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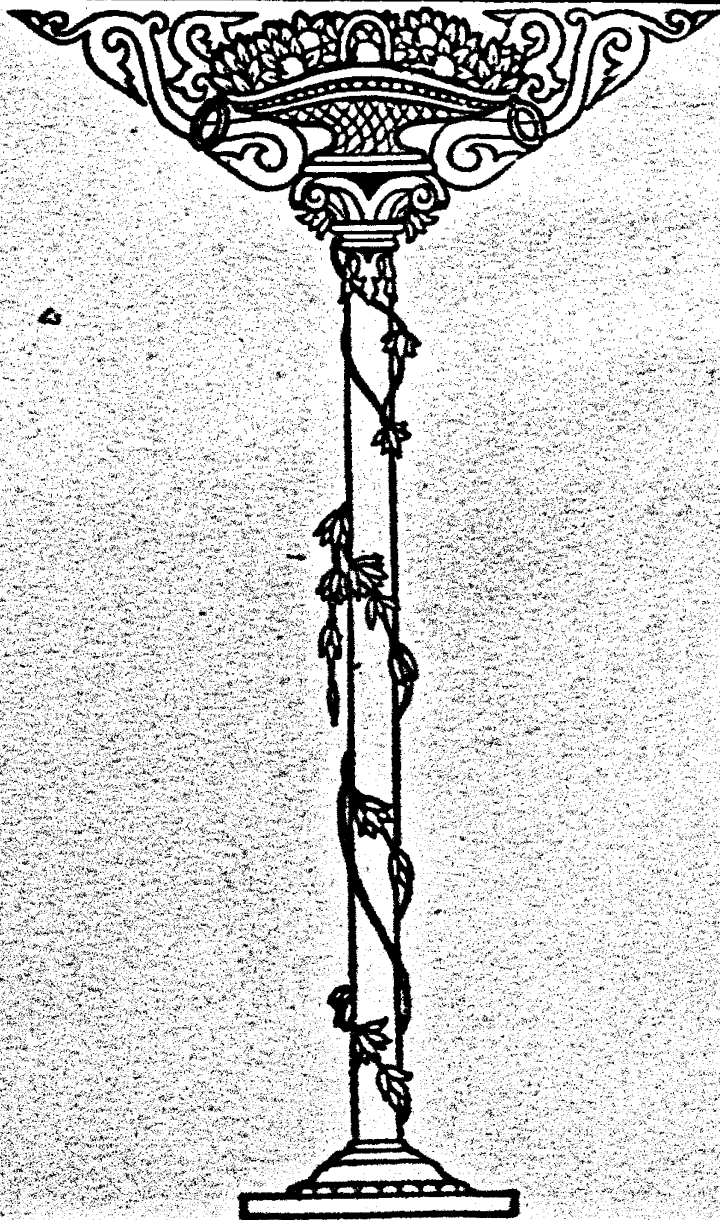

The preceding statistics show no marked change from those of last year, the total attendance for the year being a little smaller while the average for the year remains exactly the same. The number of teachers employed is smaller and the average wages per week a few cents more than for the year before. The usual falling-off is shown for the winter term both in the total and average attendance,—a change which, perhaps, is to be expected under the existing conditions, for small children living at a distance from the schools can not attend during the severe storms of the winter season.

The most notable variation from the figures of last year is shown in the number attending the different schools. A year ago the Buxton school showed by far the largest total and average attendance, but this is now changed to the Dunn school which is now considerably larger than any of the others.

The number of pupils attending High schools has increased slightly as has the percentage of attendance at all schools. Indeed there is much cause for satisfaction to those who believe in education in the large percentage of persons in town of school age now attending school.

In some respects, however, the statistics do not show conditions with sufficient accuracy since the school year and the fiscal year do not coincide; so that, while it would appear from the number of different teachers employed during the period covered by the figures presented that changes had been frequent during the school year, as a matter of fact the same teachers have been employed in all of the schools during the past two terms and are to return for the spring term.

In fact there has been only one case during the past fiscal year where it seemed necessary for the good of the school to make any change in the teaching staff, the other changes being the result of the resignation of the teachers.

On the whole the teachers of the past year as a body seem to have been better adapted to the work and more capable of dealing successfully with the conditions confronting them than has been the case for some time, and as a result the work has been more satis-

factory and better progress has been made. As I have stated in a former report, the teacher of the rural school is by far the most important factor in producing excellent results. For without a teacher who not only can teach the various subjects of the curriculum successfully but govern her school and look out for the school property and a multiplicity of other details connected with school work, all other advantages prove of little avail; while a strong and efficient teacher who can cope successfully with a new condition as it arises will prove successful under almost any circumstances. When it is said that this or that teacher has failed because her pupils were disorderly or dull or even delinquent, it means that for some reason or reasons she was not able to properly appreciate the situation and cope with the conditions.

The requirements of the successful rural school teacher are really more varied and exacting than those of any other class of school, for to her is intrusted the manifold duties that in the case of other schools are divided among several persons. In order to fill her position successfully the rural teacher must not only govern and instruct her pupils, but she must care for their health, comfort, morals and manners both in school and out, have a close supervision over all school property, see that the janitor does his work properly, and keep her schoolroom in a neat and tidy condition.

Unless the teacher is willing to undertake all this and more, she ought, under no circumstance, to apply for a position in a rural school.

The question on the part of the superintendent is to find teachers who are capable to do all this and who will accept positions at salaries that are paid rural teachers.

TEXT BOOKS.

The text books of the town are in a good condition and in every way sufficient for the needs of the school. No introductions have been made during the year and all expense incurred has been confined to supplying books where the old ones have become too dilapidated for further use.

A re-listing of the text books of all the schools is in process of accomplishment, by which it is expected that the teachers can keep a closer oversight of them and prevent, in some measure at least, the carelessness in their use which appears from time to time.

SUPPLIES.

The customary supplies have been furnished the schools throughout the year at about the usual expense.

SCHOOL HOUSE REPAIRS.

The only large undertaking in this line was at the Walnut Hill School where in addition to other needed repairs, new hard-wood floors were laid in the schoolroom and hall. In addition to this work, two of the buildings have been painted and minor repairing done to the interior of all.

DRAWING.

For the first time this subject has been introduced into all the schools and the work has been carried on by the teachers with excellent results.

The system in use is one in which colors are introduced from the start and the intention is to give the child an idea of the artistic effect of their proper combination. Some of the work of the pupils of the different schools was exhibited at the School Rally held at Walnut Hill at the close of the winter term and shows how the plan is being worked out.

MUSIC.

From several causes instruction in music was discontinued during the fall and winter terms of the past year, but it is expected that arrangements will be made for its continuation during the coming year, as heretofore. It hardly seems as if the town ought to permit this important subject to be omitted from the curriculum of the schools, especially after such excellent results as have appeared in the past

THE SCHOOL RALLY.

The customary "Rally" was held at the Walnut Hill vestry on March 1, in which the pupils and teachers of the different schools united in exercises tending to exemplify the work of the schools. Besides the usual class exercises, recitations and musical selections by the pupils, a very interesting talk on China was given by Miss McGown and an able and interesting address on, "What Constitutes a Liberal Education" by Prof. John O. Hall, Principal of North Yarmouth Academy.

The advantage of bringing the schools together for these exercises is so evident that the custom should be continued indefinitely. As the success of these meetings depends largely upon the Ladies' Aid Society connected with the Walnut Hill church, due credit should be given the President, Mrs. Frank Sawyer, and other members of the society through whose efforts the fine dinner was prepared and served to all present.

IN CONCLUSION.

From nearly every view-point the work of the schools during the past year has been a success. No serious interruption has occurred on account of sickness or for other reasons. The discipline in all the schools has been excellent and maintained without severity or friction. Progress in the studies has been uniform and fairly rapid. The grading of the pupils has been kept intact and the course of study followed except where it has seemed best to make some slight deviation.

The financial report which follows shows that in most cases the balances are on the right side of the account and that, while the schools have cost the town a comparatively large amount of money no exorbitant expenditure has been made in any direction.

Warrant for Town Meeting.

To E. G. Hayes, a constable of the Town of North Yarmouth
in the County of Cumberland.

Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of North Yarmouth qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town House in said town on Monday, the eleventh day of March A. D. 1912, at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art. 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To hear and act on the reports of the Town Treasurer, Selectmen, Overseers of the Poor, and Superintendent of schools.
- Art. 4. To hear and act on the report of the Trustees of the School Fund and vote how the money shall be expended.
- Art. 5. To hear and act on the report of the Cemetery Commission.
- Art. 6. To receive accounts against the town and raise money for such as may be allowed.
- Art. 7. To choose all such officers as are required by law to be chosen in the month of March annually.

- Art. 8. To raise money for the support of Schools and of the Poor, for the repairs of Roads, Bridges, and School houses, for the payment of Town Officers, for Text Books, High School Tuition, extermination of Brown Tail Moths, and Contingencies.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will raise for insurance, apparatus, appliances and other school supplies.
- Art. 10. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" upon the adoption of the provisions of Chapter 112 of the Public Laws of Maine, for the year 1907, as amended by Chapter 69, Public Laws of 1909, also Chapter 21, Public Laws of 1911, and Chapter 183, Public Laws of 1911, relating to the appropriation of money necessary to entitle the town to State aid for highways for the year 1912.
- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and set apart to be expended in building a state road. To hear and act on the report of the Selectmen, Town Treasurer and Town Clerk of revising the jury box.
- Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to accept such persons as bondsmen as the Treasurer and Collector may present
- Art. 13. To see what instruction the town will give the Selectmen and Treasurer to meet liabilities which might arise during the ensuing year.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the voting list in said Town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their

names entered upon said list, at the Town House at nine o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.
