BOOKS.

The text books in your schools are in an excellent condition and well adapted to the needs of the pupils.

The only change of the year was made in the arithmetics. The Hamilton series have supplanted the Milne. The new books were purchased from the same company that supplied the old ones and as exchange rates were allowed, the change was made with no greater expense to the town than would have been incurred in procuring enough of the old books to replace those which were badly worn. The new book is giving excellent satisfaction to both teachers and pupils and I believe it is most excellently adapted to the conditions of the schools. These books are now being used in all the towns of the Union with the same satisfactory results.

The appropriation under this head shows a good balance in favor of the town and the committee has recommended that only half as much be raised for this purpose for the ensuing year.

SUPPLIES.

At your last annual meeting it was voted to pay for the supplies used in the schools from the contingent fund. As there was a balance in favor of this account from last year this was done by drawing only \$8 49 from that fund.

During the coming year, however, there will be need of several maps and charts under this head and with this in viewthe school committee has recommended that a small special appropriation be made for this purpse.

SCHOOL HOUSES AND REPAIRS.

Somewhat extensive repairs were made by the committee on the building at East North Yarmouth during the summer vacation.

The ceiling and walls were covered with steel plates and the whole interior was painted. This work though somewhat expensive, has given the school-room a most attractive appearance and of course is of a very permanent nature. It was intended, also, to repair the foundations of the building but on examination it was found that their condition was such that the appropriation under this head would not admit of undertaking the work, so it was left for future provision and a recommendation was made for the purpose during the ensuing year.

No repairs of consequence were made at No. 1; for while this building is the only one now in use that is not in good repair and well adapted to the use which

it subserves, it was thought inexpedient to undertake extensive repairs then, as the need of a new building in the immediate future seemed so manifest. But unless the town decides to erect a new building here at once the out-houses should either be entirely renewed or, at least, placed in a condition more in keeping with those at the other school-houses.

IN GENERAL.

While there are some things in connection with the year's work that might have been more satisfactory, yet on the whole good progress has been made not only along the lines of study but also in the direction of general improvement in the school system.

The teachers of the several schools have been directed along the same general lines of work and a definite policy has been persued. Where it has appeared that one subject was receiving attention at the expense of others the matter has been called to the teachers notice and changes have been made with a view of correcting the fault.

While the necessity of fitting pupils for secondary, or High School work has been duly recognized, this purpose has not been made the chief end of the instruction of the schools; for while it is to be expected and hoped that a large percentage of the pupils who attend the town schools, will take more extended courses of study, it is quite probable that, for some time, at least, many of them will not do so. For such as will not or cannot carry their studies beyond the common

schools, opportunity should be offorded for acquiring a thorough mastery of the essentials of the subjects, which will best enable them to perform intelligently the functions of good citizenship and lay the foundation of useful and honorable lives. Unless the common schools do this, they are failing to accomplish the great object of free education.

I hope the schools of North Yarmouth are not failing in this direction.

Warrant for Town Meeting.

To E. G. Hayes, Constable of the Town of North Ynrmouth in the County of Cumberland.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town on Monday the eighth day of March A. D. 1909, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the reports of the Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 4. To hear the report of the Trustees of the School Fund and vote how the money shall be expended.
- Art. 5. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.

- Art. 6. To raise money for the support of Schools and of the Poor, for the repair of Roads, Bridges and School-houses, for the care of Cemeteries, for the payment of town Officers, for Text Books. High School Tuition, extermination of Brown tail Moths and Contingencies.
- Art. 7. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will raise for insurance, apparatus, appliances and other school supplies.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote 'yes' or 'no' upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1909.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will raise, appropriate and set apart, for the permanent improvement of the main highways within the town, such sum of money as is contemplated and directed by Section 5 of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, being the sum of \$57 50.

- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to accept such persons as bondsmen as the Treasurer and Collector may present.
- Art. 12. To hear and act on the reports of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer and Town Clerk on revising the jury box.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to build a new school house in District No. 1, so called, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 14. To see what action the town will take in regard to forming a Cemetery Association.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to have the Guide Boards in town repainted, and raise money for the same.
- Art. 16. To see if the town will vote to co-operate with the town of Yarmouth in accepting a law passed for the better protection of shell fish in said Yarmouth, and to arrange for any details to carry out the purpose of the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered

upon said list, at the Town House at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
