

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Officials and Citizens of Monson:

I hereby submit my annual report as superintendent of your schools. The part of this report relating to school conditions in the town has purposely been made very brief. Figures pertaining to tax rates are given for general information. In addition I have pointed out some of the features of a new school finance bill which

is being considered at this time.

This year the average of the school rates for the state is .01214 while the average of the municipal rates is .05626. The school rate for the town of Monson is .01541 while the municipal rate is .057. These figures will determine the right of the several towns to participate in the equalization fund. The purpose of this fund is to assist towns where the school maintenance and municipal rates equal or exceed the average rates for the state.

The new school finance bill which has been formulated and is now before the Legislature is an act to guarantee a minimum educational program and to provide for the equalization of educational opportunity for the youth of the state. The bill provides for greater participation on the part of the State in financing the educational activities of all communities. It would establish a foundation program the support of which would be borne one half by the State and one half by the community. In dollars it would cost \$783 per elementary school unit and \$1,305 per high school unit. The bill further provides that the State would share on the same basis the cost of transportation and board of pupil.

This paragraph is to show how the new bill would affect the school funds for Monson. These figures have been compiled by the Department of Education from their latest reports. The appropriation of \$7223 for 1935-36 required a tax rate of .01714. The increase of \$2,941 in state subsidy under the new bill makes it possible for the town of Monson to maintain schools at the same level as 1935-36 with an appropriation of less than \$7223. The increased subsidy may be used to improve the educational opportunity or to decrease the town's appropriation for school support thereby decreasing the property tax and relieving the town to that extent.

SCHOOL PROGRESS

The school procedure during the year has been largely one of carrying on with a program already established. It seems that a policy of following a definite program leads to better progress on the part of the pupils. Although no important changes have been made in the school program more stress has been given to certain phases of school work. At the beginning of the school year the Commissioner of Education called to the attention of school officials certain matters which should be especially emphasized in the school program this year. An account of these matters is given in the following paragraphs.

A special effort is being made to stress the importance of safety as it relates itself to the use of automobiles on our highways. The waste of property and loss of life in this country because of the mis-use of motor driven vehicles is ever increasing. In an endeavor to bring about improved conditions the public schools have an important part, and the Commissioner of Education has called attention to this important phase of school work and has emphasized the fact that in every school a suitable type of program for safety education should become effective.

Again the Commissioner of Education points out the importance of following very closely the State Elementary School Curriculum in all elementary schools in the state. The state law provides that the Department of Education shall furnish a course of study for all elementary schools unless a municipality has developed its own course of study which has been approved by the State Department. We have a helpful course of study and teachers have been urged to become thoroughly familiar with its content and follow it closely.

Because of the widespread demand on the part of teachers, superintendents, parents and citizens in general for an outline study in temperance to be used in the public schools of the State a comprehensive course of study in temperance has been issued by the State Department of Education, and copies have been received and placed in the schools. The course is entitled, The Science of Living, which implies good citizenship and the necessity of practicing total abstinence from all things harmful and moderation in all phases of

human activity. The main objective of the program is to develop correct habits, right attitudes and clear thinking on the part of our school pupils which will lead them to become masters of themselves. For only through such mastery can real contentment and happiness in life be attained. We will have in this curriculum material which will be of value in developing a real science of living. Through the right type of instruction much may be expected in the way of improvement for the youthful citizens of our State.

SCHOOL FUNDS NEEDED

In the January issue of Maine State School Bulletin the Commissioner of Education explains that according to reliable statistics Maine has recovered in prosperity appreciably from the low point of 1933. He calls to the attention of school officials the necessity of providing at the coming March meetings for increased appropriations for support of public schools. He maintains that costs are increasing along all lines and that the school dollar will not anywhere near begin to purchase as much as a school dollar in 1933 when costs were at a low point. He thinks that all school budgets should be planned in such a way as to provide for these increased costs, otherwise educational facilities in our schools will be diminished and a corresponding loss of educational services result for our pupils.

The school budget which has been planned for your consideration shows what it will cost to maintain your schools if salaries remain as they are now. I feel that your school officials cannot assure you that you can expect to secure teachers for your schools at the same salaries you were paying in 1933 when salaries were at a low point. It is to be hoped that some appropriation may be agreed upon which will be fair to the teachers and reasonable to the tax payers.

Very likely we will be having in the near future notices that the prices of textbooks and school supplies have been advanced, but I look for no increases that cannot be taken care of through the usual appropriations this year. The recommendation for school repairs not only includes a sum for regular school repairs, but contains an estimate on the cost for painting the grammar school building.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL OF MONSON ACADEMY

To the Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby present my second annual report as Principal

of Monson Academy.

The fall term began September 8 with an enrollment of 66 students in classes as follows: Seniors 12, Juniors 12, Sophomores 21 and Freshmen 21. The average attendance for the fall term was 63.83. There were 30 students who were not absent for any session. We have been more fortunate than many schools in not having any serious outbreak of colds or contagious diseases.

The average number of students making the honor roll each period has been 21. This comprises one third of our present student body which is a very good percentage. Other students have lacked only a few points of making the honor roll and undoubtedly could make

it with a little more effort.

Two students were certified under the New England College Certification Board, and both are doing very creditable work in college. Certification of those students maintaining a certain rank is certainly an asset to the school, and a constant incentive to keep the cali-

bre of work in Monson Academy on a high level.

This year there are twelve former students of Monson Academy attending institutions of higher learning. This is equal to the number to be graduated in June. These 12 students are enrolled in the following institutions: Northeastern University 1, Farmington Normal 3, Colby College 1, University of Maine 1, Maine School of Commerce 2, Eastern Maine General Hospital 1, State Hospital 1, and Massachusetts General Hospital 1.

Since the students who have graduated from professional schools in recent years have been able to get positions it would seem that in the light of better economic conditions professional training will prove to be a very valuable investment. To prepare students for professional training and for taking their places in the community even without further study is the very important function of Monson Academy.

New apparatus for the Physics and General Science Courses has been added this year as well as new textbooks in Junior and Senior English. Other textbooks have been replaced, and the school has been well furnished with work books and supplies.

Our laboratory is so small that it is impossible for all students to do individual experiments or even give them working space at the tables, but they are able to observe and gain a good general knowledge of the course.

We have taken advantage of the State Lending Library this year and have purchased a number of books for our library which is under the supervision of a student librarian. We also have subscriptions to several magazines and to a daily paper.

Five Students have had employment on student aid projects through the NYA which has been a help both to them, and in supplementing the work of the teachers and janitor. In no way does this work lessen the duties of either but it does make possible extra services.

The Senior Class has presented a 3 Act play this year and has been active in other ventures to raise money for graduation.

The Dramatic Club will present a One Act Play for the State Contest. The school paper, The Pharetra, with a complete alumni list will be published in April.

The Freshmen Prize Speaking Contest was held in February and the Sophomore Prize Speaking will be held early in March. The practice of the Academy Trustees in awarding prizes is appreciated by the students and townspeople.

A toboggan slide was erected by the Athletic Association in cooperation with the class in Problems of American Democracy.

The basketball team, made up largely of inexperienced players, was not as successful as past teams coached by George Larson, but a large number of boys were afforded good recreation by the sport. For the second time a freshman team was sponsored by the school.

It would be very desirable to have a girls' basketball team in the school, but the cost of practice has prohibited it during the past few years.

The need for a gymnasium in connection with Athletics and Recreational Work, especially when it is necessary to develop inexperienced players, is increasingly felt.

The activities carried on by the Academy have been made possible this year by the very excellent support of the people of Monson. We intend to make all extra curricula work self-supporting, and we hesitate sometimes to increase our activities lest we impose upon their

patronage.

In closing may I again express my appreciation to you, to the school officials, to the parents and townspeople, and to the teachers of Monson who have given me their assistance and cooperation during the year.

ANNUAL TOWN WARRANT

To A. L. Brown, a Constable in the Town of Monson, in the County of Piscataquis: GREETINGS

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the said town of Monson qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to assemble in Town Hall in said town of Monson the 22nd day of March A. D. 1937 at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:—

- ART. 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To see if the town will vote to accept the town report as printed.
- ART. 4. To see if the town will vote to fix the compensation of the Board of Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor.
- ART. 5. To choose all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 6. To see what action the town will take in regard to installing a heating plant in the Town building and raise money for the same.
- ART. 7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of schools.

- ART. 8. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the support of poor.
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair and maintenance of roads and bridges, and how the same shall be expended.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to defray all incidental and town charges and for miscellaneous purposes.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the care of sidewalks and how the same shall be expended.
- ART. 12. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise to pay interest on town debts.
- ART. 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for free text books.
- ART. 14. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the Superintendent of Schools Salary.
- ART. 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for free high school and how the same shall be expended, and to authorize the school committee to make a contract with the Trustees of Monson Academy.
- ART. 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for high school library and laboratory.
- ART. 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for school supplies and equipment.
- ART. 18. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the repair of schoolhouses.
- ART. 19. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Memorial Day services.
- ART. 20. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to state aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- ART. 21. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the improvement of the State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways and bridges.
- ART. 22. To see if the town will vote to author-

ize the assessors to transfer any amounts appropriated by the town for State Aid Highway construction in excess of the amount required to meet State apportionments, to the Highway account.

- ART. 23. To see if the town will vote and raise a sum of money for the maintenance of the so-called "50-50" State Patrol Roads.
- ART. 24. To see what sum (if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint state aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to state aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P. L. of 1931.
- ART. 25. To see if the town will vote to accept a W. P. A. project of repairing and surfacing, suitable for tar surface, the North Guilford road and raise money for the same.
- ART. 26. To see if the town will vote to allow a sliding scale of discount and how much on taxes paid prior to August 15, 1937.
- ART. 27. To see if the town will vote to charge interest on all taxes remaining unpaid September 15, 1937, interest to begin on September 1, 1937, and what rate of interest shall be charged.
- ART. 28. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for street lights for the ensuing year.
- ART. 29. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for the Monson Free Public Library.
- ART. 30. To see if the town will vote to authorize the superintending school committee to use their discretion in regard to maintaining schools in those districts where there are less than the required number of scholars.
- ART. 31. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for purchase of school flags.
- ART. 32. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of Money to be paid to Monson Band for evening concerts.
- ART. 33. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the fire department.
- ART. 34. To see if the town will vote to raise one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for School Health Nurse and

authorize the Selectmen and Superintendent of Schools to hire the same.

- ART. 35. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for services of School Physician, in connection with Health officer and School Nurse, and authorize the Selectmen to hire the same.
- ART. 36. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for insurance on school buildings and for power and lights.
- ART. 37. To see if the town will vote to authorize and instruct the Selectmen and Treasurer to hire money for town purposes.
- ART. 38. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to borrow money during the present municipal year in anticipation of, and to be paid out of, the taxes of the current year 1937 and 1938, and to execute and deliver the negotiable promissory note or notes of the town therefor.
- ART. 39. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Sexton to collect payment of the sale of Cemetery lots and for making deeds of same.
- ART. 40. To see if the town will vote NOT to accept sums of money less than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars for perpetual care of cemetery lots.
- ART. 41. To see what action the town will take in regard to the purchase of land for a new cemetery plot and make arrangements for payment of same.
- ART. 42. To see what sum of money the town will vote to grant and raise to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- ART. 43. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and pay on town debts.
- ART. 44. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for Mother's Aid.
- ART. 45. To see what part of the winter roads the town will vote to have plowed and raise money for the same.
- ART. 46. To see if the town will authorize and instruct the Selectmen to buy stumpage to provide fuel and labor for the town poor, if necessary.

- ART. 47. To see if the town will vote to withhold sums of money due from the town until such time as any indebtedness shall have been paid.
- ART. 48. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the maintenance of improved section of third class road, or to be used in connection with third class apportionment made by the state for the improvement of third class roads.
- ART. 49. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to work those receiving town aid, the same work to be credited to their indebtedness to the town.
- ART. 50. To see what action the town will take in regard to repairs on Town Road signs and raise money for the same.
- ART. 51. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars to be used for Athletic purposes in Monson Academy, the same to be expended through the Academy Athletic Association under the direction of the Principal.
- ART. 52. To see what action the town will take in regard to the purchase of a 500 gal. Pumping Fire Engine and raise money for same, if necessary.
- ART. 53. To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of one hundred (\$100.00) dollars each, the same to be held in trust, the income to be used for perpetual care of the cemetery lots of Sam Ulman, Dr. Harry W. Sampson, William H. Fogg, John L. Johnson and Mrs. Pearl Swanton, the money to be paid to the Town Treasurer by May 1, 1937.
- ART. 54. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.
