Warrant

To A. L. BROWN, a constable of the town of Monson, in the
county of Piscataquis, GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town of Monson, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble at Tarr's Hall in said town on Monday the eighteenth day of March A. D. 1912 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting. *A. F. Jackson*
- Prayer by Mr. Brown*
Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year. *Harry Shyler*
- Art. 3. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year. *J. A. Bray - W. W. Pullen - A. C. Gilbert*
- Art. 4. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of schools. *700.*
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of the poor. *700.*
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the repairs and maintenance of roads and bridges and how the same shall be expended. *2200.*
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the town will raise to defray all incidental town charges and for miscellaneous purposes. *1500.*
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of sidewalks and how the same shall be expended. ~~600~~ *600*
- Art. 9. To see if the town will vote to elect one or more road commissioners. *Eng - Flint*
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will raise or appropriate for the payment of interest on town debt. *200.*
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will raise for free text books. *300.*

Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for free High School and how the same shall be expended, and to authorize the school committee to make a contract with the trustees of Monson Academy. *900*

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will raise for school apparatus and appliances. *700*

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for repairs on school houses. *100*

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will raise not exceeding \$35 for expenses of memorial day services. *35*

Art. 16. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, also chapter 21, Public Laws of 1911, and chapter 183, Public Laws of 1911, relating to the appropriation of money to entitle the town to state aid for highway for the year 1912.

Art. 17. To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amounts regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways and bridges, the sum of \$400.00, being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, also chapter 21, Public Laws of 1911, and chapter 183, Public Laws of 1911.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid September 15th at 6 per cent interest until paid.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to employ a man janitor at the new school house and raise money for the same.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to collect all poll taxes before July 15th, 1912.

Art. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lights for the ensuing year.

Art. 22. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the benefit of the Monson Free Public Library.

Art. 23. To see what the town will vote to do in regard to

building a vault for the town records, or buying a safe for the town office, and raise money for the same.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the repairs of the Cottage roads at Indian Point, and how the same shall be expended.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to use their own discretion in regard to maintaining a school in those districts where there are less than the required number of scholars.

Art. 26. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to draw orders for all money appropriated by the town for High school when the same is needed.

Art. 27. To see if the town will raise or appropriate a sum of money to be paid to the Monson Cornet Band for evening concerts during the summer months.

Art. 28. To see if the town will vote to buy a gravel bank and raise money for the same.

Art. 29. To see what sum of money the town will raise for fire department and how the same shall be expended.

Art. 30. To see what sum of money the town will raise to repair heating plant at new schoolhouse and how the same shall be expended.

Art. 31. To see what action the town will take in regard to repairing Wilkins St., also sidewalks on Wilkins and Hebron St., as requested by members of the Lutheran church, and to raise money for the same.

The selectmen will be in session at Tarr's Hall on Monday the eighteenth day of March, A. D. 1912, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of revising the list of voters.

Superintendent of Schools' Report

The work of the schools has had no serious interruptions during the year with the exception of two days when the furnace in the grammar school building was being repaired, and there have been less changes in the teaching force than usual.

The Academy continues under the able management of Mr. Scott who during the three years that he has been principal of this school has done much to increase its usefulness. At the end of the spring term all were sorry to lose as assistant, Miss Record, who resigned after a year of faithful and good work. In the fall Miss Frances Arnold of Orono came to fill this vacancy and is proving herself to be well qualified for the position.

Mr. Deane and Miss Robinson are graduates of the normal school at Farmington, and have shown by their methods in teaching the great benefit derived from such a course.

At the end of the spring term Miss Phyllis Pennington resigned her position as teacher of the first grade, after a long and very successful term of office, and her sister, Miss Violet Pennington took her place in the fall, and is filling the position in a satisfactory manner.

All those teachers who have remained in the same school for the entire year have done excellent work.

Much credit is due to our music teacher, Mrs. Genthner for the work which she has accomplished in the schools, and for the fine entertainment given by the children under her direction, with the assistance of the grade teachers, at which a large sum was realized, which was used to help pay for a piano for the Grammar school building. A piano has also been purchased by the Academy pupils for their room.

Some other much needed improvements and repairs have been made during the year. The Vinton and North school rooms have been painted and made much more wholesome and attractive.
