

If the preceding statistics are compared with those of last year several changes will be noted, and nearly all of them in the right direction.

The number of persons of school age in town show some increase as does the total and average attendance for the year.

During the winter term as usual the attendance fell off considerably. The number of different teachers employed is somewhat larger than that of the previous year and the average wages per week shows a slight increase.

The former fact is to be regretted but the latter shows a tendency in the right direction.

There are more pupils attending the high schools than ever before and their number seems likely to increase in the future.

TEACHERS.

As has been stated the number of different teachers employed during the year is larger than that of last year. This arose from several causes. In one case illness deprived us of the services of an efficient teacher, in one or two other instances teachers resigned their positions, and in still others teachers who did not seem to meet the requirements of their position were dropped.

If this meant only a change from one good teacher to another, or from an inefficient one to one of efficiency, it would hardly need comment.

But the teacher is such an important factor in a good school, and the question of securing efficient ones at the wages the town is now paying, is such a difficult one to solve that any change in the teaching force of the town is a thing to be avoided unless there are excellent reasons for it.

As your Superintendent of Schools I have endeavored to act in accordance with this theory, and whenever a change in teachers has been recommended to the committee, I have felt that it was for the best interests of the school to have it made.

Whenever I have thought that the wishes of the community coincided with the best interests of the school I have been glad to act in harmony with this sentiment, but where other conditions seemed to exist I have been forced to follow my best judgement in the matter.

In one school the selection of teachers has not been fortunate in all cases, but when the question resolves itself into one of buying the services of a ten or twelve dollar teacher for nine dollars, there is an element of doubt connected with its successful solution, especially in these days of easy communication and soaring values.

The teacher who can go into a school of from twenty-five to thirty pupils and govern and instruct them to the satisfaction of a no more critical class of people than the citizens of the town, can get more than nine dollars a week elsewhere, and such teachers are usually aware of the fact.

But on the whole our teachers have proven to be a very good average, and the only thing to regret is that any school should fail to receive the high class of instruction and faithful and conscientious effort on the part of the teacher, that the majority of the schools of the town have enjoyed throughout the year.

THE CURRICULUM

The curriculum of the different schools has been arranged and carried out in accordance with the course of study outlines of which have been used in town for several years.

By this means the work of all the schools has proceeded along the same lines and tended to a common end, and pupils going from one school to another found no difficulty in properly locating themselves under the new conditions.

The several years or grades have been kept distinct, though pupils of different grades have often recited together where such a course appeared to be expedient.

Where so large numbers of the graduates of the different schools enter high schools and academies it is necessary that the work of the common schools should prepare them to successfully cope with secondary subjects; but considering the number that do not take a more extended course of study it is evident that the advantage of these pupils should not be sacrificed for the sake of properly preparing others for high schools.

Under these circumstances it seems to me that some departure from the outlines mentioned above should be made along the line of commercial and industrial geography and book-keeping.

Of course no extended course in any of these subjects would be advisable, but the introduction of an elementary course of book-keeping including a drill in ordinary business forms might take the place of the last term's work in arithmetic and in a similar manner an elementary commercial geography might be substituted during the last three months of the school course for the book now in use.

On the whole it seems to be time to revise the present course of study with a view of carrying out these suggestions as well as giving more explicit directions to the teacher through the entire course.

Such a course of study is now in preparation and it is hoped that when completed it will be adopted by all of the towns of the district.

TEXT BOOKS.

The only change made under this head during the year, has been the introduction of a set of readers for the lower grades which present a plan for teaching reading that combine the more salient features of the several methods now in general use.

A manual of directions for teachers' use accompany these books, and enables those of limited experience to pursue a definite and systematic course of instruction in this most inportant subject. These books are giving excellent satisfaction, both in this town and others in which they have been placed.

The text-books of the town, both in quality and quanity, are nearly all that can be desired and if the amount of money recommended by the committee is appropriated, these conditions will continue to exist.

SUPPLIES

The schools have been supplied with composition and test paper, pens, ink, crayons, and some drawing material, under this head.

These materials have been placed in charge of the teachers with instructions to use them freely but carefully, and they have been so employed.

The expense of this account is so small when compared with the great advantage to the schools resulting from a plentiful supply of uniform materials for school work that it would seem to be very unwise to return to the old-time custom of having the pupils furnish them in every variety of form and quality.

THE NEW SCHOOL BUILDING.

I take pleasure in calling attention to this subject, for when the present cost of material and labor is taken into consideration I believe it would be a very difficult undertaking to duplicate the structure which your Committee has produced, with the same amount of money as has been expended in the construction of this building.

I have said that with one exception, the town was excellently equipped with school buildings. This exception has ceased to exist, and the Buxton School is now furnished with by far the best building of its kind in the four towns comprising the district.

In fact for a building of one school room, heated by

a stove it is difficult to say where much improvement could be made. In seating, lighting, and arrangement of toilet rooms it fully meets the requirements of modern ideas, while in material and workmanship, it is a structure that does honor to the town.

It would seem that pupils provided with such accommodations for school work, would use the utmost care in its preservation from defacement and injury, but even in the short time it has been in use there have appeared signs of carelessness if not something worse and, while no serious injury has yet occurred, copies of the State laws for the protection of school property have been placed there and further defacement to any part of the building will mean the enforcement of their penalties.

REPAIRS

While no extended repairs have been undertaken during the year, the appropriation for this purpose has been somewhat overdrawn. This may be explained by the fact that after the expense of cleaning the several school houses was taken from the appropriation, there was not enough balance to cover the cost of the few repairs which seemed necessary for preserving the buildings and keeping them in good working condition.

Some painting was done at the Walnut Hill school house and two or three Hyloplate blackboards were put in to replace those too badly worn to be of further use.

As some of the blackboards at the Hicks school will

need renewing at once and foundations of the Dunn building require early attention the Committee have recommended a somewhat larger appropriation for repairs than last year.

IN GENERAL

While the results of the work have not been entirely satisfactory in all cases, yet on the whole the past year has been a successful one for the schools of the town. No epidemic of contagious disease or other forms of illness have interfered with the attendance at the several schools, and where this has been unsatisfactory the condition has arisen from other causes.

Irregularity in attendance is the worst evil with which rural schools have to contend, and until both parents and pupils learn that regular and punctual attendance is necessary for the best results in school work will this evil disappear; for while truancy laws are sufficient for cases of extended absence from school, they do not prevent irregularity in attendance in families where the advantages of free education are not fully appreciated. However, both the total and average attendance at the North Yarmouth schools is higher than in most of the surrounding towns.

But with the excellent facilties which the town furnishes for good schools, this condition ought to be expected, and there should be no feelings of entire satisfaction indulged in until the best results possible are reached, not only in this direction but in all others. The fine work being done by the North Yarmouth pupils in the several high schools they are attending, is a tribute to the excellence of their preparation for secondary studies and forms a very good criterion by which the present condition of your schools may be judged.

The "School Rally" recently held at Walnut Hill, proved as successful as previous ones, and the work of both teachers and pupils on that occassion was such as to warrant the statement that the schools of the town are in an excellent condition and moving in the right direction, in spite of the unavoidable but temporary draw- backs which are likely to occur from time to time under the most favorable circumstances.

Warrant for Town Meeting.

To E. G. Hayes, a Constable of the Town of North Yarmouth, in the County of Cumberland.

Greeting.

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town on Monday the fourteenth day of March A. D., 1910, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the reports of the Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor and Superintendent of Schools.
- Art. 4. To hear the report of the Trustees of the School Fund and vote how the moey shall be expended.
- Art. 5. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.

- Art. 6. To raise money for the support of Schools and of the poor, for the repairs of Roads, Bridges and School-houses, for the care of Cemeteries, for the payment of Town Officers, for Text Books, High School Tuition, extermination of Browu-tail Moths and Contingencies.
- Art. 7. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will raise for insurance, apparatus, appliances, and other school supplies.
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote "Yes" or "No" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to state aid for highways for the year 1910.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and set apart \$150 00 to be expended in building a state road.
- Art. 11. To see if the town will vote to have all bushes, scrub apple trees and cherry trees within the road limits cut and burned and raise money for the same.

- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to build an iron fence across the front of the cemetery nearCrockett's Corner and raise money for the same.
- Art. 13. To see if the town will vote to establish and maintain an iron fountain watering privilege, opposite the store of Collins Bros. within the limits of the highway and raise money for the same.
- Art. 14. To hear and act on the report of the Committee appointed at the last annual town meeting to investigate conditions regarding the forming of a Cemetery Association.
- Art. 15. To see if the town will vote to accept such persons as bondsmen as the Treasurer and Collector may present.
- Art. 16. To see what instruction the town will give the Selectmen and Treasurer to meet liabilities which might arise during the ensuing year.
- Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to co-operate with the town of Yarmouth in accepting a law passed for the better protection of shell fish in said Yarmouth and arrange for any details to carry out the pupose of the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town House at 9 o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
