Student and Faculty Success

meeting. Their paper,



"Using Signaling Theory to Explain Organizational Attractiveness," was developed from Mikayla's Honors thesis. The paper uses a series of vignette experiments to examine how different combinations of flexible work arrangements influence the perceived attractiveness of working for an organization. Their paper will be presented at SMA2024 and is currently going through peer review at a highly-ranked management journal.

Publication

Dr. Manuel Wörsdörfer's paper "Biden's Executive Order on Al: Strengths, Weaknesses, and Possible Reform Steps" has been accepted for publication in the computer ethics journal *Al and Ethics*. The paper's abstract reads as follows: In recent years, numerous Al ethics and government initiatives have emerged globally. The E.U.'s Al Act and the Biden Administration's Executive Order on Al are the most notable legislations. While many articles have assessed the strengths and weaknesses of the Al Act and suggested reform measures to enhance it, only a few have done the same for the Executive Order. This article addresses this research gap by offering a comprehensive analysis of the Executive Order. Specifically, it provides a critical computerethical (i.e., Kantian-ordoliberal) evaluation of the Executive Order's advantages and disadvantages and explores potential ways to strengthen it.

Presentation
