Art. 12. To see what sum of money the town will raise for superintendent of schools salary. *142.00*

Art. 13. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for free high school and how the same shall be expended, and to authorize the school committee to make a contract with the trustees of Monson Academy. *900, 1400*

Art. 14. To see what sum of money the town will raise for apparatus and appliances.

Art. 15. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for repairs on school houses.

Art. 16. To see what sum of money the town will raise not exceeding thirty-five dollars for expenses of Memorial day services.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provision of chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws 1909, also Chapter 21, Public Laws 1911, and Chapter 183, Public Laws, 1911, relating to the appropriation of money to entitle the town to State aid for highway for the year 1913.

Art. 18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate in addition to the amount regularly raised and appropriated for the care of ways, highways, and bridges, the sum of \$400.00 being the maximum amount which the town is allowed to raise under the provisions of chap. 112 of Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, as amended by Chap. 69, Public Laws of 1909, also Chap. 21, Public Laws of 1911, and Chap. 183, Public Laws, 1911.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid Sept. 15, at 6% int. until paid.

Art. 20. To see if the town will vote to employ a janitor at the new school house and raise money for same.

Art. 21. To see if the town will vote to collect all poll taxes before July 15, 1913.

Art. 22. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lights for the ensuing year.

Art. 23. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the benefit of the Monson Free Public Library.

Art. 24. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the repairs of the Cottage roads at Indian Point and how the same shall be expended.

Art. 25. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to use their discretion in regard to maintaining a school in those districts where there are less than the required number of scholars.

Art. 26. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to draw orders for all money appropriated by the town for high school when the same is needed.

Art. 27. To see if the town will raise a sum of money to be paid to the Monson Band for evening concerts during the summer months.

Art. 28. To see what sum of money the town will raise for the fire department and how the same shall be expended.

Art. 29. To see if the town will vote to furnish three more lights on Grove St. provided the poles are furnished and set.

Art. 30. To see what the town will do with the old heating plant.

Art. 31. To see if the town will vote to licenses, shooting galleries and pool rooms.

Art. 32. To see if the town will take some action in regard to helping repair the Academy as requested by the Trustees and to raise money for the same and how the same shall be expended.

Art. 33. To see if the town will instruct the selectmen to hire money to pay running expenses until sufficient taxes are collected.

The selectmen will be in session at Spencer's Hall, on Monday, the seventeenth day of March, A. D., 1913, at 9 o'clock in the forenoon, for the purpose of revising the list of voters.

Superintendent of Schools' Report

As in the past three years, John A. Scott has been principal of Monson Academy. Miss Louise Arnold of University of Maine was the assistant in the Spring term. Upon the resignation of Miss Arnold, Miss Martha Strout of Boston University was engaged to take the place of assistant, which place she now ably fills.

A commercial course has been added to the curriculum of the Academy, with Clarence E. Deys as instructor. Excellent work has been done in this department. Money to pay for the instruction in this course was raised by a few of the citizens who kindly gave their time and services in a drama for this benefit. There has been enough to pay for the course to the present time but some measures will have to be taken for more funds to carry on the course.

Manual training, agriculture, domestic science and a teachers' training should be added to the course of instruction.

The Academy building needs a heating apparatus. It is also in need of repairs. A new foundation and a basement. At least \$1,000 ought to be raised to meet these requirements.

The instruction in the common schools as a whole has been excellent. From comparison of the work done in the grades of Monson with the work done in some of the larger towns I find it equal to and often leads.

The primary school has been overcrowded. There being about 53 pupils to one teacher and room. By building two dormer windows, two rooms could be made in the attic of the grammar school building. This would place all the grades in one building, give the primary scholars more room, better ventilation and a chance for two teachers. These rooms could be finished for about \$1.

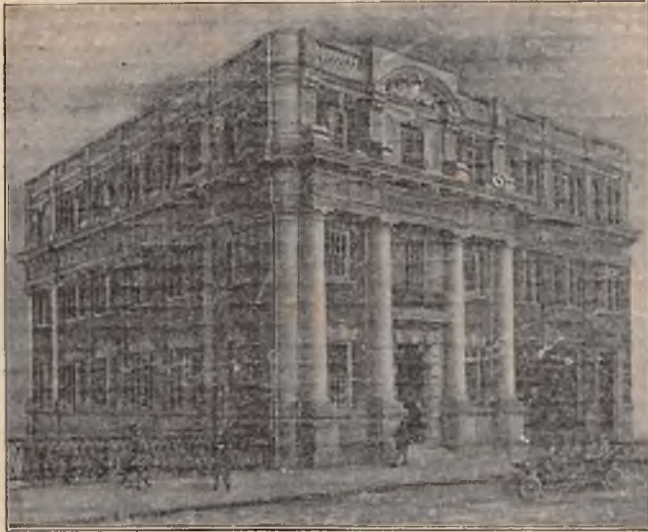
